Accomack a Finalist for Rocket Lab's Proposed U.S. Expansion

Accomack County is a finalist to be the site of a Rocket Lab facility that will support parts production, assembly, integration, and testing for the company's massive new Neutron rocket.

The company previously announced it will launch rockets from Wallops Island.

Gov. Ralph Northam announced Tuesday that Accomack is a finalist for the proposed expansion, which would result in 250 jobs being created on the Shore.

Rocket Lab senior communications advisor Murielle Baker said Tuesday the company is "not yet in a position to comment further on the Virginia or other site selection proposals, as Rocket Lab continues its competitive process to select the Neutron launch site, rocket production facility, and Archimedes engine test facility."

Baker said the company has "not established a definitive timetable for the site selection process at this time."


If Accomack County is selected, Rocket Lab, a private company founded in 2006, will expand to two launch pads on Wallops Island, one each for the Electron and the Neutron rockets.

Because of the Neutron's size — it's designed to be 131 feet tall and 23 feet

in diameter — large assemblies of the rocket are expected to be done close to the launch site chosen by the company in order to minimize logistical and operational costs, according to a press release.

"The prospect of Rocket Lab coming to Accomack is incredible for someone who grew up just a few miles from Wallops Island," said Northam, adding, "I used to love watching rockets take off when I was a kid. Years later, I'm excited to work with Rocket Lab to help create exciting new opportunities near my family home on the Eastern Shore. Wallops Island is one of just four major launch sites in the United States — and the only one located in the country's best state for business. I'm so proud of the work our Virginia team has done to get to this final step. I challenge everyone on the Commonwealth's team, and everyone at Rocket Lab, to get this project over the finish line — and propel Rocket Lab and Virginia's Eastern Shore to new heights."

The Virginia Economic Development Partnership worked with Accomack County, the Virginia Commercial Space Flight Authority (Virginia Space), and the General Assembly's Major Employment and Investment Project Approval Commission to secure

funding for the project.

A one-time \$30 million appropriation to Virginia Space to pay for the infrastructure and operational systems involved is proposed, subject to General Assembly approval.

The MEI Project Approval Commission approved up to \$15 million for site

improvements and construction of a building on a 28-acre parcel adjacent to Wallops Island.

Virginia Space purchased the property on Wallops Island Road, which was formerly a poultry farm, in 2021. Virginia Space will own the facility, which

Exmore Sewer Project in Northam's Last Budget for \$5M DEQ Grant Proposed budget also includes \$3.6M for Wachapreague sewer project

Exmore has the opportunity to receive \$5 million in additional grant funding from the Virginia Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) for the town's sewer project, which is included in Gov. Ralph Northam's proposed outgoing state budget.

Town Manager Robert Duer credited Congresswoman Elaine Luria for getting the \$5 million grant included in the proposed budget.

"She's the only politician ever been in my office that said she was going to do something and did it," he said during Monday night's Town Council meeting.

Luria had visited Exmore to discuss the sewer project with town officials and relayed their concerns to the governor, who included the necessary funding in his budget.

A total of \$68.6 million from the Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Fund has been proposed in the budget for five Virginia water and sewer projects, which also includes \$3.6 million for Wachapreague's sewer project.

The fund was established by the American Rescue Plan and may be used for water, sewer, and broadband infrastructure.

If Exmore receives the additional grant funding from DEQ, the town's sewer project will be fully funded without exceeding the town's \$5 million borrowing limit.

Exmore previously was approved for a \$3 million DEQ grant. If those funds could be combined with the additional \$5 million grant, that would give the town a total of \$8 million in DEQ grants.

Exmore also was approved for a grant of more than \$6.3 million from the U.S. Department of Agriculture Rural Development.

The grants combined with a USDA loan of \$3.2 million would give Exmore nearly \$18 million to spend, plus \$2 million in cash the town would provide for a contingency, Duer estimated.

He asked Town Council members to contact their state representatives - who include Del. Robert Bloxom and Sen. Lynwood Lewis – for the best chance of the General Assembly approving the \$5 million DEQ grant in pipe to the facility, Dukes said. the state budget.

"I implore you to call these people and tell them Exmore needs this help."

"I don't beg very often, but the worst thing can happen is we go to Richmond and somebody says, Well, Del. Bloxom, have you heard from Exmore?' and (if) he says, 'No. I haven't heard a damn word,' do you think we're going to get our \$5 million?" Duer asked.

If the Town Council is persistent in communicating Exmore's need to state representatives, "that will push us over the top," he said.

Director of Utilities Taylor Dukes presented the Town Council members with a draft wastewater connection ordinance for their review. A condition of receiving state funding for the sewer project is that every home and business in town must hook up to the new system.

Only Broadwater Academy will not be required to connect to the new system, due to the distance to the school and the excessive cost of running the

Every Exmore sewer customer must sign a wastewater user agreement, and each document must be notarized.

Exmore will be required to file more than 830 easements with Northampton County to allow town employees on private property when necessary to service the sewer system. The town will own the sewer pipes, the pump station, and the pole on which the control panel will be attached, Dukes said.

Town officials are anticipating some citizens will decline signing the wastewater user agreement – for example, homeowners who have recently made costly updates to their septic systems and don't want to connect to the sewer.

Exmore will need to condemn property or invoke eminent domain (a legal process by which a government takes private property for public use) if a homeowner or business owner refuses to sign the wastewater user agreement.

Everyone must be connected by July or August 2023, when the new system will be turned on. Dukes said.

will be leased to Rocket Lab, according to the proposal.

The Accomack County Board of Supervisors in July approved rezoning the property from agricultural to industrial use, as well as approving two conditional use permits required for the rocket production and testing facility.

"On behalf of Accomack County, I want to thank Rocket Lab for considering the county as the location to manufacture and launch the Neutron rocket," said Accomack Board of Supervisors Chairman Billy Joe Tarr. "This would be a tremendous opportunity for all involved and a huge economic boost for Accomack County. We hope to watch Electron and Neutron Rocket launches from Virginia Space's MARS Facility on Wallops Island in the near future," he said.

Accomack County Administrator Michael Mason called Tuesday "a very important day for Accomack County," saying, "Rocket Lab's proposed plans, along with the efforts of our partners Virginia Space, Virginia Economic De-

velopment Partnership, and NASA Wallops, would put the Commonwealth of Virginia and Accomack County in a position to be a leader in the aerospace launch and manufacturing industry. We look forward to the opportunity to welcome Rocket Lab and the future successes they would undoubtedly bring to the entire Eastern Shore."

Federal and state officials weighed in on the announcement, including Rep. Elaine Luria, who said, "The proposal to expand Rocket Lab USA in Accomack is an exciting opportunity that would bring 250 jobs to the Eastern Shore of Virginia and help to solidify Virginia's role as a national leader in the space industry. I am proud to support initiatives that will help create economic opportunities for the Eastern Shore."

Virginia Sen. Lynwood Lewis said, "Rocket Lab's new operation in Accomack County would be a game changer for the Eastern Shore and the Commonwealth, and even more economic activity would flow from this great project. We are thrilled that Virginia is a finalist for this expansion, and hope to build a lasting partnership with this

industry-leading company."

"I appreciate the hard work by all sides that have gotten us to this point as a finalist," said Del. Robert Bloxom, adding, "Rocket Lab would be a welcome addition to the Virginia Spaceport and Accomack County. I am sure with the great workforce and the infrastructure currently offered by NA-SA Wallops Flight Facility, Rocket Lab will choose to expand their operations on the Eastern Shore of Virginia."

Virginia Secretary of Transportation Shannon Valentine said the expanded partnership with Rocket Lab "would accelerate our shared mission to provide agile, responsive access to space."

"Through great collaboration among the Commonwealth, Virginia Space, NASA Wallops Flight Facility, and industry leader Rocket Lab, this proposal would continue to develop Wallops Island as a world-class launch site and a strategic national asset," she said.

Virginia Secretary of Commerce and Trade Brian Ball said the company's decision to expand its operations in Accomack County "would be a testament to the Commonwealth's position as anaerospace industry leader."

"This would be a huge win for the Eastern Shore and for all of Virginia, and we hope to build upon our strong partnership with Rocket Lab for years to come," he said.

Rocket Lab has not yet launched its Electron rocket, which is smaller than the Neutron, from Wallops Island.

The company is working with NA-SA "to secure all necessary agreements and certifications to launch from Wallops," according to the release.

Construction of Rocket Lab's launch complex for the Electron at the

Mid-Atlantic Regional Spaceport on Wallops started in February 2019 and the complex was officially opened in December 2019.

The launch complex is designed to support "rapid call-up missions," according to a release from the company at the time, which said "the ability to deploy satellites to precise orbits in a matter of hours, not months or years, is increasingly important to ensure resilience in space."

The launch complex includes a pad made from more than 1,400 cubic yards of concrete, a 66-ton launch platform, and a 44-foot, 7.6-ton "strongback," which lifts the rocket into launch position.

The company also built an integration and control facility at Wallops Research Park for processing payloads and Electron rockets before liftoff.

The Neutron is expected to be ready to launch in late 2024. It is designed to carry a 17,600-pound payload to low Earth orbit and also to be capable of supporting human spaceflight.

Rocket Lab was founded in 2006 and has launched numerous missions from its New Zealand site.

Headquartered in Long Beach, Calif., Rocket Lab designs and manufactures the Electron small orbital launch vehicle and the Photon satellite platform and is developing the Neutron 8-ton rocket. Since its first orbital launch in January 2018, Rocket Lab's Electron has become the second most frequently launched U.S. rocket annually and has delivered 109 satellites to orbit for both the private and public sectors.

The company's Photon platform was selected to support NASA missions to the moon and Mars and the first commercial mission to Venus, according to the release.

State courses are always free and





Northam Issues State of Emergency To Help Hospitals Address COVID-19 Overload

Gov. Ralph Northam issued an emergency order Monday intended to help Virginia hospitals address rising numbers of patients being admitted with COVID-19 and to support health care workers.

In what he said would be his final press briefing of around 70 briefings his administration has held about COVID-19 since March 7, 2020, Northam announced the order, which declares a state of emergency and which took effect Monday, Jan. 10. The order expires Feb. 11 unless it is amended or rescinded before then.

"It has been a long 22 months for all of us," Northam said, noting, "We're not built for this kind of uncertainty for this long."

Northam's successor, Governor-elect Glenn Youngkin, takes the oath of office Saturday, Jan. 15.

Northam said the order is in response to the record number of hospitalizations Friday due to COVID-19.

The duration is based on a Univer-

sity of Virginia model that predicts the latest coronavirus surge will peak in the next few weeks.

"Health care workers and hospitals are exhausted, and they are again facing increasing numbers of patients, affecting their ability to provide care," Northam said. "These steps will help ease the strain, giving medical professionals more flexibility to care for people. Ultimately, the best thing everyone can do for our hospitals and their staff is to get vaccinated."

"Without the state of emergency, the hospitals have a very strict set of guidelines that we have to follow," said Riverside emergency physician Dr. Todd Parker in a Riverside Health Systems social media post. "This gives us some flexibility to get creative in how we're gonna see and care for these patients."

Northam said as of Monday, Jan. 17, he will be rejoining those ranks, returning to his previous job as a pediatric neurologist in Norfolk.

The order says the state health commissioner may authorize increases in licensed bed capacity at hospitals and nursing homes, waiving normal licensing requirements, to respond to the increased demand.

The order includes 20 separate provisions to address hospital bed capacity, staffing shortages, and vaccine accessibility.

Among them is that health care workers licensed by another state, and in good standing, under the order are deemed to be licensed to provide care of the same type in Virginia facilities during the 30 days.

The order also allows for telehealth services and says licensed practical nurses may administer the COVID-19 vaccine without supervision of a registered nurse or a doctor during the period.

It also authorizes experienced physician assistants to practice without a written supervisory agreement and increases provider-to-patient ratios.

It also broadens the settings in which licensed health professionals may give the vaccine and provides certain liability protection to health care workers during the state of emergency.

Nearly 90% of Virginia adults have received at least one dose of vaccine.

Virginia ranks in the top 10 most vaccinated states, according to Northam, who said the vast majority of people being admitted to the hospital have not been vaccinated against COVID-19.

More than 3,500 patients in Virginia are currently hospitalized with COVID-19, and ICU hospitalizations have more than doubled since Dec. 1, according to a press release about the order.

Cases on the Eastern Shore have exploded. As of Wednesday, the Shore was averaging 122 new daily COVID-19

cases (seven-day average) and two new COVID-19 hospitalizations.

Northam noted that, while the omicron variant appears to be causing less severe symptoms overall, it is more highly transmissible than previous variants, resulting in more people becoming ill and being hospitalized.

Sentara Healthcare in Hampton Roads reported a 300% increase in COVID cases in just 10 days, according to Northam.

The number of COVID-19 patients on ventilators in Virginia as of Jan. 10 was 314, compared to 146 on Dec. 1.

Northam noted Ballard Health in southwest Virginia last week reported 97% of its COVID-19 patients on ventilators were unvaccinated.

The release urged Virginians to take these steps:

- It's a good idea to stay away from people who have not gotten their shots.
- It's a good idea to wear a mask when you're around other people, especially if you don't know whether they have been vaccinated.
- If you have not gotten a booster shot, now is the time to do it. Shots are widely available at pharmacies, doctors' offices, and local health departments all across Virginia.
- If you have children age five and above, now is the time to get them vaccinated. This will make it easier and safer for them to go back to school.
- If you have chosen not to get your shots, you need to wear a mask and practice social distancing — to protect yourself and other people.

COVID-19 Surge Forces Operational Changes

As COVID-19 case numbers surge. with peak hospitalizations expected in early February, area health care providers are making operational changes to keep up with demand.

Eastern Shore Rural Health is rescheduling appointments for nonurgent care — such as physicals and routine chronic care appointments — to free staff for telemedicine visits with patients who have COVID-19 symptoms.

"Most existing nonurgent, preventative, and routine chronic care appointments currently on the books at Eastern Shore Rural Health through Friday, Feb. 11, will be rescheduled until after March 1," said Amy G. Bull, director of communications and development for Rural Health, in a Tuesday afternoon email.

Shortly thereafter, TidalHealth, in Salisbury, Md., formerly Peninsula Regional Medical Center, announced it had transitioned into "crisis status" for the first time in the hospital's 125-year existence.

Crisis standards of care protocols are put into place when there is a need to extend the availability of key resources, while also minimizing the impact of shortages on clinical care.

"The health system is experiencing occupancy levels never seen before coupled with tremendous lengths of stay, making managing the volumes of patients very challenging," said Roger Fallebout, TidalHealth director of strategic communications, in a press release. "The situation has been and continues to be serious not only within TidalHealth but at hospitals across the nation."

Before declaring the hospital in crisis status, TidalHealth had already taken steps to reduce admissions by postponing nonurgent surgeries requiring an overnight hospital stay and the hospital "continues to evaluate all nonurgent surgeries."

In crisis status, TidalHealth will keep in place its no visitation policy at both hospitals and will also continue to relocate, as necessary, members of its team to different areas and units of patient care where they are most needed and can best benefit patients and staffing requirements. Additionally, wait times may be increased for services, in particular in emergency departments.

TidalHealth continues to the public to only use the emergency departments at both hospitals for life-threatening issues. People with less severe illnesses or injuries should see their provider or visit one of the many immediate or urgent care facilities on Delmarva.

As of Wednesday afternoon, Riverside had not made any operational changes.

"... As part of our COVID-19 strategy we monitor cases and make decisions on a daily basis to ensure the safety of patients, team members and our community at large," said Riverside Shore Memorial Hospital President Nick Chuquín. "Our facilities are focused on minimizing impacts to patient care while continuing to operate with an abundance of caution as we have during previous surges."

Are Short-Term Rentals Compromising Affordable Housing?

When Northampton supervisors approved short-term rentals in any zoning district by right nearly three years ago, none predicted that renting out homes to tourists would reduce the availability of affordable housing to residents, but that may now be reality, a concerned citizen has suggested.

Exmore business owner and local resident Ken Dufty sent a letter to Northampton's board of supervisors and planning commission Jan. 4, detailing his personal experience with selling two homes he had previously rented out.

After more than a decade of owning and renting out two single-family dwellings, Dufty and his wife, Mary Dufty, "decided it was time to get out of the landlord business shortly after COVID-19 hit us all in the early months of 2020," he explained.

Both tenants had found homes better suited to their needs. The Duftys spent several months remodeling the former rental properties before selling them.

During the remodeling, they were approached by two dozen or more people who asked the Duftys if they would consider another stint as landlords.

Many of the prospective renters were being displaced from their homes because their landlords wanted to sell the houses or convert them into short-term rentals.

Several who were on "limited budgets" and couldn't find proper housing were living out of their cars or planning to do so, Ken Dufty wrote.

Yet some offered to pay monthly rent up to \$300 more than Dufty would normally charge, and they wanted multiyear lease agreements.

"What we heard drove home the point, at least in our minds, that Northampton County appeared to be in an affordable housing crisis that seemed to us to be flying under the radar," he said.

Following suit with other localities and adopting stricter regulations for short-term rentals could simultaneously address the impact on affordable housing and reduce the number and severity of nuisances to neighbors:

- Northampton currently allows short-term rentals by right, but requiring a special-use permit means neighbors would be notified when an application is made for a short-term rental, and their input would be considered during the permitting process.
- Northampton prohibits short-term rentals in structures that aren't dwellings as defined in the county zoning ordinance. Other localities allow only a primary residence to be used as a short-term rental and require the homeowner to be on the premises during a guest stay in one or more rooms.
- Northampton allows three people per bedroom in a short-term rental. Other localities allow only two people per bedroom; however, they also allow a maximum of two additional people to accommodate couples with children.
- Northampton limits parking for short-term rentals to one space per bedroom plus one additional space. Other localities require on-street parking to be directly in front of the rental home, not in any neighboring parking spaces.
- Northampton's noise ordinance applies to short-term rentals, but other localities require that neighbors are provided contact information for one or more persons who will be available 24/7 to respond to nuisance complaints and other issues that may occur during the rental period.
- Northampton requires the payment of business license fees and transient occupancy taxes for shortterm rentals. Other localities impose fines on persons who advertise their homes as short-term rentals without the properties being licensed, taxed, and regulated as businesses.

Additional restrictions that localities have imposed on short-term rentals include:

- Prohibiting the short-term rental of an entire house or apartment.
- Requiring minimum spacing, such as 1,000 feet, between short-term

rental homes so they cannot occupv an entire block.

- Limiting the number of days per year that the home may be used as a short-term rental, such as 60 or 90 days.
- Requiring minimum stays of three to five days to lessen the frequency with which new guests arrive.
- Requiring an insurance liability policy of \$500,000 to \$1 million for a home used as a short-term rental.

Dufty noted that many of Northampton's short-term rentals may be in the county's incorporated towns of Cape Charles, Cheriton, Eastville, Nassawadox, and Exmore, which impose their own rules and regulations on businesses.

However, there also may be shortterm rentals in more rural, unincorporated areas like Jamesville, Silver Beach, Smith Beach, Oyster, Willis Wharf, Bayford, and Weirwood, which are subject to county oversight, Dufty said.

He concluded a county ordinance that "more reasonably regulated this commercial use as opposed to the very lax and permissive (short-term rental ordinance) now on the books ... could be used as a model for those localities which do not have comprehensive legislation and therefore could be contributing to ... the loss of affordable and much-needed workforce housing."

Betsy Mapp, the newly elected chair of Northampton's board of supervisors, said the county planning commission will examine the issue of shortterm rentals in its upcoming review of Northampton's zoning ordinance.

The planning commission will make recommendations for amending the zoning ordinance, and the board of supervisors will have the final say on which amendments are adopted.

"The issue of short-term rentals was something none of us were familiar with, and back when it was granted as a by-right use, I believe that no one had considered the negative aspects of it, but that's just my personal opinion of it," Mapp said.

"Now that we have seen that shortterm rentals are impacting the availability of permanent housing, that's one reason why we're taking a second look at it."

Planning Commission Hears Concerns About Townhouse, Energy Projects

Accomack County planning commissioners will continue discussing two projects in the northern part of the county next month, after hearing concerns about both during public hearings at the planning commission's Jan. 12 meeting.

All four hearings — two about a proposed townhouse development near Captains Cove and two about an energy storage facility in Wattsville — were continued to the commission's Feb. 9 meeting, when additional comments may be heard and commissioners may ask for more information from the applicants before deciding whether to recommend approval to the Accomack County Board of Supervisors.

A crowd of Captains Cove residents came out for two hearings about CCG Note LLC's proposal to build 142 townhouses on land near Captains Cove in Greenbackville.

All 18 speakers were opposed to the project.

CCG Note LLC is requesting to conditionally rezone 24.41 acres, the former Hastings/Mariner farm on State Line Road, from residential to village development and has applied for a conditional use permit to build a 142-townhouse and commercial mixed-use development there.

The property is surrounded on three sides by Captains Cove.

Water and sewer service would be provided by Aqua's facilities in Captains Cove.

Speakers said the development does not conform to requirements of the village development district.

They also expressed concern about increased traffic on Captains Corridor and the added burden on the community's water and sewage facility.

Additionally, speakers said the remote location, 15 to 30 minutes away from stores and workplaces, is not the right place to build rental townhouses.

Most speakers pointedly referred to the proposed project as the Hastings Apartment Complex.

Mark Lambertson, who owns a home on Captains Corridor, said a traffic study showing no significant impact from the townhouses was done in winter, when many part-time residents are not there and there is less traffic.

The project "is a net negative to the growing Cove community," particularly when the developer has 1,200 lots

still to be built on in the Cove, he said.

Captains Cove resident Wayne Woodhams said the county requires central sewer service for such developments to be located on the property, rather than off-site, as Aqua would be.

The project "completely disregards" the county comprehensive plan's recommended density, said Cove resident Carol Gardner.

"The proposal is an urban development," and not in keeping with the pattern of single-family homes in the area, said Cove resident Steve Dochertv.

Resident Patricia Borrelli warned approval of the project could result in "an appeal to the Circuit Court."

"There's just too many unanswered questions" about water and sewer service, said resident Linda Reece, adding, "The current water quality is less than acceptable."

Several speakers mentioned "brown water" frequently coming out of their taps.

"I pay for it but I can't use it as it should," said resident Sarah Paplauckas, who said she does not drink the water.

She noted the planning commission did not recommend approval of planned urban developments proposed in the past in the Chincoteague Road/ Wattsville area.

Resident Theresa Burkhead submitted a petition opposing the development, signed by nearly 600 people.

Resident Theresa McKnight called Captains Cove "the gem of the waterfront communities on the East Coast," noting people from around the United States who bought homes there thought they were "buying into the Andy and Mayberry community, escaping from the hustle and bustle of the city, and in an environment where you do not have to lock your doors."

McKnight said the developer of the townhouse project also controls the Captains Cove homeowners association.

"The developer has a three-to-one vote on everything in Captains Cove, which is a total conflict of interest and not in the best interest of Captains Cove community," she said, adding, "Therefore, today, we come in numbers to protest this high-density apartment complex. ... It is finally our chance, as a community, to voice our opinion and facts without a three-to-one vote. I ask you, the planning board, why would you approve this high-density rental apartment complex in the middle of nowhere?"

Resident Bill Jones said, "This is really simple. Follow the money."

"I don't think this project is in the right location. It's being proposed with the idea of turning a profit; the profit isn't going to be earned by Accomack County residents, it's going to be brought back off to (the) Baltimore area," he said, adding, "I think this site was chosen because Aqua was available. Aqua's nearby. They can put in this project and don't have to worry about the water and the sewer — they can hook it up to Aqua, which they couldn't do in any other location. I don't know anybody who would want to rent an apartment in the middle of a potato field in Greenbackville."

Jupiter Power Energy Storage Facility Hearing

Seven speakers addressed a proposal by Scout Energy LLC, a subsidiary of Texas company Jupiter Power LLC, to build and operate a utility-scale battery energy storage facility in Wattsville.

The company applied to rezone for industrial use 11.6 acres now zoned agricultural near the intersection of Chincoteague Road and Fleming Road in Wattsville.

It also applied for a conditional use permit.

The facility if approved will be connected to and function alongside Delmarva Power's 69-kilovolt substation, which is across Chincoteague Road.

Nat Drucker, senior development manager for Jupiter Power, said the lithium-ion battery facility would be surrounded by a 16-foot wall which would serve as a sound barrier, as well as landscaping to screen it.

The facility will have a locked sliding metal gate and will be accessible only to Jupiter Power personnel and emergency responders, Drucker said, adding it will be remotely monitored 24 hours a day.

"It will be a very low-impact neighbor," he said.

Benefits include tax revenue to the county and an increase in local and regional power grid resiliency and reliability, according to Drucker.

Drucker said while this would be the first such project in Accomack County, there are more than 150 similar facilities operating around the United States, with 65 more under construction.

Energy storage facilities "are going

in an area zoned residential/agricultural to play a very big role in modernizing our power grid," he said, noting Virginia set a target of 3,100 megawatts of energy storage in the state by 2035.

> Speakers noted the land is surrounded on three sides by residences, including Dream Park, a mobile home park.

Laura Twiford, who with husband Ray owns four homes and a business adjacent to the property, said they have concerns about rezoning the land for industrial use.

"Should anything happen to this project — it gets decommissioned now we're sitting behind an industrial complex, basically," she said.

"I just want to make sure that what they say they're going to do is actually what gets done," Twiford said.

Tom and Sharon Davis also spoke as owners in Dream Park.

"They bought this property knowing that it wasn't zoned for what they proposed to do," said Sharon Davis. Addressing the commissioners, she said, "You're taking our rights, our property rights, and giving it to people who are coming here."

Tom Davis said of the company, "They are not part of us," and asked, "What economic benefit do they bring to the Shore?"

He said these types of facilities typically are built "away from people."

Noting he has 150 rental units within 1/2 mile of the property, Davis said he is concerned about noise.

"Please don't approve this," Davis said. He said renters of lots at the mobile home park were not notified of the plans.

"They deserve representation as well," he said.


Donna and Gary Garvey, who live on Chincoteague Road, said they only learned about the plans a week ago via a Facebook post.

Paula Alms, of Hansen Farm Road, around a mile away, said there is land better suited for the use, "not smack dab where families are."

Thomas Clark, of Justis Farm Lane in Wallops Island, noted noise concerns, citing noise already in the area from Navy aircraft carrier landing practice at the NASA base.

He noted a proposed residential development in the same area was opposed by NASA because it was in an aircraft crash danger zone.

"You up here on this board are our only defense against big money coming in and destroying our way of life," Clark said.

Northampton County Circuit Court Indictments



In Waning Days of His Administration, Northam Dedicates Expanded Wildlife Area

Gov. Ralph Northam joined dozens of land conservation advocates in an out-of-the-way forest glade near Greenbush Tuesday to dedicate an expansion of the Doe Creek Wildlife Management Area.

The event was his final public appearance on the Eastern Shore as governor, before his successor, Gov.-elect Glenn Youngkin, takes the oath of office Saturday.

Tuesday's event was held to celebrate the first closing on land being acquired for a major expansion of the Doe Creek WMA, which formerly included 447 acres composed mostly of upland pine and hardwood mixed forest near Onancock.

The event was held in a spot along Doe Creek Road.

The acquisition is associated with an Eastern Shore land conservation initiative targeting some 8,600 acres, according to Ryan Brown, Virginia Department of Wildlife Resources executive director.

Brown credited DWR staff members Becky Gwynn and David Norris with initiating the push years ago to acquire and conserve the land on the Shore.

"This, here, is forever. For generations to come, the public access that is available here, the habitat conservation, ... these are legacy items that will endure forever and ever for the benefit of all Virginians," Brown said of the WMA expansion.

Brown thanked Northam for his support of the DWR over the past four years.

"This governor is leaving office with a very strong record of wildlife conservation," Brown said.

Northam called the conservation initiative "a very ambitious goal — over 8,000 acres of forest land."

The initial acquisition celebrated Tuesday involves around 1,200 acres, according to Northam.

Speaking in the final days of his administration, Northam said, "I don't think there is anything more important that we can do when we are in positions like this than conserve properties like this," he said, adding, " ... It's important for our quality of life and it's also important

for our economy."

Northam noted the importance of agriculture, including forestry, and tourism to the Shore economy.

Secretary of Natural and Historic Resources Ann Jennings thanked Northam for making natural resource conservation "a top priority for your administration."

Jennings detailed the contributions of the many agencies involved in bringing about the WMA expansion.

"A land conservation initiative of this magnitude doesn't happen without an all-in approach from the conservation community," she said, noting no less than 12 organizations were involved in the multimillion-dollar project.

Federal grant programs were critical to creating "a funding quilt" of resources to make the expansion happen, according to Jennings.

"The diversity of funding partners is as important and sometimes even more important than the amount of funding that each partner brings to the table," she said, enumerating the contribution in dollars and effort of each entity involved: The Nature Conservancy, Ducks Unlimited, Wildlife Foundation of Virginia, The Conservation Fund. Atlantic Coast Joint Venture, U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service, American Bird Conservancy, Virginia Land Conservation Foundation, National Fish and Wildlife Foundation through Walmart's Acres for America Program, Virginia Outdoors Foundation, North American Wetlands Conservation Council Grant Program, National Coastal Wetlands Conservation Grant Program, Wildlife & Sport Fish Restoration Grant Program, the Virginia Department of Wildlife Resources, and a private donor.

"It takes a big village to do this project," Jennings said.

Karen Terwilliger, Board of Wildlife Resources member, noted more than 3.3 million people in Virginia participate in hunting, fishing, wildlife watching, and similar pursuits.

"There is no place where that is more evident than the Eastern Shore itself," Terwilliger said, adding, "The Shore has for decades been a destination for outdoor recreation."

The expansion of Doe Creek WMA offers new recreational opportunities to more than two million people who live within a 60-mile radius, according to Terwilliger.

Additionally, the acquisition provides natural marsh migration opportunities, she said.

Terwilliger said parking and informational signage will be installed at the newly acquired properties for safe public access.

Many of the tracts will be integrated into the existing Eastern Shore loop

of the Virginia Birding and Wildlife Trail and, where feasible, opportunities for bank fishing and nonmotorized boating will be provided, according to Terwilliger.

She noted wildlife-related recreation contributes \$3.5 billion annually to local economies in Virginia.

"We truly hope that these new parcels can provide new experiences that draw additional visitors and residents alike to discover this incredible, wonderful place, the Eastern Shore," Terwilliger said.





Random Facts About ... the Upcoming Saddest Day of the Year?

According to what came out of our internet tubes when we opened them for cleaning, this coming Monday — Jan. 17, the third Monday of the year — is the saddest day of the year. This Blue Monday was cooked up in 2005 by supposed experts who calculated that the third Monday in January represented a confluence of depressing events: letdown from the joys and visits of the holidays. Christmas bills coming due along with regrets over how much was spent, New Year's resolutions showing themselves as unkept, dark nights and dreary weather.

The good news is that the science

behind Blue Monday is largely a joke, based on a publicity stunt by Sky Travel in England to sell travel packages. The bad news is that while there's no proof that Blue Monday is the saddest day of the year, it is true that many people feel a mid-January letdown as we get back to regular routines, work, paying bills, and dealing with winter weather.

Mid-January is also the prime time for Seasonal Affective Disorder, a kind of depression that usually begins in the fall and deepens throughout winter. People suffering from SAD often feel listless or sad almost every day, have sleep problems, experience low energy but high craving for carbohydrates leading to weigh gain, and have in its blue behind. suicidal thoughts.

Fifty years of studies have shown, however, that actual suicides go down during the winter and then spike in spring and early summer. Experts aren't sure why this is the case. One line of reasoning is that people tend to hibernate from taking major actions in the winter, walling themselves off and hunkering down. Then, come spring, there's a renewed energy to do something, to get something done — even if that something is, unfortunately, killing yourself.

Spring might also represent a fresh start for the world, which depresses suicidal individuals even more as they judge themselves unable to enjoy or ineligible to participate in a new beginning. 
Before this all gets too depressing, let's find some reasons to celebrate January and give Blue Monday a boot
