Report: Accomack, Northampton in Bottom Quarter of State Health Ratings

- •Life expectancy in both counties is about 3 years shorter than Virginia as a whole.
- •Life expectancy for Black Northampton residents is 5 years shorter than for White residents.
- •In Accomack County, Black residents, on average, live 3.8 fewer years that White residents.

Accomack County in a recent report was ranked 95 of 133 Virginia counties for overall health outcomes, which include measures of length and quality of life, and 115 for overall health factors, which include measures of health behaviors, clinical care, social and economic factors, and physical environment.

Life expectancy is 76.8 years in Accomack and 76.4 years in Northampton, compared to 79.5 years in Virginia as a whole.

Broken down by race, the life expectancy for White Northampton residents is 77.6 years; for Black residents it is 72.6 years.

The life expectancy for Black Accomack residents is 74 years, compared to 77.8 years for White residents.

Northampton County was ranked 101 for overall health outcomes and 107 for health factors.

The rankings place Northampton in the bottom 25% of Virginia counties for both health outcomes and health factors.

Accomack is in the lower middle range of counties, between 25% and 50%, for health outcomes and in the bottom 25% for health factors.

The rankings represent a mixture of progress and decline locally since

2019, when the County Health Rankings & Roadmaps ranked Accomack at 101 for health outcomes and 113 for health factors, and ranked Northampton at 95 for health outcomes and 115 for health factors.

Arlington is the healthiest county in the state, according to a press release from the Virginia Department of Health.

"We at the Virginia Department of Health are extremely proud that Arlington and the rest of the Northern Virginia region enjoy such good health, as recognized by the University of Wisconsin Population Health Institute," said State Health Commissioner Dr. Norman Oliver. "We know many factors affect public health, and the Commonwealth has made great strides in recent years, but we also know there are healthcare gaps that Virginia and its leaders must address going forward as we navigate our way out of the COVID-19 pandemic. We will not let up in our efforts to create healthy communities and improve healthy outcomes for all people in Virginia," he said.

The five communities with the poorest health, starting with least healthy, are Petersburg, Galax, Covington, Martinsville, and Hopewell.

The annual rankings, which use more than 30 measures to give a snap-

shot of a community's health, provide a starting point for community discussions about ways to improve.

The report is a collaboration between the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation and the University of Wisconsin Population Health Institute. It can be viewed at www.countyhealthrankings.org

The 2021 report does not yet reflect the impact COVID-19 had on counties because the data used is from 2019 and earlier. The pandemic's impacts will begin to emerge in the 2022 report.

The 2021 report includes two new measures — broadband access and high school completion.

Northampton YMCA Nears Completion

Construction is nearing completion on the \$4.5 million, 15,000-square-foot Northampton County YMCA in Cape Charles, with a ribbon-cutting ceremony scheduled for May 29, and doors officially opening soon after.

Memberships are climbing steadily and are expected to reach 300 to 400 membership units (memberships for individuals, couples, and families) and 600 to 800 total members, said Julie Crowley, district vice president of YMCA of South Hampton Roads, prior to a hard-hat tour of the new facility April 27.

There is no joining fee to sign up for a YMCA charter membership. New members of the Northampton County YMCA may use the Eastern Shore Family YMCA in Onley (or any YMCA of South Hampton Roads) until the new facility opens.

No contract is required to join the

YMCA; memberships are renewed every 30 days or can be canceled anytime.

Crowley said the YMCA lost about 35% of its membership during the COVID-19 pandemic, but as COVID-19 cases drop, vaccinations rise, and operating hours return to normal, member-

ships are increasing.

YMCA members can also participate in online fitness classes through the Virtual Y program.

The Northampton County YMCA will be open 24 hours a day, seven days

a week, a benefit to members who may be apprehensive about returning to the gym during a pandemic and prefer to work out during off hours, Crowley said.

Membership cards can be scanned to grant access to the facility anytime. Only the fitness center will be available outside of regular hours; no locker rooms or other areas will be accessible, Crowley noted.

Equipment in the fitness center will include exercise bikes, treadmills, elliptical machines, weight resistance machines, and free weights.

Parents will be able to drop off their children at the childcare center for up to two hours a day while the parents exercise. The caregivers, who are highly trained and CPR-certified, engage the children in play, arts and crafts, and other activities, Crowley said.

The men's and women's locker rooms will have both showers and dry areas, and lockers will be available for day use or rent, for members who wish to keep their gear on-site.

There are three separate family changing rooms for families with small children or adults who need help with dressing. Two of the changing rooms have showers and toilets. The heated, outdoor pools – a recreational pool and a lap pool – are accessible by door at the end of the hallway.

Donations to the Northampton Coun-

ty YMCA capital fund are still coming in, and the future addition of an architectural membrane over the lap pool, as requested by locals, is still possible.

It would be similar to a tent, enclosing the pool and allowing it to be used in colder weather. The sides could be removed in the summer, leaving a canopy over the pool, providing shade.

There is a group exercise room; classes such as yoga and Pilates will be offered and are included in the cost of a YMCA membership, Crowley said.

A multipurpose room can host youth programs like summer day camp and other programs like Parents Time Out, which Crowley likened to "free babysitting," giving parents a chance to enjoy an evening out. The program is normally held twice a month, and participants must register in advance.

Outside is an athletic field, where kids can play T-ball or summer campers can enjoy various outdoor activities in good weather. There's also room for a pavilion, Crowley added.

Northampton County YMCA charter members who register now for a small fee will have their names displayed on a wall in the lobby as a thank-you for joining early, she said.





According to the report, using data from 2015-2019, 68% of Accomack residents and 72% of Northampton residents have broadband access.

Accomack reported 81% high school completion and Northampton reported 83% — the measure is the percentage of adults age 25 and over with a high school diploma or equivalent.

Areas Where Shore Counties Are Improving

Alcohol-Impaired Driving Deaths

Accomack showed an improving trend in alcohol-impaired driving deaths, with 0% of driving deaths with alcohol involvement reported in 2019, compared to 50% in 2018 and 33% in 2017.

Northampton also showed 0% of driving deaths with alcohol involvement for 2019, but no significant trend over the past decade.

Uninsured Residents

Both counties show an improving trend for the number of residents without health insurance.

In 2018, 15% in Northampton and

17% in Accomack were uninsured, according to the report.

Those are down from 2013, when Northampton and Accomack both had 21% of residents uninsured.

Still, the figures remain higher than for Virginia and the United States, which both had 10% uninsured.

Positive trends also were reported in both counties for the number of dentists, preventable hospital stays, and air pollution.

Areas Where Shore Counties Are Getting Worse

Obesity

The report shows a worsening trend in adult obesity in both Accomack and Northampton counties — 37% of adults in Accomack and 42% in Northampton are obese.

The figures are based on 2017; the uptick comes after rates stayed fairly steady, in the low- to mid-30 percents, over the previous several years.

Both Shore counties' obesity rates are higher than Virginia's, 31%, and the United States' rate of 30%.

Still, the Shore's obesity rate no longer is the worst in the state, as it was

in 2000

Among the most obese counties in the 2021 report were King and Queen County, with an obesity rate of 49%; Isle of Wight and Madison counties, both 45%; and Dinwiddie and Lunenburg counties, both 46%, among other counties with higher obesity rates than the Shore.

Children in Poverty

Both counties showed a worsening trend for the percent of children living in poverty.

In 2019, 30% of Northampton children and 29% of Accomack children lived in poverty, compared to 29% for Northampton and 28% for Accomack in 2017.

Sexually Transmitted Infections

Both counties showed a worsening trend for sexually transmitted infections.

In 2018, 777 STIs were reported in Northampton and 734 were reported in Accomack.

The number in Accomack was up

from 648 in 2017. In 2007, only 432 STIs were reported in the county.

In Northampton, the number was down from 2017, when 878 STIs were reported, but the trend over the past decade has been worsening — for example, in 2007, only 389 were reported in the county.

Physical Inactivity

A worsening trend for physical inactivity was noted for Accomack but not for Northampton.


In 2017, 33% of residents were reported to be physically inactive, a slight decline from 36% the previous year; still, there is an upward trend in inactivity over the last decade.

In 2017, 26% of residents were physically inactive.

Rep. Luria Hears Local Questions, Concerns About Rescue Plan Funding

Congresswoman Elaine Luria hosted an online forum Wednesday in which Coastal Virginia leaders voiced their appreciation and concerns regarding the American Rescue Plan that was signed into law March 12 and will provide funding to states and localities recovering from the economic fallout of the COVID-19 pandemic.

The participants included Cape Charles Mayor William "Smitty" Dize, Accomack County Board of Supervisors Chair Ron Wolff, and leaders from Virginia Beach, Norfolk, Hampton, Williamsburg, and York County.

The American Rescue Plan will give Virginia about \$4.4 billion in state relief and \$2.9 billion in local aid.

"This funding will be critical to protecting vital local services that residents depend on and in preventing layoffs that will further weaken the economy," Luria said.

Virginia Beach Mayor Bobby Dyer said that state unemployment benefits have been both "a blessing and a curse" because many workers have become dependent upon them.

Dize agreed the problem is no longer a lack of jobs but a "lack of people wanting to work."

He said Cape Charles' largest restaurant is considering closing two days a week due to a lack of employees. The decision would cost the business \$500,000 to \$1 million in revenue this year and decrease the amount of meals taxes the town receives.

However, the Cape Charles economy has performed fairly well during the COVID-19 pandemic, leaving the town with a budget shortfall of only about \$150,000, Dize said.

He appreciated nonprofit Cape Charles Main Street for helping the town and local businesses get state grant funds to help them stay afloat throughout the pandemic.

Cape Charles will receive about \$930,000 from the American Rescue Plan, according to a press release from Luria's office.

One drawback of the plan is localities must wait for the U.S. Department of the Treasury to issue guidance on how the funds may be used, and the deadline is May 10, after many cities and towns have finished or nearly finished writing their budgets for the upcoming fiscal year.

There was a consensus among the forum participants that the guidance from the Treasury Department should be issued sooner rather than later, and Luria agreed to send a letter urging the Treasury Department to act.

Dize would like Cape Charles to spend its money on infrastructure; Luria said there is language in the American Rescue Plan that supports using the funds for water, sewer, and broadband services.

Wolff also expressed gratitude that COVID-19 did not severely impact the Eastern Shore compared to other regions.

He said Accomack County's positivity rate for COVID-19 peaked at 12% and typically stayed below the state average.

Accomack has continued all county services throughout the pandemic without raising taxes, Wolff noted.

Accomack used Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security or CARES Act funding to provide grants of up to \$5,000 each to small businesses, commercial waterman, and charter boat captains, he said.

The grants were in high demand, and the county distributed the funds "as equitably as we possibly could," Wolff said.

He appreciated the work of the Shore Delivery Corps, a volunteer group that has worked in both Accomack and Northampton counties throughout the COVID-19 pandemic, delivering medicine, food, and other supplies to citizens who couldn't leave their homes.

Wolff said plans are in the works for an Accomack town hall meeting where citizens can have their say about how the county's nearly \$6.3 million in American Rescue Plan funds should be spent.

Luria said, "Hampton Roads encompasses so many different types of areas, both urban, suburban, very rural - and each has its unique challenges, but I really appreciate the leadership that each of you is giving in your communities to deal with the challenges of COVID," and "the unifying theme of this is that there is help coming."

Northampton OKs Using Borrowed High School Money for Other Updates

Using money originally borrowed for renovations and new construction at the middle and high school complex in Eastville, Northampton supervisors voted unanimously Tuesday night to award contracts to ABM Facility Support Services to replace outdated, failing equipment in Northampton's public buildings and elementary schools with energy- and cost-saving options.

It was the culmination of several actions supervisors have taken on the ABM project over the last month.

On March 23, Northampton supervisors unanimously approved ABM's proposals to perform work at county facilities for \$2.6 million and at Kiptopeke and Occohannock Elementary schools for approximately \$20 million.

Upgrades to systems such as heating, cooling, and lighting are needed in county buildings including the courthouse, jail, sheriff's office, social services building, and administration building.

But the most work is needed at the elementary schools, which are 28 years old and have HVAC systems that have exceeded their 20-year lifespan.

Furthermore, both schools contain water pipes that were found to be made from substandard steel, resulting in pipes corroding and bursting long before the end of what should have been a 50-year lifespan.

Because the equipment at the elementary schools is in such poor condition and creates a high capital risk, supervisors decided to have ABM begin work at the schools in June.

On April 13, supervisors passed a resolution to fund the elementary school project with the money they borrowed for renovations and new construction at the Northampton middle and high school complex in Eastville.

Last fall, supervisors authorized the issuance of a school bond for about \$24 million. Their April 13 resolution authorized spending up to \$20 million of those funds on the elementary school projects.

The resolution stated the funds are being repurposed because the middle and high school project "has not proceeded as quickly as anticipated."

The goal is to replace the old HVAC systems at Occohannock and Kipto-

peke elementary schools with brandnew geothermal systems designed and installed by ABM.

Additional work to be performed at the schools includes upgrading the building envelopes, adding insulation and taking other measures to prevent unwanted air flow in and out of the buildings. Interior and exterior lighting will be upgraded and transformers will be replaced.

The work will be completed over the course of two summers to avoid any disruption to instruction. All work to be done at Kiptopeke Elementary will completed in 2021.

Much of the work to be done at Occohannock Elementary also will be completed in 2021, with the exception of the installation of the geothermal HVAC system. Replacing all the water pipes is the top priority for Occohannock in 2021.

The contract for the elementary schools authorizes ABM to perform work this year totaling \$10.8 million. A separate contract will be written for the remaining work that will begin next summer.

ABM representatives do not yet know how much it will cost to finish the elementary school projects because they have yet to determine how much rework they will need to do.

For example, they may need to reinstall the ceiling tiles at Occohannock after the water pipes are replaced, only to take them back down the following summer when they install the new HVAC system and then put them back up again.

But the risk of doing nothing about the pipes now is unacceptable, said Supervisor John Coker.

Although hesitant to estimate the remaining cost of the school projects, ABM agreed to Chairman Dixon Leatherbury's request to determine a price range.

In another matter, County Administrator Charlie Kolakowski announced Northampton received a \$345,000 grant from the Virginia Department of Emergency Management to purchase a generator for the former Northampton Middle School building in Machipongo.

Northampton also received a \$45,000 grant to assist private company Canonie Atlantic in cleaning up the former railroad yard in Cape Charles, part of the county's effort to support economic development.

Northampton 8th Graders Return to Classroom 4 Days a Week

Northampton eighth graders returned to school four days a week on Monday, April 26, leaving only three grade levels (ninth, 10th, and 11th) with hybrid students who spend just two days in the classroom every week.

"We're doing what we can to get kids back in a responsible fashion," Superintendent Eddie Lawrence said during the April 22 school board meeting.

That has included rearranging bus schedules and seating, reorganizing small or oddly shaped classrooms to socially distance students six feet or three feet according to changing guidelines from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention or CDC, using cafeterias as large classrooms, and purchasing 400 sneeze guards, he said.

"I would love to have pre-K through 12 back five days a week as normal, but we're really trying not to overextend what we can do in a safe and organized manner," Lawrence said.

Eleventh grade is the next grade the superintendent would consider bringing back for a four-day school week.

He noted it may not be possible to bring all students back four days a week by the school year's end, since supplies such as the sneeze guards are limited.

Summer Classes

Associate Superintendent Christine Hill said the deadline to apply for the Northampton schools' summer recovery and remediation program is April 30.

Lawrence has described the upcoming summer classes not as a typical "summer school" but as an extension of the current school year, intended to help students recover from academic losses that resulted from COVID-19 school closures in 2020 and a lack of full-time, in-person learning opportunities throughout 2021.

Students whose applications are received after the April 30 deadline will be put on a waiting list.

Staffing for the summer program has not yet been finalized but the goal is "to accommodate as many families as possible." Hill said.

School Board Vacancy

A Northampton school board seat was left vacant when Randy Parks resigned in late March. He served atlarge, meaning any qualified voter who lives in the county is eligible for the position.

Three candidates met the April 22 deadline to express their interest in the position in writing: Liz Jones, Virginia Long, and Matthew Bernhardt.

Virginia code requires school board vacancies to be filled within 45 days after the vacancy occurred, which prompted the Northampton school board to set a timeline on April 22 for selecting a candidate.

Interviews were conducted April 28. The school board initially planned to hold a public hearing May 12, but a legal consultation revealed that a public hearing was not necessary because the school board members are elected.

The school board opted to forgo a public hearing and planned to inform candidates of its decision April 29, with a public announcement to follow April 30.

The candidate selected will complete Parks' term, which ends Dec. 31.

The decision not to hold a public hearing was made, in part, to give the selected candidate more time to collect the 125 signatures required to get on the ballot for the November general election to run for another term if the candidate so desired.

Energy-Saving Upgrades

The school board reviewed a proposal from ABM Facility Support Services to replace outdated, failing equipment at Occohannock and Kiptopeke elementary schools at a cost of about \$10.8 million.

Work to be performed includes the design and installation of a geothermal HVAC system at Kiptopeke, and interior and exterior lighting upgrades, addition of insulation, and replacement of transformers at both schools.

The upgrades will save energy and electricity costs over time, and ABM will guarantee the cost savings to the school district, nearly \$70,000 in the first year alone.

The school board unanimously approved ABM's proposal, contingent upon a legal review and the approval of the Northampton board of supervisors.

Accomack Airport Prepares for Unmanned Aircraft Operations

Regulations for aircraft operations at the Accomack County Airport were updated this month to include rules and standards related to unmanned aircraft systems.

The Accomack County Board of Supervisors voted at the April 21 meeting to approve the changes.

"The revisions were made to include regulations and standards for unmanned aircraft systems, referred to as UAS, since these types of operations are just starting to emerge in general aviation airports, and also to address the process for off-airport access," said Barbara Haxter, airport manager.

The revisions are consistent with current rules, regulations, and minimum standards giving guidance about UAS operations, she said, noting Accomack's airport "would be one of the first airports in Virginia to support commercial UAS operations."

The impact of UAS operations could affect the airport's other users, Haxter said, adding a discussion with local pilots had been planned, prior to the COVID-19 pandemic's restrictions, to discuss operational and safety aspects of UAS activities at the airport.

"Our local pilots do have concerns about what safety measures are in place to protect them," Haxter said.

The FAA Flight Standard District Office, the Virginia Department of Aviation, and the UAS company had committed to participate in the discussion, which Haxter said will be rescheduled once COVID-19 restrictions are lifted.

"It would be advisable to have this discussion with the local pilots prior to any UAS operations taking place," Haxter said.

Ron Wolff, board of supervisors chairman, said he attended a UAS demonstration at the airport recently "and almost at the same time, a pilot in his aircraft took off. There was radio communication; there didn't appear to be any kind of discrepancies or problems between the two that were flying. ... One was lower, one was higher — but they were both operating within the same confines of the airfield. That's the way things should take place."

Haxter said, "I think communication is the key. I think most of the users at the airport are open to all forms of aviation, so I think that having a dialogue gives them a better understanding of what the UAS operator does in his normal routine that ensures that communication between aircraft, manned and unmanned."

Supervisor Robert Crockett said of the board's discussion, "Basically, what we are doing tonight is we are reviewing changes or additional rules and regulations that the FAA requires to allow us to entertain the possibility of bringing a (UAS) business into the airport. ... To do that, we need to do this." Supervisor Donald Hart Jr. said the local pilots' group did not see the proposed regulations until the day of the board meeting, but said a group of pilots had reviewed them earlier in the day and said the rules did not affect them — and called Wolff to say that.

"What I'd like to say is that, from this point forward, is any rules or regulations at the airport should at least be, as a courtesy, for transparency purposes, just given to the pilots or their association, just for them to look at ... and see if they have any comment," Hart said.

American Rescue Plan

Accomack County Administrator Michael Mason asked the board of supervisors to schedule a town-hall-style meeting to get public input on how the county should use federal funds coming to it through the American Rescue Plan.

Nonprofit organizations have been inquiring of Mason about the county's plans for the funds and want the chance to propose projects to the board, he said.

Guidelines for using the funds have not yet been released, but were expected by the end of April.

The board voted to authorize Mason to schedule the meeting Wednesday, June 2, at 6 p.m., at Metompkin Elementary School.

Federal funds sought for 911 project

Federal funds are being sought for the Eastern Shore 911 radio communication infrastructure replacement project, according to Mason.

The project was submitted for consideration for funding through a Federal Community Projects Grant, which Mason said is a new mechanism for funding community projects with federal money.

"It's basically funding that is being made available in the House, in Congress, that will allow Congress members to present up to 10 projects to (the) appropriations (committee) for possible funding," he said.

After a group from the Eastern Shore discussed potential projects for funding with Rep. Elaine Luria in a recent Zoom meeting, "the regional project that Accomack and Northampton agreed on as the frontrunner for this funding was this," Mason said.

The project has letters of support from local volunteer fire and rescue companies throughout the Shore and the sheriffs of both counties, he said, adding, "I think that regional aspect of the project makes it a very appealing project."

The total project cost, which is the amount being sought for grant funding,

is \$8.2 million, according to Mason.

Free public Wi-Fi hot spots being used

Supervisor Jackie Phillips during the supervisors' comment period said the public is making use of Wi-Fi hot spots placed in both Accomack and Northampton counties by the Eastern Shore of Virginia Broadband Authority.

"They are definitely being utilized," he said.

One of the newest hot spots installed, at Bailey Road Apartments near Greenbush, recently accounted for more than 50% of total usage, both traffic- and volume-wise, according to Phillips.

Other hot spots with high volume include Pettit Trailer Park in Mappsville, Johnson Court near Nelsonia, Dreamland 2 in Hopeton, and Captains Cove Marina Club House in Greenbackville.

"It's great they are being used," Phillips said.





Corner Bakery Will Collect Meals Tax 'As They Have Done' While Ordinance Reviewed

The Corner Bakery in Onancock can continue to pay the town's meals tax as it has in the past while the Town Council considers whether to change the ordinance governing the tax, according to Mayor Fletcher Fosque.

Four council members spoke in support of the bakery's contention that some items it sells, such as a whole cake or a dozen doughnuts, should not be subject to the tax.

The bakery's practice has been to charge the tax on items such as a doughnut and a cup of coffee, which could be considered a meal, but not on bulk items.

Sales figures submitted to the town for the period during which the meals tax was suspended due to the pandemic, together with previous meals tax submissions, indicated the bakery was collecting the meals tax on around 1/3 of its sales, according to Town Manager Matt Spuck.

"No one likes taxes — no one does. However, to enjoy our parks and receive services like police protection, they are necessary," Spuck said during the April 26 council meeting.

After becoming town manager, Spuck noticed many tax accounts were in arrears, "so we wanted to make a concerted effort to collect unpaid taxes of all kinds before they became more of a problem. That's how this issue began."

Early this year, the town began contacting businesses about delinquent taxes.

On Jan. 22, the town sent a letter to the Corner Bakery reminding the owners they had not paid the meals tax since March 2020.

The tax was suspended from April through June 2020.

After getting no response to the letter, Spuck called the bakery Feb. 19, and the town received payment for all unpaid taxes shortly thereafter.

Included with the payment were total sales figures for April through June, which were much higher than the average sales on which the business had paid meals tax in previous periods.

"The difference in monthly sales prompted me to look at the town ordinance for meals," Spuck said before reading sections of the ordinance.

The ordinance exempts from the meals tax food sold in bulk, like a whole cake.

"It doesn't seem reasonable to me that cakes and packaged products made up nearly 70% of the bakery's sales. I felt it warranted further clarification," Spuck said.

Spuck had the town attorney review a letter he wrote to the bakery before he delivered it by hand to the bakery April 6.

Corner Bakery owner Pete Smith replied by email April 8, saying he would forward both his letter and the town's to his attorney.

On April 13, Spuck wrote Smith, offering to meet in person to discuss the matter and saying "the town supports the requirement that your bakery collect the pass-through meals tax." He noted other Shore towns require bakeries to collect the tax on non-factory-packaged products.

Spuck said his hope was the two attorneys "would craft a revision to the ordinance to remove any ambiguity. This revision would be presented to Town Council and we would all move forward from there."

The bakery on April 21 in a Facebook post requested support from their followers about the matter, resulting in many people contacting council members.

Spuck asked Town Council to review the ordinance and "give thought to revising it to remove the ambiguity."

In the meantime, he recommended the town ask the Corner Bakery to collect and remit meals taxes "as they have in the past."

"I am not, was not, and would not look for a fight or even a negative exchange," Spuck said, adding, "My hope is simple: through respectful communication with Onancock businesses and with Town Council, we remove any ambiguity from the ordinance to allow administration to equitably enforce the ordinance in place."

Council member Bob Bloxom said he endorsed Spuck's approach, but said the ordinance needs to be reviewed.

"When this first dusted up, what I did was read the ordinance and noticed several ambiguities," he said, adding, "...I also believe, based on the Smiths'

internal procedures, that they were doing their best to interpret it as they thought it was to be interpreted."

"I hope to avoid something like this in the future," said council member Jov Marino.

Council member Maphis Oswald said the town has "accepted along the way what the Corner Bakery has been paying as their correct amount. To suddenly turn around and say this is incorrect and needs definition, to me is not really what we need to do."

Council member Ray Burger said he thinks the bakery's interpretation of the ordinance is correct.

Fosque said Cape Charles' meals tax ordinance does not include the bulk sales exemption.

"We don't need to take any action.... The bakery is going to continue doing what they are doing," he said, adding it would be a council decision whether to change the ordinance.

A copy of the proposed budget is on file for review at the Painter Town Office during regular business hours.

Jermaine Ken-Ron Newkirk, 38, of Parksley, pleaded guilty to possession with intent to distribute cocaine and possession of cocaine in a plea agreement with the commonwealth.

Because of an earlier distribution conviction, he faced a mandatory minimum sentence of three years. According to the terms of the agreement, two other charges were dismissed in exchange for his guilty pleas. Both convictions resulted from traffic stops.

In the first, Newkirk was stopped and a smoking device with cocaine residue was found in the vehicle.

The second charge resulted from a deputy attempting to stop the vehicle for speeding. Newkirk did not immediately stop, said Commonwealth's Attorney Spencer Morgan. He stopped when he got to his house in the Dennis Drive area near Parksley. He jumped out of the car and ran to the rear of the property. A search of the vehicle revealed a set of scales and cocaine. Inside the house, the officer found a plastic bag of white powder chunks, found

to be cocaine, and another set of scales. The scales and the packaging of the drug is what led police to the charge of distribution in that case, Morgan said.

Judge W. Revell Lewis III sentenced Newkirk to 10 years with all but three years suspended, three years supervised probation when released, and five years of good behavior.

Myron Hazzle Edwards II, 34, of Parksley, opted to participate in the first offender program. Edwards was arrested for possession of cocaine in February 2020.

Police were called when Edwards went to a house where he previously lived to pick up his belongings. A search revealed a wallet containing his Social Security card and a small package of "off-white chunks," later found to be cocaine, said Morgan.

Judge Lewis explained the details of the program to Edwards and told him the felony charge would be dismissed if he successfully completed the yearlong program. Corey Wayne Marshall, 42, of Bloxom, pleaded guilty to two counts of embezzlement, one count of grand larceny and one count of larceny of a firearm in a plea agreement with the commonwealth. Additional charges were dismissed.

According to the terms of the agreement, Marshall was sentenced to 10 years on each of the four counts. He will serve one year and six months of active jail time. He will be on supervised probation for 10 years and was ordered to be on good behavior until he has paid \$15,576 in restitution to Steve Van Kesteran, from whom money and items were taken. The firearm belonged to Stanley Young and was recovered.


Julian Travis Scarborough, 41, of Painter, will spend 15 years in prison for his convictions on drug and gun charges. In a plea agreement with the commonwealth, all the drug charges were reduced to first offenses in exchange for his pleas of guilt. Scarborough pleaded guilty to three counts of distribution of cocaine, possession with intent to distribute cocaine, possession of a firearm by a violent felon,

and possession of a firearm while in possession of controlled substances.

Scarborough was the subject of a joint investigation of the Drug Enforcement Administration and the Eastern Shore Drug Task Force. A confidential informant audio- and videotaped three separate, large-volume sales of narcotics at convenience stores in the Painter area. A search warrant executed at Scarborough's home found cocaine, a firearm, and scales.

On each of the three counts of drug distribution, Scarborough was sentenced to five years with four years suspended, leaving three years of active time. On each of two counts of possession with intent to distribute cocaine, five years with two and a half suspended (five years of active time); for possession of a firearm by a convicted felon, five years; and two years for possession of a firearm with a controlled substance, for a total of 15 years of active time He will be on supervised probation and required to be on good behavior for 10 years.

According to court records, Scarborough was indicted by an Accomack County Grand Jury for first-degree murder April 19.

Random Facts About ... Liars and Truth Tellers and Knowing the Difference

When we opened our internet tubes this week, all we saw were lying liars telling lies. Or maybe they were telling the truth. How can you tell the difference?

On the internet, finding the truth is a process that takes effort. Check multiple references. Seek out reliable sources that don't have axes to grind. Don't rely exclusively on the political side of the spectrum that you agree with. Prize data over opinion.

But what if the person is standing right there, all wide-eyed and proclaiming innocence to you: "Honey, I swear, I did not [fill in the blank]!" Are there ways

to tell if that person is lying?

Pop psychology is full of advice regarding indicators (expressions, movements, vocalizations) that supposedly will tell you when someone is lying. Pursing their lips — subconsciously trying to stop themselves from lying. Shaking their head while talking — signaling "no" that what they're saying is not true. Holding a finger or hand to their mouth — again, trying to subconsciously keep those lies in. Rapid blinking. Standing very still. Being fidgety. Won't look you in the eye.

When interrogating a suspect, police became suspicious when a teenage son who found his parents murdered in their home acted "too calm" about the crime. But the police also became suspicious of a suspect who seemed "too distraught" about a classmate's murder. These police suspicions, like the pop psychology indicators on how to spot a liar, are judgment calls.

And they are also unreliable. Both of the suspects just mentioned were, in fact, found guilty of the crimes and spent 16 and 17 years, respectively, in prison only to be exonerated of the crimes. An extensive study published in Knowable Magazine found that almost all the indicators we think point to someone lying are no more reliable than a coin toss. According to the article: "The studies assessed 102 possible nonverbal cues, including averted gaze, blinking, talking louder (a nonverbal cue because it does not depend on the words used), shrugging, shifting posture and movements of the head, hands, arms or legs. None proved reliable indicators of a liar, though a few were weakly correlated, such as dilated pupils and a tiny increase — undetectable to the human ear — in the pitch of the voice."

Can we rely on the polygraph to catch

liars? Not really. The lie detector gets it wrong from 13% to 25% of the time. It is sufficiently unreliable not to be admissible in court. Aldrich Ames worked for the CIA for 31 years, nine of which he served as a Russian spy. His spying got American agents killed. The CIA knew it had a rat and gave polygraph tests to Ames twice without detecting his lies. Had Ames been super-trained on how to defeat the polygraph? Nope, he just relaxed and passed the test being given by the top spy agency in the world.

If the CIA can't catch a lying liar, what hope is there for us? Investment documents often warn, "Past performance is no guarantee of future results." Maybe you can turn that on its head and figure if someone has fibbed to you in the past, it might be an indication, if not a guarantee, of future results.

Or as someone said about a politician, "I can tell he's lying because his lips are moving."


But the problem with not believing politicians and always being on guard against those trying to scam you through bogus emails and phone calls and finally not trusting anyone regarding anything is that you can end up with a bad case of pistanthrophobia. And that can't be cleared up with Neosporin. Pistanthrophobia is a fear of trusting people or a fear that people will betray your trust and end up hurting you. It can be crippling. And the way to get past it is to start trusting trustworthy people. Yes, even in this lying world.

And be trustworthy yourself. You don't want to end up like the playwright Lillian Hellman. In a 1979 television interview, her rival the novelist Mary McCarthy said of Hellman: "... every word she writes is a lie, including 'and' and 'the."











Golf Carts Driving Wild in Cape Charles, DUIs and Hit-and-Run, as Police Crack Down

A golf cart driver spent the weekend in jail and faces DUI charges after a hit-and-run accident in Cape Charles Saturday.

The accident comes as Cape Charles police are preparing to crack down on golf cart and other minor offenses, including those with dogs, bicycles, and skateboards.

Micheal Belton, 60, of Richmond, is alleged to have run a rented golf cart into a parked car and to have fled the scene.

Police were called to the area near the Oyster Farm Seafood Eatery at 1:30 a.m., said James Pruitt, Cape Charles chief of police.

An officer apprehended Belton "almost immediately" nearby at Colony Drive and Sunset Boulevard, Pruitt said.

Belton was charged with driving while under the influence and refusing to take an Intoxalyzer test. He spent the rest of weekend, until Monday, in the county jail.

The DUI charge is the second in recent months to be filed against golf cart drivers and comes during a doubling in the number of DUI tickets written in Cape Charles.

Since the beginning of the year, officers filed seven DUI charges, up from three the year before.

Even allowing for the impact of COVID-19 restrictions last year, Pruitt called the increase "very concerning."

The accident also comes as Cape Charles police are reprinting forms and watching for new town signage before cracking down on golf cart and other violations.

Until recently, Cape Charles police faced a financial conundrum in enforcing minor violations.

Because the infractions were technically violations of town ordinanc-

es, attorney's fees and other costs of prosecution fell to the town and were only offset by fines typically of \$25.

Consequently, when the offenses involved children, officers were hesitant to file charges and relied on the traditional remedy of following children to their homes and talking sternly to their parents.

However, in recent years, "it was nonstop and there was no punishment," said Pruitt.

Recently, the town council increased the fines and made the penalties payable directly to the town. Should individuals choose to fight the cases in court, then a summons will be issued.

Under the new ordinance, fines for allowing unlicensed drivers behind the wheel of a golf car will rise to \$100 for first offense and \$250 for second offense within a year, up from \$25.

"If we write a couple of tickets and word gets out, maybe they won't let kids drive" carts, he said.

To begin spreading the word about the enforcement plans, Mayor William "Smitty" Dize plans to meet with representatives of golf cart rental firms and rental landlords who make golf carts available with their units.

Other violations that now face \$50 fines include:

- Parking violations.
- Allowing dogs to run free.
- Riding bicycles or skateboards on the sidewalks in a newly designated area around the Mason Avenue stores.
- Taking golf carts on the public beach or failing to display a current town permit.

Especially if alcohol is involved, "we're not going to be reactive. We're going to be very proactive," said Pruitt.



Fishing from the Shore By Bill Hall



The fishing action over the last week and through the weekend was almost an exact copy of the previous week. The warmer air and water temperatures that finally showed up this week should help jumpstart the fishing action. Add reports of speckled trout and gray trout to the growing list of species that have begun to make their appearances during the early part of the angling season.

Upper Shore – Captain Matt Abell, of Sea Hawk Sports Center, said this week was almost a repeat of last week. Flounder fishing on the seaside was described as spotty through the early part of the week but picked up Tuesday as the air and water temperatures warmed. Black drum fishing in the surf also declined with the colder temps over last weekend. On a positive note, red drum and striped bass numbers improved over on the Chesapeake Bay side.

Chincoteague - Donna Rae Roeske, at Captain Bob's Marina, described the flounder fishing as hit

or miss, but she said that the number of fish being caught is slowly increasing. The wind and cold temperatures from last weekend did not do anything to help the fishing, and anglers were having to fish hard to put flat-

ties in the cooler. She thinks the next two weeks should bring more consistent action. Roeske said that the black drum bite has also been up and down with anglers catching fish one day, only to be skunked the next. The catch-and-release striped bass fishery has been good in both the surf and in the channels on the bay side. The coastal striped bass season opens May 15. The commercial fishermen are starting to catch some larger sharks in their drum nets, added Roeske.

Jimmy Vasiliou, at Captain Steve's Bait and Tackle, reported one of the first trophy-sized stripers that he had heard of was released in the surf of Assateague this week. Smaller rockfish are being caught in the surf and in Chincoteague Bay. Vasiliou said the drum bite in the surf had fallen off and he blamed the recent bout of cool weather. The shop will be hosting its annual flounder tournament beginning this weekend.

Wachapreague - The 30th Annual Captain Zed's Flounder tournament is underway with the final weigh-in occurring on the afternoon of Sunday, May 2. A spokesman for Trident Tackle reported that the tournament has over 470 registered entrants. A fish weighing 5 pounds, 1 ounce, caught by an angler from Delaware, was leading the tournament early in the week. The tournament's heaviest flounder will be worth \$3,000. Green Channel and Drawing Channel, followed closely by Bullshead, have been the most heavily fished areas. Live minnows and Berkley Gulp have been the bait combinations of choice for most of the fishermen.

Amanda Manzella, at the Wachapreague Inn, reported that her guests have enjoyed good flounder action through the week with the best action occurring on jigs fished in 5 feet, 7 inches of water. Lots of fish in the 22-

inch size class have been brought in, said Manzella.

Lower Shore - Jeb Brady, at Bailey's Bait & Tackle in Cape Charles, said that the fishing has been improving right along with the weather. The waters just off the barrier islands are still producing the majority of the black drum catches but Brady said that he expects that to change soon. Striped bass and large red drum are also being caught behind the barrier island breakers. On the bayside, the

shop has received reports of speckled trout catches in the creeks with schools of puppy drum encountered in the same areas. The fishing piers in Cape Charles and Kiptopeke have not reported much in the way of early season action, but that should also soon change, according to Brady. He described the offshore wreck fishing action as solid with some large tau-

tog being caught.



The waiver will also be open to non-residents possessing an Accomack County Solid Waste Decal. Commercial for hire waste haulers will be required to pay standard tipping fees.

Landfills will be open on Saturday May 8, 2021 from 8:30 am to 4:00 pm to accept residential garbage, yard waste, and construction/demolition debris. The landfill will also accept the following recyclable materials:

- Tires (car and small truck only "LIMIT" 12 per person/day)
- Used Motor Oil, Scrap Metal, and car and truck batteries.

Recycling materials, such as plastic bottles, milk jugs, detergent bottles, any #1 or #2 plastics, newspapers, magazines, catalogs, junk mail, telephone books, cereal boxes, metal and aluminum cans, may be recycled at any of the County's 7 Convenience/Recycling Centers "FREE" year round.

Landfills and Convenience Centers will not accept materials deemed to be hazardous, such as: Paint, Pesticides, Biological hazards, asbestos, and heavy metals. Please check with the attendants at these sites as to where and how to dispose of hazardous materials.

The Department of Solid Waste looks forward to working with the citizens of Accomack County on this program and encourages everyone to mark their calendars for the second Saturday of May every year! A "FALL CLEAN-UP" will also, be held on the second Saturday in October. This year's event will be October 9, 2021. Golf Course Cements Friendship of Two Trailblazers on Similar Life Courses

In 1963, the Masters Golf Tournament in Augusta, Ga., began its tradition of an honorary starter and ceremonial first tee shot. That same year Lee Elder was amassing victories at an impressive level in the United Golf Association, a tour for Black players, with purses only a fraction of what golfers were earning on the PGA Tour.

Elder would parlay his success on the UGA to loftier aims, raising enough funds to attend the qualifying school for the PGA Tour. There, Elder made the most of the opportunity, comfortably securing his spot on the tour and wasted no time making a run at what would be the sport's most prolific champion. During his rookie season at the American Golf Classic, Elder evenly challenged Jack Nicklaus for 72 holes, ultimately losing in a playoff.

Three years later, Elder continued to confront the convergence of sports, politics, and race, competing in the face of apartheid at the South African PGA Championship in Johannesburg, as a personal invitee of another major champion, Gary Player. Elder asserted his run on the world stage, winning the Nigerian Open later that year. His breakthrough in the States came in 1974 after winning the Monsanto Open. It was his first win on the PGA Tour, but more importantly, it earned him a spot in the Masters the following year. In 1975 Elder became the first African American to compete in arguably golf's most prestigious tournament.

Fast forward to April of this year, and the 85th playing of the Masters. Alongside both Nicklaus and Player, as well as past champions of the event, and singularly acknowledged by Augusta National Golf Club Chairman Fred Ridley, Elder was warmly introduced as the recipient of honors at the first tee ceremony. In attendance with Elder for the ceremony was Bill Allen, a native of the Shore, and a successful businessman and pioneer in his own right.

Many years prior, Allen was introduced to Elder by a mutual friend, Jim Thorpe, who followed Elder's success in the '70s and then a trio of tour wins in the '80s. The relationship between Allen and Elder would blossom, with Elder eventually referring to Allen as his godson. As Allen pointed out, his interest in Elder was without question, but he always seemed to ponder what kept Elder's prolonged interest in him.

"I know why I was interested and so excited about meeting him. I'm not sure what he saw in me to maintain a relationship. I just feel extremely blessed to have been with him for this long," said Allen.

It could be that what Elder saw in Allen was an individual who followed a similar path to Elder's own. A closer look at Allen's past speaks to their simultaneous journeys, separated only by age, but encumbered by similar barriers.

The opportunities for Black children in the early '60s on the Shore were stunted by the physical and psychological hurdle of segregation. Allen, along with his twin brother, Bobby, made do playing baseball in the agricultural fields of Daugherty. The impression was enough to inspire action in their father. "In 1962 my dad had the vision to take us out of the field from playing stickball with dirt and sticks," said Allen.

In what Allen described as a dramatic scene, their father, Bill Sr., drove his sons to Onancock at the firehouse where Central Accomack Little League had their original field. It was time for tryouts and their father had a determined edge to see his sons have the ability to play. The outcome was largely positive.

"My brother and I, and a gentleman by the name of Alvin Williams were the first people of color to play in the Central Accomack Little League, and they opened their arms up, by a far majority they made us feel so welcome and allowed us to play," Allen said.

Later, Allen confronted the inequities of education. Segregation in schools persisted through the '60s on the Shore. In 1969 the state of Virginia issued students a take on school choice, in the manner of a "yellow form." Allen remembers the form clearly, as well as his reasons for selecting the school he

"I can see it like it was yesterday. You could take a No. 2 pencil and select which school you wanted to go to. I selected to go to Onancock High School, which at the time was an all-White school. The reason why is because they had science labs and we didn't and I wanted to go to that school that had the microscopes," said Allen.

Allen applied himself well in school and was likewise a dominant football player. He would later go on to Virginia State University, earning his tuition by playing baseball and football.

Allen began to see that a professional career on the gridiron was not in the cards for him. He ran into players bigger and faster, which prompted Allen to make the unpopular decision of

quitting football, jeopardizing his scholarship. Allen informed the athletic director of his decision, stepping away from his office fearing the consequences of taking the news to his father. The solemn walk was met by a chance encounter with a man dressed from head-to-toe in yellow, which set the stage for a life-changing pivot. The man was Dr. Charles Nelson, golf coach at Virginia State. Nelson insisted that golf was what Allen wanted to do, and he took the teenager, who had never swung a club, under his wing for a year and a half. Allen made the golf team, kept his scholarship, and focused on the game with great resolve.

When he returned to the Shore during school breaks, Allen worked on his game, driving balls into the same farm fields he was accustomed to. Again, his father was a catalyst to motivate change. He urged his son

to play at the Eastern Shore Country Club, strictly forbidden in those days. Nevertheless, Allen gathered the courage to ask H.B. Rew and George McMath about the club, both of whom he had friendly family connections with.

"This is 1979. I called Mr. McMath and said I'm interested in joining the club. He said I'm interested in having you, so Mr. McMath and Mr. Rew wrote my recommendation letter to become a member of the Eastern Shore Country Club," said Allen.

Just as Elder had saved his winnings to join the PGA Tour, Allen gathered nearly every penny he could, working summers at Perdue or in the fields, to come up with the substantial sum of joining the club, which, just as important to him, offered his father a spot to learn the game.

Golf would serve Allen well on his professional progression, not in the

professional progression, not in the sense of playing for titles like Elder, but making important connections in furthering his business career. Allen proved himself by way of his work ethic, in jobs for Exxon-Mobil, Equifax, and the Faneuil Group, to name a few, but credits golf iust as much for the successes he has sustained in life.

"Golf changed my life. The major reason why I was somewhat successful in my view was because of my ability to play golf, because I could play golf I had a chance to play with senior executives in the company and they had a chance to see me in a completely different light," said Allen.

"At the end of a fivehour round they didn't know just this guy that was a marketing guy, or sales guy, or operation

guy, they knew Bill Allen and they knew they could trust me; they saw the competitive spirit I had and hopefully saw I was humble," Allen said.

Humility led Allen in the direction of setting up a charitable foundation to give back to educational opportunities for children and funds for the first tee program. Along the way, Elder was very much on board. The Masters became a meeting place for Allen to connect with customers and further his brand of genuine hospitality, and Elder 's presence at Augusta strengthened their bond.

The two remain so close that Elder, upon learning of his qualification for the Bobby Jones Award in 2019, the highest honor given by the United States Golf Association recognizing distinguished sportsmanship, Elder phoned Allen in excitement. The man Allen refers to simply as "pro" broke the news before it even went to press, and uncharacteristically was overtaken by emotion. Allen, and his wife, Kim, flew to Pebble

Beach, Calif., for the dinner and ceremony, and watched Elder accept the award bearing the namesake of the greatest amateur golfer in the history of the game, and one of the architects of the course in Augusta, and the Masters tournament itself.

The determined nature of these two men, Elder and Allen, and their contributions to the game of golf either on the world stage or at a local level, balance in great harmony and speak volumes to their enduring relationship.

Allen made great efforts to be in Augusta the Wednesday before the Masters to honor his friend. Sometimes ceremonies can be overshadowed by the event that follows, but as a spectator of golf, the moment held its place and told a story that deserved further exploration.

Thus, while Elder was changing the game of golf, golf was changing the life of Allen, and the sport is in a much better place as a result of their activity in it.

3rd Day Garden Gives Families Room to Grow Their Own Favorite Foods

A seed of an idea planted by teens from Zion Baptist Church has grown into a project that provides food plots for families to grow their own vegetables.

Pastor Andrew Matthews said that upon returning from a mission trip where some of the teens helped out in a community garden, they approached him. "They said to me, 'Pastor, we've got this land. ... Couldn't we do a community garden right here?" referring to the field behind the church along Metompkin Road.

Gardeners receive a 10-foot by 20-foot plot of land to plant, maintain, and harvest whatever they choose to grow.

The plot was tilled and marked off, and Sunday, April 25, church members and gardeners gathered to dedicate the project.

"What we're celebrating today is a partnership between Zion Baptist Church and the Foodbank/Food Hub," Matthews said. Local farmers Matt Young, Sands Gale, and Mike McJilton prepared the plot for planting. Mary N. Smith Cultural Enrichment Center and The Foodbank's Food Hub connected Zion with eligible families, and Tractor Supply Co. donated gardening tools and seeds.

The project is called the 3rd Day Garden, because according to the Bible, God created vegetation on the third day.

"This community garden is a way for people who are facing food insecurity to directly receive the benefit of God's bounty from the ground," said Matthews.

Accomack County Supervisor Harrison Phillips, within whose district the church is located, and Supervisor Robert Crockett, of District 6, attended the dedication ceremony.

Phillips was impressed by the effort. To see it start "from the young people ... from the event they attended, makes it that much more impressive," Phillips told a reporter afterward.

Gardeners Rebeca Morales and Antonia Sanchez appeared ready to get started. Noting Morales' boots, translator Marisa Sanchez said, "She came prepared to work today in her boots."



Smith presented a bill to require political ads to include fact check information in addition to the requirements for sources of funding.

Mr. Coates Was a Teacher To Remember

Many of us have that one teacher who made a lasting mark on our lives — if we are really lucky, we may have two or even three.

John Coates was that teacher for some of us who sat under his tutelage in the late 1970s at Broadwater Academy.

It was with sadness we learned of Mr. Coates' death in Richmond on April 22, at age 74.

Mr. Coates, a Richmond native, had taken a job teaching high school English at Broadwater in 1977, after earning bachelor's and master's degrees at Arizona State University.

He arrived just in time to influence my class, the class of 1979, leaving such a lasting impression that he was invited to attend our 20th reunion in 1999 — which he did.

Some of us studied humanities as well as English under Mr. Coates.

I remember participating in heated discussions in that class, which was held in the typing classroom — the typewriters were a distraction for some of us.

He was a bachelor back then — my mother joked that he seemed to always know when to show up for a visit at our house, just in time for dinner. Well, she was a very good cook, and he knew it.

Mr. Coates became a friend of the family — and of other students' families, as well.

His part-Husky dog, Gulliver, was his constant companion during those visits.

I remember him howling at the dog, who "talked" right back to him.

He named the dog after Jonathan Swift's book, "Gulliver's Travels," having brought the pup back East with him from Arizona.

In his four years at Broadwater, be-

fore he returned to Richmond for what would be a long and fruitful teaching career — first at St. Catherine's School and then at Collegiate, where he taught for 31 years before retiring in 2015 — Mr. Coates challenged students to strive for higher educational achievements than many thought possible for mere high school students.

Papers he returned invariably bore, not just a grade at the top, but paragraph upon paragraph of comments, typically written in red ink. Students could tell Mr. Coates gave his full attention to grading assignments — and he expected students to do the same in completing them.

All of that Mr. Coates accomplished while living since his teen years with a rare and debilitating disease called Charcot-Marie-Tooth Disease, which attacks the peripheral nervous system and which slowly took away his mobility, eventually leaving him using a motorized wheelchair. It ultimately affected his speech, also — which must have been tough for the man whose deep voice and bellowing laughter were a trademark.

Collegiate for many years provided him an assistant to allow him to continue to teach despite his medical condition.

As his obituary in the Richmond-Times Dispatch said, Mr. Coates "soldiered on without ever complaining in the face of every adversity, determined to forge a normal life and make every contribution he possibly could for the benefit of others, despite being wheelchair-bound for the last 30 years of his life."

One interesting detail of his career is that Mr. Coates, who taught the upper grades at Broadwater, at Collegiate "began working his way back from 12th

grade, grade level by grade level, in search of a sweet spot, a point at which his teaching method and style could have the greatest positive and most enduring impact on his students," his obituary said, adding, "Through this process, he eventually settled upon 8th grade, and endeared himself to his students by drawing out of them what many observers considered college-level work while using classical literature such as Shakespearean plays as his vehicle for doing so."

That last part encapsulates the Mr. Coates I remember. He saw students' potential, even when they did not.

Mr. Coates received many accolades and awards, both locally and nationally, during his teaching career. Collegiate named its boys Middle School English award in his honor upon his retirement.

I am so glad that after leaving us on the Shore, he found his beautiful, accomplished, artistic wife, Lucy. Together they have three children and three grandchildren.

Our families visited back and forth several times over the years when the children were young, before life got in the way.

I regret that last part now. We did converse by telephone over the years — Mr. Coates was always the same thoughtful, intelligent person I had known back in the 1970s, always engaged and interested in what was going on here on the Shore, including what his former students were up to.

"John was ever smiling, ever encouraging to others, ever persevering and ever courageous in the face of every event life threw at him. He loved everyone and never wavered in his dedication to serving others. John's life, his

humility, his compassion and his character were an inspiration for all who knew him, and his fondest private hope was that the cheerful example he set for all might some

small way be paid forward by those with whom he came into contact," his obituary concluded.

As Collegiate English teacher Weldon Bradshaw wrote in a April 23 essay on the school's website, John Coates "embodied grace under pressure."

A funeral will be held Saturday, May 1, at 11 a.m., at All Saints Episcopal Church, 8787 River Road, Richmond, and interment will follow at 1 p.m. in Forest Lawn Cemetery, in Richmond. Due to COVID-19 restrictions, attendance in the sanctuary at All Saints Episcopal Church for the memorial service will be limited to 50 families or family groups, but livestreaming will be available both on-site at the church and remotely through links on the Bliley's Funeral Home's website, www.blileys.com

There will be no limitation on attendance at the interment in Forest Lawn Cemetery but social distancing and masking rules will apply.

In lieu of flowers, the family requests memorial contributions be made either to Collegiate School or to Saint Christopher's School, both in Richmond.
