

# Cape Charles Passes Concrete Plant Zoning Changes

The Cape Charles Town Council on Aug. 19 passed zoning changes that would allow the improvement or expansion of local concrete plant operations, but it also sent additional proposed zoning text amendments to the town planning commission for review, which would give the Town Council more power to control new developments.

Coastal Precast Systems is under contract with South Port Investors, owned by Eyre Baldwin, to purchase a parcel adjacent to the existing concrete plant. The sale is contingent upon the rezoning of the parcel, tax map number 90-8-1A1, from harbor to general business/light industrial.

The Town Council approved the rezoning 4-2, with council members Steve Bennett, Andy Buchholz, Andrew Follmer, and Paul Grossman voting "yes" and council members Tammy Holloway and Ellen O'Brien voting "no."

Coastal Precast Systems had proposed zoning text amendments that would allow, for example, assembly and storage of products in the light industrial zoning district by right – that is, without a conditional use permit.

The Town Council approved the zoning text amendments 4-3. Bennett, Buchholz, and Follmer voted "yes"; Grossman, Holloway, and O'Brien voted "no"; and Mayor Smitty Dize broke the tie with a "yes" vote.

use the newly rezoned parcel as an additional laydown storage area to serve the concrete plant's current operations, with minimal impact to the wetlands, including mature trees.

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# 2020 Census Shows Population Increase in Accomack County

Data from the 2020 U.S. census shows Accomack County's population increased by 249 people since the 2010 census, a 0.8% change. The county has 33,413 residents, according to the latest census.

The U.S. Census Bureau released block data for the county Aug. 12.

The Accomack County Board of Supervisors heard a report on initial census data for the county at the Aug. 18 board meeting.

The Weldon Cooper Center for Public Study had estimated the county's population would decrease by 1.4%, or 470, in the decade, according to a memorandum from Tom Brockenbrough, Accomack County GIS coordinator.

Chincoteague's population increased by 13.7%, from 2,941 to 3,344, and Painter's population showed an 18.8% increase, from 229 to 272.

Wachapreague also grew, with a 10.8% increase, from 232 to 257.

Onley had a 3.1% increase, from 516 to 532.

Belle Haven, including the Northampton portion of the town, had a 2.1% increase, from 532 to 543.

Accomac and Bloxom's population stayed the same, at 519 and 387, respectively.

Towns that lost population in the past decade include Hallwood, with a 1.9%

# Rocket Lab Merges with Vector Acquisition Corporation

Rocket Lab announced Wednesday it completed a merger with Vector Acquisition Corporation to take the company public.

The combined company will be called Rocket Lab USA Inc. It started trading on Nasdaq Wednesday, with stock trading under the ticker symbol RKLB.

Vector shareholders approved the merger at an annual shareholder meeting Aug. 20.

Rocket Lab will receive around \$777 million as result of the merger.

The money is expected to accelerate growth in the company's space systems business, drive development of its Neutron rocket, and support future expansion, according to a press release.

"Our team is motivated by the enormous impact we can have on Earth by making it easier to get to space and to do incredible things there. We are excited to be making that a reality by embarking on our next chapter as a public company,"

said Rocket Lab founder and Chief Executive Officer Peter Beck, in the release.

"With our Electron rocket and Photon spacecraft, we've simplified space, making it easy and affordable for companies, scientists, governments, and entrepreneurs alike to get their ideas to orbit. Today, we take the next step toward unlocking the full potential of space, paving the way for our larger Neutron launch vehicle which will deploy the constellations of the future, and supporting our potential future expansion into space applications. I am thrilled to declare space open for business," Beck said.

He will continue to lead the company. "As a leader in democratizing access to space, Rocket Lab is well positioned to capitalize on exciting opportunities in commercial and government-sponsored space industry innovation," said Alex Slusky, chief executive officer of Vector and founder and chief investment officer of Vector Capital. "We are confi-

dent in Rocket Lab's ability to deliver outstanding performance and reliability to drive long-term value for shareholders."

Slusky will join the board of directors of the combined company alongside current directors Sven Strohband of Khosla Ventures, David Cowan of Bessemer Venture Partners, Matt Ocko of DCVC, Mike Griffin, Merline Saintil, and Jon A. Olsen.

To celebrate the merger's completion, Rocket Lab representatives rang the Nasdaq opening bell Wednesday morning.

Rocket Lab since its first launch in 2018 has delivered 105 satellites to orbit for more than 20 public and private-sector entitites. Its Electron rocket is the second most frequently launched U.S. rocket annually, according to the release.

Rocket Lab, based in New Zealand, officially opened the company's first U.S. launch site at Wallops Island's spaceport in December 2019.

Launch Complex 2 is designed to support "rapid call-up missions," according to a release then, which said "the ability to deploy satellites to precise orbits in a matter of hours, not months or years, is increasingly important to ensure resilience in space."

Accomack County officials in July approved conditional use permits and the rezoning of property

on Wallops Island Road, adjacent to the spaceport, clearing the way for a planned rocket production and testing facility there.

The rezoning and permits "are critical pieces to put (the Virginia Commercial Space Flight Authority, also called Virginia Space) in a competitive position to recruit and attract Rocket Lab's manufacturing component to Accomack County and the Commonwealth," according to a memorandum included in the board of supervisors meeting packet.

Virginia Space is working with Rocket Lab to support the company's Neutron rocket, which will be 148 feet tall and around 16 feet in diameter — much larger than the company's Electron rocket.

The company previously announced both rockets will launch from Wallops Island's Mid-Atlantic Regional Spaceport.

The building on the Wallops Island Road property would be for production of the Neutron, according to the memo, which went on to say, "Buildings and facilities are needed at the Wallops Island Road site, even if the manufacturing of the Neutron rocket does not occur on (the) property."

Additionally, a building was constructed in Wallops Research Park recently to support Rocket Lab's smaller Electron rocket.



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# Fraud Investigation Saves Social Services Thousands of Dollars

A fraud investigator for the Accomack County Department of Social Services saved the agency more than \$6,510 this summer.

Of 21 cooling applications made to the department this summer, 13 were denied, according to Frances Ann Bailey, fraud investigator.

The previous summer, 28 applications were denied as fraudulent, resulting in a savings to the agency of \$12,200.

"I believe because of the great denial last summer, it helped to deter a lot of individuals who weren't eligible for the program to not complete a fraudulent application this year," Bailey wrote in an email.

Even though there were still applications denied, fewer fraudulent applications this year represents progress, according to Bailey.

Clients are only eligible for air conditioning units under certain guidelines, of which they are made aware before they fill out an application.

This was Bailey's fourth summer completing air conditioning unit fraud checks.

The total savings to the agency over the four years is \$33,150, according to Bailey.

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# Vaccine Boosters Recommended and Pfizer Receives Full Licensure

Virginia health officials are making plans to deliver COVID-19 vaccine booster shots starting in September, after the White House on Aug. 18 announced the recommendation that individuals get a booster eight months after receiving their second dose of either the Moderna or Pfizer vaccine.

Federal health officials did not yet make a recommendation about boosters for those who received the Johnson & Johnson vaccine.

Dr. Danny Avula, Virginia's vaccine coordinator, in an Aug. 19 briefing said several studies in the United States as well as data from the United Kingdom and Israel show the vaccines' efficacy decreases over time, although the effectiveness in protecting from severe illness leading to hospitalization or death still remains very high.

The vaccines' effectiveness against the more contagious delta variant was somewhat decreased compared to protection against other forms of the virus, he said. In a study of New York adults, it was found that from May 3 to July 25 the vaccine's overall effectiveness in preventing hospitalization remained relatively stable at between around 92% to 95.3%, but the effectiveness against infection declined in the same period from 91.7% to 79.8%.

The rollout date to start making booster shots available is Sept. 20, contingent on the Federal Drug Administration updating its authorization and Centers for Disease Control and Prevention review, Avula said.

"The federal government has assured us that supply is not an issue," unlike in the early days of the vaccine rollout," Avula said, adding, "Whenever people become eligible, they will have access to a vaccine."

Virginia has around 1 million doses on hand and the ability to draw down another 2.5 million from the federal government, which should be more than enough to meet demand, according to Avula.

The Virginia Department of Health

will be working with local health departments to see what if any extra help they need to give out boosters.

The CDC recommends people get the same brand of vaccine for the booster as they got for the first two shots, but if that is not possible for some reason, Avula said CDC guidelines allow a person to receive a different mRNA vaccine for the booster.

The booster will be the same formulation and dosage as the intial two doses. Companies are working on formulations to specifically address the delta variant, but those will not be available for some time.

Avula said protection from the initial vaccination series does not disappear all at once, but slowly decreases over time.

"The sense of urgency or emergency is very different from what we experienced when we had no protection from this virus," he said, noting protection "does not drop off overnight," but gradually wanes.

"I want Virginians to recognize that they still have a high degree of protection" if vaccinated, he said, noting waning immunity is not atypical for vaccines.

Health care workers and nursing home residents and staff, who were among the first groups to be vaccinated last winter and spring, will become the first eligible for a booster.

By late December, a peak of around 320,000 Virginians a week will be at the eight-month mark, making them eligible for a booster shot.

Avula said Virginia previously has administered more than 500,000 shots per week and can handle the demand.

Boosters likely will be available at pharmacies and health care providers, among other locations that offered the initial doses.

# Third Dose Recommended For Immunocompromised Individuals

Not to be confused with booster shots, third doses of vaccine recently were approved for immunocompromised individuals, such as organ transplant recipients, some cancer patients, or people with advanced or untreated HIV, among others.

Those people may not have built up enough of an immune response to the virus from two doses.

Current guidelines are that those individuals should receive a third dose at least 28 days after their previous dose — those doses already are being offered.

The recommendation is for people who have:

- Been receiving active cancer treatment for tumors or cancers of the blood
- Received an organ transplant and are taking medicine to suppress the immune system
- Received a stem cell transplant within the last two years or are taking medicine to suppress the immune system
- Moderate or severe primary immunodeficiency (such as DiGeorge syndrome, Wiskott-Aldrich syndrome)
- Advanced or untreated HIV infection
- Active treatment with high-dose corticosteroids or other drugs that may suppress your immune response.

Individuals may self-attest as to their immunocompromised condition when

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# Accomack Schools Approve Spending Plan for \$13M in Federal Relief

The Accomack school board on Tuesday night unanimously approved recommendations for spending the more than \$13 million it will receive from the third round of the American Rescue Plan's Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief funding, following a public hearing on the matter.

Karen Downing, of Virginia Organizing, spoke during the public hearing to advise the school board: "If we always do what we've always done, we're always going to get what we've always got.

"And here we are tonight in unprecedented times in receiving ... historic money for investments in our school district," she said, and asked the school board to consider the funding uses suggested by the public.

Following the public hearing, the school board addressed concerns raised by each citizen who spoke.

Marvin Giddens had recommended that every Accomack student have a computer and a Wi-Fi hotspot.

Chairman Paul Bull said that each student already is assigned a laptop, and Finance Director Beth Onley said the school division is applying for a separate grant to purchase 400 hotspots.

Robert Snyder referred to the school division's plan to hire three additional translators for the next three years – two for Spanish and one for Haitian Creole – and said that the school division also should teach English to parents.

School board member Camesha Handy noted that courses in English as a second language are offered at Eastern Shore Community College.

School board member Ronnie Holden recalled that at a previous meeting, Snyder had suggested the school division discontinue use of styrofoam food containers in favor of biodegradable containers.

At the Aug. 17 school board meeting, Supervisor of Food Services Brandyn Berkholder reported that using the biodegradable containers would not be feasible because they would cost three times more than the styrofoam containers – an additional \$59,000 – and the biodegradable containers leak

when holding liquids.

Snyder also suggested giving teachers raises instead of spending about \$289,000 on three 77-passenger buses with underside storage, which would be used for school athletics programs.

Onley said the buses weren't like "fancy" tour buses, and the underside storage was needed for safety reasons.

Willie Justis suggested raises for school bus drivers and custodians; Bull noted that pay increases for those school employees had already been included in the school division's 2021-2022 operating budget.

Justis proposed that learning losses would be better addressed by hiring more teacher aides, not assistant principals.

Snyder also disagreed with hiring additional assistant principals. "When I went to school, you had a principal, you had a vice principal, that's all you needed," he said.

Onley originally had recommended hiring two additional assistant principals for the next three years.

However, her first draft of spending recommendations covered only about \$11 million of more than \$13 million in

American Rescue Plan available to the school division, so she made additions to her recommendation, including a total of four extra assistant principals at a cost of about \$871,000 over the next three years.

Kegotank and Metompkin elementary schools each will get one assistant principal. Each of the other two assistant principals will be shared – one for Accawmacke and Pungoteague elementary schools and one for Chincoteague's elementary school and combined middle and high school.

decrease, from 206 to 202 residents; Keller, with a 19.1% decrease, from 178 to 144; Melfa, with a 2.9% decrease, from 408 to 396; Onancock, with a 7.4% decrease, from 1,263 to 1,169; Parksley, with a 3.1% decrease, from 842 to 816; Saxis, with a 28.6% decrease, from 241 to 172; and Tangier, which had a 39.8% decrease, going from 727 residents in 2010 to 438 in 2020.

The board next month will begin working on required changes to electoral district lines, based on the 2020 census figures.

Three electoral districts, ED2, ED1, and ED6, have changed population substantially, according to Accomack County Administrator Mike Mason.

ED2 gained 21.6%, ED1 (Chincoteague) gained 13.7%, and ED6, which includes Tangier and other areas, lost 8%.

For redistricting purposes, the ideal district size based on population is 3,713, with a deviation of plus or minus 5% accepted in the past, according to Brockenbrough's memo.

Adjustments to the census figures, including for the incarcerated population, are expected in September.

Supervisor Donald L. Hart Jr. volunteered to assist Brockenbrough in preliminary work related to redistricting.

### Economic Development Investment Application Received from Eastern Shore Microbes

Eastern Shore Microbes, current-

ly located in Belle Haven, has applied for a grant of \$76,087 through Accomack's Economic Development Investment Program. The program was established in 2020 to support businesses that seek to create new jobs and new capital investment in the county.

Eastern Shore Microbes wants to invest \$1.75 million to expand its current business by acquiring property in Accomack County. The expansion is projected to create 15 new jobs in the next three years, according to a report by Accomack County Administrator Mike Mason.

The Accomack County Economic Development Authority recommended the board of supervisors award the grant.

The item will be on the board's agenda in September.

### **Tall Grass Ordinance Sought**

The board of supervisors voted to pursue a tall grass ordinance in agricultural areas in Accomack County, which requires asking the General Assembly to amend state law to allow for the county ordinance.

The ordinance would apply to residential lots of one acre or less in the agricultural district.

Accomack already has a code section requiring removal of tall grass, weeds, and other foreign growth from properties in other zoning districts.

In July, the board asked to have Sheriff Todd Wessells weigh in on the proposed ordinance.

"The sheriff is supportive of this effort, but did warn that it could result

in the need of additional staffing at a later date," Mason said.

### **Broadband Grant Sought**

State employees in a meeting earlier this month encouraged Accomack County and the Eastern Shore Broadband Authority to expand its proposed service area for broadband, with a goal of universal coverage, related to an application being made for a state grant.

The Virginia Telecommunication Initiative (VATI) provides funds to extend broadband service to currently unserved areas.

VATI's definition of universal coverage is that ESVBA would be within reach of all residents who are not within areas of the county for which federal funds have been invested for broadband expansion, which includes areas served by a wireless provider that received USDA funds, according to Mason.

Areas considered unserved under the VATI definition include Captains Cove, a large area on the bayside from the Maryland state line down to Mink Farm Road, Hacks Neck, and Upshur's Neck, among others, Mason said.

The cost of the project in Accomack County is around \$6 million, with an estimated local match of \$1.5 million required. The match could come from federal American Rescue Plan Act funds.

It would include 110 miles of fiber, 22 miles of which are in Captains Cove.

So far, 114 applications have been submitted to VATI for grants in this round.

# Hydro Drone Team Holds Camps and Creates New Projects

A team of local students working on a hydro drone project led by retired land surveyor and engineering instructor Joe Betit has had a busy summer conducting camps and displaying their system both on the Eastern Shore and in Norfolk.

Meeting in Pungoteague, the team of students that started with Lucas Antunes, Joslyn Herold, Dade Walker, and David Jesse "DJ" McCaleb recently added Nandua sophomore Nathaniel Long to the group.

The team conducted a weeklong summer camp at the Eastern Shore Yacht & Country Club teaching campers how to build and use the drone, then spent several days at the Chincoteague Market displaying the system. The team also made a presentation at the ESVA Maritime Summer Camp.

The highlight of the summer for the hydro drone team was being invited to the Unmanned Systems UxS Summit in Norfolk.

Betit said many of the Summit attendees were astonished that freshman college students were capable of performing at this level of design and field operations, especially when they learned the students were from the Eastern Shore and not Hampton Roads.

"We have developed our own hydro drone technology design with good GPS and sonar mapping performance plus 360 degree cameras but at a consumer cost point level," said Betit. "The Summit was composed of vendors marketing extremely high priced systems to Department of Defense and other agencies. We can produce a hydro drone for \$4,000 versus the typical prices like \$120,000 for the others."

Betit added, "We were the only producer there with a design that can provide cost effective swarms for gathering data after natural disasters. They are also practical in cost for abandonment on site after use in a severe hazardous environmental event such as for a release of radioactivity."

As some members of the team leave for college after a year of online learning due to COVID-19, the group will stay in contact online while also interested in starting hydro drone projects or groups at their schools.



# Little Farm Rescue and Sanctuary Sure to Gain a 'Colt' Following

Around midnight on July 30, Katie Cook, the principal officer of the Little Farm Rescue and Sanctuary, received a text message and photo describing an emaciated miniature horse.

The brown and white horse weighed only 108 pounds, about half the 180 to 210 pounds of a normal miniature horse.

She could see patches where hair had fallen off his skin.

His eyes looked dull.

Cook's first reaction was that of a responsible nonprofit manager.

She was only about two months into building out a new farm for over 100 animals that had been rescued, cared for, and moved from California.


Not only did she lack space, but the highly successful \$100,000 online fundraising campaign for the build-out hadn't factored in recently skyrocketing costs of construction materials. It was \$60,000 short of what she needed.

She had no tractor, horse trailers, or ATV, all those having been sold to fund the move to the Eastern Shore.

In sum, she saw no choice but to redirect the horse to the care of others. Her growing network in the animal rescue community already stretched across the United States.

However, she then reacted as an animal-rescue veteran who had crossed into California fire zones, risking her own safety to rescue pets and farm animals abandoned and stranded by fleeing families.

She sensed that Norman didn't have the time

or stamina to travel very far and needed emergency medical care.

Early the next morning, she laid

a special soft pad on the bottom of a horse stall and covered it with six times the normal inch-thick layer of wood shavings, just to provide a "super deep, super soft" landing for Norman.

He arrived lying on the floor of a horse trailer.

She and her husband, Lester, a former professional tennis player once ranked 12th in the United States and in the top 200 players in the world, picked up Norman and carried him into the stall.

Norman looked bad.

"His body was shutting down," said Cook.

He couldn't walk, and, when he tried, his feet had an odd angle that caused him to visibly grimace with each step. He shifted his weight backward off his front feet in a "pain stance."

A veterinarian, Dr. Emily Schneider of Coastal Equine, in Chesapeake, brought a mobile X-ray unit to examine his legs.

Schneider started Norman on pain medications, supplements, and a special diet to help him slowly gain weight.

He responded quickly to the treatment, gaining

about a pound a day.

Enabling him to walk required a Hail Mary surgery in Richmond to release overly tight tendons and allow him to extend his feet.

Gwyn Coghill, former principal of Kiptopeke Elementary School, drove Norman to the surgery in her minivan, where he was stabilized in the back seat by Cook and Ellen O'Brien, of Cape Charles.

The surgery succeeded, but uncovered a serious infection that is being treated with antibiotics.

Although the trend of Norman's condition is hopeful, Cook describes it as "still guarded."

Three days later, the surgery center called Cook to come to Richmond because his condition was declining.

"He was really depressed. It was like he was quitting," said Cook.

But when he saw her, "He let out this loud whinny and stood straight up. His spirit changed," she said.

And she cried.

"He's fighting hard. We're just following," she said.

However, he may have a comfortable future.

"If Norman makes it, we may be caring for him for 20 years" until his natural passing.

Many animals at the Little Farm have similar, if less medically dramatic, stories. Some were rescued from "kill pens" before being sent for slaughter.

"Almost everyone here was intended for consumption," she said.

Although the operations began in Ojai, a small, California farm town, its president feels that she is coming home.

Since her freshman year at William & Mary, where she played Division 1 field hockey on a scholarship, she has returned frequently to Cape Charles.

Her parents, Mike and Dora Sullivan, moved there just after she graduated from college and operated Sullivan's Office Supply for many years.

When her rescue operation filled all of the 10 acres that she owned in Ojai, she needed to expand, but couldn't afford land at elevated California prices.

She and Lester began searching in other states and settled on a 115-acre farm in Machipongo, where they arrived about three months ago.

They've held their first volunteer training class and hope someday to begin tours for school children and youth groups.

Her heart may be on the Eastern Shore, but it is more firmly committed to her animals.

Walking from Norman's stall, she says, "I love you. See you in a half hour."

# Island Food Closet Asks for Help as Coffers Run Bare

Donations are needed to help feed hungry people on Chincoteague, according to Craig Summers, who with his wife, Karen, coordinates the Chincoteague Island Food Closet.

Summers spoke during the Chincoteague Town Council workshop meeting Aug. 19.

Last year, during the pandemic. the food closet received significant donations, both of money and food, he said.

"It was really amazing, especially how the island came together, the citizens here. Our community was great. We even got quite a number of donations from off the island," Summers said.

Still, in 2021, donations have dropped off, he said.

"The first seven months of this year have been pretty dry," Summers said.

He thanked the council and the

police department for their donations last year and asked them to consider donating to the food closet again this year.

He also credited Island Foods for donating more than 1,000 bags of groceries last year.

The boxes of food the food closet gives out last year cost the organization \$31 each, but this year the cost increased to \$39, as food prices for some items almost doubled.

The number of recipients has increased almost 50% over last year, according to Summers.

"We're getting down to the cupboard being bare a little bit and the bank account being bare a little bit," Summers said.

People have been having problems with the credit card reader for the pump, according to Mayor J. Arthur Leonard.

Town Manager Mike Tolbert said the current system requires customers to authorize the purchase amount in advance.

The town at some point will be required to install a credit card chip reader instead of scanning magnetic strips for cards, he said.

"They do not make a chip reader for that specific pump, is what we are told. We are waiting for them to manufacture that," he said, adding changing vendors also is being looked into.

"I think with the amount of fuel that we're selling down there it's time to get a new one," Leonard said, noting that during a tuna tournament earlier this summer, the harbormaster sold 13,000 gallons of

seeking a third dose, according to Avula.

Riverside Health System is now scheduling third dose appointments for those who meet the criteria outlined by the CDC. Call 757-442-6600 to schedule a third dose vaccine appointment.

Around 56% of Virginians have been fully vaccinated.

With vaccine supplies stable, people seeking booster shots should not make it more difficult for the unvaccinated to get their first dose, according to Avula.

Since the end of May, demand for first doses has been very slow, but there has been an uptick recently with the delta variant and some employers' vaccination requirements, he said, adding that full FDA authorization of the vaccines could encourage some to get their shot.

While booster shots are important, "people getting that first dose is actually way more important in the long run" in the effort to quell the pandemic, Avula said.

### VDH COVID-19 Dashboard Updated To Give Case Numbers by Vaccination Status

The VDH Monday updated its COVID-19 dashboard to more accurately represent the impact of vaccinations on infection rates.

The main change will be reporting rates of infection, hospitalizations, and deaths by vaccination status — fully vaccinated, partially vaccinated, and unvaccinated, according to a press release.

Counts of infection, hospitalizations, and deaths of fully vaccinated people, called vaccine breakthrough,

also will be available at the state and health region levels.

Of 4.7 million Virginians who have been fully vaccinated, 10,712 infections were reported between Jan. 17 and Aug. 14.

Unvaccinated people developed COVID-19 at a rate 12.5 times higher than fully vaccinated people, according to the release.

### FDA Grants Full Licensure for Pfizer Vaccine

The FDA this week granted full licensure for the Pfizer vaccine.

"We at the Virginia Department of Health (VDH) are pleased that the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) decided to grant full licensure to the Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19 vaccine for persons ages 16 years and older. This action comes after rigorous review and study by scientists and other researchers at the FDA and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC)," Avula said in a press release Monday.

More than 200 million doses of the Pfizer vaccine have been given in the United States, and more than 5.4 million doses have been given in Virginia.

The vaccine will now be marketed under the brand name Comirnaty, according to Avula.

It will continue to be available under the emergency use authorization for people ages 12 to 15 and for third doses for immunocompromised people.

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

The additional employment positions are intended to be temporary, to address educational issues related to COVID-19. The federal funding may be applied to expenditures made between March 13, 2020, and Sept. 30, 2024.

Additional staffing recommended to address "unfinished learning" included:

- One full-time substitute at each Accomack school (except Tangier Combined School) for three years, for nearly \$658,000.
- Two instructional assistants at each Accomack school (except one at Tangier) for three years, at a cost of nearly \$1.4 million.

• Two business teachers for three years for about \$356,000.

Additional staffing recommended to address student academic, social, emotional, and mental health needs included:

- One mental health counselor for three years at a cost of about \$172,000.
- Four guidance counselors for three years, for around \$724,000.
- One social worker for three years at a cost of about \$172,000.

Onley also proposed extending the contracts of the elementary school guidance counselors by 20 days for each of the next three years at a cost of nearly \$120,000.

Similarly, the five guidance counselors currently at Accomack's middle and high schools will be upgraded from

10-month employees to 12-month employees, at a cost of nearly \$140,000, so their services will be available to students even during the summer.

Additional staffing recommended to implement COVID-19 prevention and mitigation strategies include:

- Part-time custodians for three more years for nearly \$635,000.
- Two cafeteria monitors at each elementary and middle school for two additional years, at a cost of about \$133,000.
- Health clinic assistants will be upgraded to full time and will continue their employment for three years for nearly \$521,000.

Onley said that since Aug. 17, only two stakeholders had submitted new suggestions for using the feder-

al funds. A teacher had requested repair or replacement of school tennis courts at an estimated cost of \$50,000. A school nurse asked for shaded areas on Accomack school playgrounds.

The expenditures Onley proposed Aug. 24, for additional staffing needs, supplies, equipment, and HVAC system upgrades, totaled more than \$16 million – well above the \$13.3 million available from the American Rescue Plan fund.

She also reviewed expenses that could be cut, such as playground equipment and extra video cameras for school buses.

The school board's approval of the spending recommendations came just in time for the funding application deadline of Sept. 1.

The zoning ordinance now also allows construction of a building up to 75 feet high in the light industrial zoning district with a conditional use permit.

Parcel 90-8-1A1 would be too small to accommodate a 75-foot-tall building and the required 125-foot setback. The adjacent parcel, 90-A-1A, would be suitable if the building was constructed in the middle of the property.

Coastal Precast's owner, Paul Ogorchock, has stated there are no immediate plans to purchase parcel 90-A-1A but is "speculating" about a future which could include Cape Charles

playing a role in the East Coast's wind energy boom.

There are 22 entities seeking to build more than 1,000 wind turbines that will line the coast, and participating in the effort could mean more jobs and sales tax revenue for Cape Charles and the area, he said.

Brandon Mowrey, Coastal Precast's director of business development and marketing, noted that Cape Charles has a competitive advantage because it has a deepwater harbor that is easily accessible, with no bridges or other obstructions nearby.

Ogorchock said Coastal Precast is developing its own design for wind turbines. Normally, the blades are mounted on steel pilings that are driven into the ground. The Coastal Precast wind turbines would weigh about 7,000 tons each and be sunk into the ocean bed, which would be easier to install and more environmentally friendly, he said.

Ogorchock added that companies are also interested in coming to Cape Charles to manufacture the 3,000 to 4,000 carbon-fiber blades that will be needed for the wind turbines.

He noted that the blades each will be about 20 feet wide and 300 feet long, and it would not be possible to both build and store them indoors; outdoor storage would be needed.

Before the Town Council voted on the zoning changes, the mayor spoke in support of the concrete plant. Dize, the former harbor master, pointed out that Cape Charles was founded as an industrial town, with an economy based on its railroad and harbor, which is "not a marina."

He noted up to 100 Cape Charles residents had signed a petition against the zoning changes, but the town has a population of 1,000 to 1,100 that could include a "silent majority" favoring the changes, and the opinions of everyone must be considered.

To address citizen concerns about the concrete plant's future operations, Town Manager John Hozey had drafted additional changes to the zoning text, which would give the Town Council more control over future activities in the light industrial zoning district. Examples of the proposed zoning text amendments for that zoning district are:

- Outdoor manufacturing and storage of products will be allowed not by right but conditional use permit.
- The term "sirens," which the Town Council voted Aug. 19 to remove from the list of noisemaking devices prohibited outdoors, will be re-added.
- A sound study must be submitted with any conditional use permit application, and additional noise mitigation may be required.
- Delivery of materials or products to or from a light industrial-zoned property will not be permitted before 8 a.m. or after 9 p.m. Monday through

Saturday or anytime Sunday.

• The zoning administrator may allow exceptions in certain circumstances. Exceptions must be reasonable, necessary, and minimal; must not compromise the intent of the zoning ordinance; must be compatible with surrounding developed sites; must not adversely affect the use of adjacent property; and must not impair the health, safety, or welfare of town residents.

The Town Council could not vote on Hozey's proposed zoning text amendments Aug. 19 because the changes must go through the proper process, including public advertisement and review by the town planning commission.

Town Council members who voted against the zoning text amendments proposed by Coastal Precast were concerned that newly permitted uses with potentially adverse affects could occur before Hozey's amendments could be passed.

Councilwoman Holloway also was concerned about the long-term implications of the zoning changes, because future companies operating in the general business/light industrial district may not be "good neighbors."

The advertised rezoning and zoning text amendments passed by a slim margin, but the motion to send the additional proposed zoning text amendments to the planning commission passed unanimously.

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# ESO Writers' Workshop Approaches 25th Anniversary

The ESO Writers' Workshop marks its 25th anniversary this year. It serves as a training ground for talented local writers of fiction, nonfiction, and poetry to perfect their work and the craft of writing. It is taught at the Arts Center in Belle Haven by local authors Lenore Hart and David Poyer.

The workshop follows a format that was inspired by their mentor, Frank Green, who ran a workshop in Jacksonville based on his experiences at Sewanee University. "In his workshop, the texts were read aloud by the workshop leader, and the writer sat silently at the table until all others had voiced their critiques," said Poyer. "The format originated with the Fugitive poets, Allen Tate, John Crowe Ransom, and Robert Penn Warren, in the 1920s. Frank preserved the basics, objective group criticism based on anonymous submissions."

Hart established the workshop in 1996. "When I moved here there wasn't a community for writers," she said. "I wanted to create a collaborative environment where writers can have their work read and skilled readers can provide them with intelligent critiques."

Hart grew up in Florida and immersed herself in writing at a young age. "When I was young, I originally thought I was going to become an illustrator," she said. "In fifth grade, I came up with an idea to start a newspaper that featured animals that talked and acted like humans, like that comic strip Pearls Before Swine. I began selling it around school. My friend and I were taking manila paper from our teacher's supply closet to write the newspaper on and when the teacher found out she locked the door, forcing us to cease publication. Afterwards, I began writing my own stories and reading a lot of adult and classic novels."

In the early 1980s, Hart earned a master's degree in library sciences from Florida State University. She worked as a public relations director for a three county library system in northern Florida and wrote poems and short stories in her free time. Her first two novels, "Black River" and "Devil's Key," were published in the early 1990s under the pseudonym Elisabeth Graves.

"I saved my real name for general and literary fiction since I had already published poems and stories as Lenore Hart," she said. "My first two novels were speculative fiction set in contemporary and historical northern Florida, and in those days, it was too easy to get pigeonholed into one genre. I wanted to avoid that."

After moving to the Eastern Shore, Hart enrolled at Old Dominion University and earned an M.F.A. in creative writing. Her thesis was the short novel "Waterwoman," which tells the story of a young woman growing up on the Eastern Shore in the 1920s. Hart has published 10 books total, including two fantastic fiction anthologies, and one children's book.

Her husband, Poyer, grew up in western Pennsylvania and graduated from the United States Naval Academy. He started writing in the 1970s. "I taught myself how to write in workshops," he said. "First, I started out writing short stories and then progressed to novellas and novels. I also read the works,

letters, and biographies of several famous authors in order to learn about the craft. For example, Herman Melville, Hemingway, Dostoevsky, Faulkner, and Thomas Wolfe."

Thus far, Poyer has published over 40 books. Most of his work falls into the thriller and adventure genre. He often draws upon his experience in the military for his fiction. Among his most popular work is an action packed series that focuses on the career of U.S. Navy officer Dan Lenson.

The workshop has produced several success stories. Among them is David McCaleb, a national best selling author of red ops thrillers. "The workshop was the pivotal point in my writing career," said McCaleb. "I came to it already with a finished manuscript, hoping to put some final touches on it before submitting it to publishers. It took four weeks for me to figure out I didn't know how to write, then a couple years to learn while rewriting that first book. It was a difficult journey, but

I am much better for it. Shortly afterwards, I landed a three-book deal."

Mark Nuckols, a travel writer, joined the workshop in 2010. "At first, my material was a rather dry accounting of facts, but I learned to enrich my writing with vivid details appealing to all the senses," Nuckols said. "This was the result of David and Lenore's guidance. I've also acquired important self-editing skills."

Nuckols' first book, "Travels with Ferdinand and Friends," was critiqued during the workshop and is due to be published by the end of the year. It is a travelogue about his 2014 trip around countries that were once part of the former Austria-Hungary empire, and details the aspects of European culture he encountered.

The workshop costs \$250. It begins Sept. 7 and meets on Tuesday nights for 10 weeks, from 7 to 9 p.m. Classes are limited to six students. 



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# **Court Postings**

Bail was denied for Robert Knowlton Bradley, 42, of Horntown. Bradley was free on bond for other crimes when he was recently indicted for two counts of distribution of heroin and conspiracy to distribute heroin. He had not even begun his supervised probation when these charges were incurred, said defense attorney Tucker Watson. He said his client would undergo substance abuse counseling if allowed to remain free and begin his supervision. He said his "significant other," with whom he lives, has a job in Salisbury, Md., and that they have a ten-year-old child. Watson said Bradley suffers from numerous debilitating mental and physical conditions and may not be receiving his

necessary medications while in jail.

"He was working with another person selling heroin out of his home," said Assistant Commonwealth's Attorney William Fox. Fox said Bradley was convicted on other drug charges March 25 and sentenced July 28, just weeks ago.

"The drug deals occurred in your home," said Judge W. Revell Lewis III. "Your child lives in your house."

He denied bail for Bradley, calling him a danger to the public and to his ten-year-old child.

Jason Roy Childrey, 36, of Onancock, charged with assault, assault and battery of a law enforcement officer, and DUI, pleaded guilty to felony assault and battery of a law enforcement officer in a plea agree-

ment with the commonwealth in June. He also pleaded guilty to DUI and two misdeameanor counts of assault on police officers. According to the terms of the agreement, the felony charge will be dismissed in two years if Childrey has been on good behavior during that time.

"He has made positive steps in the right direction," said defense attorney Andre Wiggins. He said his client attended a voluntary drug treatment program for almost 90 days. Wiggins said his client was using drugs that day but ingested another drug by mistake. He was taken to the hospital for treatment and then to the sheriff's office.

On the witness stand, Childrey said he remembers nothing at all about what he did. "I was absolutely mortified about my behavior that day," he told the court.

Childrey said he has apologized to

everyone who dealt with him. Judge Lewis sentenced him to six month on each assault and battery of a police officer and suspended all but time served on one. All time was suspended on the remaining two charges. Judge Lewis sentenced Childrey to 30 days, all suspended, for the DUI and to be on probation, supervised by community corrections, for 12 months.

Christopher Joseph Fox, 21, of Chincoteague, successfully completed the first offender program and felony charges against him were dismissed. He was in court one year ago charged with possession of cocaine and oxycodone. Judge Lewis noted that he had completed a year's probation, done his community service, and paid all court costs.

"Congratulations," Judge Lewis told Fox. "I am glad to see you took this seriously."

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# **CAPITAL LETTERS**

Hi, this is Del. Rob Bloxom with a Capitol Report on another special session. Gov. Ralph Northam called this session to appropriate \$4.3 billion from the federal

government in the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA). Virginia has three years to spend this money, but for understandable political reasons, the governor wanted to direct as much of the spending as possible before he leaves office. I can only hope that the pandemic will not shut the economy down again where we might need this money for future expenses. Thankfully, most of the spending is a one-time expenditure and does not create recurring expenses. The governor did leave \$1.1 billion to be appropriated at a later date.

One of the largest expenditures was \$800 million to replenish the unemployment trust fund. While I think a larger deposit was warranted, this deposit will keep businesses from paying a higher unemployment tax for one year. In the future, all eyes will be on the trust balance as a low balance could trigger a higher per employee tax on business. Broadband also received a \$700 million infusion that is supposed to get us to universal coverage. I have my doubts, but it will certainly move us closer.

Other areas with statewide investment include the Rebuild Virginia program, which received \$250 million to fulfill grant applications. Tourism received \$50 million. The Virginia Employment Commission received \$73 million to upgrade its system and the Virginia Health Department got \$100 million to modernize the department's computer systems. Utility assistance was awarded a \$120 million infusion while school systems received \$250 million for ventilation improvement.

While investments in our school system are much needed, the process for receiving this money is problematic because it is on a one-to-one match with the localities. This will be the first time any school funding has not been put through the "ability to pay" equation. The Democratic majority claims this matching system will only apply for this program. I hope that is the case, as requiring localities to match state funding on a dollar-to-dollar basis would be devastating for poor and rural communities.

Other areas of expenses range from bonuses for essential state employees to outdoor recreation improvement of our state parks. There were a host of additional appropriations made in house districts controlled by Democrats who are facing tight re-election campaigns in November. Only one Republican-controlled district received an extra penny. After seven years in the House, in both the majority and minority, I understand how the process works. I will pay close attention to the programs that received appropriations and ensure our district receives our share of the ARPA funding.



along the marshes of the seaside. Large Spanish mackerel have been caught by anglers trolling spoons around the Smith Island target ships. A recent surf fishing trip produced a catch of large spot, while Spanish mackerel could be

seen skyrocketing out of the water outside of casting distance.

Chincoteague - Donna Rae Roeske, at Captain Bob's Marina, said the most recent productive areas for keeper-sized flounder have been in Queen Sound and in Chincoteague Channel, specifically the area between the marina and Daisey's Dockside. The waters near the inlet have produced catches of red drum and speckled trout. The waters of Assateague Channel are alive with ribbonfish and a lesser amount of flounder. Whiting and croakers are the primary catches in the area between the canal and the inlet. Sharks are abundant just outside the inlet. Prior to receiving the effects of the coastal storm over the weekend, the structures on Blackfish Banks were producing black sea bass, triggerfish, spadefish, flounder, and a few trout. A variety of small panfish, sharks, and rays were being landed in the surf. Offshore, deep droppers were catching tilefish.

Jimmy Vasiliou, at Captain Steve's Bait and Tackle, said the fishing around the island has been good despite the unsettled weather of last weekend. Vasiliou said the flounder fishing has been good, especially across from Curtis Merritt Harbor. Small speckled trout and puppy drum have been hitting around the marsh banks. The shop is getting in fresh mullet and bunker for prime baits. Early in the week, Maddie Burton was leading the shop's youth croaker tournament with a 15-ounce fish.

**Wachapreague –** Debbie Shrieves, at Trident Tackle, reported Garrett Geddes boated a 56-inch, 35-pound dolphin (mahi) in the Norfolk Canyon aboard the Heat Wave.

Amanda Manzella, at the Wachapreague Inn, said the offshore fleet was catching wahoo, tuna, and dolphin in the canyons.

Lower Shore - Dez Louie, at Oceans East - Eastern Shore, said the cobia fishing remained decent through the week for bottom fishermen and sight

casters. He said the fish are starting to stack up around the bridge-tunnel. Red drum fishing has improved during the evening hours. Flounder action remains very good. Spadefish catches are still coming from around the islands and pilings of the bridge-tunnel, while sheepshead are being caught by fishing the bottom in the same areas. Anglers trolling Clark Spoons are still catching lots of Spanish mackerel. Louie said speckled trout and puppy drum are being caught along the marshes and creeks on both sides of the peninsula. Anglers fishing off the piers were landing mostly ribbonfish and croakers.

Jeb Brady, at Bailey's Bait & Tackle in Cape Charles, said the fish and the fishing methods were transitioning from the summer to the autumn patterns. He confirmed that large schools of Spanish mackerel remain off Cape Charles. Anglers trolling spoons behind inline sinkers or planers were enjoying success on the mackerel. Brady said the cobia numbers are starting to decline as the fish begin their migration. Big red drum are being caught in the evenings from Cape Charles north to Onancock.

Big sheepshead have been taken at the bridge-tunnel as well as around the concrete ships. Flounder action has been good in the Ditch and around the bridge pilings. Speckled trout action continues to improve in the bayside creeks and along the shorelines. The piers are producing small croakers, mullet (whiting), and ribbonfish. Puppy drum action out of Oyster was described as good and getting better.

# Random Facts About ... the Best Endurance Running Animal Who Ever Lived

When we opened our internet tubes to scour them of falsehoods, this question fell out: What animal is the best runner? The cheetah is fastest. It can accelerate from 0 to 60 in three seconds and has been clocked at 75 mph. But we decided to define "best" this way: take individuals from each species of animal known for being good runners, line 'em up, and yell, "Go!" The animal that is still running after all the others have fallen by the wayside will be declared the best endurance runner of all time.

"Go!"

The cheetah races ahead of everyone but around 500 to 700 yards into the race, this fast cat has had it and gets passed by all the other great endurance runners, from antelopes to ostriches. The pronghorn antelope, can average 30 mph for 20 miles or so and could run the marathon (26.2 miles) in 45 minutes. But eventually the antelope tires and taps out, being passed by better endurance running animals.

Some canines (wolves, sled dogs, the wild dog of Africa) are great endurance runners. The African wild dog can run 40 mph for up to an hour, catching dinner through what's called exhaustive predation: the dogs run until the prey gives out. But canines, unable to sweat and dependent upon panting to lower their temperatures, eventually are stopped by overheating.

In our Great Endurance Race, when most other animal runners have slowed to a stop, it's probably the horse that is still running. The modern horse has been bred to be a runner and has a spleen that will disgorge oxygen-carrying red blood cells as soon as the animal goes into a gallop. And horses sweat, although they don't sweat at maximum efficiency, and they are covered with thick hair and hides that build up heat. Horses can — and have — run themselves to death, succumbing to heart attacks, respiratory failure, or strokes while running fast and hard over distance.

After the horse gives up, is there any endurance-running animal still running? Yes. You! Humans are

arguably the best endurance runners on the planet, ever — able to maintain a running pace over longer distances and worst conditions than any other animal.

Bull, you say? (No, the bull wasn't a finalist in the endurance race.) To test the horse versus human running proposition, you could travel to Llanwrtyd Wells in Wales where, for 30 years, the town has held a horse-human 22-mile race. The contest began when a pub owner said a man could outrun a horse over distance, and equestrians begged to differ - and the race was on. Year after year, the horse won but not by as much as you might think. Horses, carrying a rider, would get out in front early, running 30 minutes ahead of the human runner, but by the end of the 22 miles, the human runner was often within a minute or so of reaching the horse. In 2004, a British runner beat the horse and then, in 2007, a German runner won the race. In an earlier horse-human contest, Michael Byrne ran in a six-and-a-half-day race in 1880. After 578 miles, Byrne was 15 miles ahead of the horse and won the race. Horses have that blood-spleen thing going for them, but humans sweat better and are able to regulate their temperature in ways that make ultra-long-distance running possible.

Daniel Lieberman, an anthropologist from Harvard, and Dennis Bramble, a biologist from the University of Utah, have figured out how our physiology has evolved to make us super endurance runners: legs with long strides and tendons-muscles-ligaments (especially our Achilles tendons) that work together to store energy then spring the runner up and forward to the next step. The human big toe facing straight forward (unlike splayed to the outside as it does in other primates) gives power to the leg kicking off for the next stride. Having up to four million sweat glands gives us an awesome cooling system. And our (relatively) big butts make us great runners, because gluteus maximus is the largest muscle in the body and is used primarily in running, not walking.

Our running physiology package developed millions a years ago as early

man was doing the same kind of exhaustive predation that the wild dogs of Africa practice. These early humans might not have had sophisticated weapons, but they were able to run after an antelope until the animal had to

stop from exhaustion and became an easy kill.

Some of us, although we've never run a race, believe we are born runners — just look at our maximum gluteus maximus.



The project area is located throughout the Town of Exmore and will encompass approximately five and one half (5.5) acres. The Town will be submitting an application to RUS for funding of the proposal.


SUPPLEMENTARY INFORMATION: The Town proposes to construct a new, low-pressure wastewater collection system that will consist of installation of 82,344 linear feet of forcemain pipe, 651 grinder pumps, and all related appurtenances, and construction of a new pump station that will be located on a Town-owned 0.5-acre lot on Carolyn Avenue and includes a building, buried wet well/valve vault, access drive, generator, and security fence. The pump station will be constructed by the Hampton Roads Sanitation District (HRSC) and will allow the Town to connect their new collection system to HRSD's collection system and transport the collected sewage to HRSD's wastewater treatment facility.

Bowman Consulting Group, LTD, an environmental consultant, prepared an environmental assessment for RUS that describes the project, assesses the proposed project's environmental impacts, and summarizes as applicable any mitigation measures used to minimize environmental effects. RUS has conducted an independent evaluation of the environmental assessment and believes that it accurately assesses the impacts of the proposed project. No significant impacts are expected as a result of the construction of the project.

Questions and comments should be sent to RUS at the address provided. RUS will accept questions and comments on the environmental assessment for fourteen (14) days from the date of publication of this notice.

Any final action by RUS related to the proposed project will be subject to, and contingent upon, compliance with all relevant Federal environmental laws and regulations and completion of environmental review procedures as prescribed by 7 CFR Part 1970, Environmental Policies and Procedures. When publishing public notices, the applicant should ensure that the notice has a reasonable likelihood of attracting the attention of individuals or organizations that may be interested in or affected by the project.

Notices must be published in newspaper(s) of general circulation (both in print and online) within the areas affected by the proposed project. The notice must be published in the non-classified section of the newspaper. If the affected area is largely non-English speaking or bilingual, the notice must be published in both English and non-English language newspapers serving the affected area, if both are available. The publication frequency shall be 3 consecutive days for daily newspapers and 2 consecutive weeks in weekly newspapers. If individual copies of the notice are required to be sent to any persons or organizations, a list will be attached. The public will be provided fourteen (14) days to review the Environmental Assessment. Public review dates shall be computed from the initial publication date of the notice. Prior to submitting a copy of the notice to the newspaper for publication, it must be submitted to the Rural Development State Environmental Coordinator (SEC) for review and concurrence at <a href="mailto:james.warner2@jusda.gov">james.warner2@jusda.gov</a>. This applies whether the notice was written by RUS or you. Once you have received notice of concurrence from the SEC, you may proceed with publication of the notice.

**Proof of publication must be provided to the RD State Environmental Coordinator. Processing cannot continue until this has been accomplished.** You must provide this office with tear sheets of the published ad from each edition that it appears in and a copy of an affidavit of publication from the newspaper as well as a list of all parties receiving an individual copy of the notice. These items should be submitted to Rural Development as soon after the publication as possible, but not later than the end of the 14-day comment period. If the notice you published does not match the one RD previously concurred with, it will be invalid and a new notice will be required to be published.

If any comments are received by the applicant, including unsolicited comments, they must be submitted to RD as soon as possible for review and comment.

# Chincoteague Ponies 2021 Football Season Begins

Having seen a decline in participants, Chincoteague expected to start the 2020 season with eightman football. While other teams in Chincoteague's conference persisted with a limited schedule last year. the Ponies sat and waited for their opportunity. Tonight, they return to football on the island, looking to break a four-year losing drought on their homefield. Wyle Maddox is the new Chincoteague coach looking to bring back a winning tradition in a format that's new to him and new to all his players. In fact, varsity football in general will be a new experience for most of his kids.

"We have two, maybe three kids who have ever played varsity football before, so they're getting their feet wet with the new eight-man," Maddox said.

The approach to eight-man football requires a departure from a ground game that the Ponies have become accustomed to, and endurance will be key with a lot of open space running. But Maddox is well aware of these realities and has focused his practices on conditioning to meet rigorous demands.

"It's definitely a lot different. It's a lot of misdirection passing, and usually it's very high scoring and not a lot of defense. It's a lot of different schematics of the game, and we've been working on a lot of conditioning trying to get ready and, especially having only 13 kids, they run both ways all game," said Maddox.

There is little room for error, and already Maddox faces the challenge of replacing a starting quarterback, having lost him to a noncontact ACL injury on the third day of practice. Maddox expects to rely heavily on the legs of Landon King, whom he

believes is the best tailback in the conference. King's size and ability will also be key on the defensive side of the ball, as he will play middle linebacker.

The Ponies face Brunswick Academy tonight, and vet another challenge they face has been the inability to assess their opponents. Accomack County lost its 2020 season, and there is little in the way of film footage for Maddox and his coaching staff to look at headed into the season.

"We're going to go into this week blind and have to make adjustments on the run," said Maddox.

The coach has a humble enthusiasm and has still set encouraging expectations to compete in the conference this year. He hopes bringing back a winning tradition will encourage kids on the island to return to the game. "I honestly think some of it's going to be the level of success. The past two years kids got pounded week after week. They were playing schools they weren't compatible with and I talked with a lot of kids who saw this and said they don't want to get pounded week after week. We're hoping this year sparks a lot of interest in them," Maddox said.

An effort to start a JV program with seventh and eighth graders had sparked a lot of interest, but the program was not allowed to proceed this year. Maddox hopes these kids will retain their interest and hopes the introduction to a new conference with playoff and all-star games will renew the incentive to compete.

"Chincoteague has never been able to have all conference awards or compete for a championship. In this conference, there are awards, an all-star game in North Carolina, and playoffs, so it's pretty cool," said Maddox.

# Tangier Residents Eager for Partnerships to Bring Little League Games to the Island

Tuesday evening a group of interested kids and parents met in the Benson Educational Building on Tangier for a meet and greet with Central Accomack Little League President, Billy Justice, and safety officer, Hannah Annis, to discuss the new collaboration between the island and CALL to ferry kids over for Little League games on the Shore.

The meeting formally introduced residents of the island to an idea that was floated in late July, and Justice's presence gave credence to the excitement for the new alliance.

"I'd like to offer an invitation for you all to come play for us," said Justice.

Justice highlighted the success of the Little League, particularly with the 2019 boys team that went all the way to the world series, but also spoke to the tremendous popularity of softball on the Shore. "Softball at CALL is like Texas football," Justice said.

The partnership is new for Tangier, but the islanders have shown a willingness to address the geographical challenges.

Town Manager Laurie Thomas presided over the meeting Tuesday and spoke to the support the town pledged at a previous council meeting. "The council has agreed to pay for the boat fare to bring kids back and forth for games," Thomas said.

Tuesday's crowd of boys, girls, and family members made Thomas smile. "I'm glad by the turnout. How often would the kids have an opportunity if not for this?" said Thomas.

Several adults in the room were in agreeance and volunteered to donate their time.

Island resident Dylan Parks was excited to help and offered his support. "I was very interested in this, to teach people, volunteer, anything," said Parks.

Jared Parks, whose son is eligible to play in the senior boys division, also spoke, eager to see his son and other kids further their understanding of the game. "It's good for kids. Everything here is pickup, and you're not actually learning the rules of the game," said Parks.

Rules and structure seem of paramount importance to Thomas as well. "This will show them sportsmanship, teamwork. The children here don't have a lot. I don't even have a child and I'm willing to make the effort," said Thomas.

Annis emphasized the importance of volunteers to successfully pull this off.

"The key to any Little League is volunteers. Everybody needs to participate. It can't all fall to one person," said Annis.

CALL has even pledged to come help dress up the field, with Justice suggesting that his brother, Bryan, and league vice president Greg Ford could come out to spike drag the field.

Earlier in the day, Justice surveyed the grounds and was pleasantly surprised by what he found.

"I've sent championship teams to Bristol on fields that were not as nice as this one. I was impressed by the fence. Whoever has done it did a good job," said Justice. A new dugout has been constructed, and Thomas said an electronic scoreboard is sitting in storage just waiting to be installed.

While some details need to be hashed out, such as getting kids from the wharf in Onancock to the fields on Hartman Avenue, Justice was eager to open fall ball registration for any interested kids on the island. The eight weeks of fall ball, which tentatively is slated to start with games Sept. 24 and run through early November, might represent a good transition.

Interested parents can register online, now through Sept. 13. The \$40 registration fee includes a jersey and cap, but all equipment will be the responsibility of the individual.

Everyone appeared excited to see the collaboration flourish, and Justice even mentioned bringing teams from the Shore a couple times throughout the year to play on Tangier's diamond.

# Local Yoga Teacher Hopes to Spread Love for Yoga on the Eastern Shore

Local yoga instructor Debra Bosna offers classes at Indigo Studio in Nassawadox. Classes are offered Tuesday, Thursday, Friday, and Saturday and are open to all levels of fitness and experience.

Bosna, born and raised in Philadelphia, discovered her passion for yoga in 2000. "One day my friend Danielle, who is very athletic, took a yoga class," she said. "She told me it was the hardest thing she ever did and convinced me to give it a try. By the end of my first session, I was lying on my back crying. I wasn't sad. I felt at peace. I went to that first class and never stopped."

Within two years, she completed her 200-hour teacher training and became a full-time instructor in Pennsylvania. She is a student of Yoganand Michael Carroll, the founder of Pranakriya Yoga. She has worked with all kinds of clientele, ranging from triathletes to wheelchair users, and mastered various styles, including athletic, yin, restorative, and yoga for chronic pain relief.

Yoga has had a significant impact on her life. Bosna was diagnosed with rheumatoid arthritis at age 4 and was in and out of children's hospitals until she was 16. "I couldn't even run in gym class without my ankles hurting," she said. "Yoga has helped me overcome my physical limitations. Yoga helps strengthen your joints, improve blood circulation, and can help heal fatigue and depression, which are arthritis symptoms that I suf-

fered from when I was younger."


Bosna moved to the Shore in 2015 and opened up Freestyle Yoga Studio in Cape Charles before relocating her operations to Cheriton. She had to shut down her studio in 2020 when the cornavirus pandemic emerged.

"When COVID-19 appeared, I just couldn't keep it open," she said. "Nobody wanted to be in a room with a bunch of strangers inhaling and exhaling. I tried teaching classes online through Zoom and creating a video series, but it just wasn't the same. My friend Richard Williams helped me relocate to Nassawadox and save my business. The studio is large enough to accommodate many students and provide room for social distancing."

Bosna loves interacting with and helping others. Before yoga, she was a social worker. "One of the things that I enjoy the most about yoga is that the studio provides a sense of community," she said. "I like providing a support system for those in need. As someone who suffered from arthritis, I definitely have empathy for people that are going through a rough time in their life physically and emotionally."

She hopes more people develop an interest in yoga in the near future. "I want everyone to know that yoga is more than physical flexibility," Bosna said. "It is a lifestyle that can enhance the mind and body and everyone is going to have a different experience."

# A Letter From Northampton Schools Superintendent Charles Lawrence

On behalf of the Northampton County School Board, it brings me great pleasure to extend this opening message to the community of Northampton County for the 2021-2022 school year. As I enter my eighth year as superintendent, we are facing the challenge of opening our schools while dealing with the COVID-19 pandemic and school renovation projects.

The summer is going by quickly, and we are extremely busy in preparation for the upcoming school year. Central office staff and building administrators are in the process of attending various workshops and trainings. The Human Resources Department has been working diligently to fill staff vacancies. Finally, our Building and Grounds Department has been making repairs and upgrades to all our campuses.

Northampton County Public Schools will be returning to instruction five days a week. All students will be required to wear masks in school and while riding the bus. Social distancing will be implemented when possible.

We are also pleased to inform you that Northampton County Public Schools will continue to participate in the National School Lunch and School Breakfast Programs called the Community Eligibility Provision (CEP). All Northampton County Public School students are eligible to receive a healthy breakfast and lunch at school at no charge to your household each day of the 2021-2022 school year. No further action is required of you and your child(ren) are eligible to participate in the meal program without having to pay a fee or submit a meal application.

Kiptopeke Elementary School is undergoing a major renovation project. Installation is underway for a total replacement of the HVAC systems at the school. In addition, the school will receive new lighting and have all of the windows and skylights sealed. The new HVAC system is geothermal and will greatly reduce the school's carbon footprint and operating cost. While the project will not be completed by the start of school, classes will start on schedule. I anticipate all work to be finished by mid-October. All the work done after the start of school is scheduled after normal operating hours.

I urge you to support the Northampton County Education Foundation and join the Parent Teacher Association (PTA). These organizations are extremely vital to the division and provide support in various areas including grants, awards, fundraisers, materials, and supplies.

I invite all parents and students to attend Open House. This year, Open House will be Sept. 2, from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. I hope to see you at Open House and during the school year. 

ShoreCat Watch Lists - Automated Alerts for New Library Items

ShoreCat, the Eastern Shore Public Library's online catalog, provides an easy way for users to keep track of new library items that are written



by their favorite authors, August 2021

are part of their favorite series, or are about their favorite subjects – all with the nifty ShoreCat feature called Watch Lists. By creating a Watch List, patrons will receive an email or text message when an item is added to the library's collection that matches any of their Watch List terms. Items include books, audiobooks, and DVDs. New items can then be requested as a reserve.

Any library patron with an email address and password saved to their library account can set up Watch Lists. Once logged in to ShoreCat, click on the blue "My Items" button in the upper right corner of the screen. Select the "Interests" tab, click "My Watch Lists," and then "Add" to set up a new Watch List term. Not only can Watch Lists be added for authors, series, or subjects, but they can also be set up by material type, such as audio, book,

or video.

Alternative-

ly, Watch List terms can be added while searching in ShoreCat and while logged into a patron account. When viewing the full details of a particular item in the catalog, simply click on the eyeglasses icon next to the author, series heading, or subject, and a new Watch List will

be automatically created. There is no limit to the number of Watch Lists that can be created for each patron account and there are no fees involved.

If a patron's reading interests change over time, it is easy to edit or delete Watch Lists from the same screen where they are created. ESPL staff can also help to manage a patron's Watch Lists from the staff side of the library's circulation software if a patron is not comfortable doing it on their own.

# Sellard Named Expert Angler

"Mean Jean" Sellard earned her second Expert Angler Award in 2021.


Special recognition is given to anglers from The Virginia Saltwater Tournament who earn citation awards for several species of fish in a single year. Sellard's species included striped bass, tautog, black drum, red drum, speckled trout, and sheepshead. Anyone winning citation awards for six different species of fish in a single year automatically qualifies as a Virginia Expert Saltwater Angler. The angler receives a certificate and a specially designed patch to mark his achievement.

The Virginia Master Angler Program recognizes the accomplishments of anglers over longer periods of time. This award is based upon the cumulative number of citations an angler earns over an unlimited period of time, starting in 1996 — the year the program began. To qualify, an angler must earn 25 citations in a minimum of five different species, with credit given for a maximum of one citation per species per year.

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
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
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## Keep Your Distance

Recently, I started a GoFundMe account. I did receive \$250, and that was


