# Accomack Supervisors Approve More Employee Bonuses

County employees who were not included in a prior decision to give bonuses to first responders will receive one in their Dec. 15 paycheck, after the Accomack County Board of Supervisors approved a resolution to that effect Wednesday.

The bonus applies to all full-time and part-time employees of the county and to social services employees other than first responders, who already were approved to receive a bonus.

The bonuses will be \$1.25 per hour for hours worked from Jan 1, 2021, to Sept. 30, 2021, with a maximum of \$1,500.

The cost is \$318,678, with \$157,874 of that coming from federal American Rescue Plan Act funds the county was allotted.

The board also in a separate vote approved including the county administrator and the county attorney in the bonuses.

The board also directed County Administrator Mike Mason to have staff look into the cost of giving bonuses to employees of county-affiliated commissions, boards, and agencies.

Mason said some inquiries from those entities have been received.

**Financial Report** 

Major county revenues were up just under 4% in the first quarter of fiscal year 2022 compared to the prior year, according to Finance Director Margaret Lindsey.

Local sales tax was flat for the quarter and communications sales tax, which funds the 911 Commission, continued to decline.

Landfill tipping fees were down compared to the prior year's first quarter, likely in part because bad weather in August 2020 caused a spike in trash and debris coming into the landfill.

Building permits were up sharply in the quarter, bringing in nearly \$140,000, compared to around \$71,600 in the first quarter last year.

The rainy day fund as a percentage of the general fund went down in FY2021, coming in at 13.5%. For 2022, the budget only allows for a contribution of just over \$64,000, meaning the downward trend will continue unless more money is committed, according to Lindsey.

Supervisor Crockett noted no funds have been taken from the rainy day fund; the reduction in the percentage is due to the total budget going up.

# Accomack Sheriff Investigating Shooting Death of Daugherty Road Woman

#### Staff Report

A 38-year-old woman was found fatally shot at a Daugherty Road residence Nov. 10, according to Accomack County Sheriff Todd Wessells.

The sheriff's office received a report at around 11:06 p.m. of a gunshot vic-

tim in the 22000 block of Daugherty Road near Accomac.

When deputies arrived, they found the victim, Chikira Antrice Fletcher, of Daugherty, unresponsive. She was pronounced dead at Riverside Shore Memorial Hospital. The body was transported to the Norfolk Medical Examiner's Office to determine the cause of death.

"We've got to get that to a certain point so we that can operate for a couple of months" in case of a major emergency, said Supervisor Donald Hart, who is the county's emergency services director.

Hart asked staff to look into "where is our path to get back on track with that" during future budget preparation.

#### **Federal Funds for Tourism**

Accomack County is receiving \$260,000 in federal funds for tourism recovery, Mason told the board.

The money, which comes through the American Rescue Plan Act, must be used for tourism marketing and development.

The program requires the county to work with its three destination marketing organizations to come up with a plan to spend the funds.

The three organizations are the Chincoteague Chamber of Commerce, the town of Onancock, and the Eastern Shore Tourism Commission.

Half the money will be disbursed when a spending plan is approved, starting in January 2022, and half will be given on a reimbursement basis.

The money must be obligated by Dec. 31, 2023, and must be spent by June 30, 2024.

Mason, in consultation with Board of Supervisors Chairman Ron Wolff, asked the tourism commission to develop a proposal for how to allocate the money among the destination marketing organizations and towns and to oversee the spending plan that must be submitted to receive the funds.

The board of supervisors will be presented the proposal once it is developed.

#### **Tangier Flood Damage Assessment**

A team of eight, including from the Department of Public Safety, the Building, Planning, and Economic Development Department, and the Virginia Department of Emergency Management, among others, went to Tangier Wednesday, Nov. 17, to assess damage caused by a coastal flooding event on Oct. 29.

The information gathered will be Plan Act.

submitted to the state and used to determine if federal assistance can be provided.

Supervisor Robert Crockett was among those who went to Tangier. He said around 45 residences and some crab shanties were affected by the flooding.

"That day that it happened, we contacted them. We tried to get a declaration for Tangier, but because the state didn't have one, our hands were tied and we couldn't get one," said Supervisor Hart.

"It was a very bad situation. They had bad flooding they hadn't had for many, many, many years," Hart said.

Wolff said he had spoken with Tangier ferry captain Mark Crockett in Onancock and said, "He shared with me some of the impact from the island. The 1933 and the 1960 storms — he said the water was higher on this flood tide and wind than in either of those two storms."

#### Northern Wastewater Service Area Study Initiated

The Hampton Roads Sanitation District Commission on Oct. 23 approved initiation of a study of a northern Accomack wastewater service area.

"A group of stakeholders has been meeting ... including folks from the town of Chincoteague, the county, HRSD, and other folks," Mason said, adding, "The purpose of these meetings was ultimately to try to initiate a northern Accomack service area study."

The study will focus on evaluating strategies to address both short-term and long-term wastewater treatment and disposal needs in the northern part of the county.


It will look at demand, capacity constraints at existing facilities, disposal alternatives for treated effluent, environmental impacts, and permitting, Mason said.

#### Accomack Child Care Grant Program Delayed

Accomack County's program to award grants for child care startups or expansion, originally slated to begin in November, is delayed.

A January rollout is likely, according to Mason.

The grants will be made using federal funds from the American Rescue Plan Act.

# Shore Farmer Hops on Production of Beer Brewing Specialty Crop

Dixon Leatherbury, an Eastern Shore native, retired farm equipment dealer, and Northampton County supervisor, has been taking on the challenge of growing and selling hops since 2015.

Hops are the green, cone-shaped flowers of the hop plant – which is related to hemp and marijuana – and are primarily used to add stability and flavor to beer. That flavor may be bitter, citric, or zesty. Hops can also flavor other beverages and be used in herbal medicines and as a natural antibiotic.

#### History

Brewing beer or ale with hops dates back to ninth century Germany. Prior to that, blends of bitter herbs and flowers such as horehound, dandelion, and heather were used to offset the sweetness introduced to the brew by the wort, a mix of malted barley and yeast.

It was discovered that the hops' nat-

ural antibacterial properties kept beer and ale from spoiling; hops became popular in 19th century Britain because the ale brewed with hops could be shipped unrefrigerated to British troops in India. That was the beginning of the popular brew style known today as an India pale ale or IPA.

Hops were grown in Virginia as early as the 1600s, and Thomas Jefferson grew hops at Monticello.

#### Present

About 80% of U.S. hops production is in the Pacific Northwest; the rest is mainly in the Midwest and on the East Coast. The Eastern Shore is near the southernmost edge of the East Coast area in which hops are grown.

In northern latitudes, which get about an hour more of daylight in the summer, hop plants can grow up to 30 feet tall and yield up to 10 pounds of wet hops per plant – about four times as much as Leatherbury observes in his hop yard, he said.

His farm is working with North Carolina State University, which received




Cones form on hop plants in late June through early July. Photo credit: © Ievgenii Meyer/Adobe Stock.

a grant to breed a variety of hops that is better suited to the shorter summer days farther south.

Hops come in hundreds of varieties, divided into two main groups: bittering and aromatics. Varieties of hops that grow well on the Shore include Cascade (named after the Cascade mountains), Nugget, and Zeus.

Only female hop plants are grown on Leatherbury's farm in Machipongo. If male plants were introduced, they

would fertilize the female plants, producing seeds and lending an "off flavor" to the end product.

The higher demand for hops in recent years was driven by the increasing popularity of IPAs, the farm-to-table experience, and nano- and microbreweries, Leatherbury said.

The Shore has two microbreweries of its own – the Cape Charles Brewing Co. and Chincoteague's Black Narrow's Brewing Co. There are 32 microbreweries in Hampton Roads, including Big Ugly Brewing, in Chesapeake, which uses Leatherbury's hops.

#### **Pests and Threats**

Downy and powdery mildew are two types of common threats for hops, which are combated by spraying the hops with mildew killer every seven to 10 days, Leatherbury said.

Insects that are pests to hops include potato leafhoppers, Japanese beetles, and what Leatherbury calls his nemesis – two spotted spider mites. Pesticides can be applied to the hops to kill the insects before they damage or kill the plants.

Growing hops organically is possible but not economical, he noted.

#### **Growing Season**

Hop plants are dormant during

the winter, and edible shoots begin to emerge in March. The edible plant is available for such a short time it is considered a delicacy and can be served in a salad, cooked like asparagus, or pickled.

The hop plants become too bitter to eat once they reach about eight to 10 inches tall.

When the plants are tall enough, around late April or early May, they are trained to climb up strings made of coir, or coconut husk fiber, which are attached to trellises.

Three or four shoots per plant are chosen to wind around the string, and the rest are trimmed away. Training the plants and trimming are done by hand.

The shoots must be wound clockwise around the strings or they will unwind themselves, Leatherbury said.


New shoots that emerge later also must be cut by hand, but a chemical spray can be used on them after the hop plants reach 6 feet tall.


Burrs, which will grow into cones, begin to emerge in mid-May.

#### **Harvesting and Processing**

A large-scale harvester, bigger than a tractor-trailer, costs about \$1 million and can harvest about 200 hop plants per hour; Leatherbury uses a small-

scale harvester that was designed and built on his farm.

After the hop plants are harvested and the leaves and cones have been removed from the plants and separated, the cones are ready to be sold or processed.

The fresh, unprocessed cones are called wet hops because they have a moisture content of 70% to 75%. Wet hops must be used quickly, because they will spoil within 48 hours, even with refrigeration.

Beer brewed with wet hops has a "more dramatic, slightly grassier" taste, Leatherbury said.

Since hops are harvested in late August and early September, and it takes about six weeks for yeast to cause fermentation and produce alcohol, a beer brewed with wet hops will be ready just in time for Oktoberfest, he added.

Hops that are not used wet must be dried at a low temperature – not more than about 125 degrees, or the batch will be ruined – so Leatherbury uses "a lot of air but not much heat" to dry the hops until they

have less than 10% moisture content.

When dried hops are refrigerated, they can last up to four months, and when they are also vacuum-packed, they can last up to 18 months.

Dried hops can be processed into pellets, which can last two years or more and are preferred by brewers because the pellets are much easier to use.

After a brew has fermented in a steel tank, if hop pellets were used,

the plant material will have sunk to the bottom, making for easy cleanup. However, whole-cone hops contain leafy material that floats to the top of the tank and must be skimmed off.

Most pelletizers heat their contents to 190 or 200 degrees. A special pelletizer is needed to process hops, and there is only one in Virginia. That machine was unavailable this year, so Leatherbury shipped hops to New York to be pelletized,

and he looks forward to finding more economical ways to transport the hops.

Starting a hop yard with several hundred plants is "not a hobby" and requires patience. A newly planted hop yard will be about 20% productive in the first year, about 50% to 60% in the second year, and about 80% to 90% by the third year, Leatherbury said.

Establishing a hop yard costs about \$15,000 per acre, and there are ongoing costs for labor, fertilizer, and other supplies.

One acre can be planted with 1,000 hop plants, which will yield around 2,500 pounds of wet hops or 750 to 800 pounds of dried hops (about 3.5 pounds of wet hops will make one pound of dried hops), Leatherbury said.

Wet hops sell for around \$5 to \$10 a pound, and dried hops sell for around \$15 to \$20 a pound. If hops farmers can get top dollar for their crops, their yards can potentially bring in \$15,000 per acre every year.

Growing hops is "plenty of work ... but it is fun," Leatherbury said. "I have met more delightful folks – brewers are really a different lot. ... They think outside the box, and they're fun to be around."

# Ridge Road Paving Tops Chincoteague Street Priorities

The Chincoteague Town Council at a meeting Thursday, Nov. 18, discussed paving roads in the Ocean Breeze development.

The state highway department has not yet approved including 10 roads in the development, at the southern end of Chincoteague, in its urban maintenance program. Approval would allow funds from the program to be used to pave the roads.

At this point, the town's request would not be approved, if it is, until June 2022, according to Town Manager Mike Tolbert.

Of the 10 roads, the priority is to pave Ridge Road as it extends through the development from Beebe Ranch to South Main Street at Capt. Bob's Marina, according to a memorandum to the council from Tolbert.

The Public Works Committee at a meeting Nov. 2 recommended using town money to repair and pave that portion of road prior to highway department approval, at a projected cost of \$78,629. The committee asked Tolbert to develop a plan to include the cost in the current year's budget.

Tolbert recommended funding the project from the general fund using additional revenue that has come in from meals and transient occupancy taxes.

Council member Denise Bowden made the motion to use town money to repair and pave the road, saying, "It needs to be done."

The measure passed unanimously. The town will let Ocean Breeze residents know about the plans to improve the roads there, likely by letter, signs in the construction area, and via social media.

"I would like to see that done. Communication with the residents down there is key to making this all work," Bowden said.

The town still intends to include Ridge Road extended, along with the other nine named roads, in its request to VDOT to add the Ocean Breeze roads to its urban inventory, according to Tolbert.

The Town Council voted in May 2021 to accept ownership of the 10 roads and to request VDOT to add them to its inventory.

VDOT denied the request for this year but the town is preparing to resubmit the application for consideration for the fiscal year 2023 grant.

The owners of T&W Block Inc. announced that the company has been acquired by Chaney Enterprises.

T&W Block, a ready-mix concrete, masonry, and aggregate materials company in Onley, has been in business for 64 years as a family-operated business.

The company also has a barge terminal in Onancock.

Chaney purchased T&W Block from President Genevieve Walker and her sister, Chief Financial Officer Wendy Walker.

The company was started by their late father, Bobby Walker, in 1957.

"We are happy to see that legacy continued by another family-owned company," Wendy Walker said Monday. Walker thanked the company's customers, community, and vendors for their support over the years.

"We appreciate all of the customers we have had in the past 64 years of business and (are) so excited about the updated equipment, technology and

benefits Chaney has to offer to our employees and this community," a Nov. 11 post on T&W Block's Facebook page said.

Tammy Hill, who has been with the company for more than 35 years and currently is vice president of T&W Block, will serve as senior sales and service manager for the Eastern Shore of Virginia Division with Chaney.

Chaney will take over the business Dec. 1, according to Walker.

Chaney Enterprises is a family-owned concrete and materials company with 50 years in business.

"Customers will continue to be greeted by the same smiling faces and voices of all 25 TW Block employees. Sales, service and dispatching will continue to be led locally by Tammy Hill," according to a press release from Chaney Enterprises.

Walker said that, while she and her sister are leaving the business, all other current staff are staying in place, meaning there will be a seamless transfer of accounts and services, with the same products offered.

"We're excited that (Chaney) will be able to modernize our fleet and systems as well as (providing) greater benefits for our valued employees," Walker said.

"As an already successful business, we look forward to supporting the TW Block & Concrete family and joining them with our team. Together, we can continue to provide excellent services and products to Accomack and Northampton counties while working to enhance local communities," said Francis "Hall" Chaney III, chief executive officer for Chaney Enterprises.

Chaney's acquisition of the barge terminal in Onancock will increase the company's opportunities to barge construction materials into the Hampton Roads area, according to the release.

The company owns three other terminals — the Chesapeake Barge Terminal in Chesapeake, Va., the Sussex Barge Terminal in Seaford, Del., and Waldorf Rail Terminal in Waldorf, Md.

The acquisition of T&W Block is Chaney's second expansion in less than a year into Virginia's Eastern Shore.

The company acquired three Branscome ready-mix concrete plants and a barge terminal in August.

Chaney announced in August it was acquiring Branscome plants in Chesapeake, Oak Hall, and Nassawadox.

The assets included the operations of the Chesapeake Barge Terminal, also known as the Branscome Dominion Yard.

Chaney operates in three states as a construction material supplier. The company started in the 1960s in southern Maryland.

Since the early 2000s, the company has grown in its service area; with acquisitions of Howlin Concrete, Rowe Materials, and PCS Concrete, it reaches customers as far east as Ocean City, Md., as far west as Bealeton, Va., and north to Baltimore, according to the company website.

In addition, Chaney Enterprises in 2018 announced a retail venture called BuilderUp, formed with the merger of Dunkirk Supply and The Concrete Store.

The merger allowed Chaney to start operating two retail locations and one manufacturing location in southern Maryland.


Chaney, headquartered in Gambrills, Md., operates more than two dozen ready-mix concrete plants, nine sand and gravel facilities, and three BuilderUp locations.

The acquisition of T&W Block marks Chaney's seventh expansion in Virginia, according to a press release.

#### Artists Paint Conservation Lands in 'Paint the Shore'

The Virginia Eastern Shore Land Trust (VESLT) held its biennial Paint the Shore event this fall and mixed it up by inviting student artists from Nandua Middle School to participate.

"Paint the Shore is an opportunity to foster partnerships and community connection through art and land conservation," explained VESLT Executive Director Hali Plourde-Rogers.

A group of 13 artists spent the last month painting on conservation lands under easement with VESLT, culminating in a Nov. 12 reception and art exhibit that ran through Nov. 21 at the Historic Palace Theatre and Lemon Tree Gallery, in Cape Charles.

The artists had the opportunity to paint on conserved lands that are not usually open to the public, and through the exhibit "the community could engage

with the artists and with the conservation lands depicted in their work," Plourde-Rogers said.

Paint the Shore is a plein air event, meaning paintings are done outdoors in natural light. The term plein air comes from the French phrase "en plein air," which translates literally to "in the open air."

A new addition to the program this year was participation by eighth grade students at Nandua Middle School.

It was Plourde-Rogers' idea to contact Nandua Middle School art teacher Sarah Clark, who was a Virginia Art Education Association teacher of the year in 2020 and is known for art-based community outreach.

The student participants included Ian Lewis, William Norman, Jaqueline Diaz-Salamanca, Chris Lopez-Perez, Kymani Walker, Nicolette Edwards, Jazyiah Byrd, Luis Gomez-Lopez, Jordan Maldona-

# Nonprofit Railroad Group Asks Governor To Investigate ANTDC

An organization that opposes the removal of Eastern Shore railroad tracks has asked the governor to investigate the local public body that has oversight.

In a Nov. 22 letter, New York, Philadelphia & Norfolk Railroad Resurrection Ltd. Secretary Roger Malik requested that Gov. Ralph Northam open "an immediate investigation into unethical, and likely illegal, conduct of public business by the Accomack Northampton Transportation District Commission (ANTDC)."

The ANTDC's purpose is "facilitate the planning and development of transportation systems ..." according to Accomack County's website.

The crux of the complaint is the secrecy with which Canonie Atlantic conducts its business. Members of the ANTDC board — including six supervisors, three from each county — form most of the governing body of Canonie Atlantic Co., owner of the railroad infrastructure on the Eastern Shore. The company's meetings are often intertwined with those of the ANTDC, with short ANTDC business meetings that adjourn into Canonie Atlantic board meetings. Business meetings of the ANTDC are conducted publicly, while Canonie's board meets privately.

Under Virginia's Freedom of Information Act, government entities must conduct business in the open, although they may go into closed session to discuss certain matters, such as litigation.

"In practice, the commissioners of the ANTDC and directors of Canonie consistently, meet as one group, act as commissioners and regulators, then, minutes later they switch roles, and become owners of the (mis)regulated railroad company," Malik wrote in his letter. "Conversely, Canonie directors constitute all participants in the meetings of ANTDC. Both groups function as the same entity."

Members of the Canonie Atlantic board are Accomack supervisors Donald Hart, who chairs the board, Reneta Major, Jackie Phillips, and Ron Wolff; Northampton supervisors Oliver Bennett, Dave Fauber, and John Coker; Spencer Murray; and John Sharpley, whose business, Coastline Chemical, of New Church, is a customer of the portion of the railroad still in operation.

Members of ANTDC are Hart, Wolff, Major, Fauber, Coker, and Bennett, with VDOT employee Linda Balderson as an ex-officio member.

ANTDC is the sole shareholder of Canonie Atlantic.

Malik said when his organization contacted the Virginia attorney general's office, he was told, "Our reaction would be to defend the ANTDC against your allegations."

A spokesperson for the AG's office did not confirm or deny Makik's assertion but, instead, suggested directing questions to the county attorneys for Accomack or Northampton counties.

Office of the State Inspector General Communications Director Kate Hourin said her office had received a complaint about ANTDC in July, but closed the case because it was involving county supervisors, which put the case outside of her agency's realm.

"NYP&N is becoming more personal and outrageous in its accusations against ANTDC and its leadership," said Canonie Secretary Murray.

"No Eastern Shore citizen that understands the railroad's recently-faced challenges and the progress made should take NYP&N or their accusations seriously," he added. "The accusations against ANTDC and Canonie leadership are false."

Malik would not speculate on the likelihood of the governor ordering the investigation Malik requested. "I'm going to try to remain open-minded," he said. "I'm doing my best and so is all of my staff. All of us here at NYP&N are hoping that the governor will respond and will press an investigation, and if that investigation shows that Canonie has been co-opting a public process to their benefit, I hope their charter is pulled."

Northampton County Attorney Beverly Leatherbury said the issue was litigated in the 1990s in circuit court and the arrangement was deemed "perfectly acceptable, perfectly legal."



#### Accomack Gets More Wi-Fi Hotspots

The majority of Accomack students are attending school in person five days a week for the first time since COVID-19 hit in March 2020, but Accomack County Public Schools is continuing its work to ensure its students get the internet access they need at home to complete their schoolwork.

Technology Services Coordinator Jack Bowden updated the school board Nov. 16 about the Accomack schools Wi-Fi hotspot program, which provides free hotspots to qualifying households of Accomack students (those with no internet access).

In July, ACPS applied to purchase 400 Wi-Fi hotspots through the American Rescue Plan's Emergency Connectivity Fund, which is run by the Federal Communications Commission and administered by the Universal Service Administrative Company.

The application was approved in September, and the devices were ordered in October and received this month, Bowden said.

There is a limit of one hotspot per household, and the home must have a Verizon wireless account with 4G mobile broadband service and unlimited data. The hotspots are compatible only with Verizon, Bowden noted.

If a parent is unsure if their wireless service is compatible with the device, he or she may take one home, and if it doesn't work, the parent must return the device within 45 days.

The hotspots are ready to go and have been tagged and entered into the ACPS inventory management system.

Setup is simple. After a battery is installed and the device is turned on, it will pick up a cellular signal and begin downloading setup data.

The Emergency Connectivity Fund will cover the cost of the hotspots and one year of service, which began Nov. 21.

Bowden told the school board that if ACPS wants to continue to offer the hotspot service to students after one year, the school division must pay \$15 a month per device – that's \$6,000 a month or \$72,000 a year for 400 devices.

After the first year, ACPS will not be bound by a contract and may continue the service on a month-to-month basis.

Bowden has inquired about receiving service only from September to June, but he has not yet received a response.

Since the program pays a perdeer processing fee, the organization asks donors to consider donating larger-bodied deer. Processors have the right to refuse any deer donation that has not been field

# Hydro-drone Team Wins \$25,000 in Entrepreneurial Competition

A group of local college students who have formed Earth Systems Management LLC, led by Joseph Betit of Pungoteague, won second place and \$25,000 in the recent Philip E. and Carole R. Ratcliffe Foundation Shore Hatchery entrepreneurship competition in Salisbury, Md.

Held in person for the first time since 2020 due to COVID-19, this semester's competition also marked the opening of Salisbury University's new Dave and Patsy Rommel Center for Entrepreneurship at SU Downtown. Some 13 applicants from throughout the Mid-Atlantic competed for their share of \$100,000 in prize money.

Jesse McCaleb made the presentation that demonstrated the firm's capability to provide near-shore, shallow water environmental and bathymetric mapping services and production of hydro-drone systems, as well as marine infrastructure inspections, and change monitoring for environmental projects, aquaculture crops, and other areas. Also in attendance at the presentation were Lucas Antunes

and Betit. Unable to attend due to taking exams at college were Joslyn Herold, Dade Walker, and Phillip Le.

"Everyone participated in putting the project together," said Betit. "They are experienced at working together on-site or at a distance."

The drone built by the team has the capability to measure flow, salinity, and temperatures of the waterways it covers and would be of use to environmental scientists, aqua farmers, and marine engineers.

"We have developed our own hydro-drone technology design with good GPS and sonar mapping performance plus 360-degree cameras but at a consumer cost point level," said Betit.

As a winner in the Shore Hatchery competition, Earth Systems Management LLC will be provided with a free office for six months in the Downtown Center for Entrepreneurship starting in January 2022. Two business mentors have also been assigned.

The office includes use of the meeting rooms and the presentation area, highspeed internet, and use of the Makerspace containing 3D printers and CNC cutters.

The Philip E. and Carole R. Ratcliffe Foundation Shore Hatchery program established was with an initial \$1 million contribution in 2013. In 2017, the Ratcliffe Foundation announced a second \$1 million gift to continue the Shore Hatchery through spring 2023. It is administered through SU's Franklin P. Perdue School of Business. Its goal: to fund entrepreneurs


and have new businesses opening within six months, with the potential of employing three or more within three years.



# Accomack County Circuit Court

The case against 26-year-old Antoinette Waneta Satchell, of Onancock, charged with the attempted second-degree murder and malicious wounding of a Keller man, was continued so a psychological examination could be performed.

Defense attorney Brandon Matthews made a motion for a continuance to determine if Satchell is competent to stand trial. Satchell was present for only the first hour and a half of the four-hour preliminary hearing in July. Matthews said Satchell did not want to hear the testimony and was returned to her cell. He said she needed to be evaluated.

Judge W. Revell Lewis III ordered the evaluation and continued the case until Feb. 3, 2022.

Commonwealth's Attorney Spencer Morgan had no objection but said he wanted to know the results as soon as possible so he could proceed with the case earlier if Satchell is found competent.

This case involves the March 6 attack on 63-year-old Ray Barnes. At Satchell's preliminary hearing, Barnes testified that Satchell came to his house with a man he did not know to sell him drugs. He said he bought crack cocaine from them and smoked it that night.

Barnes said he awoke at 2:30 a.m. and saw Satchell standing on his porch. He opened the door and she came inside. Soon after, the man came through the door with an aluminum baseball bat and began hitting Barnes. Barnes said he was struck in the head and fell to the floor. He said Satchell got a fillet knife from his kitchen drawer and began stabbing him and demanding money. He said he heard the man tell Satchell to "go to the car and get the gun."

Fearing for his life, Barnes said he was able to get the bat and hit his at-

tacker. He said the pair took his wallet and left. He said he was able to get to a neighbor's house using the baseball bat as a crutch. His friend saw him injured and covered in blood and called 911. Barnes was airlifted to a Norfolk trauma center.

Satchell is also charged in the murder of Onancock resident Brian Daley, a crime that took place the following day.

Kenneth Corneal Birch Jr., 51, of Saxis, was sentenced to three years in prison for his convictions on 14 charges, including grand larceny, destruction of property, and four counts each of stealing checks and the forgery and uttering of those checks.

Defense attorney Brandon Matthews said his client had an addiction problem for 28 years.

On the witness stand, Birch said he wanted to get away from drugs. He said he has been diagnosed with mental health issues that contribute to his problem. "I'd rather be dead than use again," Birch told the court.

"He has a history of petty theft, nothing violent," Matthews told the court. He asked that his client be given no active jail time.

"Since 1989, there are 85 charges in your criminal history," said Judge Lewis. "You have been down this road several times." He sentenced Birch to a total of three years active jail time with considerable time suspended. He will be given credit for the year and nine months he has already served. When released, Birch will be on supervised probation with a zero-tolerance policy for the use of alcohol, illegal drugs, or marijuana.

Jay Anthony McGlown, 29, of Accomac, in a plea agreement with the commonwealth, pleaded guilty to the unauthorized use of an automobile.

According to the terms of the agreement, adjudication will be withheld for one year. If the restitution of \$6,500 is paid by Nov. 17, 2022, McGlown will be convicted only of a misdemeanor and will receive a suspended sentence.

The incident occurred in July of 2020. McGlown was socializing and drinking with the owner of the car. He took the car without her permission and wrecked it, said Commonwealth's Attorney Morgan.







Under the terms of the agreement, McGlown is not have contact with the owner of the car in addition to paying full restitution. The agreement stated also that this crime will not violate McGlown's probation on another conviction.

Bernadette Yvette Mills, 42, of Melfa, was sentenced to two years with all but 30 days suspended for a violation of her probation.

Mills pleaded guilty in April to larceny, third or subsequent conviction. A man who had just been shopping in the Onley Food Lion realized he must have left his wallet there. The store's security footage revealed that he dropped the wallet after paying for his groceries and it was picked up by a woman who put it in her cart.

The woman was later identified as Mills, said Assistant Commonwealth's Attorney William Fox. She said the wallet contained no money and said she threw it away. The wallet did contain money, said Fox, though the owner was uncertain as to the exact amount. Fox said Mills had numerous previous larceny convictions.

Jeb Brady, at Bailey's Bait & Tackle in Cape Charles, said the recent fishing action has slowed with the falling water temperatures. He reported there are still a few trout around, but he believes that the majority of the fish have moved on. Being cold-blooded, the fish also don't feed as actively in the cooler water. Brady said there are still some puppy drum on the seaside out of Oyster, but their numbers are also dwindling. Rockfish numbers are on the increase, particularly the smaller schoolie-sized stripers in the bayside creeks. A few keeper-sized stripers have been reported, though most are just under the 20-inch bayside minimum size limit. Brady said the larger fish, including the trophy-sized cows, should start to show up soon with the falling water temperatures. He addedd that the offshore wrecks are loaded with nice-sized sea bass.



# Random Facts About ... Thanksgiving Dinner, Strange to Some, Dangerous to Others

When we opened our internet tubes for cleaning this week, we got a bellyful (!) of information about the dishes people serve, or used to serve, for Thanksgiving.

In the 1930s, gelatin became popular in cooking as a cheap way to add color and variety to meal choices made meager by the Great Depression. General Foods published "The Greater Jell-O Recipe Book" in 1931. You could have Jell-O with tomatoes, with prune juice and cooked prunes, with canned corned beef, with radishes and scallions, and

with all manner of fruits. Some of these gelatin dishes (thankfully, not the corned beef Jell-O) became Thanksgiving staples — Jell-O molded fruit salads, for example. You'll find the tin molds, doughnut-shaped for fresh fruit to be stacked in the middle, in the way back of your kitchen cabinets.

Sometimes Jell-O was/is added to ambrosia salad, a Southern dish with coconut and oranges and, depending upon your family traditions, all manner of extra ingredients. If ambrosia isn't sweet enough to make your glucose top the charts, you can always try candied sweet potatoes with marshmallows on top: sweet potatoes, butter, brown sugar, white sugar, cinnamon, nutmeg, vanilla extract, melted marshmallows.

If you're having Thanksgiving in Baltimore, don't be surprised to find sauerkraut as a Thanksgiving side dish. In New York and New Jersey, a nice Italian dish like manicotti might be on the Thanksgiving table.

And when it comes to dressing (if your tradition is Northern or Midwestern, you probably call it stuffing), get ready to have your mind and stomach blown. In New England, you'll frequently find clams and oysters in your dressing/stuffing. In some parts of Pennsylvania, the dressing/stuffing is called filling and it's made with potatoes. In addition to a bread base, the following ingredients have found their way into Thanksgiving stuffing/ dressing: corn chips, popcorn, plantains, pepperoni, cranberries — and, of course, a deboned chicken that has been stuffed into a deboned duck that is then stuffed into a turkey: your classic turducken.

To stuff or not to stuff? Back in the day, as in ancient times and also just a decade or so ago, dressing was almost always stuffed inside a turkey, which got baked that way. Delicious but concerns about food-borne illnesses became widespread as overstuffed turkeys tended not to cook thoroughly, which contaminated not only the turkey meat but also the stuffed-inside dressing. Recommendations became that you cook the dressing separately and let the open-cavity bird cook by itself.

If you simply must have dressing that's been stuffed, the USDA recommends using USDA or state inspected pre-stuffed frozen turkeys, which have been prepared under controlled conditions. The catch: you're supposed to cook these turkeys frozen, not thawed out, and that could add from four to seven hours of baking time to your Thanksgiving duties.

If you're a danger junkie, you can deep-fry your Thanksgiving turkey. This has become a tradition, starting in Cajun country and becoming popular throughout the USA. A fried turkey is delicious and avoids a major complaint about baked turkeys, that they are dried out. But lowering a raw turkey into a vat of boiling oil is asking for trouble. Annually, that trouble adds up to five deaths, 60 injuries, and more than \$15 million in property damage to almost 1,000 homes. One major problem is that people don't follow proper oil displacement procedures to guarantee that the turkey you're easing into the oil does not cause the oil level to overflow the container and ignite when it reaches the oil's heat source. If this happens outside, on a grill, the burning oil can be a huge mess. If it happens in your kitchen on the gas stove, the result is likely to be devastating.

The other major problem occurs when someone lowers a frozen turkey into boiling oil. The result: explosion!

Assuming your turkey doesn't have salmonella (thaw it out in the fridge and make sure the cooked meat's internal temperature reaches 165 degrees Farhenheit) or explode and burn down your house and assuming you stay away from equally lethal discussions of politics — your Thanksgiving dinner should be an absolute delight.





# Sheriff Doughty Issues Warning to Be Vigilant About Holiday Scams

With the holidays upon us, Sheriff David L. Doughty Jr. wants to remind you to stay vigilant against scams. The Northampton County Sheriff's Office recently received complaints advising that people were told they would go to jail if they didn't pay a fee over the phone. The callers even portrayed themselves as a deputy with the sheriff's office. In some cases, the number that is displayed on your caller ID could be spoofed and will be the actual number of the business or agency.

Sheriff Doughty asks that if you are unsure who you may be talking with, hang up and call the Northamp-

ton County Sheriff's Office directly at 757-678-0458. "Our deputies encourage you to verify who you are speaking with," said Doughty. "Our dispatchers work 24/7 and would be happy to answer your call. No law enforcement officer is going to contact you on the phone trying to collect money for fees or fines."

The scammer may already know a lot about you or the person they're pretending to be. They may know your name, where you live, and other information they could have found on social media sites or by hacking a family member's email, and sometimes they simply guess. But they al-

ways say that you need to pay right away by wiring money, sending a money order, or paying with gift cards or reloadable cards.

According to the Federal Trade Commission, here are other tactics scammers use in fake emergency scams:

- The scammers usually present themselves as an "authority-figure," like a lawyer, police officer, or doctor. They think it makes them sound more convincing.
- The scammers say it's urgent and that you're the only one who can help.
- They will tell you it's important to keep it secret. They tell you

that because they don't want you talking to other family members and friends who will likely realize it's a scam.

Scammers play with your emotions. They're counting on you to act quickly to help your family or friends and they're counting on you to pay without stopping to check out whether there's really an emergency. If you get a call like this, you can be sure this is a scam.
