Pilots and Crew of Navy E-2C Hawkeye Parachute to Safety; Plane Crashes in Bloxom Soybean Field

A Navy aircraft crashed Monday afternoon in a soybean field off Mason Road in Bloxom, triggering a massive emergency response.

The crash was reported around 4:05 p.m.

The plane was a Navy E-2C Hawkeye aircraft, the kind that practices touch-and-go operations at NASA Wallops Flight Facility.

The aircraft was assigned to Air-

borne Command & Control Squadron (VAW) 120 Fleet Replacement Squadron on board Naval Station Norfolk, according to a statement from Naval Air Force Atlantic Public Affairs in Norfolk, Va.

At the time of the crash, the aircraft was conducting a training flight, according to the statement, which went on to say that initial reports indicated no structures or people on the ground were damaged or injured.

Large Grant to Keep Small Cape Charles Businesses Afloat

Just two weeks ago, Cape Charles was discussing at its town council meeting an \$845,000 grant from the Virginia Department of Housing and Community Development (VDHCD) to help its business community recover from the economic devastation caused by the COVID-19 pandemic.

Last week, the town received approval of the funds, giving small businesses in and near Cape Charles a

boost to tide them through the winter.

"I hope that we can have checks to people in November, because that's when they'll need them," said Tammy Holloway, president of Cape Charles Main Street and co-author of the grant application.

A meeting next week with state officials will shed more light on the schedule for applications and awards.

Public comments read at the Aug. 20 Cape Charles town council meeting

ESCC Hosts 'Conversations on Race'

Eastern Shore Community College staff and local citizens started what they hope will be an ongoing dialogue on race when they participated in an online video conference titled "Conversations On Race" Monday night.

But to understand the conversation, one must first understand the YouTube video that participants were asked to view, "Uncomfortable Conversations With a Black Man," by Emmanuel Acho, a former NFL linebacker.

Acho used YouTube as a "safe space" to receive and answer questions from

his "white brothers and sisters to increase your level of understanding so that you can increase your level of compassion and lead ultimately to change."

The first question he answered was why some Black people are responding to racial and social injustice with rioting instead of protesting.

Acho quoted Martin Luther King Jr., who once said, "Rioting is the language of the unheard."

Since the 1960s, according to Acho, peaceful protests have been ineffective at raising awareness of the oppression

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cording to scanner reports.

They were undergoing medical evaluation, Cmdr. Jennifer Cragg told US-NI News Monday.

The Hawkeye, assigned to the "Greyhawks" of Airborne Command & Control Squadron (VAW) 120 Fleet Replacement Squadron, left Chambers Field at Naval Station Norfolk, Va., on Monday for the training mission before the crash, according to a report by the U.S. Naval Institute News.

Firefighters from Bloxom and Wallops fire departments had the fire at the crash site mostly extinguished by around 4:30 p.m.

Mason Road resident Robyn Dattner was among those who saw the crash happen.

"I was out here doing yardwork and all of the sudden I see something go down right over there...black smoke, flames. ...Then all of a sudden I just smelled the fumes," she said, adding, "It was like a big, black cloud."

Dattner called the county to report the crash.

Robert Williams, also of Mason Road, said he saw the smoke from the crash site rising as he was driving home from Parksley.

Williams said the crash was the second major emergency to happen in the immediate area within weeks, after a house on Mason Road caught fire earlier this summer.

of Black people, which has led to recent rioting, Acho said.

He noted that he does not condone rioting but "sometimes pain and hurt, it doesn't know how to express itself."

Acho continued by sharing his definition of "White privilege" – having a head start in life due to hundreds of years of systemic racism.

"It's not saying your life hasn't been hard, but ... your skin color hasn't contributed to the difficulty in your life," he said.

Acho then addressed why some believe it's acceptable for Black people but not White people to use the "N-word."

"Black people took something that was meant and originally used as evil, and we turned it into a term of endearment," but when White people use the term, it "reminds us of the pain of our ancestors," he said.

Acho also addressed why Black people appear to focus more on Whiteon-Black crime than Black-on-Black crime. According to Acho, it's the same reason why Black people proclaim "Black lives matter" instead of "all lives matter":

"Right now, Black people are dying at the hands of White people, and I can't change that. Only you, my White friends, you all can change that," he said.

During the virtual conference hosted by ESCC, Pastor Irvin Jackson, of the Living Word Church of Deliverance in Parksley, asked participants to describe their reactions to the YouTube video.

"I loved it," said Tina Taylor, ESCC's workforce innovation and opportunity coordinator. She appreciated that White people want to know and understand the Black experience, and videos like "Uncomfortable Conversations With a Black Man" make it possible for them to get the answers they seek.

She also is unfamiliar with the daily life of White people, particularly parents. Taylor said she didn't know what kind of advice White parents have to give their sons to stay safe and live, but "Black mothers have to say a whole lot more" than "look both ways before you cross the street."

Lisa Johnson, vice chair of ESCC's advisory board, called that "the talk" – a talk she felt she still needed to have with her 29-year-old son when

he bought a new pair of running shoes after Ahmaud Arbery, a Georgia Black man, was fatally shot in February when three White men chased him down while he was jogging.

"I don't need sympathy. One-hundred percent of me seeks to be understood. ... listen and consider that my reality ... and a White person's reality are two very different things," Johnson said. She wants empathy.

Jackson wanted to know what other questions Black people and White people had for each other.

Taylor asked, "What have we done ... to offend you so, when we were the race that was enslaved?"

Arthur Carter, a retired doctor who identifies as African American, considered her question. In his answer, he referred to the story of Jack Johnson, who became the first African American heavyweight boxing champion of the world in 1908.

"His crime ... 'unforgivable Blackness," Carter said.

From the beginnings of American history, the term "Black" has been defined by the nation's language and culture as "bad, evil, dirty, hypersexual, violent," he explained.

"White" has been defined as Black's "polar opposite," or "good, pure, holy, peaceful, nonviolent, hyposexual."

"We know all of those are lies," Carter said.


He recommended the book "Stamped From the Beginning: The Definitive History of Racist Ideas in America," by Ibram X. Kendi, which discusses the evolution of racist language in America.

Carter also recommended that all teachers, from kindergarten through college, show their students the PBS program "Race: The Power of an Illusion," which discusses scientific findings suggesting there are no genes linked to the physical characteristics humans use to define race.

He also had a request. As a believer that race is a social construct, Carter spoke in terms of ethnicity, not race.

"What I would want, and do want, is for European Americans – those who are willing – to become allies in the quest for righteousness, social justice, and equality. Not to walk in front ... not to walk behind ... but side-by-side" with African Americans, he said.

Jackson asked the conference participants what they would do to create "excellent race relations."

For Pat Bane, it's about "personal relationships" and "sharing and doing things together." When one counts people from other races as friends and they spend a lot of time and talk together, "how quickly you forget the differences and how many things you find in common," she said.

Christina Duffman, ESCC English instructor, asked participants what they would like to result from the ongoing conversation on race.

Carter would like to see centuries-old issues in both Northampton and Accomack counties finally resolved.

Northampton supervisors passed a resolution in 1808 and received state funding to remove from the county every African American man, woman, and child who wasn't a slave. Northampton's citizens have never received an apology to this day, Carter said.

Accomack County history records at least one lynching, that of Magruder Fletcher, a Black man, in 1889. He was accused of sexually assaulting a White woman in Tasley.

There were also race riots in Onan-

cock in 1907, involving shootings and burning of buildings.

None of these events has been acknowledged even with a historical marker, Carter pointed out.

But he looks to the future and hopes for the day that "the color of a human being's skin is of no more significance than the color of his or her blouse, eyes, hair, or pants."

ESCC President Jim Schaeffer changed his mind about what he wanted to gain from the conversations after he had listened to what his colleagues had to say about the Black experience.

"I was going to use the word 'understanding' and then I thought, 'No, I want more than that.' ... I want to build up my sense of empathy," he said.

Patrick Tompkins, ESCC's vice president of academics, workforce, and student programs, wanted "change."

He spoke of the removal of Confederate monuments and said its "symbolism is very important," but it doesn't bring about real change.

"The only discouraging thing for me in this time is, sometimes, despair that change is not coming," he said, but he believes "the arc is bending the right way."

YouTube Video Documents Perspectives of Four 2020 Chincoteague Graduates

What happens when senior year of high school is cut short because of a pandemic? How does that affect young people on the brink of adulthood?

Recent graduates of Chincoteague High School spoke about their unique senior year in a video sponsored by the Chincoteague Island Arts Organization.

A copy will be given to the Museum of Chincoteague Island for its living history project.

CIAO summer intern Davis Stack interviewed four members of the class of 2020 about being seniors during the COVID-19 pandemic — and what their world might look like going forward.

The video features interviews with Joshua Reese, Caroline Woods, Rachael Liddle, and Kyle Moore.

Asked what he missed out on when senior year was cut short, Reese said, "I missed out on prom and graduation

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and all that."

Reese acknowledged the school tried to provide a graduation experience for seniors, despite pandemic restrictions.

Chincoteague's commencement ceremony in June was a drive-in one held in the school parking lot, followed by a vehicle parade through town.

"It was a good experience. I thoroughly enjoyed it. It was different than, I think, any other graduation," Reese said.

What Reese looks forward to, post-pandemic, is going to a movie theater again.

"Watching something — anything. Sitting home hasn't been the best," he said.

Reese was looking forward to Randolph Macon College this fall.

Those plans changed somewhat due to the pandemic, with students taking two classes in the first half of the fall semester and two in the second half, rather than the usual schedule.

"What are your thoughts about entering into the 'real world' in such crazy times?" Stack asked.

Reese said he is "a little bit on edge"

about the prospect, but said, "I guess you don't control the cards you are dealt."

Reese was in Florida on vacation when he found out school was closed for the rest of the year.

He passed the time working for his uncle for a couple of months, then resumed his job at Bill's Seafood Restaurant.

"I think (the pandemic) has definitely pushed me to work a lot harder and make sure my finances are good, so I don't have to really struggle or worry about something like this (if), say, it comes back again," Reese said.

Woods was active in drama club all four years of high school.

Because of the pandemic, she missed out on directing the last play of her high school career.

Among other extracurricular activities, Woods was in band — the spring concert also was canceled.

Woods also mentioned seeing movies with friends and being able to go out as things she looks forward to once restrictions are lifted.

The commencement celebration "was kind of a nice, little, 'okay, this is actually happening' thing. ... Even though it was still not what we expected it to be, it was still more than what could have happened if things had gotten even worse," she said.

Woods is attending James Madison University. At the time of the interview, the start of fall semester was about a month away.

"There are definitely going to be a lot more restrictions on things. ... My guess is that there's probably going to be some of my classes moved online. I know a couple of my friends are having their classes moved 100% online," she said, adding, "... I'm sure there's probably going to be less activities and things to attend."

Woods said she is looking forward to adulthood, even in these strange times.

"It's definitely going to be a challenge, but growing up is already a challenge. I think of myself as kind of an adaptable person, so I don't think it will be too difficult, but it still is going to be a challenge," she said.

When school closed, she went to work at Mr. Whippy's to keep busy.

The school didn't give seniors any academic work, she said.

"They...sent us an email that said, 'Congratulations; you're done."

Liddle missed spending time with friends as senior year abruptly ended.

She also was a member of drama club, working on costuming and makeup.



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"That was really disappointing to miss all that, and the memories," she said.

What she looks forward to post-pandemic is "just being able to sit in a restaurant and not having to worry about being six feet apart from people, and being able to communicate and being able to see people smile at you — because you don't really get to see that with masks on."

Liddle wants to attend cosmotology school, but may take a gap year.

She said commencement was "weird, being in a car."

Entering the "real world" during COVID-19 is "kind of scary," Liddle said, adding, "It's really stressful, because now I'm working a full-time job and I have bills to pay."

Moore also missed spending time with people after school closed.

His plans include trade school in North Carolina.

"I was happy with what we got," for a commencement celebration, Moore said. "A lot of people complained about it, that it wasn't enough, but I was happy that we at least got something."

He expects trade school to be different than it would have been pre-pandemic.

"They are actually going to go halfway online, halfway in person. ... Trade school, you've got to learn hands on," he said.

Moore played football and soccer — the soccer season was cut short when school closed.

"Right now it makes me a little ner-

vous" to be entering the "real world" during the pandemic, Moore said.

Trade school takes 1 1/2 years, "and right after that, I'm going right to work. ... If nothing's open, I'm not going to have a chance to get a job, so I kind of worry about that — but hopefully everything goes back quick and I'm able to get a job," he said.

He went to work at the KOA campground on Chincoteague the same day school closed, but worked for only 1 1/2 weeks before most staff were laid off.

He later was brought back, then laid off again.

"Now we are back full power," he said. What will Moore never forget about high school?

"All of the friends I made, and probably some of the teachers. They are just really good people here."

CIAO has been unable to offer its usual series of live programs in the Island Theatre and the Annex this summer but has been streaming virtual programs online. This was its fourth such program. It also included a short video with aerial views and shots of landmarks on Chincoteague and Assateague, produced by Kier Johnson.

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COVID-19 Restrictions Remain Unchanged for Labor Day Weekend

COVID-19-related restrictions in the Eastern region of Virginia will remain in place at least through the Labor Day weekend, Gov. Ralph Northam said in a press conference Tuesday.

"Overall, Virginians are doing a good job of keeping this curve flat," Northam said, showing charts of case rates to reporters.

Statewide case counts dropped in June, then rose again in July, driven in part by an increase in cases in the Eastern region.

If the numbers continue to trend in the right direction, the Eastern region could join the rest of the state and move fully into Phase 3 of recovery sometime after the holiday, according to Northam.

The seven-day percent positivity for COVID-19 PCR tests statewide stands just below 7%.

"When we started a couple of months ago, we were well over 20%," Northam said, adding, "We'd obviously like to see it lower than 7, but we haven't seen sharp spikes statewide, which is a good thing."

On average, 15,000 to 20,000 tests per day now are being administered in Virginia.

On the Eastern Shore, the positivity rate was 2.2% as of Tuesday, with 11,477 total PCR tests administered to date.

Accomack County has had 1,148 cases, 87 hospitalizations, and 19 deaths reported since the pandemic began.

Northampton County has had 304 cases, 49 hospitalizations, and 29 deaths, according to the Virginia Department of Health.

In both counties, the majority of cases were reported in May and June.

By region, new cases in Northern Virginia are trending slightly higher than earlier this summer, but significantly lower than early in the pandemic.

The seven-day moving average for new cases there is around 240 and the percent positivity for testing is around 6%.

The Central region has a seven-day moving average of 170 cases per day and saw a drop in percent positivity starting in early August. The figure stands at just over 7% now.

The Northwest region has around 120 new cases per day and had a positivity rate of just under 5% as of late July, with the figure inching up slightly more recently.

The Southwest region is seeing an upward trend in case numbers.

Two months ago, the average daily case number was around 80; now it is more than 220, Northam said.

The percent positivity also is increasing.

"This is especially concerning for a region where there are fewer hospitals, especially with critical care capabilities," Northam said.

The Eastern region is averaging around 214 new cases a day, which is better than in July.

The percent positivity has come down from the mid-July spike of 12% to under 9%, "which is still higher than we'd like, but this is certainly moving in a positive direction," according to Northam.

He said the virus "is still alive and well around the Commonwealth of Virginia, and we have to continue the guidelines and be vigilant," especially as schools and colleges open this fall. Northam said he would make no changes in restriction levels before Labor Day.

Those restrictions in Hampton Roads include cutting off alcohol sales at restaurants at 10 p.m. and a 50% occupancy restriction on indoor dining.

Northam noted that the state saw surges in case numbers after Memorial Day and July 4th, and said, "We don't want to repeat that as the summer draws to a close."

"Now is the time to double down on what we know is working," he said.

Northam urged Virginians who have

not done so to download the COVID-WISE app.

The app notifies a person if he or she has come in close contact with someone who tested positive for the virus who has entered that information into the app.

He also urged people to get tested if they have symptoms, think they have been exposed to someone with the virus, or need a test to go back to work.

Northam spoke about the Trump administration's recent reclassification of teachers as critical infrastructure workers, meaning they could be expected to continue working even if they have been exposed to COVID-19.

"That's the wrong thing to do, so Virginia is taking a different approach. If you are a teacher and there is a high chance you've been exposed to COVID-19, you should get tested and stay home until you get the result, even if you don't have symptoms," Northam said.

Northam also announced he is extending for another 60 days driver's license credentials due to expire by Oct. 31, as DMV offices continue to be open by appointment only.

Northam called for people at lower risk for the virus to work as poll workers.

"Many poll workers are elderly, so they are at high risk for COVID-19, so we are seeing a shortage of poll workers across our state," he said.

Interested people may apply to be a poll worker at www.vote.virginia.gov

Northam said while metrics related to the virus are now "at a more acceptable range," Virginians should not let their guard down.

"We're still not where we need to be" to further ease retrictions, he said, adding, "It's in our hands; it really is. ... We could get this under control very easily if we all did the right thing."

unanimously supported applying for the funds to help save businesses that don't qualify for federal aid.

Roxane Ward, who runs a Mason Avenue boutique, wrote, "micro-businesses seem to fall through the cracks. ... It appears we are too small for the small business programs. However, this grant provides a light at the end of the tunnel for many of us."

The Community Development Block Grant for which Cape Charles applied is typically used to improve infrastructure, but this year the money is being made available for COVID-19 relief.

Cape Charles' economy relies heavily on tourism, an industry that took a huge hit when nonessential retail businesses were closed earlier this year to limit the spread of the coronavirus.

To make matters worse, the shutdown began in mid-March, just ahead of the warmer weather that drives travelers to towns like Cape Charles with its beach and outdoor recreation.

About 84% of Cape Charles' businesses earn most of their annual income from mid-May through August, according to town staff.

About two dozen businesses in town are particularly vulnerable because they have been open less than three years, and it takes three to five years to fully establish a new business, the report stated.

The town wants to help micro-businesses, which employ two people or fewer. Those businesses didn't qualify for small-business loans and now struggle to pay rent, utilities, and other expenses.

Cape Charles applied for the maximum amount of funding of \$500,000. As a community with at least 30% small, woman-, and minority-owned businesses (more than 80% of Cape Charles businesses are SWaMs), it was eligible to apply for an additional \$300,000, bringing its total funding request to \$800,000, plus about \$45,000 for administrative expenses.

Cape Charles Main Street will administer the grant and distribute the funds, a process that will take about six to nine months.

Five spending categories have been proposed:

 A rent and mortgage relief program that will cover up to six months of rent or mortgage payments, based

- on need, for qualifying businesses.
- A reopening expense relief program to cover the cost of face masks, shields, sanitizer and dispensers, safety signs, and modifying cashier stations.
- Technology upgrades such as new hands-free, point-of-sale systems.
 - Business recovery training, to include a ServSafe class (sanitation training for restaurant employees), social media training to help businesses be competitive in a new environment, and certification training for small, woman, and minority-owned businesses.
- Administrative costs to manage grant funds and plan, coordinate, and implement the recovery training programs.

Businesses may apply for up to \$15,000 under the grant.

Cape Charles may also help businesses outside the town limits if it is awarded funds near the top end of its request, and if Northampton County does not also apply for a block grant.

Cape Charles aims to help up to 50 businesses, giving first priority to businesses in town.

The town made its case on the grant application by noting that 18% of the Eastern Shore population lives at or below poverty level, and "it is imperative that the businesses that Cape Charles supports that drive our local economy save jobs for those individuals ... to keep the town and surrounding area from falling back into a state of blight."

The unusual state grant requires no matching funds from the town, Main Street, or businesses involved.

"It's the smartest thing I've ever seen" because the state Department of Housing and Community Development chose to give away funds earmarked for Community Development Block Grants that would have required matching funds, Holloway said.

She complimented town manager, John Hozey and town council for its assistance. The application was prepared on short notice around the busy July 4 holiday. Helping prepare the application were co-author Karen Zamorski, program director; Bill Stramm; and Reggie Widgeon.

Accomack Grand Jury Indictments

Three people were indicted on counts of murder and two others were indicted on counts of attempted murder when a grand jury met in Accomac in August.

Rikece Labryan Campbell, 27, of New Church, was indicted on a count of second-degree murder and a related firearm charge in connection with the March 28 slaying of Cervone Copes. Campbell was arrested April 2.

The sheriff's office received reports of someone being shot on Tull Circle in Atlantic at around 12:14 a.m., March 28, according to Accomack County Sheriff Todd Wessells.

When deputies arrived, they found Copes, 42, of Atlantic, lying in the living room floor, suffering from a gunshot wound.

He was pronounced dead at the scene. Thomas Lee Watson Jr., 48, of Chincoteague, was indicted on a count of second-degree murder and use of a firearm in commission of a murder in connection with the shooting death of his father, Thomas Lee Watson Sr., on April 30 at a Chincoteague residence.

Watson Jr. confessed to an officer that he shot his father with a handgun, according to a court document. An investigator found the victim's body with a gunshot wound to the back of the head, according to the document.

Ambrose Felix Knox, 30, of Parksley, was indicted on a count of second-degree murder and use of a firearm in commission of a murder in connection with the May 2 slaying of Joe Northam. 41. of Tasley.

At approximately 1:08 a.m., the Accomack County Sheriff's Office received reports of a subject who had been shot on Brainard Street in Parksley.

When deputies arrived, they discovered a man lying on the garage floor with a gunshot wound. Northam was pronounced dead at the scene.

Knox was arrested the same day.

Robert James Northan Jr., 35, of Parksley, was indicted on counts of attempted first-degree murder; attempted second-degree murder; malicious maiming; use of a firearm in the commission of an attempted murder, use of a firearm in the commission of a malicious maiming; and possession of a firearm by a convicted felon in connection with an incident near Accomac on March 25.

He was extradited from Maryland after he was arrested by U.S. Marshals fugitive task force members in a Pocomoke City, Md., motel on Thursday, April 23.

He remains incarcerated.

A press release from the U. S. Marshals Office described Northan as a Bloods gang member.

Accomack County Sheriff Todd Wessells at a hearing in July testified he responded to a Tyler Lane residence for a call of shots fired on March 25 at around 2:26 p.m.

Wessells said when he arrived, he found Donald Veney and his grandmother outside the front door of the residence.

Donald Veney "had blood coming from his mouth, his face, and his back," Wessells testified.

Veney was standing when Wessells arrived, but then "he just told me that RJ had shot him and he collapsed on the porch," Wessells said, adding the victim had blood coming from his back and "as he was talking, he was blowing out blood from his mouth."

After Major Shane Childress of the Accomack County Sheriff's Office arrived at the scene, Wessells asked Childress to get him a pair of gloves and Wessells then proceeded to apply pressure to a gunshot wound on Veney's back for several minutes until an ambulance arrived.

Veney was transported to Riverside Shore Memorial Hospital.

Wessells asked Veney who shot him, and Veney again said RJ, according to Wessells' testimony.

"I said, 'RJ Northan?" — and he said yes," Wessells said.

Childress and the ambulance crew heard the statement, Wessells said.

The alleged victim, Donald Veney, also was called to testify at the hearing.

He replied in the negative to questions from Accomack County Commonwealth's Attorney Spencer Morgan about whether he recalled the incident or being shot, and also replied in the negative to a question about whether he knows Northan.

Louis Jeron Woolford Jr., 40, of New Church, was indicted on a count of attempted first-degree murder and use of a firearm in the commission of an attempted murder in connection with a May 23 incident in which the victim was a family or household member. Woolford was arrested early the next day and is being held without bail.

Tyvon Lyncurtis Smith, 27, of Parksley, was indicted on counts of possession of a firearm by a convicted felon; escape from custody of a police officer; larceny; and resisting arrest in connection with a Jan. 12 incident.

Smith was arrested in Maryland after four weeks on the run, according to a press release issued by the U.S. Marshals Service.

After Smith, who was described in the release as a Bloods gang leader, was taken into custody in Accomack County on a firearms charge, he was able to manipulate and remove the handcuffs used to restrain him during transport, according to the release.

After arriving at the Accomack County Jail, the officer opened the vehicle door to remove Smith. As soon as the door was opened, Smith took off on foot. Multiple agencies responded but were unable to find Smith immediately after his escape.

Because of Smith's gang ties and danger posed to the community, a multi-agency fugitive investigation was launched, including the U.S. Marshals, Virginia State Police, the Accomack County Sheriff's Office, the Drug Enforcement Administration, and the Federal Bureau of Investigation — leading to Smith's arrest Feb. 7 at a Pocomoke City residence.

He is being held without bail.

Pony Centre To Offer Low Tech, High Sensory Camps for Kids

Until a matter of weeks ago, the Chincoteague Pony Centre had only known one owner. Richard and Caroline Conklin built the Centre for their daughter more than 20 years ago. It was her dream, a spot to offer pony rides and serve as a sort of welcome center to the cultural significance of the Chincoteague pony. The past two years the property rested in limbo, as a rented business, often rumored to be destined for other purposes. For the anonymous buyer, a love for the people of the island and a strong desire to keep the integrity of the original vision alive is what led to the sale of the property.

The transaction, which took place in July, in the middle of the summer and a once-in-a-lifetime pandemic, could not have landed in more able hands with just the right people equipped to deal with such a transition in a time of uncertainty.

Lou Mavromatis and her daughter, Chelsie Kenlon, are the new faces of the Pony Centre. They have the pedigrees to bring a unique, local expertise unlike any other. They are descendants of the Maddox family, a name synonymous with the history of the island and the equine culture that, in part, defines Chincoteague.

Kenlon laughingly described the closing process as uneasy at first, but quickly, as reality set in, past, present, and future seemed to guide her emotions.

"It was like, boom! We're going to do this and we're opening in two and a half weeks. We were all born and raised in this; this is our whole lives anyway," Kenlon said.

Mavromatis is a woman who speaks proudly of her family's traditions, a family who has not lost step for generations of co-existing with horses.

"We've been in the horse business our entire lives. We literally brought the barn stuff that we do on a regular basis here and opened the doors for the public to join. It's what we love to do," said Mavromatis.

Mavromatis humbly regards herself as "labor and support" in this new venture, eager to turn over the operation to her daughter and grand-daughters, in whom she has all the faith in the world to run with the ambitious changes that will soon be coming.

At the forefront of these changes is the implementation of a camp for children, ages 6-12. The camp will be daily, its duration supported by the interest of the community it seeks to serve. The camp comes at a time of great need. Schools are in flux, parents are short on healthy learning options while children are at a crucial stage, eager to learn. Thus, the idea is both novel and timely.

For \$40 a day kids will not only ride horses, but learn many aspects of care and upkeep of the animals and will on Wednesdays cruise the island by water for three hours. Additionally, guest speakers will discuss all things horses and Chincoteague history. Kenlon took heed of the urging of parents in the area.

"Kids are coming here to learn what it takes to take care of horses. There is structure, there is instruction, they are learning something," said Kenlon.

A lack of childcare on the Shore plays heavily in the decision to move forward with a truly hands-on experience.

"There's always been limits to child care around here. We always knew we wanted to address that situation. We are not schoolteachers but we do know how to get kids to a goal," said Mavromatis.

For proof, one need look no further than Kenlon's daughter, Haleigh, who might just be the first person you see when you drive onto the property. Just shy of 10 years old, Haleigh is a fixture with the horses, tending to and riding the horses, and serving overall as an ambassador to the new business. Both her mother and grandmother spoke glowingly of Haleigh's work ethic.

"She has been here just as much as the rest of us. She's used to going to the farm. She knows what has to be done. I don't have to tell her," said Kenlon.

"She's really quite awesome. She does a little bit of everything: riding, grooming. Where she's turned up shining is her hospitality. She knows how to talk to people," Mavromatis said.

And for all her hard work and effort, Haleigh has modest requests for compensation.

"After you get everything done, you get to ride, it's very relieving that you got everything done that day," Haleigh said.

Along with Haleigh, the daily operations are run by a small crew of true animal enthusiasts who want to see this place succeed. Steven Allen runs the retail side of the operation, which has been progressively filling the shelves in real time. Amid the hurry of activity, Allen found time to emphasize ownership's focus on providing a healthy environment for the animals, which are predominantly rescues. There is a petting zoo on the property, supported by donations, which houses tropical birds, goats, and donkeys that came up from floods in Texas.

The care of the animals extends to the namesake of the operation. There are still pony rides on the property, and the gentle mannered animals are regarded with great concern.

"We do pony rides from 9-11 and 3-5. We give the animals a break so they can be well-rested," said Allen.

At the back of the house, where the smell of fresh hay reminds you that this is a living, breathing operation, volunteers John and Arlene Blake also extend care to the animals. The Blakes are retirees with no prior knowledge of horses. They came here seeking something to do, and to get in shape. Their attitudes, along with their physical health, have been healed by these animals in a very short amount of time. John Blake joined a lively conversation to offer his assessment.

"Retirement is not just sitting home and watching TV. I just love it here. I love the horses. If they need extra help, we're here whenever," said Blake.

The Blake's have been working at least six days a week in upward of four hours a day, offering tremendous support as Kenlon and Mavromatis focus on getting the business operational.

"They're on it. They really get us going in the morning and get our ducks in a row. They've all learned

horse stuff just by being here," Mavromatis said.

Everything seems to be progressing with rapid persistence, but the knowledge and attention to detail is genetic at this point. The camp starts Sept. 14. It will be Monday through Friday, and all sessions will be paid in advance. Parents are permitted to attend at a slight \$5 upcharge, and \$25 for Wednesday cruises. Kenlon insists, however, the children will be in good hands. Kids over 12 can apply to be volunteer counselors to serve as an extra set of eyes and ears and all the horses on property have been trained with careful consideration.

"We do everything we can to make the parents feel comfortable with the horses," said Kenlon.

In the spirit of healing, programs are also being established for thera-

peutic horsemanship, to serve anyone with ADHD to autism. Kenlon spoke of remarkable results so far.

"The difference it makes in children and adults is crazy, you can watch it happen in front of you," Kenlon said.

The Chincoteague Pony Centre is a business that months ago was at a crossroads but now is forging ahead with a back-to-basics approach fostered by a skillset that meet the needs of the here and now. Mavromatis has seen the positive effects that putting aside technology has sustained in her own family and hopes others will find its healthy ends.

"You will notice with these kids, none of them have any electronic devices on them whatsoever. This is not a virtual world, I like to refer to it as the 4-D pp, you can smell it, taste it, feel it, and sense it," said Mavromatis.

Random Facts About ... Dung Beetles

Our internet tubes were so clogged with election trash that none of the cute kitten videos could get through. When faced with a big mess that needs to be cleaned up, what you need is a lot of dung beetles.

They are present everywhere on Earth except Antarctica — this species of beetles that got its name for its close relationship with poop: storing it, eating it, courting on it, and laying eggs in it.

Not all dung beetles form manure into balls and roll them across the ground but those are the dung beetles we're examining here. These beetles are an ecological marvel, taking heaps of manure (toxic to grass when it is too concentrated) and dividing this rich fertilizer into usable little chunks and then spreading it around where it can do the grass and other plants some good. In Africa, as soon as an elephant makes a deposit, thousands of dung beetles can rush out and make the mess disappear in a matter of hours.

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
You've probably seen nature films showing how the beetles roll their balls of dung, with their back legs up on the ball and then moving backward. They apparently can navigate by the sun and stars, rolling their precious poop orbs exactly where they want them. Some dung balls are placed in tunnels. And when you see two beetles on a single ball of dung, you know what that means — honeymoon. After the egg is laid and the larva hatches, it survives by feeding on the dung ball.

Depending on the species that created them, some dung balls are marble-size, some are the size of tennis balls, and some are so large and covered in hardened clay that they were once mistaken for ancient stone cannon balls.

Although the scarab was symbolically sacred in ancient Egypt, immortalized in paintings and jewelry, it was a poop-roller like any other the dung beetle roll its dung? We can't answer the first question but the answer to the second question is moisture and digging conditions. The beetle searches for exactly the right place to dig and bury its manure ball so that its larva, one per ball, will hatch successfully and survive. And the reason the beetle is in such a hurry is that other beetles, the lazy bums, will steal an already rolled ball of dung rather than rolling their own. The beetles also have to be on the lookout for cuckoo dung beetles, which are smaller parasitic dung beetles that will lay their

eggs on another beetle's dung ball. (They're named cuckoo parasites after the cuckoo bird, which lays its egg in another bird's nest.)

You can sneer at dung beetles if you want, but consider this: At more than 350,000 species, the order of beetles makes up the largest group of animals on Earth. The renowned biologist, J.B.S. Haldane, was asked by a group of theologians what he could conclude about God based on Haldane's study of creation. Haldane reportedly replied that the Creator had, "An inordinate fondness for beetles."

Aside from ruining a window of access to the open waters during a portion of Saturday, the remnants of Hurricane Laura had little impact on the area's fishing. Highlights from the week include a nice bite of dolphin (mahi) off Chincoteague in an area known as the Parking Lot as well as the continuing run of trophy red drum along the channel that stretches from off Occohannock Creek down to Cape Charles.

Upper Shore - Captain Matt Abell, at Sea Hawk Sports Center, reported that his charters have been doing well with the late summer red drum run in the lower Chesapeake Bay, releasing fish up to 52 inches long. His clients have also released several undersized cobia measuring up to 36 inches. Captain Abell said that puppy drum catches have been scattered on both the bay and seaside, but he is yet to hear of a concentration in either place. Small speckled trout are also hitting jigs on the seaside. Captain Abell reported good flounder fishing out of Folly Creek, with one customer catching his fourfish limit in less than an hour. This week saw the appearance of good numbers of dolphin (mahi) over the Parking Lot, with anglers enjoying success trolling as well as chunking. The autumn black perch fishery is shaping up to be a productive one as most of the tidal creeks in southern Maryland are holding good numbers of the tasty panfish.

Chincoteague – Jimmy Vasiliou, at Captain Steve's Bait and Tackle, reported that surf fishing

slowed down this week, with beach fishermen finding a few spot, croakers, and kingfish (whiting) for their efforts. A variety of panfish, as well as some flounder, have also been taken off the islands docks and piers. Joe Pruitt brought in a nice 24-inch flounder this week. Robert Lynch boated a limit of flounder on the inshore wrecks, where large triggerfish and black sea bass have also been found. Vasiliou said that mahi have been the most abundant offshore species as of late.

Donna Rae Roeske, at Captain Bob's Marina, reported that the weather has played a large factor in the fishing over the last week, especially on Saturday when the remnants of Hurricane Laura passed through. She said that the flounder bite had slowed in the inside channels and creeks, with angers finding about a 50/50 mix of keeper and undersized fish. Lots of smaller "pickers" are around to keep the activity constant, including spot, croakers, whiting, swelling toads, and even small sheepshead and speckled trout. Puppy drum have been caught along Wallops Island, according to Roeske. The subway cars on Blackfish Banks are producing large flounder, triggers, and black sea bass, with knowledgeable anglers limiting out in a few hours. The area between the Parking Lot and the Lumpy Bottom is producing gaffer dolphin and some yellowfin tuna, according to Roeske, while surf fishing is producing mostly panfish and undesirables such as skates, rays, and small sharks.

Wachapreague – Captain Lindsay Paul, at Trident Tackle, told me that anglers were still finding a few flounder as well as some croakers, spot, and kingfish (whiting). He had not heard of any offshore catch reports, but the Bite Me returned with a catch of tilefish on a recent deep dropping trip.

Amanda Manzella, at the Wachapreague Inn, reported that a husband and wife team staying at the inn had a catch of four flounder on Saturday, all mea-

suring over 20 inches.

Lower Shore – Jeb Brady, at Bailey's Bait and Tackle in Cape Charles, said that local anglers are starting to shift away from the traditional summertime species and are now starting to target the fall species fishery. Number one on the list is the evening trophy red drum release fishery along the channel edge stretching between the mouth of Hungars Creek down to Cape Charles. Brady said that some cobia are also being caught by anglers targeting red drum. Speckled trout action is improving as the water temperatures

begin to cool. Numbers, as well as the size of the trout, are on the increase, as the shop weighed two trout this week that exceeded 4.5 pounds. The concrete ships off Kiptopeke are still producing spot and croaker, while a run of small puppy drum developed recently off the Cape Charles Pier, some of which made the 18-inch minimum size limit.

Bill Hall was the first Eastern Shore resident to achieve Virginia Salt Water Master Angler Status. He has been named Virginia Saltwater Angler of the Year and Virginia Saltwater Release Angler of the Year and is a Virginia Press Association award-winning sports columnist.



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
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Historic Cape Charles Elementary Still Sound and Ready to Graduate to College Courses

Community college courses could come to the once legally segregated Cape Charles Elementary School.

The start of classes is hardly imminent, however. Major renovations need to be done to the long-abandoned school building, built in 1929 partially with funds from philanthropist Julius Rosenwald.

Tevya Griffin, president of the Cape Charles Julius Rosenwald Renovation Initiative, said that a meeting prior to the COVID-19 quarantines resulted in an agreement in principle with Eastern Shore Community College to expand the college's reach in southern Northampton County.

The next step, as the initiative restarts following the continued easing of pandemic restrictions, will be to negotiate a memorandum of agreement with the college, she said.

The memorandum would help the group obtain grant funding to restore the school to its original appearance and convert it to a community center benefiting people of all races.

The center would include public meeting rooms, a hall for social events and weddings, a community kitchen, and museum displays.

Since the initiative purchased the building in January 2019, it has completed engineering inspections. Richmond, Va., architect John Humphrey donated the drafting of floor plans, elevations, and renderings.

"Other than the roof, everything is remarkably sound," said Beth Walker, board member and co-owner of the Northampton Inn in Cape Charles.

Leaks in a valley of the roof and a

corner, will need to be patched "the sooner, the better," she said.

The building benefited from being built late in a construction campaign started by Booker T. Washington and Julius Rosenwald, one of the founding partner of Sears, Roebuck & Co.

Most of the almost 5,000 Rosenwald schools built around the country were made of wood, but the Cape Charles building came late in the building campaign when exterior walls were made of brick.

More good news from the inspections was how many of the original features remain intact.

Light fixtures, doors, a chalkboard, and even a segment of the original curtain around the auditorium's stage, remain.

"We have nearly all the historic windows," Walker said.

The windows were then considered part of the school's cutting edge, educational design. They were large and faced east, creating bright, sunlit rooms for learning.

After the school closed in the 1960s, some of the windows were removed and stored in the attic. Others were pocketed behind concrete on the front of the building.

The renovation project will also need to lay a new floor in the auditorium. The original floor was removed in the 1960s when the building was converted from a school to an eel-packing plant. A sand floor was poured, which accommodated heavy equipment.

Another major renovation expense will be parking and site preparation.

"We need to bring the site up to functioning the way that we want it to," Walker said.



the goals of hope, empowerment, and autonomy. And for many people with mental health challenges, recovery is often possible.

Many factors contribute to recovery, including having a good support system of people you like, respect, and trust. They can be family members, friends, teachers, faith leaders, neighbors, or peers — what's important is that you have people you feel comfortable talking to about what you're experiencing and support you may need.

Research has shown that having a social support system can have a positive impact on your overall mental health, especially for women, older adults, patients, workers, and students. On a scale of 1 to 10 where 10 was "a great deal of stress" and one is "little or no stress," a 2015 survey found that the average stress level for people with emotional support in place was 5 out of 10 compared to 6.3 out of 10 for people without emotional

support.

Having a few people you trust and can turn to can help you manage everyday challenges, make difficult decisions, or help during a crisis situation.

It can also combat social isolation and loneliness, both of which can put you at higher risk for physical and mental health issues including high blood pressure, a weakened immune system, anxiety, depression, and more.

If you don't have this right now, that's okay. Use these tips from the American Psychological Association to help build and strengthen your support network:

- 1. Reach out to family and friends. Simply saying hello or offering to help with a task can spark conversation.
- 2. Use technology. Connect with people far away via email, text messaging, or video calls.
- 3. Connect with people who share your interests. Join a club, volunteer at a local organization, or take a class to

help meet people who share your likes and interests.

- 4. Look for peer support groups. If you are facing a personal challenge, consider joining a peer support group to help take care of your mental health and connect with people who are facing something similar.
- 5. Ask for help. Reach out to your local library, place of worship, or community center to learn more about local events you may want to attend or groups you may want to join.

Remember that everyone's support system will look different. They can be anywhere from one to 10 people and include diverse people from different areas of your life. And they take time to build.

It's also important to take care of your own mental health and well-being in the process. Use self-care strategies and tips from the Mental Health First Aid curriculum to take care of yourself while also building a network around you.





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

Confusion About Voting by Mail

Dear Editor:

In his letter of Aug. 28, Mr. John Woolaver makes a valid point with regard to the confusion surrounding absentee voting and voting by mail. Between misleading statements by our president and mailings from groups like the Center for Voter Information, it's easy to see how a person could be led to believe that the resulting confusion could lead to fraud.

Let's be clear: voting by mail involves obtaining and returning an absentee ballot. There is no special "vote by mail" ballot. "Absentee voting" and "Vote by Mail" are two names for the same thing. You must be a registered voter to receive an absentee ballot. Mr. Woolaver received an application for an absentee ballot, not the ballot itself. The package sent by the Center for Voter Information was insufficient in making the distinction between the application and the ballot clear.

The belief that fraud is an inevitable result of voting by mail is false. Surveys of past elections demonstrate that the rate of voting fraud overall in the U.S. is between 0.00004% and 0.0009%, according to a 2017 study by the Brennan Center for Justice.

He still stands for protecting America and our borders; leaving the Middle East, the Iran deal, and the Paris Climate Accord, which designated China and India as "developing nations," an act that exempted them; appointing Supreme Court justices that enforce the Constitution; removing restrictive government regulations; and making NAFTA and other trade treaties less unfavorable to the U.S.


taken listening, self-preservation has overtaken community, and anger has overtaken compassion. Love has been relegated to a dirty word.
