Republicans Sweep Commonwealth's Top 3 Offices

Businessman Glenn Youngkin won the race to be Virginia's next governor in his first run for public office.

Republicans also won tight races for lieutenant governor and the attorney general, giving the party the top three state offices.

Winsome Sears won the lieutenant governor's seat with a 2% margin over Democratic challenger Hala S. Ayala, making Sears the first woman of color to hold a statewide office.

Jason S. Miyares bested Democratic incumbent Attorney General Mark Herring by a margin of 1.3%

The races were closely watched and was widely viewed as a bellwether for the 2022 midterm election.

"Alrighty, Virginia, we won this thing," said Youngkin, speaking to supporters in Chantilly, Va.

"For too long, we've ... been expected to shelve our dreams, to shelve our hope, to settle for low expectations," Youngkin said. "... We will be a commonwealth of high expectations."

Terry McAuliffe congratulated Youngkin in a statement Wednesday morning conceding the election. "I hope Virginians will join me in wishing the best to him and his family." Incumbent Del. Rob Bloxom will return to Richmond to represent District 100 in the Virginia House of Delegates, garnering 57% of the vote to challenger Finale Norton's 43%.

In a call with the Eastern Shore Post, Bloxom attributed both his win and Youngkin's to "good policy and a good campaign.

Bloxom also thanked campaign volunteers. "My campaign is 100% volunteers," he said. "Rob's Mob did a great job helping me get elected."

Accomack Results

Accomack County voters were strong supporters of Bloxom, where he captured 65% of votes.

Races for other top offices saw about the same level of support for Republicans in Accomack County, with about 60% voting for GOP candidates.

Parksley voters chose Janice Benton Welch and Carol E. Matthews to fill the unexpired terms of Dana Bundick and John Carter Parks, both of whom resigned in January.

K.J. Savage was elected in an unopposed race to fill an unexpired term on Chincoteague Town Council.

A narrow majority of Northampton County voters chose the Republican candidates for state offices on Election

Day, including candidate for governor Glenn Youngkin, according to election results released by Northampton County voter registrar Terry Flynn Tuesday night. "Northampton voted well, and we saw some competitive races," Flynn said. Turnout was 55%, about 5% higher than the historical average. "Our (Continued on Page 2)

Youngkin beat Democrat and former Virginia Governor Terry McAuliffe in Northampton, 2,640 to 2,571, a difference of 69 votes.

Republican candidate for lieutenant governor Winsome Sears received 2,663 votes compared to Democrat Hala Ayala's 2,538 votes, and Republican challenger for attorney general Jason Miyares received 2,617 votes compared to Democratic incumbent Mark Herring's 2,573 votes.

Republican incumbent Del. Robert Bloxom, who has served in the Virginia House of Delegates since 2014, outpaced his Democratic challenger, Finale Norton, in a vote of 2.871 to 2.348.

John Coker retained his District 1 seat on the Northampton County Board of Supervisors, defeating challenger and Eastville police major Robert Stubbs, 762 to 603.

District 2 Supervisor David Fau-

ber was ousted by challenger Ernest Smith, who received 531 votes compared to Fauber's 280 votes.

District 3 Supervisor Oliver Bennett, an incumbent, ran unopposed and retained his seat with 586 votes.

All three candidates who ran for the Northampton County School Board won unopposed.

Elizabeth "Liz" Jones had been selected by the school board last spring to fill the seat vacated by Randy Parks, who resigned in March, until an election could be held. Parks served at large but Jones ran in District 1 and received 1,135 votes. District 1 school board member and current chair, Maxine Rasmussen, did not seek re-election.

Helene Doughty, with 660 votes, will join the school board, representing District 2. Current District 2 school board member Paul Bibbins did not run for re-election.

Jill Bieri ran for the at-large school board seat vacated by Parks, and Bieri received 3,678 votes.

District 3 school board member Stephanie Castro did not seek re-election, and no one ran for her seat, but 176 write-in votes were received for the District 3 opening on the school board. The winning write-in candidate was Betty Borden with 116 votes.

Two of Northampton's incorporated towns each elected one new Town Council member: in Cape Charles, Ellen O'Brien beat Herb Thom in a vote of 391 to 224; in Cheriton, Brian Sparrow ran unopposed and received 172 votes.

About 55% of Northampton County's 9,542 registered voters participated in the state election, and nearly 32% of voters participated in the local election.

Updated election results are expected to be released Friday, Flynn said.



Eastville Council Hears Two Sides to Policing Issue

Eastville's police department and town officials continue to be scrutinized by citizens, but none so publicly as Stuart Oliver, who has lived in Eastville for 32 years and regularly attends and speaks at Town Council meetings.

But at least one person who more recently moved to Eastville has spoken publicly in support of the police department, after a photo was published in the Eastern Shore Post Oct. 29 of a uniformed Eastville police officer placing Republican-candidate election campaign signs in front of the Northampton County voter registrar's office in Eastville.

David Suda introduced himself at the Eastville Town Council meeting Nov. 1 as a former Virginia Beach police officer who moved to town with his wife about two years ago.

He said it's "not fair" to say East-ville police officers earning \$100,000 a year are getting "too much money." He implied that complaining about their wages is like complaining about the price differences between McDonald's and Ruth's Chris Steak House, and Eastville police officers are highly qualified and deserve the higher-than-average pay.

Suda also asserted that Eastville police officers are not writing "too many tickets" and they wouldn't be able to write so many tickets if so many drivers weren't speeding down Route 13 at 70 mph or more.

He explained how the Eastville Police Department won him over after he moved to town about two years ago.

Eastville had been hit by a hurricane or another major storm, and Suda was removing debris from his driveway at 11:30 p.m. one night, when Maj. Rob Stubbs and Mayor Jim Sturgis saw him and offered to help, giving him extra flashlights and checking on his family, he said.

"That's something that, I'm kind of embarrassed to say, I would have never done for anybody in Virginia Beach. This is a more community-oriented place, in my opinion, and that's kind of when I realized this is a great place to live."

Stubbs "knows me by my name. I couldn't even tell you five people that I knew when I was working as a police officer, nor did I care to know them. ... But they (Eastville officials), in my opinion at least, for whatever it's worth, they do care," Suda said.

"Mistakes do happen," he said, referring to the incident last week in which an Eastville police officer, identified as Linwood Christian by Oliver, was photographed in uniform on public property, placing election campaign signs for Republican candidates, including Stubbs, who ran for the District 1 seat on the Northampton County Board of Supervisors.

"It's very easy to armchair quarterback," Suda said. "So, let's just say a police officer in this town does something that, well, is newsworthy – cringeworthy – but, at the same time, how many of us have actually had that experience ... whereas now, it's Monday morning. I can read about it, be like, 'Oh, they should've done that."

But Oliver disagreed. "This isn't Monday morning quarterbacking. This happened many times. Why do you think somebody was sitting in the bushes with a camera?" he asked, referring to his teenage son, Patrick Gordon Oliver, who took the photos of Christian placing the signs.

Stubbs had told the Post via email that Police Chief David Eder "does know that some of us put out signs on our own time and it is approved."

But according to a Northampton County Sheriff's Office monitoring system, Christian had been "at work for almost two hours into a full shift and was on the clock. ... This does not add up," Oliver asserted.

Other complaints he made about the Eastville Police Department included its recent hiring of a new of-



ficer, who lives in Virginia Beach; the costs of the police officer's travel to work, including gas, tolls, and vehicle wear, are paid by the town of Eastville, Oliver said.

The officer was issued a police GMC Yukon SUV, which he is permitted to park at the south toll plaza of the Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel when he goes home at the end of the work day, Stubbs previously confirmed.

Oliver noted that criticism of Stubbs is a "sensitive matter" due to a recent death in his family and asked, "I wonder how many bereaved transients hurrying through East-ville with family emergencies have been met with compassion within our town limits? I'm sure many were sent home with tickets written by Eastville's finest."

"I have been advised that I am a hater and anti-police because I have dared to criticize the salaries and activities of the top brass," he said.

Oliver added that 32 years ago, an active business within Eastville town limits, such as Kitchen Sync (a catering business run by his wife, Louise Oliver, in the historic Eastville Inn owned and leased by Northampton County) "would have been appreciated and supported. Now town leaders furtively sneak around in secret meetings to oust the lower performing food and beverage cash cows. It's all about the money," he claimed.

Oliver told Town Council members, "Ultimately it is the responsibility of the Town Council to oversee the operation of the town's finances and activities. You have allowed several individuals to hijack the operation of this locality for their own personal enrichment and have sold out any semblance of honor and integrity in the process."

He said, "I have been advised by Mr. Stubbs through various media outlets that he is praying for me. I neither want nor need Mr. Stubbs' prayers. He should get his own house in order. It is my personal observation that your acting police chief has a major problem with the truth."



School Divisions Get Creative in Filling Substitute Teacher Positions

Both Accomack and Northampton County Public Schools are struggling to find substitute teachers amid a waning COVID-19 pandemic, with each school division applying a different strategy to address the issue.

The Accomack school board had previously approved a new substitute pay scale that would take effect Jan. 1, 2022.

However, "none of the board or any of us could have really anticipated the labor shortage which is driving hourly rate wages up from 15 to 20 dollars at places like McDonald's or Walmart," said Director of Human Resources Clara Chandler during the Oct. 19 Accomack school board meeting.

The demand for substitute teachers has increased as more school staff have been required to quarantine for COVID-19, and some substitutes are "fearful on returning to school," she added.

Accomack schools have used the third round of the American Rescue Plan's Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief funding to hire new permanent substitutes, instructional assistants, and student support monitors.

Many of the new hires were offered placement on the substitute list, "rightly so ... but we're basically robbing Peter to pay Paul," Chandler said.

The Accomack school board on Oct. 19 approved the new substitute teacher pay scale to take effect two months early, Nov. 1.

Accomack substitute teachers pay previously started at \$66.50 per day. but that was boosted to \$90 per day for a substitute teacher without a college degree.

A substitute teacher with a bachelor's degree will earn \$105 per day, up from \$90 per day. A teacher who has retired from Accomack County Public Schools will earn \$135 per day to substitute.

Substitute teachers who work four days a week for a month will receive a monthly bonus of \$150.

No experience is necessary to apply to be a substitute teacher.

The Northampton school division also has been struggling to find substitute teachers, even though it already has a competitive substitute pay scale: \$84 per day for a substitute teacher without a degree, and \$100 per day for a substitute teacher with a degree.

Long-term substitute teachers in Northampton schools earn more: \$105 per day without a degree and \$125 per day with a degree. (A teacher absence of 10 days or more is considered long-term.)

Many of Northampton's substitutes are being placed in long-term assignments due to teachers quarantining for COVID-19 or taking maternity leave, said Chief Financial Officer Brook Thomas during the Oct. 28 Northampton school board meeting.

There are about 50 names on the substitute list this year - about half as many as usual - and many of them are cafeteria substitutes, she said.

Northampton schools have resorted to unconventional strategies for getting substitutes, such as paying extra to salaried teachers to cover half or whole blocks during their planning periods.

One drawback is that those teachers have to spend time after school planning lessons, Thomas noted.

So far this school year, there have been more than 150 half- or full-day teacher absences that were not covered by substitute teachers but by internal staffing, she said.

The solution Thomas proposed is contracting the recruiting, training, and placement of substitute teachers with the ESS educational staffing firm, which is headquartered in Tennessee and works for 13 Virginia school divisions.

ESS would work on a "fee for service" basis, meaning the firm would be paid only for each successful substitute teacher placement. Thomas estimated the annual cost to Northampton schools for the service would be about \$33,000.

Substitute teachers recruited by the firm would be employees of ESS, not NCPS, and they would be eligible for benefits and incentives not offered by Northampton schools.

For example, substitute teachers hired by ESS would be eligible for health insurance benefits. Currently, there is no circumstance in which an NCPS-employed substitute teacher could become eligible for health insurance.

ESS offers incentives to employees who accept certain jobs or refer other substitute teachers to the firm, and it pays employees every week instead of every two weeks.

ESS also will be able to use retired teachers living in Northampton County to assist with substitute teacher training.

Teachers and substitutes will continue using Northampton's current absence management software, Frontline, formerly AESOP. The service can be accessed online or by phone.

Northampton school employees currently use Frontline to complete tasks such as entering absences and uploading lesson plans for substitutes.

Substitutes can use Frontline to view and accept available work assignments and view their schedules.

Superintendent Eddie Lawrence added that another benefit of the ESS service is that assistant principals will spend less time finding and contacting substitute teachers.

The Northampton school board voted unanimously in favor of obtaining the services of ESS.

Northampton School Board OKs Extra Planning Time for Teachers

The Northampton school board on Oct. 28 unanimously approved giving teachers extra time every month to take a break from the classroom and catch up on administrative tasks such as planning and grading student work and calling, emailing, or meeting with parents.

That extra time will take the form of a two-hour early dismissal for students on the second Wednesday of every month, starting in December.

"For the teachers who are in the room, believe me, we understand how hard you're working and sacrificing," said Superintendent Eddie Lawrence.

"For the last two-and-a-half years, I could not have asked for a better staff, and I know you're frustrated at times, but I think this is at least a step in (the right) direction."

The school board will revisit the matter in January to determine if two early dismissals every month will be feasible.

Lawrence, who recommended the

early dismissal idea, wanted to implement it in November but decided starting it in December would give parents time to make childcare arrangements for the early dismissal days.

Laura Lembke, a veteran middle school science teacher, expressed her gratitude to Lawrence for his recommendation, which is expected to help curb teacher burnout.

"My baby teachers ... all the teachers that are younger than me, are taking sick days, and they're not taking sick days because they're sick. They're taking sick days because they need to catch up. They need to plan, they need to grade, they need to make those parent contacts," she explained.

New and veteran teachers alike have been unaccustomed to teaching full classes of students in person, five days a week. Last year, they saw most of their students in the classroom twice a week and taught them remotely twice a week. One day a week was reserved for custodians to do deep cleaning, and teachers used that time for the administrative tasks on which

they are now falling behind.

Considering that "plus a new curriculum, plus new pacing, plus new materials ... my baby teachers are struggling," Lembke said.

Sheri Noll, a high school English teacher, added that teachers also are adjusting to new block schedules.

Felicia Matthews, a parent of two Northampton students, said, "Our teachers are getting burned out and they're not feeling supported by administration." She was concerned that if the problem is not resolved, good teachers will quit.

Stephanie Zodun, another concerned parent, submitted written comments that were read into the record.

"I beg you to come up with a plan to give our teachers some breathing room this year. We will not just lose new teachers at our county, we will lose them from the profession. Our veteran teachers will leave as well. We can't let that happen," she wrote.

Zodun recommended reverting to a four-day school week for students, which would give teachers a whole day every week for planning lessons and contacting parents.

But Lawrence noted that would not be possible, as the Virginia Department of Education has been "adamant" about its requirement that the school year must include at least 180 days or 990 hours, and Northampton's school year already has been shortened due to construction at Kiptopeke Elementary School.

Students need to be in class as much as possible to recover the learning losses they have experienced during the COVID-19 pandemic, he added.

School board members were willing to approve the early dismissals if teachers would be free to use the extra time for whatever they need to do, not for professional development — which is already scheduled at other times.

Lawrence agreed. "I want the teachers to have their time. It should be a full work day, but they should have some time. ... I think it's time that could be well spent and put to use."

Man Accused of Rhatigan Murder Released on Bond

A judge set a secured bond of \$100,000 for Joseph Tykot, 58, of Painter. Tykot is charged with the 2016 murder of 41-year-old Eric Clifford Rhatigan, of Eastville. Rhatigan was found beaten to death in a field on Davis Road near Craddockville on June 16, 2016, said Commonwealth's Attorney Spencer Morgan.

Rhatigan's body was found by his former girlfriend, Susan Kelly Antrim. She identified his body and told police he was the father of her children.

Morgan said two recently smoked cigarette butts were found near the body. Tests showed one had Rhatigan's DNA and one had DNA matching that of Tykot. Morgan said the ground was disturbed in a way that suggested a scuffle had taken place. Morgan said Antrim had contact with the defendant the morning after Rhatigan was killed.

Kimberly Tykot testified that her husband has several health issues, including recent back surgery from which he has not yet recovered fully. She said he was not doing well in jail.

Billy Graham, of the Parksley area, said he has known Tykot for 15 or 20 years. He said he met Tykot when he hired him to do work on his house. He described Tykot as "a very good hunter." He said he had not seen him in six or seven years and did not know Tykot was a convicted felon. "I am here to support him," he told the court.

Defense attorney Garrett Dunham argued for bail, saying Tykot, a two-time convicted felon had no charges before or after his 1988 felony drug convictions. As reasons to allow bail, Dunham said his client had numerous heath issues that needed attention and that the case was five years old. He said Tykot had been in no trouble during that time.

Morgan spoke against bail for Tykot, noting the savage nature of the beating that killed Rhatigan.

Judge W, Revell Lewis III set bond at \$100,000 for Tykot and ordered him to be supervised by pretrial services. He told him he was to use no alcohol or marijuana and was to have no contact direct or indirect with Antrim who is expected to be called as a witness for the commonwealth.

A call to the jail confirmed that Joseph Tykot has been released on bond.

Baltimore Man Guilty of Breaking and Entering

Brandon Michael Expectacion, 32, of Baltimore, pleaded guilty to possession of cocaine in a June 12, 2020, incident. He pleaded not guilty and was tried in a bench trial for breaking and entering a dwelling house in the night-time and petty larceny in the same incident. He was found guilty only of breaking and entering.

Robert Hill testified he and his wife were watching television in their Trails End home at about 9 p.m. when someone began shouting and banging on their door. Hill said he got up and opened the door partially when the man who had been banging at the door pushed the door open and shoved him out of the way. He said the man who came into his home was sweating profusely and said, "Call the police, they are trying to kill me."

Hill told the court his wife ran outside in fear. He said the man appeared to be "in another world, under the influence of something." Hill said the man went into the kitchen and came back out waving a butcher knife. Hill

said he became frightened and left his house. He told the court he heard the man locking that door behind him.

When police arrived, Expectacion came out of the house voluntarily and was arrested. A search revealed a baggie of cocaine in his wallet. Hill said he went back inside and found his wife's purse moved with its contents scattered. He said a lockbox appeared to have been thrown against a wall.

Defense attorney Laurie Nield disputed the larceny charge, saying nothing was taken from the house. She said her client was fearful someone was trying to kill him and wanted to protect himself. "He was not in his right state of mind," she told the court. She questioned the defendant on the witness stand. He told the court he was having a paranoid episode. He said he had been diagnosed with paranoid schizophrenia and had, at times, been hospitalized for that condition. He said he had no intention to do harm to anyone.

Judge Lewis dismissed the larceny charge and found him guilty of breaking and entering. "This is a very serious matter," he said. "People were sitting in their house." He denied Nield's request for bond and remanded Expectacion to jail.

The case is continued for sentencing on Jan. 27, 2022.

Random Facts About ... the Origins of Halloween and Crazy Costumes

With Halloween over, we thought it was safe to open our internet tubes for cleaning this week but, as soon as we did, all kinds of Halloween facts came tumbling out.

Let's start with how this scary holiday got its start. The Celts lived about 2,000 years ago in what is now Ireland and England with some Celtic populations in France. A wild and wooly bunch, the Celts argued and battled among themselves as much as they fought invaders, most especially the Romans. The Celts sometimes went into battle with nothing more than a sword and a shield (and no clothing), and Celtic women also fought in wars and were as fierce (and muscular) as the Celtic men. One Celtic queen, Boudicca, led a revolt against Rome that massacred more than 70,000 Romans and their allies.

Halloween has its origins in a Celtic

autumn festival, during which the Celts would light fires and wear masks, many of them animal heads, to keep ghosts and bad spirits at bay. This and other pagan autumn festivals became linked with the Christian All Saints Day, which an eighth-century pope designated for Nov. 1. The day before became All Hallows (Holy) Eve ... Halloween.

The influence of the early Roman Catholic Church had people dressing up as saints and angels on All Saints Day, but some people still dressed as demons on the night before, Oct. 31. In the Middle Ages, some of these demon-dressers would go door-to-door asking for handouts in exchange for a song or dance — the first trick-or-treaters.

Our modern version of trick-or-treating emerged in the United States in the early part of the 20th century. By the 1930s, the practice was well established, but the treats given out were as

likely to be small toys, coins, and fruit rather than candy. In the 1950s, candymakers jumped on the trick-or-treat bandwagon, and as parents became concerned with treats being tampered with, the small, individually wrapped pieces of candy became the default treat to give out on Halloween.

In 1982, some nutcase contaminated Tylenol tables with potassium cyanide and then put the bottles of Tylenol on store shelves for unsuspecting people to buy. Seven people died as a result and the culprit was never caught. After that, fear of booby-trapped or poisoned Halloween treats became so overheated that some hospitals offered to X-ray trick-ortreaters' candy for needles and razor blades and some parents examined each piece of Halloween loot to determine safety, with fruit and homemade goodies often discarded as a precaution.

Early 20th century Halloween celebrations in this country often emphasized the "trick" part of trick-or-treating with young people defacing public buildings, setting fires, and creating so much criminal mischief that many places

called for a ban on Halloween. Although soaping windows and TP-ing trees still occur, the holiday was largely pacified by emphasizing it as an event for younger children. In some jurisdictions, teenagers are prohibited from trick-or-treating.

Costumes have also become kinder and gentler. In ancient Hallows Eve celebrations and even in American Halloweens of a hundred years ago, most costumes were demonic, terrifying, and representations of the evil spirits said to roam the earth on this one scary night of the year. More recently, kids have dressed up as princesses and comic book heroes. According to USA Today, the most popular costumes this year were witch, rabbit, dinosaur, and Spiderman.

Finally, there's the issue of when to celebrate Halloween. Although many holidays have been moved, for the sake of convenience, to nearby Fridays or Mondays, Halloween has for the most part been kept on its traditional Oct. 31 date. The exception is when Halloween falls on a Sunday, as it did this year. Jurisdictions in the Bible Belt, in Mormon Utah, and other places decreed that the Oct. 31 holiday would be celebrated on Oct. 30. Some explanations said the move was made because Halloween on Sunday would interfere with students preparing for school on Monday, but when Halloween falls on a Wednesday, for example, there doesn't seem to be a widespread effort to move the celebration to the previous or next Saturday. The real reason for not celebrating Halloween on a Sunday appears to be the holiday's emphasis on demons and devils, which conflicts with Christian values.

Maybe we need more trick-or-treaters dressing up as angels and saints.



Pickleball is the fastest growing sport in the country, and there is a growing legion of pickleball enthusiasts on the Eastern Shore.

Played on a 20' x 44' court that matches the size of a badminton court, pickleball combines elements of badminton, Ping-Pong and tennis.

"Think of it as a giant Ping-Pong court," said Mike Bono recently, as he was beginning a clinic at Eastern Shore Yacht & Country Club, where members have built a regulation pickleball court enclosed by a net.

Bono said pickleball is being played up and down the Shore. "There's a large group of players who play at Wachapreague almost every day by painting lines over a tennis court. On Chincoteague, they play in the community center on a tile floor, and Cape Charles has a court drawn over a tennis court. I know one homeowner who has built his own pickleball court in his yard, but other than that, I believe this is the only court built specifically for pickleball on the Eastern Shore of Virginia."

Bono, a public-school teacher who has coached various sports and has played tennis competitively, touts the many benefits of pickleball.

"Older players like it because there is less running than in tennis. It's also a happier game," said Bono, "because players are closer to together and there's more conversation. The volleys are longer because the ball is slower than in tennis and players have time to react. In tennis, if someone beats you, they say, 'Good game,' but in pickleball, they usually show you techniques on how to improve your game. It's also more casual than tennis. There's no proper attire—anything goes from T-shirts and shorts to workout clothes."

Like tennis, two or four players can play, using solid paddles and a perforated ball much like a whiffle ball. The net is hung at 36 inches on the ends and 34 inches at center, two inches lower than a tennis net.

The ball is served with an underarm stroke, and points are scored only on the serve, with the player or team first scoring 11 points and leading by at least 2 points being the winner. There is an area 7 feet from the net that is the non-volley zone or "kitchen," where the ball can't be hit before it bounces.

Bono was teaching the finer points of pickleball to six players at the first of two clinics on a recent Sunday at Eastern Shore Yacht & Country Club.

Tori Bloxom said the appeal of pickleball for her "is to get some exercise and see friends."

Her husband, Bob, who has played tennis throughout his life, said, "Now that I am 60, I like the fact there is less ground to cover in pickleball compared to tennis."

Eve Belote said she is not all that athletic, but enjoys pickleball. "I did not play tennis and never felt I had good hand-eye coordination, but I find I can play pickleball well enough to get enjoyment from the game while being with friends."

Julie Badger said couples and families can enjoy playing pickleball, which is as much a social time as it is an athletic endeavor.

Vince Passione, now 70, finds pickleball a good way to stay active and fit while not having to run as much as tennis demands.

His wife, Jo Anne, said, "I like the fact the games go rather quickly, and you can rotate partners and make up different teams."

Bono believes strongly in stretching before starting play. "You need to do some jumping jacks or leg pumps to get the muscles loose before jumping on the court and playing," said Bono.

Pickleball was invented in 1965 on Bainbridge Island, a short ferry ride from Seattle, Wash., when three fathers — whose kids were bored with their usual summertime activities — created the game.

They first used homemade equipment, improvising paddles from ping pong and a perforated ball, but as the game evolved, pickleball equipment was standardized.

"It's like any sport in that you can spend more if you want," said Bono. "My first paddle was \$20, and now I have one that cost \$120. You can feel the difference."

over the last part of the previous week made it difficult for most anglers to get out on the water, but when they did, they found a sizable population of fish remaining. Both trout and puppy limits were landed, with some trout qualifying for Virginia Saltwater Fishing Tournament citation awards. Louie said he was pleasantly surprised that flounder were still inside the Chesapeake Bay in good numbers, with fish landed on squid strips, Gulp, and live minnows off the concrete ships and along the bridge-tunnel. Hiding in the bottom structure along the same areas are tautog and sheepshead, which have been hitting crab and shrimp baits. Tautog fishing will improve as the water temperature continues to fall. The lower bayside piers are producing a mixed bag of undersized sea bass, spot, flounder, and speckled trout.

Jeb Brady, at Bailey's Bait & Tackle in Cape Charles, confirmed the current great speckled trout fishery in the lower Chesapeake Bay, describing it as "on fire." He said anglers were reporting limiting out on fish measuring 18 inches and longer. The fish have been aggressively hitting both soft plastics and hard baits, with fish stacked in the grass beds along the shorelines. The puppy drum fishery out of Oyster remains steady. Puppy drum were reported to have also schooled up in the bay, just off Cape Charles. Increasing numbers of

Dear Editor:

Efforts to decrease erosion and increase wildlife habitat, e.g., ruff grouse, on our farm during the late '70s early '80s started with consulting the local U.S. Soil Conversation rep. He was a young Delmarva native assigned to our district in West Virginia by the U.S. Department of Agriculture and a fine person to work with.

Recommendations included stopping cattle grazing on 30 steep acres, developing some springs to limit erosion, and planting of autumn olive (Elaeagnus umbellata, a shrub that produces huge berry crops), white pine, and switch grass.

The plan was designed and federally subsidized to limit erosion caused by cattle wallows and increasing the grouse population. The soil conservation office helped with the expenses and provid-

ed the trees and shrubs. We purchased switch grass seed. What a surprise, the autumn olive thrived, the white pine was devoured by the deer, and the switch grass didn't grow. Having developed springs and 500-gallon tanks for watering was/is great and throwing in a few gold fish an added plus. Erosion stopped, birds fed!

Autumn olive, a deciduous shrub native to Asia that has spread as an invasive species throughout the United States, is a different story. Autumn olive is clearly in view on the Shore and is invading. Observe as you travel Route 13 and look along the edges of the fauna for a light green shrub tree up to 20 feet high. In the spring, there are white flowers that emit a honey sweet aroma. Check out the invasion as you head toward Chincoteague on the right side from Wallops to the causeway marsh. Autumn olive fixes nitrogen in the soil and has inch-long sharp needlelike thorns.

Back to the West Virginia farm: upon retiring in 2007, my obsession was eradicating the autumn olive that had invaded the farm virtually everywhere frequent mowing didn't occur. Mechanical means of grubbing them out with a tractor bucket, digging out with a digger, and brush hogging were totally ineffective as they then just spread from the root everywhere. (Similar to crape myrtle). Gathering the shrubs and piling up to burn doesn't work either; they just will not burn!

The only thing that works is to cut them off low and paint the freshly cut stump with a mixture of Crossbow herbicide and diesel fuel and that had to be done within 30 minutes. Everywhere a bird "deposits" a seed a plant can thrive. This plant, although pretty and a heavy barer of eatable berries, will take over everyplace that doesn't get mowed. Our Onancock neighborhood has some prime examples. Please beware, autumn olive is a serious invasive species.
