Another COVID-19 Casualty:

Annual Chincoteague Christmas Parade Canceled

The Chincoteague Town Council held an emergency meeting Monday afternoon to discuss the town's response to Gov. Ralph Northam's recent executive orders increasing restrictions on gatherings due to increasing cases of COVID-19 in Virginia.

All council members except Matthew Reed attended.

"We've got things coming up in the

town that need to be looked at," said Mayor J. Arthur Leonard.

"The governor sent down new things and everybody's got to react to those new things," Leonard said.

Northam's orders restrict public, outdoor gatherings to 25, versus the 250 previously allowed.

"In my view, that's going to shut down tree lightings, parades," Leonard said. Emergency Management Coordinator Bryan Rush said Virginia's seven-day average for the coronavirus test positivity rate is increasing and now stands at 7.3% — a 1.2% jump in one week.

Accomack County has had 17 new cases, one hospitalization, and two deaths from COVID-19 and Chincoteague has had two more cases in the

Accomack Airport Hangar Survives Budget Battle

Its future was in question after Gov. Ralph Northam asked for funding to be struck from the budget amendments for a new \$2 million hangar at the Accomack County Airport, but today the governor signed the biennial budget amendments with the airport funding intact.

Del. Rob Bloxom introduced the funding request during the General Assembly special session.

"This long-fought battle was won with the help of Sen. (Lynwood) Lewis who helped me persuade the Senate conferees that this was a worthwhile project," Bloxom said of the proposed funding for the hangar in the Oct. 30 Eastern Shore Post. "This should help attract customers from Salisbury to Melfa to be close to Wallops Island when testing or housing aircrafts or drones."

Gov. Ralph Northam saw things differently, sending portions of the proposed budget amendment package back to the General Assembly, with some amendments of his own. Among them were striking the hangar and a Nimmo Parkway project in Virginia Beach, adding \$1 million for an independent investigation into the culture at the Virginia Military Institute, and seven language-only amendments.

Writing in a Nov. 5 press release that the airport hangar and the parkway project "do not warrant special treat-

past week, he said.

"In my opinion, this is still a steady state, but it's a warning state," Rush said.

Rush said religious ceremonies are not affected by the order, but the 25-person limit does apply to things like wedding receptions and funeral wakes.

The only change for restaurants is a ban on serving alcohol after 10 p.m., he said.

Rush said a decision was to be made by the chamber of commerce about whether to proceed with the Christmas parade; have a reverse drive-by parade where entries with 25 or fewer people are stationary and spaced out and the public drives by them; or cancel the event.

The Chincoteague Island Chamber of Commerce Tuesday announced the parade is canceled.

"After much consideration, the Chincoteague Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors has made the de-

cision to cancel this year's Chincoteague Old-Fashioned Christmas Parade, scheduled for Saturday, December 5th. With the new state guidelines limiting all public and private in-person gatherings to 25 individuals and with the safety of our participants, essential workers, volunteers, and staff as our highest priority, this is the best public safety decision.

"Even a drive-thru parade would have its risks.

"We know this is another disappointment, but we are already working on some other special happenings because this is still a Season of Thankfulness and we still have so much to be thankful for. Stay tuned for more details at www. chincoteaguechamber.com

Additionally, the downtown merchants association has canceled the tree lighting ceremony, Rush said. The downtown Christmas tree will be lit for the holidays, but without a

Additionally, a Chincoteague Cultural Alliance representative said Wednesday the Holly Day Market on Saturday, Nov. 28, has been canceled due to concerns about health and safety because of the spike in COVID-19

Councilwoman Denise Bowden said the council should support whatever decision the chamber of commerce makes about the parade.

"We're not being more restrictive... than what the governor has put out, but to me it just seems like it's pretty cut and dry what we have to do," she said.

"As much as we all want these things that we're normally accustomed to, I think right now we've got to make these sacrifices, and Lord willing, if nothing else takes us out and we survive this COVID stuff, we can get back to normal operations, hopefully by the spring or mid-summer anyway," Bowden said, calling for "small sacrifices right now" to ensure the safety of the community and visitors.

"If they want to have the parade,

I think do it. People need stuff, too. I think people go half stir-crazy when... everything is taken away," said Councilman Gene Wayne Taylor.

"... It's been so long now, you know what I mean? People have just about had it, so what I'm saying is, give them something," he said.

Still, Councilman Bill McComb said. "It is also a time to consider public safety, too. You can't say without a doubt you can do this successfully without congregation."

He said having the parade also encourages participants to congregate as they put floats together.

Police Chief Robbie Fisher said the police department tag football tournament on Saturday, Nov. 28, will go on, with players and officials screened, social distancing enforced, and other safety measures in place. The tournament is a fundraiser for a new town park.

ment," he said the two projects should go through the established transportation project review processes to "allow for full transparency by weighing different transportation projects against each other" instead of permitting the projects "to 'jump the line."

Lewis appeared to find Northam's argument specious. While acknowledging there is merit to public review processes, Lewis said, "We do stuff like that all the time. We pick meritorious projects, and we fund them."

"The House accepted his taking out of the budget my amendment over my objections," said Bloxom, meaning the House accepted the governor's amendment to remove the airport hangar from the General Assembly's budget amendment package.


But the Senate held the line. "The Senate didn't accept (the governor's) amendment so the funding is still in the budget," Bloxom said.

"We're in a good place" Lewis told a Post reporter Nov. 12. "It's not over yet."

Acknowledging the governor held line-item veto power, he added, "I would like to think that given the close vote in the House and the significant vote defeating his action in the Senate that he would rethink his position on that," Lewis said.

The funding was still in the budget amendment bill he signed into law Nov. 18.



Accomack County final results for the Nov. 3 election include several winners of town offices determined by write-in vote.

The official results came after the electoral board met.

In Bloxom, Thomas W. Beasley will be mayor after receiving the most write-in votes.

Council members in several towns also were determined by write-in vote.

The state board of elections certified election results Wednesday, after delaying certification earlier in the week to give additional time to the Richmond voter registrar's office, which has had a COVID-19 outbreak, according to the Richmond Times-Dispatch. Northampton Results

Northampton certified its results of the Nov. 3 election, in which 72% of the county's registered voters participated.

Only about 24% of all Northampton voters cast their ballots in person on Election Day; the rest were absentee ballots sent by mail or cast early in person.

A majority of Northampton voters, 55%, picked the Democratic candidate for president, former Vice President Joe Biden. He received 3,667 votes. The Republican incumbent, President Donald Trump, received 2,955 votes, or 44%. Jo Jorgensen received 100 votes.

Northampton voters chose Democratic incumbent Mark Warner over Republican Daniel Gade for the U.S. Senate. Warner received 3,889 votes, or 58%; Gade received 2,795 votes, or 42%.

The Democratic incumbent for the U.S. House of Representatives, Elaine Luria, likewise was successful over her Republican challenger, Scott Taylor. Luria received 3,889 votes, or 56%; Taylor received 2,763 votes, or 41%. David B. Foster received 150 votes.

The Cheriton mayor and a town council member will be switching roles. Mayor Larry LeMond did not run for re-election but won a seat on the town council. Town council member Jacqueline "Jackie" Davis defeated her opponent, Warren "Ski" Wisneski, in the mayoral race.

Davis got 171 votes, or 65%; Wisneski got 85 votes, or 32%.

The six seats on the Cheriton town council will be filled by the six candidates with the most votes, out of seven total candidates.

The Cheriton town council will consist of B.B. "Barry" Downing, 176 votes; Robert "Bo" Lewis Sr., 174 votes; Norma Spencer, 159 votes; Larry LeMond, 136 votes; Matthew Yancy, 135 votes; and Gregory Hardesty, 133 votes. The seventh candidate, Scott Berger, with 98 votes, did not make the cut.

Nassawadox Mayor Patricia "Patty" Stith will continue in her elected position; she ran unopposed and got 193 votes.

Only four candidates were on the ballot for the six-person Nassawadox town council. The two remaining seats will be filled by write-in candidates. The winners are John Hallett Sr., 128 votes; Claude Jones, 123 votes; Elizabeth "Liz" Freund, 115 votes; Andrea Fox, 113 votes; Kimberly Fitzpatrick, four write-in votes; and Lisa Lindberg, two write-in votes.

There was a similar situation in

Eastville, where Mayor James Sturgis ran for re-election unopposed and got 150 votes.

There were five candidates on the ballot for the six-person Eastville town council, and two write-in candidates. The winners are Mary Beth Briggs, 109 votes; John Crockett, 103 votes; Barbara Thomas, 96 votes; Eleanor Gordon, 95 votes, and write-in candidate Glenn Purvis, 22 votes.

For the sixth town council seat, there was a tie between David Philpot III and write-in candidate Douglas Coburn Jr., with 16 votes each. The winner will be determined by a draw.

Northampton citizens voted in favor of a constitutional amendment on redistricting, 4,275 to 2,028. They also voted for a constitutional amendment to provide tax relief on personal vehicles of disabled veterans, 5,631 to 894.

Northampton citizens said "yes" to a 1% sales tax rate increase to pay for repairs and new construction at Northampton High School, 4,658 to 1,886.

Northampton voter registrar Terry Flynn reported on Wednesday that he was not aware of any lawsuit in the county alleging voter fraud.

He confirmed that an American conservative activist group, Judicial Watch, claimed Northampton has more registered voters than adults living in the county.

Flynn said the claim was based on U.S. Census data that undercounted Northampton County by 60%.

Former Broadwater Head of School Remembered

Broadwater Academy announced the death of former faculty member and head of school, Joseph Spagnolo.

"His contributions to our school community are lasting, particularly in the strength of our science curriculum, and his tireless dedication positively enriched the lives of our students," the school said in a press release. "Our sincere condolences are with Joe's family, friends, former colleagues, and students at this time."

Spagnolo served as an oceanography teacher at Broadwater Academy for more than 10 years and was later appointed as head of school and served in that capacity for four years.

During his tenure as head of school, he oversaw a capital project that upgraded the school facilities with new HVAC systems, a new roof, and upgraded parking facilities. In addition, he was instrumental in enrollment increases for the school through a scholarship program through the Hampton Roads Community Foundation.

Accomack School Division Changes COVID-19 Plan in Face of Changing Guidelines

Accomack County Public Schools amended its COVID-19 mitigation plan Tuesday night due to COVID-19 policy changes at the federal and state levels.

Tonya Martin, coordinator of school health services, said the CDC has changed its definition of "close contact" to being within six feet of another person for at least 15 minutes within a 24-hour period, even while wearing a mask.

The new, stricter definition of close contact means more Accomack school staff and students will be sent home to quarantine for 10 to 14 days after potential exposure to COVID-19 in school.

The Accomack schools COVID-19 mitigation plan also was changed to align with new statewide restrictions put in place by Gov. Ralph Northam when he amended several COVID-19-related executive orders on Nov. 13.

For example, executive order 63 was amended to lower the minimum age of children required to wear face masks in most indoor, public spaces, from age 10 to five.

The plan also has adopted the Virginia Department of Health Algorithm for Evaluating a Child with COVID-19 Symptoms or Exposure for use by school health staff.

It's presented as a flowchart listing a series of yes-or-no questions about COVID-19 signs and symptoms, leading the user down one of multiple paths toward a recommended course of action such as sending the child to school, keeping the child home, seeking medical care and/or COVID-19 testing, and putting the child in isolation or quarantine for a certain period.

Other new language in the plan specifies the five key strategies for mitigating the impact of COVID-19: wearing face coverings, social distancing, hand washing, cleaning and disinfecting, and respiratory etiquette (such as coughing or sneezing into a tissue).

The plan now specifies that mask breaks

should not exceed two minutes. However, students also get breaks from wearing face masks for 15 minutes while eating breakfast or lunch and while they are outdoors and spaced at least 10 feet apart.

A parent of a student who cannot wear a face mask for medical or other reasons may apply for an exception.

Clara Chandler, director of human resources, discussed how staffing is impacted by teachers frequently being sent home to quarantine for two weeks after exposure to COVID-19.

One consequence is that Accomack now employs many long-term substitute teachers, since a substitute teaching position becomes a long-term position on the sixth consecutive day that the teacher covers the same class.

The long-term position pays more, because a long-term substitute normally does the same job as the regular teacher, preparing and presenting new lessons and conducting assessments rather than simply monitoring the classroom.

But substitutes covering for teachers in quarantine aren't really doing the

same amount of work as a regular teacher, and many of them do not have bachelor's degrees, Chandler pointed out.

For this reason she proposed a temporary policy change that would not give substitutes long-term status until their 11th school day in the same class — after the average, two-week quarantine period has ended.

Chandler noted that some teachers in quarantine are working from home, providing virtual instruction, and substitutes are only needed to monitor the students in the classroom.

She recommended also paying these substitutes by the regular daily rate.

Her third recommendation was to allow substitutes to work in more than one Accomack school.

A motion was made to accept the temporary policy changes, which passed unanimously.

In another matter, Superintendent Chris Holland announced that an order of 1,900 Chromebook laptops had arrived and nearly 1,200 were delivered to schools on Monday.

Northam Announces New COVID-19 Containment Measures

With COVID-19 cases on the rise again, Gov. Ralph Northam on Friday, Nov. 13, announced new measures to slow the virus' spread.

"COVID-19 is surging across the country, and while cases are not rising in Virginia as rapidly as in some other states, I do not intend to wait until they are. We are acting now to prevent this health crisis from getting worse," said Northam in a press release.

"Everyone is tired of this pandemic and restrictions on our lives. I'm tired, and I know you are tired too," he continued. "But as we saw earlier this year, these mitigation measures work. I am confident that we can come together as one Commonwealth to get this virus under control and save lives."

The following measures took effect at midnight on Sunday, Nov. 15:

- Reduction in public and private gatherings: All public and private in-person gatherings must be limited to 25 individuals, down from the current cap of 250 people. This includes outdoor and indoor settings.
- Expansion of mask mandate: All Virginians aged 5 and over are required to wear face coverings in indoor public spaces. This expands the current mask mandate, which has been in place in Virginia since May 29 and requires all individuals aged 10 and over to wear face coverings in indoor public settings.
- Strengthening of enforcement within essential retail businesses: All essential retail businesses, including grocery stores and pharmacies, must adhere to statewide guidelines for physical distancing, wearing face coverings, and enhanced cleaning. While certain essential retail businesses have been required to adhere to these regulations as a best practice, violations will now be enforceable through the Virginia Department of Health as a class 1 misdemeanor.
- On-site alcohol curfew: The on-site sale, consumption, and possession

of alcohol is prohibited after 10 p.m. in any restaurant, dining establishment, food court, brewery, microbrewery, distillery, winery, or tasting room. All restaurants, dining establishments, food courts, breweries, microbreweries, distilleries, wineries, and tasting rooms must close by midnight. Virginia law does not distinguish between restaurants and bars: however. under current restrictions, individuals that choose to consume alcohol prior to 10 p.m. must be served as in a restaurant and remain seated at tables 6 feet apart.

Northam in a press conference Wednesday reiterated the restrictions and discouraged Virginians from holding social gatherings, even of the 25-person nature allowed in the executive order, especially indoors.

"Do it outside if you can," he said of holiday and other gatherings.

"Please think about your holiday plans and the risk. ... This year, staying home is an act of love, too," Northam said.

Northam said news of two promising vaccines is "good news," adding that the state has been planning for vaccine distribution for months "and we will be ready."


Virginia remains near the bottom of states in the nation in terms of COVID-19 case rates, standing at fourth from the bottom currently, according to date reported by the New York Times.

Still, Virginia reported 2,071 new cases and 25 more deaths Tuesday, after 29 deaths Monday.

The state now has passed a 7% test positivity rate, with the most rapid virus spread in southwest Virginia.

"I do not intend to wait for things to get worse before taking action," Northam said.

Northampton Superintendent: Data Drives Back-to-School Decision

Since Northampton schools Superintendent Eddie Lawrence announced last month that he expects all K-12 students to be back in the classroom four days a week by Christmas – despite the COVID-19 pandemic – he's been getting questions about how he makes his decisions.

The short answer is it's all based on the data.

"Currently, we have no students who are positive, that we know of. We have no students who are quarantined, that we know of. We have no instructional staff or support staff that are positive or quarantined, that we know of," Lawrence said during the Nov. 18 school board meeting.

Several teachers and students have stayed home for a few days while awaiting COVID-19 test results, but the tests came back negative and everyone returned to school.

Lawrence also considers data from the Virginia Department of Health, published and updated daily on its website, and guidance from the CDC (Centers for Disease Control and Prevention). The VDH school data can be searched at https://www.vdh.virginia.gov/coronavirus/key-measures/pandemic-metrics/school-metrics/

For every Virginia county or city, the risk of COVID-19 transmission, from lowest to highest, is color-coded as follows: lowest risk, dark green; lower risk, light green; moderate risk, yellow; higher risk, orange; and highest risk, red.

As of Nov. 18, over the previous 14 days, Northampton had nearly 111 new cases of COVID-19 per 100,000 people, and the positivity rate of COVID-19 tests was 4.5%.

The number of new COVID-19 cases was a higher risk factor, but the overall COVID-19 test positivity rate was a lower risk factor.

The percentage of hospital inpatient beds occupied in the region was less than 70%, and the percentage of those beds occupied by COVID-19 patients was less than 4%, both low risk factors.

During the same period, the data for Accomack was similar – about 117 new cases of COVID-19 per 100,000 people, and a COVID-19 test positivity rate of 5%.

According to the CDC, when making decisions about school operations, administrators are expected to consider three core indicators – the number of COVID-19 cases and the test positivity rate, plus the school division's ability to follow guidelines for wearing face masks, social distancing, hand hygiene and respiratory etiquette, cleaning and disinfection, and contact tracing in cooperation with the local health department.

Both Northampton and Accomack are at higher risk for transmission of COVID-19, but across the Chesapeake Bay, the cities of Virginia Beach, Norfolk, and Chesapeake are at highest risk

Only two Virginia counties – Middlesex and Lunenburg – are at moderate risk for COVID-19 transmission, and no locality is at low risk for transmission.

Lawrence pointed out that no school on the Eastern Shore has been identified as the source of a COVID-19 outbreak, and "luck has shined upon Northampton County."

He noted that the entire school division does not need to shut down to prevent transmission of COVID-19. A closure can apply to one school, hall, or a single classroom.

Nandua High School, in Accomack County, reported an outbreak in progress to VDH on Oct. 21, but there is no data available on the related number of COVID-19 cases. The data is updated every Friday. VDH notes that "the presence of an outbreak at a school does not reflect a school's ability to educate its students or to protect the health and safety of its school community."

The next grade levels that will be allowed to return to school in person four days a week are third and seventh grade.

The return of the seventh grade is delayed because the middle school classrooms are configured differently from the elementary classrooms, and plastic safety shields are needed between rows of desks to keep students separated.

Plastic safety shields were ordered for both the seventh and eighth grade.

Partnership Improves Internet Access for Underserved Students

A little creative thinking and a lot of cooperation among Accomack's school district, county officials, and the local broadband authority allowed them to get internet connectivity for underserved children learning from home during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Beth Onley, finance director for Accomack County Public Schools, said the county wanted to use CARES (Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security) Act funding to provide free Wi-Fi hotspots in highly concentrated areas of homes without internet access, where families of Accomack students live.

The goal was for the Eastern Shore of Virginia Broadband Authority to install the fiber optic cable and other equipment and provide high-speed internet service.

ESVBA would have been unable to build the infrastructure before the Dec. 31 deadline to spend the CARES Act money, but a temporary solution was found, which uses Verizon internet.

The Accomack school district purchased 10 high-performance routers at a cost of about \$13,000 and has been

installing them in school buses, which are parked in communities with the most need for internet connectivity.

The routers are powered by the batteries in the school bus engines. The batteries are recharged by solar panels installed on the roofs of the buses.

If the batteries were not recharged, they could power the routers for only three days before needing to be replaced, Onley said.

A WiFi signal can be picked up within a 400-foot radius of a hotspot, so families may not be able to connect to the internet inside their homes, but it's accessible.

The hotspots are now in six Accomack communities, with two additional communities to receive service soon:

- Seaside, near White's Neck Road, Parksley
- Rolling Acres, near Dennis Drive, Bloxom
- Johnson Court, north of Nelsonia
- Clover Hill, near McComas Drive and John Cane Road, Greenbush
- Chestnut Village, near Myrtle Ave., Melfa
- Pettit Street, near Beartown Road, Mappsville

- Royal Tartan Road, near Bethel Church Road, Mappsville (coming soon)
- A.S. West Road, near Craddock-ville (coming soon)

Most of the communities served are mobile home parks or small neighborhoods of single-family homes.

The communities were chosen after Accomack County Public Schools conducted a survey over the summer and Accomack County employees created a map of all the addresses of students whose parents answered "no" when asked if they had internet at home.

The survey did not differentiate between homes that could not get internet access or families who could not afford internet.

The first Accomack communities to receive the hotspots had the highest concentration of homes with no internet.

The WiFi hotspots work with Verizon internet, but the longterm goal is for the Eastern Shore of Virginia Broadband Authority to provide a high-speed, permanent solution, Onley said.

ESVBA will provide broadband at the WiFi hotspots once the fiber optic cable is installed, and the routers will become the property of the authority.

Fiber optic cable can be buried underground or hung above ground like power lines. There may be a delay in the installation of the cables in some Accomack communities, like Rolling Acres, where there are no telephone poles and the cables must be buried, which is more time-consuming and costly.

The most difficult part of the project has been finding the right places to park the buses and getting permission from property owners to use the spaces, Onley said.

But the families who use the Wi-Fi are appreciative, and once a bus is parked, "the communities are protective of it," she said.

Accomack County, the school district, and the broadband authority started "a great partnership" with the WiFi project, which was truly a "cooperative effort," Onley said.

The result is helping underserved children by providing internet access and improving the quality of their education during a global pandemic, and that's "pretty cool."



Governor Announces \$20M Spectrum Shore Broadband Investment

Gov. Ralph Northam returned to his hometown of Onancock on Nov. 12 for the announcement of a \$20 million investment for broadband internet on the Eastern Shore by Spectrum, a Charter Communications company.

Spectrum will provide services to more than 17,500 homes and businesses in Accomack and Northampton County.

The first phase of the Spectrum broadband expansion is complete, with service available to more than 7,000 customers. Another 11,000 customers are expected to get connected in March 2021.

Spectrum offers broadband internet with speeds starting at 100 Mbps for residential customers, who can opt to upgrade their service to 400 Mbps or 1 gigabit with no data caps, modem fees, or contracts.

Small and medium-sized businesses can get service with speeds of 600 Mbps to 1 gigabit.

Low-income families and senior citizens who qualify for the Spectrum Internet Assist program can get 30 Mbps

internet for \$17.99, Spectrum's way of the state level. helping to bridge the digital divide.

(Download speeds of 25 Mbps or higher are considered broadband - a standard set by the Federal Communications Commission.)

That digital divide has become more apparent during the COVID-19 pandemic.

"In order to access healthcare online, start a business, complete school assignments at home and communicate with friends, an internet connection is vital to families of today," said Del. Rob Bloxom.

"I applaud Spectrum for their commitment to bringing broadband to the Eastern Shore of Virginia," he said.

Before COVID-19, nearly 100% of doctor visits were done in person, but now 75% of doctors' interactions with patients are through telehealth, Northam added.

"When families don't have access to broadband ... it becomes an equity issue," he said.

Investment in broadband has been a priority of the governor since he took office, when only "about \$4 million a year" was being spent on it at

The latest budget Northam has proposed includes \$52 million for broadband to be spent over the next two years. Virginia also will use \$30 million of its Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security funding for broadband.

Northam said about 108,000 more families have gotten access to broadband since he took office, but about 500,000 Virginia families still go without, and many of them are on the Eastern Shore.

"Expanding broadband into rural communities across Virginia is one of the most important things we can do to assist in expanding our economy and creating equity for all Virginians," said State Sen. Lewis.

"It's crucial for broadband providers like Spectrum to play a role in bridging the digital divide so that everyone has access to the information and tools they need to succeed in today's environment. During these unprecedented times. these investments have become even more paramount," he said.

Northam also emphasized that in-

vestment in broadband is an investment in the economy.

"Virginia is the number one state in this great country of ours in which to do business. ... as long as we can keep working together and keep doing things like expanding broadband, then we'll stay number one," he said.

He likened the rural digital divide to the 20th-century struggle to connect America to the electrical grid.

Thomas Edison started his Illuminating Company in 1882, but it took 43 years until half of the country had electricity.

"When we talk about investing in infrastructure now, it's not just about roads and bridges, and tunnels and rail, and ports. It includes the internet as well," agreed Rep. Elaine Luria.

Spectrum's new customers in Onancock and elsewhere on the Eastern Shore will join 30 million others in 41 states.

Accomack Approves New Business Recruitment Grant Program

The Accomack County Board of Supervisors Wednesday approved a new program intended to attract businesses to the county.

The resolution passed by the board, 8-0, establishes an economic development investment program, including a way to award grants to qualified businesses.

Supervisor Harrison Phillips III was absent.

Localities according to the state constitution are hindered from making direct grants to businesses, but the economic development authority is authorized by state law to do so, according to Accomack County Administrator Mike Mason.

Under the program, the board of supervisors may appropriate money to the EDA, and the EDA board of directors may accept the funds and use them to award grants to qualified businesses.

Mason described the county's partnership with the EDA as vital.

"I think it's a good program," said Supervisor Robert Crockett, who made the motion to adopt it.

Grants may go to new businesses locating in the county for the first time; businesses relocating within the county; and businesses that are expanding.

The program does not include businesses within incorporated towns.

Businesses outside the county airport or the industrial park must meet three criteria to be eligible:

Taxes and other revenue generated by the business and collected by the county have to exceed the grant amount no later than 80 months from when the business begins operations in the new, relocated, or expanded facility.

For every grant dollar received, the business must spend \$23 on capital investments, with at least half expended within a year of receiving the grant.

For every \$10,000 received in grant funds, the business must create at least one new, permanent, full-time job in the county, or must create at least 10 new jobs within a year of receiving the grant.

Businesses at the airport or in the industrial park only have to meet one of the criteria.

Applicants must provide financial statements.

The EDA will administer the grant

program, but the county administrator must review all grant applications, which then will be presented to the board of supervisors for approval.

Library to Receive CARES Act Funds

The board of supervisors approved giving \$20,000 in federal CARES Act funds to the Eastern Shore Public Library to help with expenses related to the coronavirus pandemic.

All expenditures will be incurred before Dec. 30, as the act requires.

The money will go to help all three libraries in Accomack County, including in Accomac, Chincoteague, and the Muddy Toes Library on Tangier.

Pandemic-related expenses include for cleaning supplies, personal protective equipment, plastic bags used for curbside pickup of books; book trucks to hold books in quarantine for one week after return; and sneeze guards and other larger barrier units.

Rebalancing the Budget

The board approved changes to the fiscal year 2021 budget passed in the early days of the pandemic last spring.

At the time, the board deferred employee raises, additional school fund-

ing, and some capital spending and approved quarterly appropriations rather than the typical annual appropriation, in light of budgetary unknowns related to the pandemic.

After a better-than-expected unassigned fund balance reported in the county fourth quarter financial report and the fact that the General Assembly's state budget adjustments did not significantly impact state aid to localities, Mason made recommendations to rebalance the 2021 budget, which the board approved Wednesday.

The action rescinds the quarterly appropriation process; eliminates four planned noncritical capital improvements (parking lights and an automatic gate at Sawmill Park, a fire suppression system for the clerk's office, and exterior painting of the county administration building); replaces previously budgeted pay raises with one-time, \$600 bonuses for employees, effective Dec. 15; and leaves the local share for the public school district as originally adopted.

County Will Pursue Local Cigarette Tax



staff the go-ahead to look into imposing a local cigarette tax of up to two cents per cigarette or 40 cents per pack, after the General Assembly passed legislation allowing counties to do so. The state measure takes effect July 1, 2021.

The tax could bring in at least \$422,000 to the county, Mason said, adding the amount could be double. He noted northern Accomack County, near the Maryland state line, is a destination for cigarette sales.

"We are in a unique location for this." Mason said.

The board will discuss the tax during its budget deliberations for next year's budget.

The measure would require additional resources in the commissioner of revenue office, which would be charged with administration and enforcement of the tax, Mason said.

County to Hire Firm to Collect Delinquent Taxes

The board voted to contract with Taxing Authority Consulting Services to help collect delinquent property taxes. The firm is paid through a 20% fee that can be added onto the tax bills, so collection is at no cost to the county.

The treasurer's office also will continue

its own collection efforts, including DMV holds, delinquent notices, and others.

The board also voted to increase the courthouse security fee from \$10 to \$20, after a public hearing with no speakers. Boat Ramp Parking Fees Approved

The board approved parking fees at county boat ramps after a public hearing at which no one spoke.

Accomack County taxpayers are exempt from the fees.

Two ramps, Queen's Sound and Kegotank Landing, were removed from the list of facilities where fees will be charged because of land ownership at those facilities.

Violation of the parking fee requirement will be a class 4 misdeameanor with a fee of \$75 per violation. Supervisor Robert Crockett noted court costs of \$75 would also be charged, making the total expense to violators \$150 per violation.

A daily permit will cost \$7 per vehicle and/or boat trailer and an annual permit, for a 12-month period starting July 1, will cost \$40.

For people with a Virginia saltwater recreational fishing license, reduced fees will be charged: \$5 for a daily permit and \$30 for an annual permit.

The permits may be purchased on-

line or at the Accomack County Treasurer's Office.

Accomack taxpavers will be issued an annual parking permit for each vessel and its trailer assessed with personal property tax by the county.

Other owners exempt from the fees may obtain an annual permit at no charge by applying to the treasurer.

Cellphone Tower Rezoning Approved

The board approved conditional rezoning from agricultural to general business of around 14 acres between Keller and Pungoteague to allow for a Verizon cellular tower.

The project still must be approved by the Board of Zoning Appeals for a special use permit.

Internet Updates

The board voted to send a letter to the Department of Community Housing and Development, Del. Rob Bloxom, Sen. Lynwood Lewis, and Gov. Ralph Northam objecting to a determination that a challenge made by DNG, a wireless internet provider, to Accomack and Northampton counties' grant application is valid.

In August, the two counties partnered to submit a regional application for state funds for broadband expansion in several communities.

The Virginia Telecommunications Initiative Grant, administered by the DHCD, is a major state funding mechanism for broadband internet improvements in localities.

DHCD in its finding noted "more than 10% of serviceable units for the proposed project area were identified as receiving service by DNG."

Still, Mason said members of communities in the areas proposed for the projects "overwhelmingly supported the application" made by the counties, including petitions representing "just about every resident" of the communities.

"If this continues, it will be very difficult for us to get a grant from this program," Crockett said, making the motion to send a letter to elected officials and the DHCD.

The counties in the application requested \$460,820 from DHCD for a regional broadband project including two projects in subdivisions in Accomack County and six in Northampton County.

The areas in Accomack County include Deer Point, which would serve around 49 residences, and Red Bank Road, which would serve around 30 residences.



Court Postings By Nancy Drury Duncan

Accomack County Circuit Court

Kendrah Tae Smith, 43, of Fayetteville, N.C., pleaded guilty to felony shoplifting in an agreement with the commonwealth.

On Dec. 17, 2019, Smith went into Walmart's electronics department, opened a headphone display case, and took two pairs of headphones, two pairs of earbuds, and two iPods. She went to another section of the elec-

tronics department and took several hard drives, said Assistant Commonwealth's Attorney William Fox. He said the Onley Walmart received an email notification about her having committed a similar crime in the Pocomoke City, Md., store. She has been in jail since she was arrested Feb. 4, 2019, said Fox. According to the terms of the agreement, Smith agreed to plead guilty to the charge and pay \$1,901 in restitution. Her sentence is three years with all suspended but for time served.

Carroll Reese Bishop, 53, of Melfa, convicted in 2018 of possession of a stun gun by a convicted felon, had his charge reduced to possession of a concealed weapon, a misdemeanor.

"He has not been in much trouble since his original felony," said Commonwealth's Attorney Spencer Morgan. He mistakenly believed he could own a stun gun, said defense attorney Carl Bundick. He said his client suffered from several serious medical conditions. Judge W. Revell Lewis III found Bishop guilty of carrying a concealed weapon and sentenced him to six months with all that time suspended. He ordered him to be on good behavior for three years and ordered the weapon to be destroyed.

Charles Mullens Jr., 58, of Wallops Island, in court a year ago for possession of cocaine, did not successfully complete the first offender program, said Assistant Commonwealth's Attorney Michael Baker. Mullens has not paid court costs or completed community service, he told the court. Defense attorney Carl Bundick said his client has been in the hospital seven times and has serious

medical issues. Judge Lewis found Mullens guilty of felony drug possession and sentenced him to 12 months in jail with all but 10 days suspended.

Jody Munns, 58, of Crewe, Va., was sentenced to six months, all suspended but time served, for possession of methamphetamine, six months, all suspended, for possession of a schedule IV drug, and 30 days, all suspended, for possession of marijuana. She was ordered to be on good behavior and unsupervised probation for five years.

Jonas Noel Rodriquez, 47, of Parksley, was sentenced to three years with all time suspended, two years of supervised probation, and to be on good behavior for five years for distribution of morphine. "He had past drug issues but is clean now," said Assistant Commonwealth's Attorney Fox. "He thought he was doing a favor for a friend," said defense attorney Tucker Watson. Judge Lewis congratulated Rodriquez on his continuing sobriety. "You learned a valuable lesson," he said.

Vasean Maurice Armstrong, 37, of Oak Hall, was sentenced to three months with all suspended but time served for leaving the scene of an accident, fined \$500 for driving without a license, and sentenced to six months, all suspended but time served, for attempting to flee from law enforcement officers. He was ordered to be on good behavior for five years. "What started as a conversation escalated quickly and got out of hand," said defense attorney Garrett Dunham. "He has been in jail almost continuously since his (December 2019) arrest," said Commonwealth's Attorney Morgan.





The Show Will Go On: North Street Playhouse Turns to Digital Platform To Continue Eastern Shore Holiday Entertainment Tradition

The Christmas production at the North Street Playhouse in Onancock is a holiday tradition for many Eastern Shore residents.

And the show will go on, despite the COVID-19 pandemic. The North Street Playhouse Christmas Spectacular will be presented to audiences online via www.showtix4u.com See details at the end of this article to order tickets and for performance dates and times.

Now in its 34th year, the playhouse is popular with theatergoers of all ages. It typically has three different series offering 12 to 15 productions a season. Its offerings include plays, musical theater, and a summer camp for youth.

In 2016, the playhouse expanded its scope to hire professional actors for a summer musical production, "Rent," and also invited local actors and young interns to work in the production. The interns shadowed and were understudies for the professional actors, resulting in a valuable learning experience.

The experiment was successful, resulting in similarly cast productions of "Young Frankenstein" in 2017, "Kiss Me, Kate" in 2018, and "Dames at Sea" in 2019.

This year, North Street's holiday show, like many events in 2020, will look a little bit different.

Unable to offer live performances because of the COVID-19 pandemic, the playhouse earlier this year launched NSP Digital to deliver performances to its audience via the internet.

The "Spectacular" is a holiday variety show, directed by Mary Stiegelbauer and featuring as hosts some familiar names to North Street theatergoers: Peej Mele, Cat Yudain, Jimmie Lee Brooks III, and Dwight L. Trice Jr.

The show also includes four special guests from past summer musical productions at North Street Playhouse: Jimmy Wencel, who was in "Spamalot"; Caitlin McKechney, who performed in "Kiss Me, Kate"; Mi-

kaela Holmes, who was in "Rent"; and Timiki Salinas, who was in "Young Frankenstein."

North Street Playhouse artistic director Terry Bliss "emailed me back in September because Music Theatre International had released a statement that they were opening up some show licensing to digital platforms," Stiegelbauer said.

Bliss asked her if she would help the playhouse produce a holiday show with some of the other professional actors who have been involved in past North Street Playhouse productions.

"After looking at the list and really thinking about the pros and cons to this weird theatre/film medium, I decided to reach out to Peej, Cat, Lee, and Dwight and get a feel for their thoughts on this as well," Stiegelbauer said.

After holding a virtual meeting, the group decided to do a variety/cabaret-style holiday show.

"Terry and the NSP were enthusiastically on board and we were all so grateful to be provided work because COVID has decimated our industry," she said.

They did rehearsals via Zoom, "which are just strange dealing with internet delay connections and flipped images. This becomes super challenging when I am choreographing and their feeds are coming in about two beats behind," Stiegelbauer said.

Additionally, each actor has to make their movements opposite to what they see everyone on their screen doing, because of flipped images.

Brooks, who lives in Manteo, N.C., was director/choreographer for the North Street productions "Rent" and "Young Frankenstein," and was choreographer for "Kiss Me, Kate." He also played the roles of Angel in "Rent" and Paul in "Kiss Me, Kate."

Mele, of New York City, will be remembered as playing Igor in the North Street Playhouse production of "Young Frankenstein" a few years ago.

Yudain, also of New York City, has appeared in "Young Frankenstein," "Rent," and "Dames at Sea" at the playhouse.

Trice, who is from Michigan and lives in Raleigh, N.C., wrote the lyrics for an original song, "What's This," featured in the holiday show and the trailer. The music was mixed by Derek Graham of Life By Design

Trice dances in Stiegelbauer's company, draMAStic Dance Works. He performed in draMAStic's productions of "Dracula" and "Foot Work & Footlights."

This is Trice's first North Street Playhouse production.

Getting the show ready for primetime "involved a lot of Zoom calls, phone calls, texting, picture diagram texts for story boarding, and then trusting the actors to film everything on their own and send it to me—and then I put the puzzle pieces together," Stiegelbauer said.

The holiday show is being filmed by the actors in their homes, then sent to Stiegelbauer for editing.

Without a stage crew, the actors themselves are responsible for everything from costumes and makeup to hairstyling and props, as well as for recording their parts — all from their apartments.

"It's been a bizarre but fun pro-

cess," Stiegelbauer said.

Fishing from the Shore By Bill Hall



As the remainder of the inshore warm water species begin to show signs that they have started their annual migration out of the bays and inlets for warmer waters to the east and south, anglers will be biding their time between fishing for diminishing populations and waiting for the much-anticipated arrival of schools of larger striped bass/rockfish. Recent reports indicate that the bulk of the larger oceanic striper population is still centered off the coast of New Jersey, where they are gorging themselves on schools of menhaden. A similar scenario applies to the Chesapeake Bay population of larger fish, which still remains in the upper Maryland portion of the bay. It is going to take a drop in water temperature or a significant cold front to jumpstart their migration south. Until then, anglers will have to remain content, fishing for the smaller schoolie-sized stripers until the bigger fish arrive.

Upper Shore – Captain Matt Abell, at Sea Hawk Sports Center, reports that rockfish action remains pretty good in the northern Virginia-southern Maryland portion of the Chesapeake Bay. The bulk of the larger fish still remain well north of the state line. Most of the feeding bird activity over the schools of fish is still occurring from Kedges Strait north, with most of the southern rockfish action occurring in the shallows. A few speckled trout continue to linger in the shallows of Pocomoke Sound. Tautog action has picked up in in the upper bay, with fish being caught around deep water structure. Abell said that he had received some reports of large trout caught on the seaside, but the anglers were secretive of the exact fishing location.

Chincoteague - Jimmy Vasiliou, at Captain Steve's Bait and Tackle, reported that puppy drum action in the surf improved over the weekend, with beach anglers also hooking into some large kingfish (whiting) as well as some school-sized striped bass. Stripers were also being caught around structure, such as bridge pilings, along the Assateague and Chincoteague causeways. Vasiliou said that the trout numbers have been on the decline. The offshore wrecks are holding tautog and black sea bass, with some smaller togs also being caught over structure inside Chincoteague Bay. The shop will host its annual surf fishing contest on Nov. 20, 21, and 22. The entry fee is \$25 and each paid participant will receive a Captain Steve's embroidered hat with his or her entry. A portion of the proceeds, as well as all donations, will go to the Briana Merritt Memorial Town Park Project. Prizes given to the largest legal fish weighed include Penn, St Croix,

Star Rod, and Tsunami combos.

Wachapreague – A few flounder, puppy drum, red hake, and speckled trout remain available inside the inlet, but angling activity is light. The wrecks continue to hold tautog, black sea bass, and triggerfish.

Lower Shore – Jeb Brady, at Bailey's Bait & Tackle Shop, said the speckled trout and puppy drum action declined over the last week, some of which was probably due to the recent windy conditions. Although the numbers were lower, the class of fish caught seemed to be a little larger than in recent weeks. Brady said that there has been a recent increase in the number of school-sized striped bass, with most of the fish failing to meet the 20-inch minimum bayside length. Sheepshead and some smaller tautog are still being caught around structure. Everyone is waiting for the larger striped bass to show up.

This will be the last installment of the fishing report for the season and what an unusual year it has been. We started off

the season with a discussion of how to safely fish while practicing social distancing as well as a description of what local tackle shops were doing in their attempts to protect their customers and employees from a brand-new virus that hardly anybody ever heard of before. Many of those protective measures are still in place. Let's hope that we get off to a more normal start in the early spring of 2021.

It has been my privilege to once again be the spokesperson for the local tackle shops, fishing guides, and charter captains, providing accurate and up-to-date angling information for our readers. Over-

all, 2020 has been a productive year for most fisheries along the Eastern Shore of Virginia. Let's hope the winter striped bass season follows suit. Have a safe and wonderful Thanksgiving celebration and a joyous holiday season. With a little luck, we will see you again in the early spring.





Virginia's First Lady Wants to Help Ready the 'Littlest Learners' for the Greatest Futures

Virginia's first lady Pamela Northam echoed the sentiments of many visitors returning to the Eastern Shore when she said in a recent interview, "Once you cross the Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel, your worries just drop away into that salt air." She and her husband, Gov. Ralph Northam, a Shore native, take every opportunity to be active — boating, walking, running, biking, and fishing, a hobby of the governor.

They also enjoy showing off the Shore at every opportunity. The latest occasion for that arose with the first full staff retreat, in October, for members of the executive mansion staff and the governor's Cabinet at Kiptopeke State Park. On family visits, they're often accompanied by their Labrador retriever — Murphy of Chincoteague — given to them by the governor's brother, who practices law on the Shore, and father, who lives near Onancock. Now, there's also Virginia Pearl, the new Northam Labrador puppy.

Not everything is as carefree for the first lady as a trip to the Shore. Life for her and the governor — like so many people in the state — became very different when they tested positive for COVID-19 Sept. 24. They experienced a mild-to-moderate case of COVID-19 and worked from home while in quarantine for two weeks.

Increased Funding for Child Care

One of their objectives in child care for the commonwealth came to fruition Oct. 21 with their joint announcement of \$65.8 million in new funding - supported by federal Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES Act) dollars — to increase access to child care and support child care providers amid the ongoing pandemic. This brings the total amount of CARES Act funding Governor Northam has dedicated to early learning and child care programs in 2020 to \$138 million. This funding has helped about 2,000 of Virginia's child care providers to remain open during the pandemic. The first lady is in touch with legislators about restoring some of the funding put on hold by the economic downturn associated with COVID-19.

Nearly 45% – approximately 2,600 – of child care programs closed their

doors at the beginning of the pandemic. Thanks to more than \$70 million grants and other relief, many have reopened or are starting though thousands children of

across Virginia remain on waitlists for child care. Pamela Northam made the announcement during a virtual meeting of the Children's Cabinet, an advisory body to the governor, which she heads.

The Children's Cabinet focuses on three major areas of school readiness: unifying the state's early childhood education programs, creating a uniform rating system for early childhood education programs, and setting a long-term vision for the programs, with clear deadlines to ensure progress. "We're also focused," she said, "on the training and compensation of early educators. Teachers are key to improving school readiness."

Funding announced in April – amounting to "less than an extra dollar-per-hour for child care providers," she explained, "continues the incentive grant program for child care providers through the end of this year. It helps us show appreciation to private providers by moving them to pay parity with those who are publicly funded so they don't have to get an extra job."

Early Childhood Education Initiative

The first lady's chosen initiative since her husband became governor Jan. 13, 2018, has been to improve the access to — and the quality of — early childhood education throughout the state. After moving into the executive mansion, she said she "spent a year researching early childhood educational systems and sought out experts on the subject." She traveled more than 6,000 miles visiting what are referred to as "early childhood care and education providers" — elementary schools, child care centers, family day-homes,

local departments of social services, and nonprofits.

"The goal on those trips," she explained, "was to have conversations where we heard what early educators, parents, and local leaders needed from the state. This shaped the work we have done at the state level."

A major focus has been working to ensure Virginia's kindergartners are ready for school and that the state's children have access to fresh and healthy food, something that nearly half a million Virginia children currently do not have. In addition to heading the Children's Cabinet, she helped to bring about the state's first chief school readiness officer, whose division works with other state agencies serving young children from birth to 5 years in the early childhood care and education system.

In developing her school-readiness initiative, Northam gained early support from leaders of the Virginia Chamber of Commerce, the Virginia Business Council, and the Virginia Early Childhood Foundation. As a partner in a political power couple, she also made a point to meet with Republicans as well as Democrats during the 2018 General Assembly to discuss her focus and solicit ideas from legislators. "It's better to have a lot of voices at the table, but in the end, we need to speak with one voice," she said.

One of those voices on the other side of the legislative table was that of Virginia House of Delegates Republican member Chris Jones, of Suffolk (who lost re-election in November 2019 after his 76th district was redrawn). "I met with the first lady and was pleased this was a passion for her," he said. "Republicans had this on our radar for some time. We're positioned to move ahead in getting the best bang for our buck in the delivery of early education in the commonwealth."

Concern for Rural Areas

The circumstances of children living in rural parts of the state - often on very limited incomes - have been of special concern to her. Like her Eastern Shore husband, she grew up in a rural area – in Texas – and met Ralph Northam when he was a resident in pediatric neurology. After studying at Baylor University and the University of Texas, she specialized in pediatric occupational therapy, where her work included rehabilitation hospitals, teaching hospitals, and special education. She's traveled on Richmond school buses with volunteer teachers, administrators, and cafeteria workers to deliver food to children out of school because of the pandemic.

The reasons for her initiative are not only personal – "We all want to love and care for our children," she said — but imperative for the future of the commonwealth. "Early childhood education is the best investment we can make in our future workforce," she explained. "Today's kindergarten students will be putting the final bolts in the ships being planned now at Newport News Shipbuilding. We're growing the workforce of the future."

Northam gives inspirational credit for her early-childhood initiative to

immediate past first lady Dorothy McAuliffe, who mounted a campaign to feed thousands of hungry Virginia children daily. Northam has also been

quick to give a nod to "local communities for leading the way" to innovative approaches for improving early childhood education in communities stretching from Danville to the Eastern Shore.

As someone who has been active for vears in Hampton Roads environmental organizations, she has also worked to incorporate more environmental education into the broad field of education. Jay Ford, the Chesapeake Bay Foundation's Virginia policy grassroots adviser based in Belle Haven, said, "For the first time in almost a decade, funding for environmental education in Virginia has doubled, and a lot of that is due to Pam's quiet work behind the scenes. There are kids on the Shore who can throw a rock in any direction and have it land in a creek but have never been out on the water. We want to see that change with the additional funding."

Looking Back, Moving Forward

Despite the challenge of moving from the private life of a doctor's family into a public life that's always in the spotlight, Northam has welcomed all of the surprises and opportunities — epitomized by living in the 1813 residence, the oldest governor's mansion in the country still used for its original purpose. "We're trying to tell a fuller story of this 207-year-old mansion," Northam said. "Its history has had quite a trajectory: a civil war, two world wars, pandemics [including the 1918-1920 Spanish flu]. Along the way a lot of different people have cared for this home."

The stories range from those of former first ladies to those of enslaved people. She praised the assistant director of the mansion, Kendall Battle, who is African American, for assisting with this effort and helping to plan a recent dinner for descendants of enslaved people who worked at the mansion.

The first lady came under fire a year ago for handing out raw cotton — growing behind the formal Charles Gillette garden at the mansion — to a group of Black Richmond students on a tour and asking them if they could imagine what it must have been like to pick the plant with its scratchy, coarse fibers. The in-

cident occurred at the same period as the governor was apologizing for a photograph of him in blackface in a college yearbook. The first couple acknowl-

the experiences that other people have had," the first lady said in an interview for this article. "We all need each other to help us understand the complete experience."

The former slave quarters and original kitchen overlooking the gardens — including a kitchen garden on the slope behind the formal garden — are important parts of "the complete experience" at the mansion. Northam and mansion staff have involved an inner-city garden group, Tricycle Gardens, in planting and composting native Virginia plants in the pollinator gardens. "We, of course, do everything naturally; no herbicides or pesticides," she said.

The spaces inside the slave quarters are being pared down to educational use to tell — online as well as in person — the fuller story of the lives of enslaved peoples and first ladies. The preservation of the historic kitchen is part of the curriculum for educators.

The mansion's interior has had two recent additions — a painting Ethan Brown did of his Pamunkey ancestor, Chief Walter Bradby, which hangs in the ballroom; and a print of "Head of a Young Woman Veiled, 2019," delivered to the mansion by artist Kehinde Wiley to hang there until it moves to a permanent gallery next year at the Virginia Museum of Fine Arts, which had purchased it.

Inside and outside, the Virginia executive mansion's story becomes more robust. "We can't move forward unless we know where we've been," the first lady said.

She and her husband "will definitely be back in the 757-area-code again in the future," she said in response to a question about the end of the governor's term in January 2022 and a return to private life in Norfolk. "In the meantime, we're still very focused on our littlest learners."

The Northams have two grown children: Wes, a neurosurgery resident, and Aubrey, a web developer.



Random Facts About ... Famous (and Not So Famous) Last Words

When we opened one of our internet tubes for cleaning last week, all kinds of last words — famous and not so famous — came spilling out.

In some cases, last words sound too good to be true so maybe the words were edited to make the speaker come off better. Leonardo da Vinci, one of the most accomplished artists of the ages, supposedly went out on a note of modesty, "I have offended God and mankind because my work did not reach the quality it should have."

Hope-is-the-thing-with-feathers poet Emily Dickinson died in 1886 of what was known then as Bright's disease but is today called kidney disease or nephritis, and among the last words she ever offered the world were these: "I must go in, the fog is rising." Civil War Confederate general Stonewall Jackson's last words were also poetic: "Let us cross over the river and rest under the shade of the trees."

On other occasions, last words are uttered in front of multiple witnesses so there's no faking it. From the death chamber where he was about to be executed in 1966, convicted murderer James French shouted these last words to members of the press: "How's this for your headline — French Fries!" He was being electrocuted. At another execution, this one in front of a Utah firing squad, James Rodgers was asked if he had any last request and his response was, "Bring me a bulletproof vest."

Edward Abbey, an American writer who died in 1989, also went out on a joke, saying, "I hid a million dollars under the —"

Michael Jackson's last words were a series of pleas: "More milk! More milk, please!" You might think this is apt for the kind of man-child Jackson was, asking for milk as some kind of throwback to his childhood. But then you find out that "milk" was his name for propofol, the powerful anesthetic that's normally used in hospitals and that Jackson overdosed on in 2009, killing him.

"You be good. See you tomorrow. I love you." These sweet last words belong to Alex, an African grey parrot who was used in research at Brandeis University. It's what he told his handler every night. And one night, it was the last thing he ever said.

Johnny Ace, a singer from the 1950s, was fooling around with a gun backstage at one of his concerts when a friend told him to be careful. Ace held the gun to his head and said," It's okay! Gun's not loaded... see?" His last words.

In the category of oops-last-word, Civil War Union general John Sedgwick was killed by Confederate sharpshooters immediately after telling his staff, "They couldn't hit an elephant at this distance!"

Dominique Bouhours, a French grammarian who died in 1702 but whose pronouncements on language are still considered standards in France today, died with words any member of the grammar police would appreciate, "I am about to — or I am going to — die: either expression is correct."

President in an Orange Jumpsuit?

Sept. 8, 1974, President Gerald Ford granted former President Richard Nixon an unconditional pardon for "any crimes that he might have committed against the United States as president." Among the reasons for the pardon were Ford's conviction that our country needed to focus on other problems (such as the Vietnam war) and Nixon's poor health. At the time he faced a life-threatening battle with phlebitis but he recovered and lived 20 more years.

Presidential historian Douglas Brinkley has speculated on the national mindset that underlays the pardon: A president is not held to the rule of law like the rest of us.

The image of a president in an orange jumpsuit is too mind-boggling for us to digest.

That mindset didn't extend to lesser members of the Nixon administration. Forty-eight Nixon officials went to prison. John Mitchell, his attorney general, sentenced to one to four years, served 19 months. Haldeman and Ehrlichman, Nixon's two closest aides, each served 18 months. John Dean, his legal counsel, sentenced to one to four years, served four months.

But we were spared the image of Nixon in an orange jumpsuit. We didn't have to confront the fact that, in two elections, we'd overlooked his character flaws and elected a criminal to the White House. We overlooked the fact that the man who proclaimed "I am not a crook" coordinated burglaries, hid the bombing of Cambodia from Congress, and impeded Vietnam war peace talks to improve his chances of winning a second term.

While he impeded those talks, 20,000 more Americans were killed in Vietnam.

These acts constitute treason, a

crime for which lesser Americans are

No American president has ever been imprisoned. Does this mean election to president elevates a person to godlike status, immune from the justice that falls on lesser beings? Could such a person shoot someone in the middle of Fifth Avenue with impunity?

In 1974 our country sidestepped this question, avoiding the national convulsion that would have accompanied a Nixon trial and punishment. Now our country may face it again. Is a president or ex-president above the law? Is he above the moral considerations we share as men and women?

We'll get the answer when President Trump comes to trial, which appears inevitable, at least in New York for tax fraud. At the federal level, possible charges include campaign finance violations, obstruction of jus-

tice, soliciting foreign government intrusion into an American election, even negligent homicide for the tens of thousands of Americans who died because of his callous and politically driven handling of the COVID-19 epidemic.

The answer will profoundly impact the future of the presidency and our country. If we sidestep the question, if we avoid the convulsion, we will confirm the lament we hear today from many of the world's other democratic countries.

America is no longer (in Ronald Reagan's words) the shining city on the hill.

Time To Act on Confederate Monument in Eastville

Some have urged the Board to convene a facilitated group of citizens who would propose a nonbinding resolution. However, at the end of the day, it is unlikely our leaders will be presented with an answer that will please ev-

eryone. Therefore, I conclude it's time for our Board of Supervisors to demonstrate leadership and deliberately act.

If the State of Mississippi's leadership can navigate politically troubled waters and embrace a 21st century state flag absent the stigma of the "Stars and Bars," Northampton County's managers can certainly realize the fulfillment of all that is right and fair for our community.

I urge our Supervisors to give this daunting task high priority until every Northampton County citizen can pridefully walk the Old Courthouse Green free of its symbolic reminder of social injustice and inequity.
