



## Northampton Gets First Look at Possible Middle/High School Construction Plans

*Architects present five layouts for \$35.7 million project, which includes a combination of renovations to the existing high school and adding space with new construction*

Northampton supervisors and citizens got their first look at five possible layouts for the county's upgraded middle and high school Tuesday night in a presentation by architectural firm Waller, Todd & Sadler.

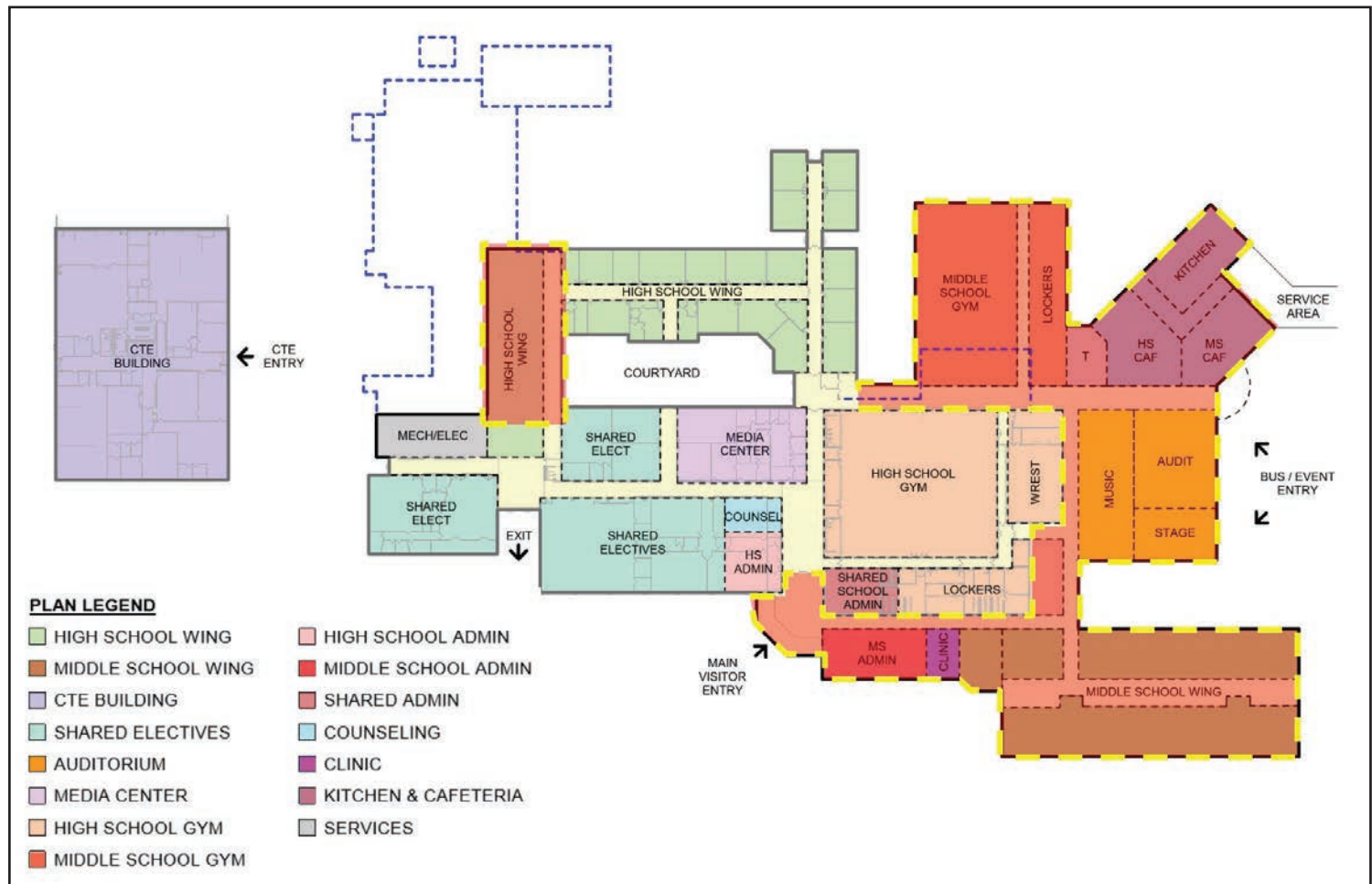
The 35.5-acre Northampton High School campus on Courthouse Road in Eastville will be transformed by demolishing the school buildings constructed in 1954, renovating the 1978 additions, and adding new construction.

The final product will increase the school's interior from about 110,000 to 145,000 square feet and will accommodate 1,000 students – 450 in the middle school, which will include students in grades 6 to 8, and 550 in the high school.

That area does not include more than 21,000 square feet of space in the Career and Technical Education building that will also be renovated.

A budget of \$35.7 million is proposed, including \$28.3 million for construction. The timeline for completion is 2.5 years, including two years for construction.

Possible upgrades to the outdoor

campus include a parking lot close to the main entrances, a bus loop accommodating 12 to 15 buses and separating bus and car traffic, new curb cuts, truck access for kitchen deliveries, and access to athletic fields.

The current athletic field house and bleachers may be renovated or replaced.

The five layouts presented by Waller, Todd & Sadler include all the following upgrades, but in different configurations:

- At least two separate entranc-

es, one for parents, visitors, and student drop-offs, and another for bus riders and special event guests. In some scenarios, entrances for middle school and high school students are also separate. Northampton High School currently has one main entrance at the front of the building for all students and visitors.

- A wing for a new auditorium, stage, and music room. The current auditorium, built in 1954,

will be torn down.

- A wing for a new kitchen, middle school cafeteria, and high school cafeteria. The current kitchen and cafeteria are also part of the 1954 building that will be demolished.
- Separate wings for the middle school and high school, where core classes will be taught. A third wing or group of classrooms for electives will be shared.

# Like Many Southern Towns, Parksley Faces Monumental Decision

The proposed sale of a Confederate monument erected in Parksley in 1899 is attracting attention.

The Parksley town council voted in June to sell the property for \$1 to the Sons of Confederate Veterans.

A public hearing is required by law before it can be sold.

It is unclear whether the town actually owns the monument and the land on which it stands — a deed recorded in 1903 says the lot was sold for \$1 by the Parksley Land and Improvement Company to the Harmanson-West Camp, Confederate Volunteers. Still, Accomack County lists it as belonging to the town.

Mayor Frank Russell said this week the town's attorney is still researching the property in county records.

"Until we find out whether we even own it, I have no comment. We don't know whether we own it or not; we are trying to find out," he said.

In the meantime, an Accomack County resident started an online fundraiser to make the town a count-

er offer for the property, a small plot at the corner of Cassatt Avenue and Mary Street.

The fundraiser, organized by Jay Ford, surpassed its \$10,000 goal and had raised \$11,295 from 139 donors by Wednesday, six days after it began.

"Should the town agree, the site would be used to erect the very first monument to Black persons on Virginia's Eastern Shore, one of the oldest communities in the United States," the description on the GoFundMe website says.

If the town rejects the offer, the money donated will go to the Thurgood Marshall College Fund and Black Lives Matter.

Asked why he started the fundraiser, Ford said, "It sort of built up in the wake of the George Floyd killing, with the ongoing conversation about racial equality and specifically letting people feel safe and making communities feel inclusive. It's something that we have tried to explain to our daughters and that we thought was really important — to engage this conversation. To be

honest, I felt like it was a conversation the Eastern Shore wasn't taking in earnest."

It is important that conversations about systemic racism take place in rural areas like the Shore as well in cities, Ford said.

"There's no justice if we leave rural Virginia out of it," he said.

Ford, who is White, participated in a rally in Accomack in June to protest Floyd's killing and has been speaking with members of the local faith community about racism.

Additionally, as a member of Gov. Ralph Northam's environmental justice council, Ford over the past year has gotten to hear from people of color around the state.

"And the most harrowing tales have been in the rural pockets of Virginia," he said.

Two young women, Shanyette Dickerson, 28, and Taniqua West, 33, who helped organize the Accomack rally and are Black, spoke about the current discussion surrounding the Parksley monument.

"It's not what I thought it was going to be. I thought it was going to be a little more positive than it is, simply because no one ever talks about that monument. It has been there forever, and now, all of a sudden, it's a big deal that it comes down, when literally no one ever talks about it," said Dickerson.

"Some people that are arguing about this right now just found out two weeks ago that there was even a Confederate monument on the Eastern Shore," she said, adding she herself only found out it existed a couple of months ago when an acquaintance noticed the monument and went closer to see what it was.

Ford asked for their thoughts about the fundraiser before he did it, West said.

"If they think that we don't realize that that's a race issue, they are wrong," Dickerson said about the town's proposal to sell the property.

Since the rally, they helped found the Melanin Action Project, an organization devoted to seeking racial equity, and that is collaborating with Virginia

Organizing to promote policy change.

“It’s encouraging for us as Black people to know that we have some positive allies who aren’t in it to get their five minutes of fame,” Dickerson said, adding, “I might not see that change in our lifetime, but at least I know that I spent my years on this earth fighting for my community, for the equality that we deserve.”

West said the millennial generation, of which they are a part, may be key to bringing about change.

“We tend to dance to the beat of our own drum and we stand up ... for what’s right, not taking no for an answer,” she said, adding, “...We have facts here ... so you can’t tell me that my feelings are invalid, you can’t tell me that I don’t matter, and you can’t tell me that none of this stuff that we are going through, past and present, isn’t true — because it is.”

Ford said in other localities where monuments like Parksley’s are being removed, the action is “being coupled with a meaningful conversation on racial equal-

ity and what it means to be an inclusive community — and in many places they are adopting significant reforms.”

Parksley recently received a grant to revitalize its downtown and is the site of the new regional library and Eastern Shore Heritage Center, which are under construction.

The proposal to sell the monument and have it remain in place doesn’t fit in with those initiatives, according to Ford.

“I think we are all rooting for what’s happening in Parksley. ... This is out of step with those projects that are designed to bring people back into the town, to get people spending dollars from both locals and off the Shore,” Ford said.

Having “the very first monument to the accomplishments of Black Virginians on the Eastern Shore” in Parksley would send “an incredibly inclusive, welcoming message that mirrors the investment that, quite frankly, our tax dollars are going into through their revitalization program and the library — it says they are open for all people,” Ford said.

## Charges Certified in Accomac Shooting

A judge certified to the grand jury charges against Robert James Northan, 34, of Parksley, in connection with a shooting near Accomac in March.

Judge Gordon Vincent in Accomack County General District Court July 24 certified two charges against Northan and dismissed a third charge. Vincent reduced a charge of attempted first-degree murder to attempted second-degree murder.

Northan also is charged with use of a firearm in commission of a felony.

A charge of use of a firearm by a convicted felon was dismissed after the commonwealth failed to introduce evidence of a prior conviction during the preliminary hearing.

Accomack County Sheriff Todd Wessells testified he responded to a residence at 24488 Tyler Lane in Accomac for a call of shots fired on March 25 at around 2:26 p.m.

Wessells said when he arrived, he found Donald Veney and his grandmother outside the front door of the residence.

Donald Veney “had blood coming from his mouth, his face, and his back,” Wessells testified.

Veney was standing when Wessells

arrived, but then “he just told me that RJ had shot him and he collapsed on the porch,” Wessells said, adding the victim had blood coming from his back and “as he was talking, he was blowing out blood from his mouth.”

Veney was transported to Riverside Shore Memorial Hospital.

Wessells asked Veney who shot him, and Veney again said RJ, according to Wessells’ testimony.

“I said, ‘RJ Northan?’ — and he said yes,” Wessells said.

Major Shane Childress and the ambulance crew heard the statement, Wessells said.

Donald Veney was called to testify next.

He replied in the negative to questions from Accomack County Commonwealth’s Attorney Spencer Morgan about whether he recalled the incident or being shot, and also to a question about whether he knows Northan.

Defense attorney Brandon Wilder said the alleged victim “gave no testimony” and asked the judge to dismiss or reduce the charges.

Northan was arrested by U.S. Marshals fugitive task force members in a Pocomoke City, Md., motel April 23.

- A separate gym and locker rooms will be built for the middle school. The high school will retain the current gym, which will be renovated.

In each scenario, the middle and high school will share a library/media center.

Each plan has advantages and disadvantages, leaving county and school officials to carefully consider their options.

For example, options A and B place a new middle school wing out front, enhancing the building’s overall curb appeal and giving the middle school its own space, but the distance from middle school classrooms to some elective classrooms could prove inconvenient.

Options C, D, and E do not propose major changes to the building’s facade but group the middle and high school wings, elective classrooms, li-

brary, and cafeterias on one side of the building. The areas most likely to be accessed by the public, such as the gyms and auditorium, are grouped on the opposite side of the building, by the main parking lot.

Superintendent Eddie Lawrence said option A, with the new middle school out front, was his favorite choice, and it would be an attractive option to the public.

School board members agreed. Chair Maxine Rasmussen said, “One thing, though, that we’ve heard from parents ... is they just wanted a new middle school, and if we put them in that back hallway — even though we give them two separate entrances — they are not going to consider that what they wanted.”

The final choice may not exactly match any layout presented by the architects Tuesday night, but it may combine elements from multiple layouts, according to what county and school officials believe will work best for Northampton students, employees, and the community.

## Northampton Approves Plan To Resume Classes in the Fall

*Majority of teachers ready to return to classroom; parents split on online vs. in-person learning*

The Northampton school board voted July 23 to approve the district's plan to resume classes in the fall amid the COVID-19 pandemic.

The plan gives parents a choice between 100% online learning for their children, or a hybrid option of two days in school and two days at home, with one day a week reserved for deep cleaning of classrooms.

"In my heart, I do feel there's not a safer place for the children than in our schools," said Superintendent Eddie Lawrence.

"As we look at the summer of unrest we've had, I think our schools can play a pivotal role in calming down the frustrations that a lot of people have — and children need to be in school with each other," he said.

Parents may choose online learning instead if they have reliable internet at home.

Associate Superintendent Christine Hill clarified that parents who choose the online learning option will decide how long their children stay in that program before returning to school in person. That could mean children learning from home for a month, a semester, or the whole year, she said.

A back-to-school survey was provided to school staff and parents by mail and electronically. Reminders to complete the survey were made by robocall and the Northampton County Public Schools website. The survey was also available in Spanish.

As of July 23, 137 staff and 287 parents had responded. Administrators planned to follow up with parents who had not responded starting Monday, July 27.

Of the teachers who responded, a majority were "prepared and ready to report" to school in the fall, Hill said. The teachers were also amenable to teaching remotely, she said.

Nearly 45% of parents who responded wanted the online learning option, Hill reported.

Only 30% of parents said their children will need to ride the bus. School board chair Maxine Rasmussen said that may relieve some of the burden on the operations department to provide bus transportation to students while adhering to state regulations.

Students must practice social distancing on school buses, which means, in most cases, one child per seat and multiple bus runs when bus drivers are already scarce.

During the public comment period, a letter by parent Felicia Matthews was read into the record. One of her concerns was what would happen if a Northampton teacher or student tested positive for COVID-19.

Due to privacy law, a student who tested positive for COVID-19 could not be named, but a letter would be sent home to parents informing them if a student or teacher tested positive for the virus.

Lawrence noted that the school division's "first line of defense" against such a situation is twice daily temperature checks for students — once before getting on the bus and again later in the day, he said.

Former school board member Nancy Proto also submitted a letter for public comment regarding an unrelated matter.

In a previous letter, Proto had asserted that the school board had done a poor job of evaluating the superintendent, and their actions were neither transparent nor conformed to the Virginia Code.

(The school board voted May 28 to reissue Lawrence a two-year contract without members receiving 30-days notice of the vote as required by law; that error was later corrected.)

Proto believed that Lawrence's performance should be judged in part by students' academic performance, since "instructional leadership" is one of the seven performance standards set by the Virginia Department of Education for school superintendents.

She called Rasmussen's June 30 comment that students are more than test scores a "copout."

Proto wrote, "The primary purpose of a school district is to educate its students. Regardless of what other growth students have made, if we have not educated them, we have failed."

# Governor Spares Shore From Tightening of Hampton Roads Coronavirus Restrictions

Gov. Ralph Northam announced July 28 he will tighten coronavirus-related restrictions in Hampton Roads due to its increased rate of positive cases of COVID-19, but other Virginia regions, including the Eastern Shore, will remain in Phase 3 of the state's reopening plan.

Starting Friday, July 31, in Hampton Roads, no bars may serve alcohol after 10 p.m., and no restaurants may be open after midnight.

"We all know that alcohol changes your judgment. You just don't care as much about social distancing after a couple of drinks. That's when the virus gets spread, and that's why we are taking this action," Northam said.

Also in Hampton Roads, restaurants may not use more than 50% of their indoor seating capacity, and gatherings will be limited to 50 people or fewer.

Eastern Shore citizens will be unaffected except for those who may travel to the Hampton Roads area.

The restrictions will apply to the Virginia cities of Virginia Beach, Norfolk,

Newport News, Chesapeake, Hampton, Portsmouth, Suffolk, Poquoson, Williamsburg, and York and James City counties.

The percentage of positive COVID-19 tests is down statewide, from 7.7% last week to 7.3% this week.

The positivity rate has dropped to 5.7% in Northern Virginia, 5% in the northwest region, and 6.8% in central Virginia. The southwest region has remained "relatively stable" at 7.1%.

However, the COVID-19 positivity rate in Hampton Roads is 10.8%.

In Hampton Roads cities, the COVID-19 positivity rate ranges from 9.9% to 18.6%.

The COVID-19 situation in Virginia got the attention of Dr. Deborah Birx, the White House's coronavirus response coordinator, who met with Northam earlier in the day.

Among her concerns were the demand for COVID-19 tests and the wait times for test results as the coronavirus continues to spread through southern states.

Birx recommended pooled testing, which tests a group of samples together,

allowing more people to be tested using fewer testing supplies and resources.

A negative result means all the samples were negative; a positive result means at least one person tested positive and each person in the group must be tested individually.

"If we can, through pooling, double and triple testing availability, then you decrease turnaround times by 3x (three times)," Birx said.

Northam approved of pooled testing and developing an "on-the-spot" test that could give results in 15 to 20 minutes.

Waiting 10 to 14 days for COVID-19 test results is "unacceptable," Northam said.

More than 1.15 million COVID-19 tests have been administered in Virginia to date.

Virginia has had about 87,000 cases of COVID-19, and more than 2,000 related deaths, numbers representing "real people and real lives" affected by the coronavirus pandemic, Northam said.

Virginia Health Commissioner Norman Oliver reported 922 new cases

of COVID-19 and 20,138 additional COVID-19 tests completed as of July 27.

COVID-19 cases aren't trending down everywhere, but there is "hopeful news," Northam said.

Virginia "has so far avoided the dramatic increases that other parts of the country are seeing," and the number of COVID-19 cases remains relatively stable in four of the state's five health districts, he said.

For example, COVID-19 cases in Northern Virginia – where about 3 million of the state's approximately 8.5 million people live – dropped by two-thirds since the coronavirus pandemic was at its peak in May.

Nursing homes, which accounted for one-third of Virginia COVID-19 cases, have about 1% of cases now.

Nearly 3,000 Virginia nursing home residents have recovered from COVID-19, about 12,000 COVID-19 patients have been discharged from Virginia hospitals, and a vaccine is on the way, Northam said.

He offered counsel to those who may be losing hope: "Be not afraid, do not let yourself grow weary. We're going to get through this together."

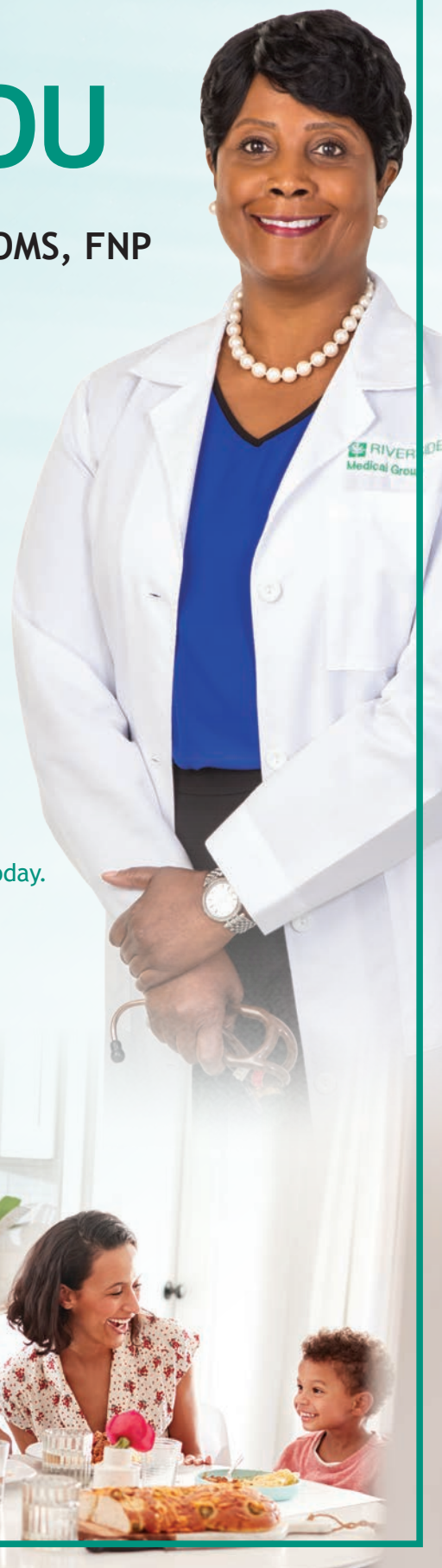

*Preserve closes until at least Oct. 1 to repair damage and ensure public safety*

The Cape Charles Natural Area Preserve is closed for repairs as of Wednesday, July 29, due to trespassing and unauthorized access to the natural habitats from the boardwalk, according to a recent press release from the Virginia Department of Conservation and Recreation (DCR).

"The urge to get outside during the pandemic has led to a steadily increasing level of visitation that is impacting the stability of the boardwalk and the sensitive natural communities it traverses," said Dot Field, the Eastern Shore steward of DCR's Natural Heritage division.

The natural area preserve is about a half-mile from the Cape Charles Harbor, with its entrance tucked away behind a chemical lab on Patrick Henry Avenue.

Public access to the preserve is permitted via the boardwalk, which ends in an overlook of the Chesapeake Bay.

A sign at the end of the boardwalk warns visitors that beach access is not permitted from the preserve.

Unauthorized access to the shore has worsened erosion at the end of the boardwalk and "is in direct conflict with the conservation purposes of the preserve," the press release stated.

"Repairs are needed to ensure public safety if the preserve is to open for reuse," it continues.

The 29-acre preserve will be closed until at least Oct. 1.

During the closure, the boardwalk will be repaired and modified so the public can access the preserve safely without further worsening shoreline erosion or otherwise negatively impacting protected natural heritage resources.

"Taking a walk on the boardwalk at Cape Charles Natural Area Preserve has long provided visitors and residents of Cape Charles with the opportunity to bird watch, bay-gaze and otherwise immerse themselves in a quiet natural setting," Field said.

"DCR, with the assistance of the Master Naturalist chapter, has always

been pleased to be able to safely provide this experience," she said.

Visitation at the Cape Charles preserve had exceeded capacity in recent months, including unauthorized access to the sandy shore, eroding dunes, and coastal maritime forest, which provide a habitat for the federally endangered northeastern beach tiger beetle, whose scientific name is *cicindela dorsalis dorsalis*.

The northeastern beach tiger beetle is recognized by its sandy color and dark markings that are vaguely similar to a tiger's stripes.

It eats small invertebrates and scavenges on dead fish, crabs, and other crustaceans.

Tiger beetles live their entire lives on the beach. They lay eggs from late June to August, and the larvae hatch in late July to August. They stay in the larval stage, burrowed in the sand, for one to two years until they fully develop.

Tiger beetles were once abundant but now live only on the Chesapeake Bay and on Massachusetts coasts. The beetle's population has diminished due to development and recreation on shorelines.

Other impacts to the beetle's habitat include erosion and inundation due to sea-level rise caused by climate change.

The northeastern beach tiger beetle became a threatened species in 1990, and it was recommended for the endangered species list in 2009.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service works with communities to develop models for shoreline management to maintain or improve the beetle's habitat.

## TYSON REACTS TO EMERGENCY WORKPLACE STANDARDS

One of the two largest employers on Virginia's Eastern Shore answered questions about the company's response to Virginia's new emergency workplace safety standards.

The standards were adopted July 15 by the Virginia Department of Labor and Industry's Safety and Health Codes Board.

Tyson Foods, which has a poultry processing facility in Temperanceville, employs more than 1,200 people.

Together with the Perdue Farms facility in Accomac, more than 3,040 people work at the plants, according to Accomack County's 2020 Annual Poultry Report.

A spokesperson said Tyson formed a coronavirus task force in January and has "put in place a host of protective steps that meet or exceed CDC and OSHA guidance for preventing COVID-19 to protect our team members."

Spokesperson Morgan Watchous said Tyson in many cases is "ahead of new guidance with our existing practices and processes."

"As for the new safety standards that Virginia has mandated, we've consistently met or exceeded CDC and OSHA guidance, on which the Virginia standard is based. We continuously review local, state and federal guidance and update our COVID-19 control plan as necessary and will do the same with the VOSH standard," she said.

Training about COVID-19 is required for all new hires at Tyson, as the Virginia standard requires.

Training includes symptom monitoring; social distance guidelines, cleaning procedures, face mask protection, and preventive measures including staying home if an employee is not feeling well.

Updates are communicated to employees through departmental meetings, postings, communication booths set up during break times, text messages, and social media.

Specific measures in place include:

- Conducting health screenings of all employees each time they come to work, checking temperatures and for symptoms such as coughing or shortness of breath.
- Providing mandatory face masks to employees and requiring face shields for certain jobs.
- Implementing social distancing mea-

asures, including installing physical barriers between workstations and in break rooms, providing more break room space, marking six-foot distances in common areas, staggering start times, and having social distancing monitors stationed throughout the facility during all shifts.

- Regularly cleaning and disinfecting high-traffic areas, such as restrooms and break rooms.
- Providing education to ensure employees understand risk factors and protective measures.
- Clearly posting guidance and updated COVID-19 communications in employee welfare areas.
- A relaxed attendance policy encouraging symptomatic employees to stay home.
- Benefits have been increased, raising short-term disability to 90% of base pay.

In May, 1,282 employees and contractors at the Temperanceville plant were tested for COVID-19. Of that total, 257 tested positive — most were asymptomatic. Tyson spokesperson Worth Sparkman said the company continues to provide employees testing, using both its internal occupational health team and third-party providers.

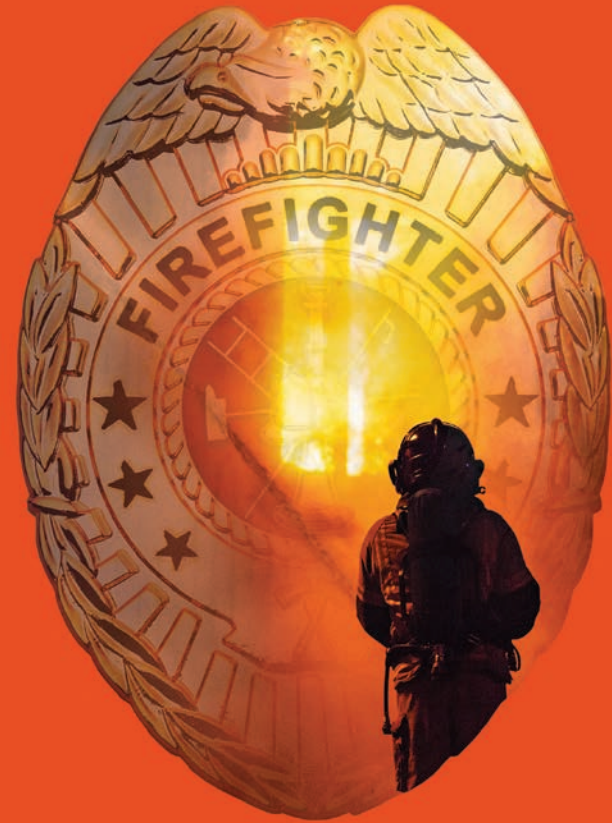
"We have waived out-of-pocket costs, deductibles and pre-approval or preauthorization requirements for team members to receive COVID-19 testing. We also have waived co-pays for the use of telemedicine through Doctor On-Demand and relaxed refill limits for 30-day prescriptions of maintenance medication," he said.

Watchous said employees who test positive receive paid leave and may return to work "only when they have met the criteria established by both the CDC and Tyson."

"We disclosed test results as part of our efforts to help affected communities where we operate better understand the coronavirus and the protective measures that can be taken to help prevent its spread," she said, adding the Temperanceville plant currently has "very few active COVID-19 cases."

## Onancock Considers Workplace Safety Standard, Reports Business Grant Awards

Onancock's town council referred Virginia's new workplace safety standard for COVID-19 to the personnel committee for review before it is adopted as part of the town's personnel policy.

The temporary emergency standard — the first in the nation — was adopted July 15 by the Virginia Safety and Health Codes Board, after Gov. Ralph Northam directed the Department of Labor and Industry to develop it.

It takes effect as soon as it is published in a Richmond, Va., newspaper — likely this week.

The standard establishes detailed requirements for Virginia employers to protect employees and prevent the spread of the virus.

Council member Maphis Oswald called the standard “a very good policy” and said “it's a great step toward safety.”

The Department of Labor released a 12-page document outlining policies employers are required to follow under the standard, Town Manager Matt Spuck told the council.

“We are required to do training of all employees — and keep in mind this is for the protection of our employees, regardless of their position, from COVID-19,” Spuck said.

Additionally, the town, along with all other Virginia employers, must assess each position as to level of exposure risk, and at each level, take certain additional actions to protect workers.

Oswald asked about financial support for employees affected by the virus.

“There is part of the policy that discusses compensation in this, and I'd really love to have the personnel committee go through that because there are a lot of options open to council and the town,” Spuck said.

### Business Grants Awarded

Onancock awarded 14 full grants of \$3,072 each and 24 partial grants of \$1,023 each (two were for less because their lost revenue was less than that) to small businesses in town affected by the coronavirus pandemic.

“I want to sort of sing the praises of the town right now because the county put their small business grant out there and said that they were going to issue fixed-fee, first-come, first-served grants to businesses who have been closed and at the supervisors' meeting, they announced that they only had 34 qualified grant recipients. We issued 38...so we gave a lot of money to a lot of people,” Spuck said.

The town distributed \$67,000. The funds came from the federal CARES Act.

“I think this is a super, super initiative that council put forward,” Spuck said.

### Fee Increase

The council voted to increase the fee for a special use permit application from \$125 to \$150 and to have the applicant pay for advertising costs.

The council also voted to add a \$5 assessment to each traffic or criminal case to help pay for an electronic summons system anticipated to be required by the state in the future.

It also voted to rezone 58 Market St. from business downtown to residential.

## Man Shot at Large Painter Gathering

A man is in critical condition after suffering multiple gunshot wounds early Sunday at a large gathering in Painter.

The Accomack County Sheriff's Office around 12:09 a.m. Sunday received a report of shots fired on Shell Bridge Road, according to Sheriff Todd Wessells.

The victim, who the sheriff's office did not identify, was transported to Riverside Shore Memorial Hospital by the Accomack County Department of Public Safety. He subsequently was flown to Peninsula Regional Medical Center by Maryland police helicopter and later was

transferred to the University of Maryland Medical Center in Baltimore, Md., where he currently is listed in critical but stable condition, according to Wessells.

The Accomack sheriff's office was assisted by the Northampton County Sheriff's Office, Exmore Police Department, Virginia State Police, Onley Police Department, and the Onancock Police Department.

## Court Postings By Nancy Drury Duncan

### Two Murder Charges Certified to Grand Jury

Murder charges against two men in unrelated cases were certified to a grand jury Monday.

In the first case, Rikece Campbell, 27, of New Church, is charged with second-degree murder and the use of a firearm in the commission of a felony in the March 28 shooting death of Cervone Copes. Copes, 42, also known as "Chuckie," was the father of seven children. Police were called to the home at around midnight.

The commonwealth's first witness, Evron Strand, was there when Sgt. Eric Nottingham arrived at the New Church home on Tull Street where Strand lived and where the shooting took place.

On the witness stand, Strand appeared not to want to cooperate. He said he was there that night but did not remember much. "It had nothing to do with me," he said. He said his uncle died that night but that he doesn't remember much about how it happened.

Commonwealth's Attorney Spencer Morgan asked Strand if he was using drugs or alcohol that night. Strand responded, "No, I am an athlete." Morgan then asked Strand if he often had problems with his memory. Strand responded that he did not.

Sgt. Nottingham testified he found a shotgun outside the door of the mobile home when he arrived. An EMT called to the scene testified Copes was still alive and was being given CPR by a deputy when he arrived. He said Copes had a gunshot wound on the left side of his abdomen with a portion of his intestines showing and said he called the Maryland State police helicopter to take Copes to a trauma center, but the victim died before it could arrive.

Charletta Copes, Campbell's mother, said she later received a call from her son telling her Copes was dead and that he shot him.

Campbell's defense attorney, James Broccoletti, made a motion to strike the commonwealth's evidence. "She got a

phone call," he said. "Rikece said he shot Chuckie. We don't know whether it was an accident or what." Broccoletti said there was "no evidence of criminal liability."

Commonwealth's Attorney Morgan disagreed, saying, "He made a confession; he said he shot him. The standard today is probable cause." District court Judge Gordon Vincent heard the evidence and said he found probable cause to certify the case to a grand jury.

The second case involves a May 2 shooting in the Whitesville section of Parksley.

Ambrose Knox, 30, of Parksley, is charged with the second-degree murder of Joe Northam and the use of a firearm in connection with a felony.

Testimony was that there were a number of people involved in a dice game in a garage at the residence of Dwayne Hargis.

Accomack County Sgt. Julian Sharpe said he responded to a call that a man had been shot at 23491 Brainard St. When he arrived, he found the victim with a gunshot wound in his chest. He said a crowd of people were already gathered in the area. An emergency medical technician testified that he pronounced Northam dead shortly after arriving.

Ashante Edwards, who testified that Northam was the father of her children, said there were six or seven people at the table playing dice. She said Northam was drinking and that he and Knox were in an argument which continued outside. "I felt liquid splash and heard a gunshot. I ran home," she said. She said she heard Northam say, "I've been shot," and ran toward the rear of the garage.

Sgt. Joshua Marsh, of the Accomack County Sheriff's Department, testified he found Northam's body "toward the rear of the garage with wounds on the upper chest and right forearm." He said he spoke with Dwayne Hargis who told him Knox and Northam were having an altercation. Later, he spoke with Knox's father who told him he and his son would meet him at the sheriff's office.

Marsh said they arrived at 6:50 a.m. and Ambrose Knox turned himself in. When he spoke with Knox he noticed blood on his nose and shirt.

He said Knox gave a statement which said he was at the Brainard Street residence earlier. He and sever-

al others were gambling with dice. He said Knox told him he made his points but Northam disagreed. Northam told Knox he owed him five dollars. "He told me his cousin gave Northam \$20 and told him not to worry about it." He said Knox told him that Northam walked around the table and got in his face. He said the confrontation went outside and Northam pushed him and struck him in the face with a beer bottle or can. He said Knox told him, "I pulled out my gun and shot him."

He told Marsh he was scared, and said Northam was coming toward him and looked like he was reaching for something. "Knox said he didn't see anything but didn't want to give him a chance to reach for anything."

Marsh said Knox told him the gun was in the left interior of his jacket and that he fired once. He said he took a photo of Knox showing an injury on the bridge of his nose and blood on his face and clothing. "He gave police his clothing and gave a blood sample," Marsh said. "He cooperated fully."

Marsh testified the garage and the yard outside was littered with alcohol containers. Judge Gordon Vincent heard the evidence and certified the case to a grand jury. Attorney Thomas Northam is representing the defendant.

### Suspect Found Guilty in 2019 Robbery of Parksley Dollar General

On Tuesday, July 28, Judge Glen A. Tyler found Torrean Vinton Washington guilty of robbery, grand larceny, and use of a firearm in connection with a Jan. 20, 2019, incident at the Dollar General store in Parksley. The commonwealth's case, while wholly circumstantial, ultimately proved beyond a reasonable doubt that Washington was guilty.

Employees of the store testified that around 8:30 a.m. an individual entered the store wearing a mask and a distinctive sweatshirt with the letters G-A-P across the front.

The masked individual ordered the employees to open the safe and give him money. The suspect brandished a firearm at or around both employees before leaving the scene. Video entered into evidence showed the incident in the store

lasted less than two minutes. One of the employees observed the suspect get into a silver foreign four-door vehicle and drive off. The victim described the vehicle to police and gave the general direction the vehicle traveled.

Sgt. K. Reese, of the Accomack County Sheriff's Office, contacted Chief B.K. Greer, of the Parksley Police Department, seeking access to the town's video camera system. Greer and Reese identified a silver Toyota Camry traveling past the Parksley Police Station on Dunne Avenue going in the direction toward Bennett Street almost two minutes after the robbery in Dollar General. Reese noted several features of the vehicle in addition to the color, make, and model, from the video provided by Greer, including an EZ-Pass in the windshield on the passenger side and damage to the rear bumper.

Three days after the robbery, Reese observed a vehicle matching the suspect vehicle traveling northbound on Route 13 in the Painter area of Accomack County. Reese stopped the vehicle. The driver was the owner of the vehicle.

Reese contacted Investigator S. Castiglia who made contact with the vehicle's owner on the roadside. Castiglia learned that the owner of the vehicle had lent the vehicle to the defendant on the morning of the robbery. The vehicle's owner told Castiglia that the defendant said that he needed to return to Perdue to "clock out."

The commonwealth presented evidence from a Perdue employee that the defendant did not have any time-card information from that date on record. The vehicle's owner also said that when the owner lent the vehicle to the defendant there was a sweatshirt like the one worn by the defendant in the vehicle and when the vehicle was returned the sweatshirt was gone. When the vehicle's owner asked the defendant about the sweatshirt, he said that he didn't know anything about it, but that he would get the owner a new one.

Prior to pronouncing conviction, Judge Tyler stated "I can connect the dots" and found the defendant guilty.

Commonwealth's Attorney J. Spencer Morgan, who prosecuted the case, acknowledged Accomack County Sheriff's Office Investigator S. Castiglia, Sgt. K. Reese, Dep. C. Hargis, and Parksley Police Chief B.K. Greer for their contribution to the resolution of this case.

## EASTERN SHORE’S DARK SKIES ENHANCE VIEW OF MILKY WAY FOR STARGAZERS

A remote location surrounded by water grants Eastern Shore stargazers an excellent location for viewing the Milky Way.

The light pollution of Virginia Beach, Va., and Ocean City, Md., fades away. The ocean to our east projects nothing more than an occasional celestial reflection, a visual accent to the sweeping slash of stars that angles across our skies.

The Milky Way, essentially a sideways view through more than 200 billion stars in our galaxy, stretches across most of southeastern sky, providing a faint backdrop to brighter but smaller constellations.

Videographer and producer Jim Baugh, of Cape Charles, owner and producer of Jim Baugh Outdoors TV, mas-

tered the art of forecasting the best viewing to indulge a childhood fascination for celestial navigation. Eventually, this side project for his business evolved into a four-minute compilation of time-lapse sky views that show the Milky Way rising from the horizon and angling up and across the sky until dawn.

The film, which made its debut last year at Cape Charles’ Palace Theatre during the Experimental Film Virginia festival, has won four awards, including best in the experimental film category in the Madras Independent Film Festival in India. Entitled “The Milky Way Galaxy, Our Home,” the film was recently entered for consideration at the internationally known Sundance Film Festival.

The film includes an original score written by Baugh and will motivate

stargazers and their children for the late-night adventure ahead. View the film on his blog at <https://jimbaughoutdoors.blogspot.com/2019/03/milky-way-madness-2019.html>

Baugh admits that the Milky Way can be elusive, requiring the right combination of location, weather, and grit. In the four last months, he has found only four nights for ideal viewing and, in his case, astrophotography.

### Choose Your Ideal Location

Baugh has four favorite locations on the Shore.

The two with the darkest sky and public access are the town of Wachapreague and the Red Bank boat ramp. Wachapreague is so good for viewing that any location with an unobstructed view of the sky within about five miles

of town works well, Baugh said.

Town residents hope to capitalize on their star-filled skies by registering as an official “dark sky” site and marketing the town to stargazers.

For the ultimate viewing experience, even better than Wachapreague, is unpopulated Cedar Island, a barrier island separated from Wachapreague by four miles of marsh.

Getting there requires a boat, however. Captain Meriwether Payne, owner of Seaside Ecotours in Wachapreague, is among the charter skippers who can carry visitors to the island.

Baugh’s other favorite sites include Cape Charles locations removed from the street lights of the business district.

On the ocean side of the peninsula, he also likes to shoot from Magotha



Road, south of Townsend. Although the small beach at the road's end is privately leased, the paved portion of the road is open to the public.

**Find a Clear Night**

For the best viewing, try to schedule around the phases of the moon, which can be bright enough to obscure the Milky Way.

Stargazers want to wait for the five days before and after a new moon, when the visible part of the moon disappears or shrinks to just a sliver, Baugh said.

This month, that prime viewing period will begin roughly Aug. 15 and continue until about Aug. 24, bookending an Aug. 18 new moon.

Fortunately, two websites juggle data on the moon and the weather, producing location-specific forecasts for viewing, Baugh said.

One of those sites even made changes at Baugh's request.

The owner and programmer of the website [www.cleardarksky.com](http://www.cleardarksky.com) created a special webpage that forecasts cloud cover, humidity, and other viewing conditions for Cape Charles. To use the forecasts, which Baugh says have been quite accurate, follow this link: <http://www.cleardarksky.com/c/Cp-ChrsVAkey.html?1>

In the four top rows of colored rectangles that signify viewing variables, look for columns containing four dark blue rectangles. These columns indicate ideal combinations of what astronomers call darkness, seeing, cloud cover, and transparency.

An additional lower three rows of rectangles indicate ground conditions

— in other words, how comfortable the night may be for viewing.

Another site, [www.clearoutside.com](http://www.clearoutside.com), provides a longer range forecast and additional details, including the phases of the moon.

**This Weekend's Forecast**

The Milky Way will appear faintly against the bright light of the moon, which will reach its fullest size Monday. However, other celestial attractions, including Jupiter, Saturn, and the International Space Station, will be visible this weekend. To find them, Baugh recommends downloading Stellarium Mobile Sky Map (\$3.49 on Google Play; \$2.99, Apple App Store, \$9.99 for premium).

## Fishing from the Shore

The recent run of hot weather continues to impact the local summertime fishery. Most anglers have shifted their fishing efforts to deeper, cooler water and the incoming tide. Cobia fishing has slowed, but spadefish, Spanish mackerel, and deepwater flounder fishing has picked up the slack for most anglers.

**Lower Shore** – Jeb Brady, at Bailey's Bait & Tackle, reported that the cobia fishing continues to slowly decline. Brady theorized that this was due to a combination of the excessive heat and the fish beginning to spawn. A few fish were caught by some of the charter captains sight fishing with live eels, but the captains had to "work hard" to get them to bite. On the upside, spadefishing and fishing for Spanish



mackerel have yielded more dependable results. Spadefish have been hitting clam baits around the fourth island of the Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel, Plantation Light, and over and around the Cell. Spanish mackerel catches have been reported

from outside of the bridge-tunnel up to buoy 42. Most anglers are high-speed trolling using small spoons on long leaders behind small planers or inline sinkers. The best flounder reports came from anglers using Berkley Gulp and squid while drifting along the area known as the Ditch. The bayside piers are producing a mixed catch of spot, croaker, whiting, and gray trout.

**Wachapreague** – A spokesperson from Trident Tackle reported that the shop weighed in flounder up to 5 pounds, 10 ounces over the weekend. Best flounder fishing has occurred during the last of the flood through the first of the ebb, that is when the water temperature is at its coolest. The area just inside the inlet has been productive. Most anglers are fishing a combination of Berkley Gulp and live minnows. Spanish mackerel are being caught by anglers trolling just off the beach. The vessel Bite Me registered a pair of citation blue-line tilefish weighing 16 pounds and 17 pounds, 8 ounces. The fish were caught while deep dropping in the Washington Canyon.

Amanda Manzella, at the Wachapreague Inn, echoed the flounder fishing reports, describing the fishing as "strong."

**Chincoteague** – Jimmy Vasiliou, at Captain Steve's Bait & Tackle, said that the flounder fishing has been good in the back bays, particularly early in the morning for anglers using Gulp and minnows. Vasiliou said that there are a few croaker around but they are not in the numbers that the area is accustomed to. Tuna have been taken by anglers trolling around and chunking over the area known as the Parking Lot. Sharks have been abundant, both inside and outside the inlet. Cobia have been cruising off Blackfish Banks while large flounder, spadefish, sea bass, and ribbonfish have been caught over the railcars. Anglers fishing the surf are finding mostly spot, kingfish (whiting), and perch.

Donna Rae Roeske, at Captain Bob's Marina, claims that, despite your fishing expertise, you can catch a flounder in "any channel, creek, or reef, simply

by casting a line with a jumbo minnow, artificial bait, or strip of squid." Other available species include kingfish (whiting), perch, spot, sheepshead, puffers, ribbonfish, and sharks. She said that anglers are quickly limiting out on flounder while fishing the Blackfish Banks artificial reef, then targeting sea bass, cobia, triggerfish, and spadefish for the remainder of the trip. Roeske said that anglers were having success with yellowfin tuna and even a few cobia while chunking over the Lumpy Bottom. She added that golden tilefish were being caught while deep dropping in the canyons. Large black sea bass were being caught on the Marine Electric and the Barge. Shark catches are coming from five miles off the beach. Catches in the surf have included small panfish, sharks, and rays.

**Upper Shore** – Alan Ring, at Sea Hawk Sports Center, reported that flounder fishing has been good in the seaside inlets for anglers using live minnows and Gulp. Larger flounder have been caught over the railcars by anglers jigging with large pieces of squid and smelt. On the Chesapeake Bay side, the rockfish and speckled trout action has shifted from the hot shallow water to deeper cooler water. Schools of surface-feeding bluefish can

be found and will aggressively hit artificial lures cast their way. The southern Maryland river mouths have been holding perch, spot, and kingfish (whiting). Peeler crab and bloodworm baits have produced most of the catches there.

Ernest Bethel is the Northampton Lady Yellow Jackets soccer coach. The Jackets finished the 2019 season with a 10-5-1 record that included a district championship, 5 All-District players, a fourth-place finish in the region, and four All-Region players. Bethel is a physical education teacher who commutes from Hampton to Northampton Middle daily for his job and would have had four seniors on this year's team.

After the 2020 season was canceled, several seniors lost their last chance to display their talents and secure a scholarship to play at the next level. Bethel already had two players, Wendi Martinez and Yeats James, commit to Shaw University before the season was lost.

Bethel has been coaching since high school but recently got back into coaching in 2016 as his son's youth soccer coach in Hampton. He's seen his fair share of travel teams in the Hampton Roads and knows through his own collegiate career how important it is to be able to continue training and playing at a high level. Travel teams give exposure for athletes at the optimal level, as traveling allows them to compete against the best players in the state, along with other states, compared to just their region.

Bethel has been the bench boss at Northampton since 2018, a season that nearly mirrored 2019, and has seen what talent the Shore has. "We have talent; it's just raw" said Bethel.

With this in mind and a lost season at hand, he felt the need to do more for the players who lost the chance at a possible breakthrough season. After pondering the idea of forming the Shore's first girls' travel team, he decided to put plans into motion.

He reached out to players and coaches from Arcadia, Northampton, and Nandua to schedule the team's first practice. On Monday, June 1, the team met with only

nine players. After that practice, players reached out to one another, eventually building the roster to its current 21 with only four hailing from Northampton.

Within two weeks, the team settled on the name Eastern Shore Lady Panthers and entered their first tournament. The Virginia High School Cup was initially intended to give high school seniors one more chance to play with their teams before graduating. It featured school-based teams but allowed the Panthers hybrid team to play. They dropped three close games against larger school teams with more chemistry like Bethel High School, a 5A team, and Poquoson High, a 2A team that has made the state tournament the last three years.

"I'm very proud of the team," remarked Bethel of the team's performance in their first tournament, finding a win outside of the lines. Shortly after the tournament, Bethel reached out to coaches and sent what limited video he had of players. Doing so enabled another Shore player, Jakelyn Rivera of Nandua, to land a scholarship to play at the collegiate level. Rivera will be attending Bluefield College and play defense and midfield for the Rams. "I did not know this was possible," said Rivera of the chance to play at the next level.

Still in the developmental stages, the travel team plans to extend out to both high school boys and girls along with middle school teams. Bethel plans to sign his travel teams up for both college camps and tournaments to allow for development and maximize the exposure to college coaches. He's already received praise from coaches at Virginian Wesleyan and Christopher Newport about the formation of the team.

With COVID-19 still looming, future tryouts for the Panthers have been pushed back to spring 2022. Until then, Bethel will be seeking Shore sponsors to help keep player cost low.

# VHSL Makes Decision on Fall Sports

For the first time in over 100 years, high school teams will not take to the gridiron this fall for football. For that matter, no sports will be played until the year's close, following the Virginia High School League's decision made Monday.

By a margin of 34-1, the committee, which is made up of school superintendents, principals, and athletic directors from across the commonwealth, voted to adopt the third of three potential models for the return of competitive sports. Model 3 delays all three seasons of high school sports but keeps intact the potential for all sports to be played, albeit with condensed seasons and still resting on Virginia exiting Phase 3 guidelines.

The decision was made during a video conference, and the hope seems to be the delay will allow time for schools and teams to make the proper adjustments, rather than jump into a tumult of uncertainty, both logistically and medically.

The condensed season will kick off Dec. 14, with basketball, wrestling, swimming, and indoor track and field leading the way. The first contests for these sports will be Dec. 28, and the season will conclude Feb. 20.

Football reemerges in February, along with volleyball, golf, cross-country, field hockey, and competitive cheer. The first contests for this season will be held March 1 and span two months.

Baseball, softball, soccer, lacrosse, tennis, and outdoor track and field overlap slightly in this new model, with games starting April 26. If all goes as planned, the 2020-21 season will conclude June 26.

It's important to note that while this decision represents the state of high school sports moving forward, progress with the more "high-risk" games will still be contingent on existing, and/or the revision of Phase 3 guidelines outlined by the governor and Virginia Departments of Health and Education.

## Random Facts About ... Tears

Cleaning out our internet tubes this week, we started to weep — not because of anything we read online but because something got in our eye. Your eyes produce three kinds of tears. The ones that made us cry to clear our eyes of an irritant are called reflex tears, which come out in reaction to a foreign body or smoke or onions. Reflex tears are more plentiful than basal tears that are in your eyes all the time to keep your cornea wet, nourished, and protected from dirt. The third type of tears, come on, you know ... “Titanic” and when “Unchained Melody” starts playing in “Ghost” and all through “The Color Purple.” Emotional tears.

Really bad things and really good things can both elicit the same emotional tears. Scientists believe those tears contain hormones not present in reflex or basal tears. Emotional crying might be a form of social bonding. Whatever it is, emotional crying belongs exclusively to us. Many animals cry out in pain or distress but as far as we know, only humans break down in tears.

Go ahead and have a good cry. It might

help you relax by activating the parasympathetic nervous system — PNS, not PMS, which has also been known to produce tears. Tears might reduce pain by releasing endorphins and reducing toxins. Some studies have found that after crying, babies sleep better.

But have you ever wondered if maybe newborns are faking it? They can cry their heads off without producing a single tear. The truth is, the lacrimal glands, which produce tears, don’t develop fully until the end of the second month of life. Newborns simply aren’t able to produce tears. So give the little diaper vipers a break. Soon enough they’ll be crying their eyes out.

And then, in an odd twist of fate, when those boy babies grow up to be old men, they start crying again. Adult men, with a buffer of testosterone and various social prohibitions to protect them from emotional tears, often don’t think it’s proper to cry. In old age, with those buffers disappearing, the old men shed tears while holding young grandchildren or petting old dogs. It’s enough to make you weep.

# Editorial

Parksley is undergoing a revitalization. With a new library and cultural heritage center under construction and a \$700,000 community development block grant to improve downtown, it seems things are looking up for the town.

The block grant contains money for town branding — deciding on an image Parksley wants to project to the world — and the town held a March workshop to solicit ideas.

The consultant working on the town's logo asked the group assembled what single picture of the town they would use to represent Parksley on a postcard. Responses included Jaxon's Hardware, the vintage Coca-Cola sign, the Eastern Shore Railway Museum, the farmer's market, the 2017 war memorial, and a Victorian house. These are all postcard-worthy attributes of the picturesque town.

Another question was posed about the aspects of town they would pitch to a travel writer who wanted to write an article about Parksley. Responses to that question included: the soda

fountain at the cafe; 1800s buildings; the railway museum; the town park; and local businesses, such as Russell's Formal and Bridal Shop.

Noticeably absent from both lists: the Confederate veteran's memorial, the "treasure" so many are clamoring to defend.

The block grant also includes funds for facade improvement for 20 properties, erecting a band shell with an entertainment and education area, and a signature alleyway that links to the library.

But all the investment for revitalization won't balance out the weight of that monument.

Town officials have proposed selling the monument and the ground it stands on to the Sons of Confederate Veterans. According to officials, the town attorney is not sure the property is theirs to sell.

Selling the monument would tie the hands of the town for future generations. Elected officials have a responsibility not just to their current constituents, but to future residents and businesses. If you can't bring yourselves to take down the monument as town officials, at least don't tie the hands of the town forever.

Selling the monument and the ground it stands on is a move akin to-

Pontius Pilate washing his hands of the whole affair.

Town officials: Don't outsource your controversy. You were elected to make the tough calls. If you believe the monument should stay where it is, go on record voting for Parksley as the home of the Confederate memorial. Let your constituents know where you stand. Let the travel writers pen stories about a town so Victorian it can't let go of its devotion to honoring those who died defending the vile institution of slavery.

"They fought for conscience sake and died for right" is inscribed on the monument.

Fortunately, town officials needn't die for what is right. They just need to summon the courage to take right action — the future of Parksley depends on it.

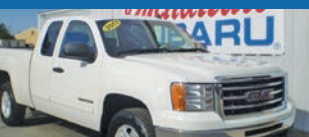
