# COVID-19 Delta Variant Identified on Eastern Shore, Cases Rise

The Eastern Shore for the past six weeks has been averaging around one case per day of COVID-19, according to a health department official.

The health department is closely monitoring an increase in cases seen over the past four days, said Jon Richardson, chief operating officer of the Eastern Shore Health District, on Monday.

As of Wednesday, the average had risen to five new cases per day.

The delta variant of the virus has been identified among cases on the Eastern Shore, which Richardson said is not surprising.


"The vaccines are still measuring pretty effective against this variant, which is good news. Given its higher level of transmissivity, the main concern would be amongst the unvaccinated," he said in an email.


There currently are four variants of concern in the United States. All four have been reported on the Eastern Shore.

The delta variant is now the most common variant in the United States. It is thought to be 40% to 60% more transmissible than the alpha variant, which itself is estimated to spread about 50% more easily than previous variants.

As of Friday, July 23, the Eastern Shore had reported 13 cases of the alpha variant; two of the beta variant; one of the gamma variant; and three of the delta variant.

A variant of the virus that causes COVID-19 is considered to be concerning when it increases the risk to human health, for example by spreading more easily or causing more severe illness, among other factors.





New COVID-19 cases in Accomack have been increasing for the past 30 days, according to the Virginia Department of Health. The number of new cases in Northampton has been decreasing.

Between June 20 and July 24, the Eastern Shore reported 29 new cases

and one death.

Of the total cases, seven were people 19 or under; 10 were age 20-39; seven were age 40-59; four were age 60-79; and one was a person age 80 or over.

Four of the cases involved Black in-

### Eastville Inn Tenants Face Uncertain Future as County Moves to Month-to-Month Lease

Louise Oliver, who runs a catering business out of the historic Eastville Inn owned by Northampton County, was surprised when she learned that the county was considering offering the lease to someone else to run a different type of business.

She was even more surprised that she first learned of the news from not a county official but the minutes of an Eastville Town Council meeting.

"My initial reaction when reading the Eastville Town Council minutes ... was one of shock and disappointment that I should be treated in such an unprofessional manner ..." Oliver said. "As an excellent tenant of the Eastville Inn and successful business owner I would have expected to be treated with a modicum of respect."

Oliver has run her catering and weekly meal service, Kitchen Sync, out of the first floor of the Eastville Inn for the last six years, with the help of three regular part-time employees and her husband, Stuart Oliver, who has long-standing family ties on the Eastern Shore.

Louise Oliver has dozens of clients who order her pre-made meal items at the beginning of every week, which are picked up or delivered every Friday, ready to bake or freeze. The menu changes every week, blending casual and fine dining fare in what the Kitchen Sync website calls "inspired eastern shore dishes with an international flair."

Oliver, who is originally from Tasmania, Australia, is accomplished in the culinary arts. She has worked around the globe as a private chef and a manager for several large hospitality companies. Her travels and experience lend European and Asian influences to the dishes she creates. Her employees also bring Mexican influences to the table.

She has a long list of corporate clients, and more than 500 private clients, for whom she caters both off- and on-site.

Clients often choose the Eastville Inn

for corporate events because it offers more privacy than a restaurant. The inn's most popular dining area is the Glass Room, a dining room enclosed by a glass wall and decorated, like the rest of the establishment, in the federalist colonial style of the late 1700s to mid-1800s.

The Olivers attribute the success of Kitchen Sync in part to its alternate business model, which stands out from its predecessors.

Previous businesses at the Eastville Inn have consisted mainly of restaurants that eventually faltered and were closed, including a restaurant operated by Tim Abraham, of Cape Charles.

Abraham later found success when he opened the restaurant Tim's Place, in Cape Charles, but it appeared that running a restaurant out of the Eastville Inn wasn't meant to be, even for the most aspiring entrepreneurs.

The Olivers noted aspects of the Eastville Inn that are not conducive to the restaurant business.

The narrow, long kitchen is not convenient for servers delivering orders to guests in the main dining room, but the layout is ideal for preparing catered meals, Louise Oliver said.

There is little to no parking at the inn, and foot traffic in town is light. On a warm, sunny Friday afternoon, only one person walked past the inn in nearly two hours, she pointed out to a reporter.

The town's main street, Courthouse Road, once was part of the main road on the Shore, Stuart Oliver said. The construction of Route 13 divided many of the Shore's small towns, and now most traffic bypasses Eastville's historic courthouse green.

The Eastville Inn was built around 1724 to serve travelers passing through or stopping to do business at the Northampton County courthouse, which has been home to the oldest continuous court records in the U.S. since 1632.

Similarly, the Eastville Inn is thought to be the town's oldest surviving business establishment.

The Eastville Inn operated through the decades and centuries, but business dwindled in the 1960s and 1970s, perhaps due in part to the opening of the Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel in 1964, which enabled more through traffic via Route 13.

The Eastville Inn fell into a state of disuse and disrepair. The private establishment appears to have become public property around the time Northampton County obtained federal grant funding to restore the historic building, which was reopened in 2000.

Since then, the Eastville Inn has been home to a number of restaurants and also has endured periods of vacancy.

About 2015, Louise Oliver was looking for a commercial kitchen for her catering business that she had been operating for about four years. She discovered the Eastville Inn, which was vacant at the time. Northampton County offered the Olivers a lease on the inn.

The lease worked well for the Olivers, but after the initial lease expired, it was renewed on an annual basis, the couple said.

They were told the one-year lease gave more "flexibility" to the county, whose officials were concerned about the amount of rehabilitation the structure still needed.

(The second floor of the Eastville Inn remains empty and unused, except for limited storage, and is stripped down to the floors and framing, with no walls, ceilings, furniture, fixtures, or working utilities.)

A one-year lease agreement was not ideal for the Olivers, but they carried on their business.

There was another unexpected turn of events when the lease came up for renewal in October 2020, in the middle of the COVID-19 pandemic: Northampton wanted the Eastville Inn open for lunch at least three days a week, primarily to serve county employees.

The Olivers reluctantly agreed to the new lease terms. Louise Oliver began planning and occasionally purchasing equipment she would need for preparing food to order. She kept tabs on the COVID-19 pandemic through the Virginia Department of Health.

Oliver had settled on the opening date of July 6 to serve lunch every Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday, allowing Friday to remain as the weekly pickup and delivery day for her pre-made meals.

She displayed a sign on the front of the building announcing that Kitchen Sync would be opening soon.

Then Oliver read the minutes from Eastville's May 3 Town Council meeting, which stated that "Northampton County was considering a different direction for the Eastville Inn and possibly a new tenant."

The announcement was made by David Eder, who is both Eastville's police chief and its town administrator, a dual role of which the Olivers are critical, citing a possible conflict of interest and the potential for corruption. "The lines are blurred," Stuart Oliver said.

The Northampton board of supervisors held a special-called meeting June 23, which consisted of a closed session for the discussion or consideration of the acquisition or disposition of public property – specifically, the Eastville Inn – and consultation with legal counsel on an unrelated matter.

The June 23 meeting minutes state that after the closed session. Supervisor John Coker made a motion to terminate the Eastville Inn's lease Sept. 30, at the end of its current term, and "allow the tenant to lease the property on a monthby-month basis if they so desire."

The motion was seconded by Supervisor Oliver Bennett and passed unanimously.

Throughout their ordeal, Louise and Stuart Oliver have been provided little explanation or guidance, except for one meeting with County Administrator Charlie Kolakowski.


Kolakowski wrote in a Jul. 29 email to the Eastern Shore Post, "The East-ville Inn is a unique and important asset. ... It is also an old structure that will need to be maintained and will require significant investment to keep it operating. ... The County will be advertising a Request for Proposals for the sale or long-term lease of the facility ... to properly provide for the long term preservation of the property and also provide a vibrant and contributing facility to enhance the Town and County."

Stuart Oliver disagrees with the idea of Northampton selling a piece of history and a public asset. He said selling the inn would "border on insanity" and not be in the county's best interest.

The Olivers believe they have been good stewards of the inn and have sustained their business, even through COVID-19.

A restaurant may not have survived the pandemic, but Louise Oliver's meal delivery service went "through the roof" and approximately doubled due to new clients who could not or would not eat in restaurants.

The Olivers serve clients from Exmore to Cape Charles and will deliver any order, whether it's a week's worth

of meals for a family or a pint of soup for one person.

Stuart Oliver noted that even during the pandemic, the rent on the Eastville Inn was paid in full and on time every month.

He acknowledged that since Kitchen Sync is not a restaurant, it generates few food and beverage taxes for the town of Eastville. However, he and his wife have maintained the inn, and their business has not caused any trouble and "serves the community well," he said.

Louise Oliver was recently notified that she will be permitted to lease the Eastville Inn through Jan. 31, 2022, enabling her to schedule events for the upcoming fall and winter holiday seasons.

Stuart Oliver will continue to attend Eastville Town Council and Northampton supervisors meetings to make his case to allow the business to continue in its current location and to enter a three-year lease agreement.

The couple also plans to submit a bid for the purchase of the Eastville Inn, even though they doubt the process will be fair.

Louise Oliver is also looking for another location with a commercial kitchen in case their efforts to purchase or continue leasing the inn fall through, even though commercial kitchens are hard to find, she said.

Either way, Kitchen Sync won't be sunk if the Olivers have anything to do with it.

dividuals; three were Latino; and 22 were White.

One case was in a congregate setting. The percent of positive PCR tests over the past seven days is 5.6% for the Eastern Shore Health District. The percent positivity has been on the increase in both counties over the past 23 days, according to the VDH.

Around 53% of the Shore's overall population has been vaccinated with at least one dose, and almost 50% is fully vaccinated.

Among adults only, 64% has received at least one dose of vaccine. The percent increases to 84% for Shore residents age 65 and older.

The statistics mean the Shore remains ahead, in terms of vaccination rate, of almost all comparable Virginia health districts — that is, other rural districts with similar socioeconomic profiles, according to Richardson.

Around 26% of Shore residents age 12 through 17 have been vaccinated.

As has been the case throughout the pandemic, Eastern Shore Rural Health is offering vaccine, including to that age group.

Anyone may call Rural Health to make an appointment for their child to be vaccinated, whether or not he or she is a patient there, at no cost.

The Centers for Disease Control in a briefing Tuesday announced updated guidance recommending vaccinated people wear masks indoors in public in certain parts of the country with substantial or high transmission of COVID-19. That includes almost twothirds of counties in the United States.

Accomack as of July 24 fell into the high category for community transmission of COVID-19, according to the CDC definitions, which are based on county-level data for the number of new cases per 100,000 people and the seven-day test positivity rate. Northampton was in the low category.

In May, the CDC guidance was revised to say vaccinated people did not have to wear masks in certain situations. At that point, the delta variant accounted for only 1% of infections in the country. Now it represents 83% or more, according to the CDC.

The lower than hoped for vaccination rate in the country also likely is a

factor in the CDC's revised guidance.

Unvaccinated people should continue masking until fully vaccinated — the same guidance the CDC previously gave.

As of July 26, Virginia health and education officials announced school divisions can make local mask policies based on community conditions and public health recommendations, according to the Interim Guidance for COVID-19 Prevention in Virginia pre-K-12 Schools.

Below are the recommendations from the interim guidance for school divisions to adopt for the 2021-2022 school year:

- Elementary schools (including pre-K classrooms) should require students, teachers, and staff to wear masks indoors, regardless of vaccination status. This recommendation should stay until vaccination is available for children under 12 years old and there has been enough time for children younger than 12 years old to be fully vaccinated.
- At minimum, middle and high schools should require students, teachers, and staff who are not fully vaccinated to wear masks indoors.
- All schools may want to consider universal masking, regardless of vaccination status, for specific reasons as outlined by the CDC.
- All schools should be prepared to adjust local mask policies as local public health conditions change throughout the year.
- Masks must be worn on school buses, per federal order.

Since January last year, at least one in 11 people in Accomack County and one in 15 in Northampton County have been infected with COVID-19, according to the New York Times coronavirus tracker.

At least one in 703 in Accomack and one in 325 in Northampton have died of the virus.

Since the pandemic began, 2,907 cases in Accomack and 807 in Northampton have been reported.

In Accomack, 216 people have been hospitalized and 46 have died as result of the virus. In Northampton, 82 have been hospitalized and 36 have died.

At least one in 10 people in the United States has been infected and at least one in 543 has died during the same period, according to the New York Times.

### Cape Charles Delays Zoning Vote for Potential Concrete Plant Expansion

The Cape Charles Town Council voted 4-2 at its July 22 meeting to defer action for 30 days on two motions related to zoning that would potentially allow the local concrete plant, Coastal Precast Systems, to expand.

Expecting council members to make a quick decision to expedite a business deal would have been like "putting a gun to the Town Council's head," said Kevin Cosgrove, of Norfolk, an attorney who represents several of Cape Charles' concerned citizens.

Coastal Precast had proposed a set of zoning text amendments that would allow the following by right on property zoned general business/light industrial: assembly and storage of products, and construction of buildings up to 75 feet high with 125-foot setbacks by conditional use permit. Other minor zoning text changes also were proposed.

Southport Investors, a company owned by Eyre Baldwin, had proposed rezoning a parcel adjacent to the concrete plant from harbor to general business/light industrial, so it could be sold to the concrete plant.

Citizens who spoke out on the matter during a July 13 joint public hearing of the Cape Charles Planning Commission and Town Council were concerned that a decision was being rushed without giving elected officials adequate time to study the potential long-term impacts of the zoning changes.

Many of those concerns were repeated during the public comment period of the July 22 meeting, but other speakers offered new perspectives or clarification of their previous statements.

Brandon Mowrey, an employee of Coastal Precast and a representative of Cape Charles Properties, provided more information about the concrete plant's intended use of the parcel it seeks to purchase, tax map number 90-8-1A1.

Coastal Precast will be involved in the expansion of the Hampton Roads Bridge-Tunnel through leasing land to a contractor who will fabricate 21,000 tunnel liners for the \$3.8 billion project.

The requested zoning changes will

allow Coastal Precast to provide additional lay-down storage that may be needed for the tunnel liners.

The new zoning also would make Coastal Precast a more attractive potential business partner for renewable energy contractors, particularly those working with any of the 22 offshore wind farms on the East Coast, Mowrey added.

The concrete plant expansion could create 50 to 100 new jobs, he said.

Coastal Precast currently has around 160 employees, and only about 20% of them live across the Chesapeake Bay, Mowrey estimated.

He had previously indicated that Coastal Precast eventually may need to construct a building up to 75 feet tall for wind turbines.

Councilman Steve Bennett reminded everyone later during the July 22 meeting that even if the proposed zoning text amendments were passed, a 75-foot-tall building could not be built on the parcel currently under consideration for rezoning.

However, a building of that height

could be constructed on an adjacent parcel zoned light industrial.

Many of the Cape Charles citizens who submitted public comments expressed a desire to see the town's tourism industry grow, not the concrete plant.


"Who do we want to be ... a charming, family-oriented historic town that appeals to people from all over our country, or a growing industrial complex?" a citizen asked.

Others supported the concrete plant but felt that two months was not enough time to gather public input and study the implications of the proposed zoning changes.


(The Town Council passed a resolution May 20 to advance the proposed zoning amendments to the planning commission, and over the next several weeks a public hearing was advertised, and the town's interim zoning administrator, Katie Nunez, prepared a staff report that agreed with the proposal.)

Earl "Chip" Moore was the only citizen whose public comment appeared to favor

# Accomack Considers Adding 24-Hour EMS Staff at Greenbackville

The Accomack County Board of Supervisors voted to hold two public hearings to receive comment about adding county positions to make it possible to staff Greenbackville Volunteer Fire Department 24 hours a day and to add positions for backfill staffing, a training coordinator, and human resources.

Greenbackville Volunteer Fire Department requested the county provide paid EMS personnel at the department 24 hours a day.

The department previously was approved to have paid staff Monday through Friday during the daytime.

Still, over the past year, the department has been fully staffed (with two paid county employees during the day on weekdays) only 35 days, according to Charles R. Pruitt, Accomack County director of public safety.

The county currently has three daytime vacancies, which along with employees being pulled out to do recruit training, 24-hour position vacancies, and personnel on extended leave accounts for the gap, Pruitt said.

Greenbackville Volunteer Fire Dept. spends around \$24,000 a year of its own money to pay EMS personnel, according to Barry Outten, the fire chief.

Outten during the public comment period at the July 21 Board of Supervisors meeting asked the board to approve 24-hour staffing and said Greenbackville is agreeable to the idea of revenue sharing.

Colby Phillips, senior general manager of Captains Cove, the large community near Greenbackville, also spoke asking for 24-hour staffing.

"Response time is a matter of life or death," she said.

Greenbackville over the last year has not met the county standard of responding to calls within 20 minutes or less on 33 out of 192 calls, and 126 of those calls were handled by another agency, meaning its station reliability was 34%, compared to much higher percentages for other fire companies in the county, including Chincoteague at 94%, Saxis at 82%, Bloxom at 91%, Parksley at 97%, and Onancock at 96%, among others.

Pruitt proposed the county add 12 positions — seven full-time employees, three positions for backfill to cover for employees on leave and vacancies for three shifts, a training coordinator, and a full-time human resources position.

Benefits of instituting 24-hour staffing at Greenbackville include that the county's response-time benchmark would be met; another EMS unit would be added to the northern part of the county; the need for mutual aid from Oak Hall Rescue and Chincoteague Volunteer Fire Co. would be reduced; and likely improved employee recruitment and retention (because most fire and EMS personnel want 24-hour shifts).

At an estimated cost of \$794,219, an EMS tax increase would be required in fiscal year 2024 to pay for the additional staff.

"We are very lucky in the county of Accomack that we have dedicated volunteers. We need those volunteers," Pruitt said, but said a training coordinator is needed to coordinate training for both career and volunteer personnel, as well as to train new recruits and provide continuing education.

Pruitt said it takes around nine months to train a new recruit.

The position would cost the county around \$83,000 a year including benefits, according to Accomack County Finance Director Margaret Lindsay.

The human resources position is needed because the county since 2016 has added 15 full-time employees to the Department of Public Safety, as well as 10 more full-time employees in other county departments.

Staffing models say the county Human Resources Department should have 3.5 full-time equivalents, plus a director and a half-time administrative support position, Pruitt said.

The department currently has one full-time position, a .25% administrative support position, and a person who splits time between human resources, risk management, records management, and Freedom of Information Act duties.

The position would cost the county around \$68,000.

Lindsay said a 2.5 to 3.5 cent hike in

the EMS tax would be needed by fiscal year 2024 to pay for the initiative.

The initiative requires a public hearing before it can be instituted.

"You have previously advised us that this board will also need to consider increasing taxes next year because we are at the limit as far as making cuts and so forth," said Supervisor Robert Crockett, directing the statement to Accomack County Administrator Mike Mason.

"We're going to be faced with those next March and also be faced with this the following March, two consecutive years," Crockett said.

Mason said the board could choose instead to increase both tax rates next year.

Crockett said he would like the board to look at the request as two separate items — first, Greenbackville's request for 24-hour staffing and, second, the backfill, training coordinator, and human resources positions.

"I'd like to be in a position where I can vote on Greenbackville and vote on the others separately," Crockett said.

He also said he would like staff to research the amount of revenue that could come from revenue sharing with Greenbackville.

"There is no doubt that something needs to be done," Crockett said.

"Greenbackville deserves this. I think we need to do this," said Supervisor Donald L. Hart Jr., noting the Greenbackville area's growing population and its location in the far northeastern part of the county.

Hart spoke about previous tax hikes to pay for EMS services.

"Not one time in my 40 years (on the board)...have I heard any citizens come and raise Cain about raising taxes for EMTs or fire," he said, adding, "... I think the public will support it."

"They came in and asked us to raise their taxes," Supervisor Billy Joe Tarr said of past requests.

"I think it's reasonable," said Supervisor Paul Muhly. "This is probably the most important thing we do as a governing board, is to provide this service to our citizens."

Other board members also supported the proposal.

Chairman Ron Wolff called the proposal "a first attempt" to address public safety needs.

"Right now, Greenbackville is sinking," said Wolff, adding, "... We as the

leaders of the organization, we can't afford to have one member drown; everybody's got to be afloat."

Mason said the backfill positions are needed to make the plan work.

### **Broadband Project Areas Changed**

The board approved changes to a memorandum of understanding with the Eastern Shore of Virginia Broadband Authority that replace areas already being served by another wired broadband provider with alternate areas where ESVBA will instead expand its fiber-to-the-home service.

The MOU was entered into in February and included around \$866,000 in various projects.

It was found since then eight areas originally proposed for expansion are already being served by Spectrum, Accomack County Administrator Mike Mason told the board.

Areas removed from the MOU are on Chincoteague Road, Coal Kiln Road, Daugherty Road, Dogwood Drive, Greta Road, Hacks Neck Road, Redwood Road, and Hillsborough.

Replacing those areas will be projects on Stump Town Road, Justiceville Road, Parks Road, Horntown Road, Bloxom Road, and Holland Road.

The cost of the projects is approximately the same as for the ones originally listed.

The board also approved eligibility guidelines for a broadband installation assistance program offered through ESVBA. The board in February gave \$50,000 towards the initiative to help low- to moderate-income residents pay for connecting to ESVBA's network.

The proposed eligibility guidelines for the Internet Assist Program are:

1. Qualifies for the FCC Emergency Broadband Benefit program using the following criteria and applied at www. checklifeline.org using one of the following four eligibility rules:

a. Qualifies for FCC Lifeline benefits through participation in SNAP, Medicaid, Supplemental Security Income, Federal Public Housing Assistance, or Veterans and Survivors Pension Benefit;

b. Experienced a substantial loss of income since Feb. 29, 2020, due to job loss or furlough and has a total household income in 2020 at or below \$99,000 for single filers and \$198,000

for joint filers;

- c. Received a federal Pell Grant in the current award year; or
- d. Received approval for benefits under the free and reduced-price school lunch program or the school breakfast program, including through the USDA Community Eligibility Provision, in the 2019-2020 or 2020-2021 school year.
- 2. Qualifies based upon the FY2021 HUD 80% low-income limits for the county based upon the number of persons in family.

### Food and Beverage Tax

The board approved scheduling a public hearing about instituting a food and beverage tax of 5%, which if approved will affect around 68 businesses in unincorporated parts of Accomack County.

A public hearing must be held before the board can vote on implementing the new tax.

The tax is projected to raise at least \$300,000 a year for the county, which could help offset the anticipated cost of a new state mandate to pay overtime wages, which county officials estimate

will cost around \$241,000.

Northampton County has a 4% meals tax, which raised \$329,000 in fiscal year 2020, according to Mason.

Additionally, the towns of Onan- $\operatorname{cock}$  and Chincoteague each have a 5%meals tax, while Parksley and Onley have a 4% meals tax.

The county tax would not apply within town limits.

### **Opioid Settlement Dollars Coming to Accomack**

Accomack will receive a portion of money coming to Virginia as result of settlements and court orders related to opioid lawsuits.

The board approved a resolution approving the Virginia Opioid Abatement Fund and a settlement allocation memorandum of understanding.

Accomack's share is calculated to be .348% of funds in the state's Opioid Abatement Fund, calculated based on opioid-related deaths, emergency room visits, and prescriptions.

The board passed a resolution approving the Virginia Opioid Abatement Fund and a settlement allocation memorandum of understanding with the state.

At least an estimated \$107,000 should

come to Accomack as result of the initial settlement, with additional settlements likely in the future, according to Accomack County Attorney Jan Proctor.

Attorney General Mark Herring in a press release said Virginia is expected to receive more than half a billion dollars from opioid distributors McKesson, AmerisourceBergen, and Cardinal, and opioid manufacturer Johnson & Johnson as result of a multiyear investigation into the role opioid manufacturers and distributors played in creating and prolonging the opioid crisis in Virginia and across the

In total, McKesson, Amerisource-Bergen, Cardinal, and Johnson & Johnson will pay \$26 billion that will go toward prevention, treatment, and recovery efforts in communities across the country.

Most of the up to around \$530 million Virginia is expected to receive will go toward Virginia's opioid abatement authority.

"The roots of the opioid crisis began in the marketing offices and board rooms of pharmaceutical companies like Johnson & Johnson and ran straight into the homes and medicine cabinets of Virginians. Distributors like McKesson, AmerisourceBergen, and Cardinal spread billions of doses of highly addictive opioids throughout our communities, helping to fuel a crisis that has killed hundreds of thousands of Americans and upended the lives of Virginians in every corner of our Commonwealth," Herring said, adding, "No dollar amount will ever be able to bring back the Virginians we have lost to this devastating epidemic, but we can at least dedicate our time and resources to preventing further loss through prevention, treatment, and recovery. Throughout my time as attorney general, one of my top priorities has been to go after the pharmaceutical and marketing companies that created and prolonged the deadly opioid crisis, and I will not stop until all those involved are held accountable."

### Tall Grass Ordinance Proposed

The board voted to ask state elected officials to pursue adding language to state law that would allow the county to require residential property owners in the agricultural district to keep their grass cut.

The law would not apply to active farming operations.

"It seems like a big step to take for a fairly small problem, but if that's the only recourse we have, I would like to do this," said Supervisor Harris Phillips, who made the motion.

Supervisor Crockett asked Phillips to amend the motion to include consulting with the sheriff first to seek information about the sheriff's office's ability to enforce the law if the General Assembly passes it.

### **Accomack Will Help Pay for State Police Equipment for Crash Investigations**

The Board of Supervisors voted to pay \$5,500 towards the cost of equipment the Virginia State Police uses for crash investigations.

Supervisor Billy Joe Tarr said he, Chincoteague Town Manager Mike Tolbert, and VDOT representatives spoke with a state police official about the need for the equipment.

The Chincoteague causeway after a recent fatal crash was closed for six hours as police processed the scene.

Police told the officials they could have accomplished the task much more quickly if the proper equipment had been available.

### Making 'A Tremendous Difference': Group Seeks To Reduce Feral Cat Population

Leaders of an Accomack County nonprofit group are working to improve the lives of community cats — and to reduce their numbers — by organizing trap-neuter-return events.

After holding its first Neuter Scooter event in June, in which 31 cats were spayed or neutered, the group, Northern Accomack Community Cats, held a second event July 21 in Bloxom.

The Bloxom Volunteer Fire Co. allowed the group to house the cats in a building on the fire station property during the event.

This time, 11 male cats were neutered and 10 females were spayed.

Virginia Beach SPCA employees made the long drive to the Shore for the event.

Margie Spangler and Rebecca Dinger-Tedder are co-chairs of the grassroots organization, which they started in 2019 to address the health and welfare of "community cats," the preferred term used to describe outdoor, unowned, free-roaming cats, as well as the needs of their caregivers.

For the first six months, they focused on fundraising and getting word out about the organization, before starting TNR efforts in earnest.

To date, the group has spayed or neutered 267 cats, fostered and placed to adoption 38 kittens, and made more than 150 referrals for service for people who are outside the group's operating location, have kittens they need re-homed, or need services the group does not provide.

Trap-neuter-return is the most humane option for community cats and the healthiest option for humans around them, according to the group.

Trapping and relocating feral cats, rather than neutering them and releasing them back to their original location, does not work in the long run, according to Dinger-Tedder.

Relocation creates a vacuum effect in the area from which the cats were taken, allowing other feral cats to move in.

In contrast, a colony of neutered or spayed cats will keep out other feral cats.

A female cat can come into heat as young as four months old. It is estimated one female cat and her kittens will produce 100 more cats in a seven-year lifespan.

There are around 50 million free-roaming cats in the United States, according to the group.

Northern Accomack Community Cats covers a large area, from the county's border with Maryland down to Onley, and east to Wattsville.

The group has held two large, three-day TNR events at Trails End, a large community in Horntown.

In addition to the larger events, the group works regularly with Pocomoke Animal Hospital twice a week, and on some Saturdays, to get more cats neutered.

They also work with others in the region.

"We don't stop," Spangler said.

Northern Accomack Community Cats works with the people who take care of outdoor cats in their neighborhoods, lending them traps and charging just \$25 per cat for spay/ neuter and a rabies vaccination.

"We teach the caregivers how to trap," Spangler said.

"If they can, we prefer for the cat caretakers to do the trapping, for two reasons: first off, it lets us get more done because then we don't have to be on the ground doing it, but also, a lot of the caretakers, their cats know them," making the trapping process easier, according to Dinger-Tedder.

Laura Chuquin-Naylor and Rhudy Naylor were among those who brought cats to the event in Bloxom.

From a colony that at one time had around 40 cats, the Naylors brought five to be neutered this time.

"It has really made a tremendous difference," said Chuquin-Naylor of the group's efforts.

"It's a lifesaver, it really is," said

Libby Williams, another caregiver, who brought six cats from Deep Creek to the event.

"This is the ending to the situation, because if you get them all spayed or neutered, then eventually...they'll pass away," she said.

Ignoring the issue of unowned, free-roaming cats "doesn't make it go away," Spangler said.

Dinger-Tedder said TNR is a good solution for both cat lovers and people who don't like cats roaming their neighborhood.

"I understand the objections to TNR. It's a difficult problem. This is the most humane, the most useful, solution we have right now," she said, adding, "The goal of people who don't like cats and the goal of people who do TNR is the same — we don't want any more cats to be outside — but it's a process. It's going to take concentrated effort. It's going to take funding. It's going to take people being on board, whether you love or hate cats, and then we can all get

what we want."


The organization is never without a waiting list and easily could do three times the work being done now if funding and more providers were available, Dinger-Tedder said, adding, "The need is great and the avenues are few on the Shore."

the concrete plant over tourism.

He said Cape Charles can't handle the tourism growth it has recently experienced, with many businesses searching for employees, and restaurants having wait times of an hour or more for service.

"I would rather hear a safety alarm than deal with a rental house full of loud, obnoxious vacationers. I would rather pass a licensed commercial truck driver on the street versus a drunk tourist or a child driving a golf cart," Moore wrote.

He suggested that most of the dust coming from the area of the harbor was due to vehicles driving too fast through a parking lot to the Shanty restaurant and the marina, and some of the noise of heavy equipment could be due to construction at Bay Creek.

Councilman Andy Buchholz made a mo-

tion to approve the zoning text amendments, and Councilman Paul Grossman seconded the motion to open a discussion.

Grossman, who is also a planning commissioner, was at odds over the zoning proposal. The concrete plant's planned activities were no more "dramatic" than any by-right use currently allowed in the zoning ordinance. However, Grossman was not comfortable moving forward without seeing a site plan or other specifications from Coastal Precast.

Buchholz spoke in support of Coastal Precast and noted that when he moved to Cape Charles in 2004, the concrete plant (then Bayshore Concrete) was "100 times" louder than it is now.

He did not understand the public complaints about dust coming from the concrete plant and noted that a wind study, which was conducted for the town's breakwater project, showed the wind generally does not blow from the south into town (the concrete plant is on the

south side of the Cape Charles harbor).

Buchholz said the local economy must be diversified if the town of Cape Charles is to survive. "We've got to learn how to live together ... all of us," he said.

Councilwoman Tammy Holloway shared Grossman's hesitation to make a decision without more information from Coastal Precast, but she agreed that "a balance of our industry is critical."

Councilwoman Ellen O'Brien observed that many citizens have lost trust in the Town Council. One step in rebuilding that trust would be for Town Council members to listen to their constituents and delay a decision on the proposed zoning changes.

She agreed with Councilman Andrew Follmer's suggestion to defer voting on the matter for 30 days.

A motion to defer the vote passed 4-2, with Bennett and Buchholz voting "no."

The Town Council will revisit the zoning proposals at its Aug. 19 meeting.



### **Accomack Circuit Court**

Antone Mohammad Beverly, 24, of Philadelphia, pleaded guilty to felony eluding, as well as to charges of reckless driving and driving without a license.

In November 2020, Beverly was driving a Toyota Corolla northbound on U.S. Route 13 near Exmore. An officer attempted to pull him over by ac-



tivating his lights and siren. Beverly did not pull over and the chase continued into Accomack County at speeds between 100 and 130 mph, said Assistant Commonwealth's Attorney Michael Baker. He said Beverly repeatedly changed lanes and passed other vehicles on the road. He was finally stopped in Temperanceville.

Judge W. Revell Lewis III ordered



that a presentence investigation report be prepared and set sentencing for Oct. 14.

Jeffery Lee Bromley, 46, of Crisfield, Md., was sentenced to five years for destruction of property and 12 years for larceny, second offense. All that time was suspended. He was ordered to be on good behavior for 10 years.

Bromley broke into outdoor vending machines at T's Corner and at a car wash and took items. He told the court he had had a drug problem but began to seek treatment after he committed those crimes. He said he had not used drugs since a week after the February 2020 incident. He has also paid the \$3,150 in restitution.

"Congratulations on your progress," said Judge Lewis.

Ervin Jose Diaz Gramajo, 23, of Parksley, who was convicted in August 2020 of 10 counts of carnal knowledge of a 13-year-old girl was sentenced to 10 years on each count with all but three years and four months suspended. Both the 13-year-old victim, who is a relative, and the defendant told

police the acts were consensual, said Commonwealth's Attorney Spencer Morgan at the trial.

Robert Knowlton Bradley, 42, of Horntown, was sentenced to three years with all but time served suspended for possession of cocaine.

He has a long and troubling criminal record, mostly as a juvenile and a young man said defense attorney Tucker Watson. He said his client suffers from mental and physical health issues.

In September 2019, the Eastern Shore Drug Task Force received a tip about Bradley from a person at Trail's End campground. When members of the task force arrived, they saw Bradley leaving. They followed him to Fleming Road where they saw him throw something out of his car and into the parking lot at Dublin Farms. When the item was recovered and tested, it was found to be a glass smoking device containing cocaine residue.

Judge Lewis order him to be on supervised probation for four years and 10 months to run concurrently with probation already begun for another conviction of cocaine possession. He is to be on good behavior for 10 years.

"I never expected to have her home again," Lewis said in a Facebook post

"She was tied in front of a Food Lion store in Greenville for about three hours. A nice young lady saw her and thought 'Something is not right.' She called animal control and we received pictures and confirmed it was Piglet," Lewis wrote, adding, "...We are extremely grateful to all involved in locating Piglet, especially Onley town police and the law enforcement in Greenville."

The Lewises headed to North Carolina right away to pick up the pup, arriving back home in the early morning hours Wednesday.







> Wachapreague - Amanda Manzella, at the Wachapreague Inn, reported good numbers of flounder are being taken inside the inlet, while limits of larger flounder have been taken daily by guests fishing the Parramore Reef.

> Captain Lindsay Paul, of Trident Tackle, reported anglers were catching plenty of flounder inside the inlet during the incoming tide. A lot of the fish are undersized, but limits of keepers are being caught. In addition to the flounder, there are plenty of small croakers, added Paul. He described the flounder fishing on the reef as iffy, with some sea bass also being caught.

> Lower Shore - Dez Louie, at Oceans East - Eastern Shore, said that the cobia fishing has tapered off some, as chumming for fish out of Cape Charles yielded a mixed class of fish this week. He blamed the slow down

Spanish mackerel have been feeding on surface schools of baitfish and Louie said that the mackerel and ribbonfish are eagerly hitting Gotcha Plugs, Rat-L-Traps, and Clark Spoons. In the shallows, trout fishing has shown signs of picking up with catches made of popping corks and jig/ grub combinations.

Jeb Brady, at Bailey's Bait & Tackle in Cape Charles, said flounder fishing around the pilings of the Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel has been really good over the past week, with anglers reporting limits on 20-inch (and larger) fish using Gulp with cut bait. He said anglers trolling spoons around the big pods of Spanish mackerel off Cape Charles have enjoyed success.

Spadefish and triggerfish action was also described as really good around the fourth island, the Cell, and Plantation Light. He characterized the cobia fishing as good for sight casters and bottom fishing. The lower bayside creeks are starting to produce speckled trout, with fish hitting both live bait and artificials.

### Random Facts About ... Hot Dogs — Conspiracies, Origins, and Overeating

Whenever we open our internet tubes for cleaning, we don't have to look far to find a conspiracy, but we were surprised to find one involving hot dogs and buns. Hot dogs usually come in packs of 10 while hot dog buns are traditionally sold in packs of eight. Is the hot dog conglomerate trying to get you to buy two extra dogs even though you need only eight to insert in the number of buns you have? Or is the bun syndicate forcing you to buy an extra pack of eight buns to cover those two leftover dogs? Did the buns and the dogs get together to cook up this deal?

Turns out, the packaging choices were reached independently and for logical reasons and without the bun colluding with the hot dog nestled within. Meat has traditionally been sold by the pound and it takes 10 normal-size hot dogs to make a pound. Bread products are sold by the count and buns traditionally have been baked in pans with multiple slots of four, so packages of eight and 12 are usual.

This month, Heinz, the condiment giant, is making a big deal out of trying to resolve the dog-bun disparity by sponsoring a Change.org petition to make hot dogs and buns both available in packages of 10. Meanwhile you can buy an eight-pack of bun-length hot dogs. In the classic hot dog-bun situation, the hot dog is shorter than the bun, leaving room for ketchup, relish, and whatever strange concoctions people in Baltimore put on their dogs. But when the hot dogs are larger (bun length), they are bigger so fewer of them make up a pound and you get an eight-pack of bun-length hot dogs that match an eight-pack of buns.

How the classic German sausage, which was created in the 1600s, morphed into the iconic American hot dog is a story with more twists and turns than your lower intestine. At some point in the mid-1800s, German immigrants brought with them to America sausages that they served with bread rolls and sauerkraut. These were called dachshund sausages because they resembled those long, round pooches. The food, because you could hold it by the bun, became convenient to eat at ball games and vendors would call out, "Get

'em while they're hot!" Around the turn of the 20th century some crazy college kids were referring to the sausages-in-buns as "dogs" and it wasn't long before "hot dogs" was born.

On the Fourth of July in 1916 (this

is one of those, as legend would have it stories), four recent immigrants to America were at Nathan's Famous hot dog stand in Coney Island, N.Y., talking about how they could show their patriotism for their new country. What occurred to them? Show you are true, blue American by eating the most hot dogs! And thus was born the Nathan's Famous hot dog eating contest. The contest has been on the record since 1972. People have 10 minutes to stuff down as many hot dogs as they can, ketchup and mustard optional. Most contestants dip the dog and bun in water to make consumption faster and easier. This year's contest was won by repeat champion Joey "the Jaws" Chestnut. Do you even want to know how many he ate to win? A men's world record: 76 hot dogs and their buns, more than 16 pounds. This year's women's winner was Michelle Lesco.





# Sailing Regatta Heads to Cape Charles Aug. 14-15

Sailboat enthusiasts will have the opportunity to witness a collection of vessels from several viewpoints when the 18th annual Leo Wardrup Memorial Cup passes by Cape Charles Aug. 14 and 15.

Hailed by Chesapeake Bay Magazine as the Chesapeake Bay's best regatta, the two-day race features more than 90 sailboats and over 450 sailors navigating a route crossing the bay from Cape Charles to Hampton.

The race is a function of the Chesapeake Bay Yacht Racing Association, and the event is presented locally by the Broad Bay Sailing Association. The goal of both groups is to promote sail training and sailboat racing on the southern Chesapeake Bay.

During the past eight years, \$45,000 in proceeds from the race has been donated to Sail Nauticus. Based out of Norfolk, Sail Nauticus is a nonprofit organization which focuses on instructing children in the

Hampton Roads area on the merits of both sailing and maritime sciences.

The late Leo Wardrup, for whom the race is named, was a retired navy captain, an avid sailor, and a representative in the House of Delegates.

The race kicks off Saturday, Aug. 14, at 10 a.m., at the north side of the Thimble Shoal Channel, and finishes that day at the Cape Charles entrance buoy. The following day, sailors embark at 10 a.m. from Cape Charles to a completion point off Buckroe in Hampton.

It's the hope of Broad Bay Sailing Association's Bob Magoon that people will come out for the impressive spectacle from a series of vantage points and increase the exposure of the event.

"We have had people on the Shore watch the boats particularly as they come out of Oyster Farm lined up the channel. As we come out, it's a pretty neat parade of boats. We are also down at the city dock so we would welcome more local awareness," said Magoon.

Mariners are advised that a crane

barge and tug will be conducting emergency repairs to the pier 9 fender system of the North Channel bridge at the southbound span of the Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel. Repair operations are expected to be conducted during daylight hours through Aug. 2. Captain of the vessels will be monitoring and can be contacted on VHF channels 5, 13, and 16.

### Art League Provides Enrichment for Eastern Shore Students

The Eastern Shore Art League held an art enrichment day this past Saturday at the Historic Onancock School. The event was funded by United Way and divided into two sessions. One from 10 a.m. to noon for high school students ages 12 to 14 and another from 1 to 3 p.m. for students ages 15 to 17.

"We wanted to try something new," said Carol Barylski, ESAL secretary and event organizer and instructor. "We used to host annual student art exhibits featuring work students completed in their high school art classes. COVID prevented that from happening last year. So, we decided to switch things up and offer an enrichment day for the kids instead."

During both sessions, Barylski walked students through various painting techniques, including how to double load colors and properly use rubber cement. Then the students created their own artwork using these techniques.

"I really want the students to see that painting is all about the process not the product," she said. "Creativity doesn't come when you are overthinking things or overly neat."

Barylski, a New Jersey native, has had a love affair with painting since her early youth. "I've been painting since my mom put a crayon in my hand," she said. She attended Rutgers University and studied art history and studio art and then worked as an art teacher in Medford, N.J., before moving to the Eastern Shore 30 years ago.

Dottie Troxler, another ESAL member and Chincoteague resident, also developed an interest in art early in life. "Although I've always been interested, I didn't take any art classes in school," she said. "Truthful-

ly, I have only been painting for 15 years and joined the art league in 2008. I paint a lot of landscapes and practice in plein air, which is sort of like painting outside in the moment."

Troxler sells her work to venues such as Lemon Tree Gallery and the Eastern Shore Yacht & Country Club. She and Barylski, like the rest of the art league, are dedicated to promoting the visual arts throughout the Shore. Since the league was formed in 1977, its goal has been to welcome artists of all skill and experience levels and form a network of people interested in creating and learning about art.

The rich network was one of several factors that convinced April Flory, graphic designer and former art league president, to move from

New York to the Eastern Shore nine years ago.

"We loved the beauty of the Shore and noticed there was an active art scene, so we knew we could make a home here," Flory said. "Being in this type of environment motivates and inspires you creatively."

The league frequently hosts paint-outs, exhibits, workshops, presentations, and holiday luncheons for its members in and around Onancock. There have been discussions of hosting more events that are beneficial to the general public, including a weeklong art camp that focuses on a specific medium such as sculpting.

"We really want to bring art to the Shore and particularly bring it to the attention of the youth and foster their creativity," said Barylski. "Members of rural communities often don't have proper access to the artistic networks found in more urban areas. We certainly want to change that."

### Bocce, Chess in Play as Citizens Shape Central Park Plan

A bocce court in Cape Charles Central Park is being rolled out as part of planned improvements next year.

"Now we're focused on the last remaining space in the park. What's missing is games for adults," said Hank Mayer, chairman of Citizens for Central Park.

The plan is being unveiled after a summer of capital improvements focused on the children's playground and gazebo, with more work planned on the formal fountain this fall.

To entertain adults, the group proposes to add a bocce court, two concrete chess/checkers tables with seats, two corn hole courts, picnic tables, benches, and shade trees.

The games would be located in the one undeveloped portion of the park that remains toward the southeastern corner, Mayer said.

The courts would take up a considerable amount of space.

The bocce court would measure 12 feet wide by 60 feet long; the two corn hole courts, 10 feet wide by 40 feet long each.

The group estimates the project cost at between \$30,000 and \$40,000, some of which will be raised by donations.

Visitors to the group's popular Saturday series of open-air concerts will notice renewed margarita cocktail sales and online appeals as the Citizens for Central Park ramps up its fundraising.

The group is seeking public input in coming weeks before sending its proposal to the town council.

This year, the town funded through its capital improvements budget more than \$30,000 to redesign and repair the park's formal fountain at its western end.

The fountain will be replaced with a more participatory water display, including water jets in which children may play and cool down. Parts for the project, including an in-ground water tank are on back order, but work is hoped to be completed before the end of the year, Mayer said

The town also gave \$10,000 toward the group's summer concert series, which has become an increasingly popular tourist draw.

This year's July 4 concert attracted between 700 and 800 people and is believed to be the largest opening concert the group has held, Mayer said.

The largest concert of the series tends to be the last concert, which will be held on Labor Day weekend and feature "The English Channel."

Improvements to the children's playground, located in a fenced and mulched area along the northern side of the park, included a heavy duty zip line, along with a three-foot high, roughly circular pit for GaGa Ball, which Mayer described as a version of kickball.

The improvements were also underwritten by a \$10,000 gift from Paul and Maria Henderson, of Cape Charles.

Volunteers organized by Jen Lewis of the Town of Cape Charles helped reduce the costs by assisting with installation.

Donations to the group may be made through its Facebook page, which is listed under Cape Charles Citizens for Central Park.

### Anthony LoFaso, Onancock Feral Cats Present Risks

Dear Editor:

We were shocked to read the reply from "Alice Burton, of a northern Virginia animal rescue group," when responding to Chincoteague residents' concerns regarding the ongoing release of stray and feral cats into the community. Ms. Burton's response was, essentially, "deal with it."

Stray and feral cats present a number of risks to Chincoteague's residents, including people, pets, and wildlife. In addition to property damage and general nuisances, cats also pose a disease risk. For example, cats are the top source of rabies among domestic animals in Virginia. From 2001 to 2019, cats accounted for 72% of all confirmed rabid domestic animals in the commonwealth. There were nearly eight times more rabid cats than rabid dogs. Just like our pets, stray and feral cats must be vaccinated initially and then given regular boosters to maintain current rabies vaccination. Anything less puts the community at risk.

Of course, stray and feral cats are also a nightmare for wildlife. Scientific studies estimate that cats annually kill 2.4 billion birds in the U.S. and are the top source of direct, human-caused bird mortality in the U.S. and Canada. Studies in Virginia have shown that cats are major predators of wildlife, and a Wildlife Center of Virginia study

showed that even with cutting-edge veterinary treatment, over 80% of birds attacked by cats died.

To hear Ms. Burton's comments that concerned residents should just build a fence or employ other deterrents on their property unjustly places the burden on local residents for the behavior of groups that release cats onto the landscape. Instead, it should be the responsibility of these groups to keep the cats contained, ensuring that both cats and the community stay safe.
