Documentary To Chronicle Last Days of Inlet View Campground

A filmmaker who lived at Inlet View campground in the final weeks before residents had to leave after the property was sold to a developer is making a documentary about the storied community.

Amy Nicholson, a commercial director and documentary filmmaker based in New York City, spent time living in a camper trailer she and her husband purchased at Inlet View in the community's waning days, before residents

had to vacate the homes where some had spent their summers for decades.

Nicholson, a Baltimore native, grew up visiting Assateague Island National Seashore and as a teen worked as a waitress summers in Ocean City, Md.

About a decade ago, Nicholson took her vintage large-format box camera to Chincoteague during the off season, planning to make some photographs "of things that were closed for the season."

COVID-19 relationships with Cape Charles Christian School, Kiptopeke Elementary, and home-schoolers.

The goal will be to attract more children back to the garden for Thursday sessions of instruction and hands-on gardening.

The garden helps children appreciate fresh vegetables by having them grow to maturity, pick them, and help sell them at the group's farmers market, Goetkin said.

The group also emphasizes community spirit and uses the market to demonstrate math and other concepts.

Preliminary investigation found Veronica Dawn Milbourne, 61, driving a 2007 Dodge Nitro, was traveling north on Route 13 and failed to yield to the traffic signal at the intersection of Route 175, striking a 2020 Chevrolet Impala that had the right of way, ac-

cording to Virginia State Police spokesperson Sgt. Michelle Anaya.

Sheryl B. Lewis, 66, who was driving the Impala, suffered serious life-threatening injuries as did her 15-year-old passenger.

Lewis later died at the scene. Her pas-

senger was transported to Riverside Shore Memorial Hospital.

Milbourne suffered minor injuries and was taken to Riverside Shore Memorial Hospital. Charges will be forthcoming, according to State Police.

Police Investigate Fatal Shooting on Route 13 Near Accomac

State Police are investigating a fatal shooting near Accomac Thursday, April 28.

Police were called to the scene of a single-vehicle crash on Route 13 at the intersection of Front Street and Mary N. Smith Road.


The crash was reported at around 7:35 a.m., according to Virginia State Police spokesperson Sgt. Michelle Anaya.

When troopers arrived, they found a silver 2011 Ford Focus in the median, with the male driver suffering from a gunshot wound.

The driver, Dajon Trikece Wise, 25, of Fisher Road, Parksley, died at the scene

The Virginia State Police is reaching out to the community for any witnesses who were driving in the area of Route 13, in the vicinity of Front Street and/or Mary N Smith Road, prior to or after the incident, who may have information.

"I was just basically puttering and I wandered into Inlet View," as well as checking out Tom's Cove and Pine Grove campgrounds, she said, adding, "It struck me that there is such community in those places."

This was around the time the "tiny house" concept was starting to become trendy.

"It just stuck with me. ... I was laughing, thinking, 'These were the original tiny houses. There they are on wheels, but they never move. The people have added on and they have all these beachy decorations and crabs with their names on them and stuff. ... I was just fascinated with the sense of community," Nicholson said.`

The memory of Inlet View lingered with her and one summer, when she was between projects, she decided to rent a place there.

She and her husband also were looking for property in Accomack County to retire to, so Inlet View was a good home base.

"So I rented a cabin from Louise Tull the first year for about six weeks," she said.

The first evening they were there, she ventured out to see where the road led.

"These people were sitting in the yard, who turned out to be my neighbors, and they said, 'Who are you and and come in here and have a glass of wine and meet all of us.' And I was in love," Nicholson said, adding, "It was just magical. I consider myself sophisticated and I've traveled — but I'd never been to a place like that."

Soon thereafter she and her husband purchased a camper trailer on a lot on the water and moved in.

"I didn't film anything for quite a while because I wasn't sure what I was filming, but after the first year and a half, I just thought, wow, people look at this place as this kind of s--thole, honestly, and they have no idea what a beautiful community this is — and I'm going to make a portrait of this," she said.

So Nicholson bought a video camera.

"It was a new, small camera that could shoot 4K and so I had to wait quite a while for it to come in — and by the time it came in, we had gotten our letters saying the property had been sold, so I

filmed the very last summer. I filmed whatever time we had left," she said.

Independent campgrounds like Inlet View and Tall Pines Campground near Sanford, which was recently purchased by Sun Outdoors, "are so important to working-class families," Nicholson said.

The documentary, which is still being edited, opens with Inlet View residents telling stories about their first impressions of the place they called a summer home, in some cases for decades.

"There was a very deep appreciation for the beauty of that island," Nicholson said.

One woman had been coming there for 49 years, according to Nicholson.

"She was my age and she had been coming there since she was a child," she said, adding, "When you go to a place for 50 years, you're a little bit attached to it."

Nicholson conducted around 15 interviews for the film, working by herself because she didn't want to intrude on the residents at their time of upheaval by bringing in a film crew.

"If people were going to give me their trust, I wasn't going to break it by bringing more people into the mix. So I filmed it myself," Nicholson said.

"Sadly, some people had already packed up and left. ... People were leaving in the middle of the summer because they were so heartbroken," she said.

While the documentary's emphasis is not on the pros and cons of the property's purchase by a developer, residents did comment about it often.

"People made a lot of commentary about what was happening. I'm not including any of it in the film. I just wanted them to tell their stories and to talk about how they felt about the place," she said.

Still, in interviews people often told her the new campground planned for the property "is going to be very different because the type of campground that it's going to be, it's going to be almost more like a hotel. The family will come for a week and they'll enjoy their vacation and they will pack up and they'll leave — where the people there (at Inlet View) knew each other for forever and it was a very, very tight community, and that's a very different vibe."

Nicholson referred to another documentary she made, about the rezoning of Coney Island, "which resulted in a very corporate version of Coney Island, where the city of New York gave a sweetheart lease to a corporation that manufactures rides.

"I saw how the crazy quilt of operators and the guy with no teeth who lets your kid ride for free — I saw how that was ruined by a corporate view of what the value of the land was."

With the Inlet View project, Nicholson said, "I want people to see what the beauty of a noncorporate place is, when people are forced by either lack of income or just because, you know, it's kind of a rough place — left to their own devices, what they bring to the value of life is being a good neighbor; looking out for each other; if someone needs help, help them. You know, we're all in this together, so let's all have a potluck.

"And it really was like that. I'm not exaggerating when I say it was kind of a utopia in that respect. And that won't happen when people just come for vacation and leave a few days later."

Nicholson is passionate about preserving the unique character of places like Chincoteague.

"I hope I'm not too late. I saw what happened here in New York with the massive rezonings of the Bloomberg administration," she said, adding, "I can't argue that it's not nicer and there's less trash. It's all very pretty and it's all very nice — but it's sterile."

Nicholson said she understands the need for growth and revenue, but said, "It's a very slippery slope, because when Chincoteague becomes a Disneyfication of what people come there for ... when the individuality of that is gone, sure you're sitting on that spot, but you're not having the same experience.

"So, I'm fascinated with the value of the experience that people have when the place is not generated from whole cloth, when it develops over decades, and when the friendships and the memories are baked into the ground. ... There's so much value in that."

Before Nicholson left Inlet View for the last time, she tried to get as many names and phone numbers of former residents as she could, totaling around 125 families who she tries to keep updated on the film's progress.

Nicholson and two editors, Laura Israel and John Young, are in the process of editing the film as well as seeking grants to cover costs.

Nicholson said she considers "Happy Campers" as belonging to the for-

mer Inlet View residents and hopes to find a way to show the film to them first, once it is completed.

"They took the time to talk to me and let me film things in the midst of packing up," she said.


According to Bluewater Development's website, Sun Outdoors Chin-

Chincoteague Council Presented With Check for Brianna's Kindness Park

A representative from Team Brianna, Donna Leonard, made a presentation at Monday's Chincoteague Town Council meeting thanking the council for its assistance during the planning and creation of Brianna's Kindness Park and presenting the council a check for \$48,602.76, raised through fundraisers.

Team Brianna asked to remain involved in the planning process for the park as it nears completion and asked that the donation be earmarked to be used for projects already discussed for the park, including adding shade, a "hangout" section for teens, and a handicapped accessible area.

Team Brianna "would be happy to step up to the plate" should funds need to be raised for future projects, Leonard said, adding, "The town has done a commendable job on this project."

Downtown Murals Comment

Resident Patricia Farley during the public comment period said the idea of creating murals downtown, mentioned

at a recent council meeting, is exciting.

She was involved in numerous public art projects in Pittsburgh, Pa.

"What I want to encourage council to do is think about ways that you can bureaucratize the process of reviewing and approving murals," she said.

"We are blessed with an island full of artists and we have art everywhere. but we don't have a lot of art in the public realm," she said.

She noted two popular examples, the mural in Watson Park and the Misty statue downtown.

Farley said she was "thrilled" when she heard Mayor J. Arthur Leonard speak at a recent council meeting about revitalizing the downtown area.

"Artists and art always have a positive impact on economic stability. ... (Art) says to the community and to the visitors — particularly here — we love this town, this is our history, this is something that we value — and right now, downtown is in great need of some love. It does not look loved right now, for a number of reasons," Farley said.

She noted Princess Anne, Md., recently held a mural competition.

"Money is available. National arts organizations love murals and there is money avaiable. There are also buildings available; I know of two that would love to have a mural on them," she said.

To install murals downtown, some review process would need to be established, she said.

Town Wells Status

Town Manager Mike Tolbert reported that the latest test results from NA-SA Wallops Flight Facility for the filtration plant for the town's water show the water before treatment "still contains PFAS, five to 25 times the EPA advisory level for drinking water of 70 nanograms per liter." After filtration, all samples were lower than three nanograms per liter or undetectable, which means the process is working, he said.

The system has been in operation for nearly a year and has treated more than 38 million gallons of water.

The town's wells are on NASA property.

"As you know, NASA would like us to move our wells from their property," Tolbert said.

Proposed federal legislation would fund relocation of the town wells, providing up to \$14 million for the relocation over a five-year period. The legislation is pending before Congress.

The town purchased property south of the NASA Wallops main base and drilled some test wells there to see if it is a suitable site to locate town wells. Initial tests did not show the volume required to meet the town's demand.

Still, a geologist said the property still could work out.

The town now has a chance to add comments and suggested changes to the proposed legislation, according to Tolbert.

"One of the things that we intend to ask for is ... some more time," he said, adding he and Public Works Director Harvey Spurlock spoke to a geologist













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who works for the Department of Environmental Quality, who said five years likely is not sufficient time to do what needs to be done.

Secondly, town officials would like "to look seriously at an RO plant, a reverse osmosis plant," Tolbert said.

NASA Wallops officials have offered to facilitate a meeting between town officials and the Virginia congressional delegation staff to discuss inserting language in the legislation that would allow alternatives to ground water wells and would extend the funding window.

The meeting is expected to happen in the next two weeks, Tolbert said.

Marijuana Legislation

Legislation passed by the General Assembly in 2021 "had a recommit clause in it and the General Assembly this year failed to do that," Tolbert said.

As result, localities do not have the authority to act on the legislation passed last year — either to hold a referendum or to adopt parallel ordinances based on the state ordinances.

"Long story short, we have to wait for the next General Assembly session. Hopefully they will pass something that we can act on," he said.

Meals and Hotel Tax Revenue Up

Chincoteague's general fund revenues are higher than normal at this point in the year, mainly due to meals and transient occupancy tax revenue "significantly exceeding their budgeted values," according to Tolbert's report.

Although both were down slightly from April 2021 figures, meals tax revenue of \$52,866 still exceeded the three-year average by \$12,751.

Transient occupancy tax revenue collected in April, \$41,515, exceeded the three-year average by \$5,479.

Spurlock Retiring

Harvey Spurlock, director of Public Works, is retiring after working for the town since 2009.

Spurlock "has served the Town loyally since August of 2009. He has overseen some very large projects and changes for the Town during his tenure and his expertise will be missed. Harvey will continue his career at Wallops Flight Facility with Jacobs and has promised to lend his support to the Town during the search and transition for his replacement," Tolbert said in his report.

The position and the civic center director position have been advertised.

COVID-19 Update

The seven-day positivity rate for CO-VID-19 testing as of Monday was 9.8%, according to Bryan Rush, Chincoteague director of Emergency Services.

A month ago, the rate was 4.3%.

Last year, in May 2021, the rate was 4.6%.

"So again, we're starting to see a little climb." Rush said.

Reporting by ZIP code stopped on March 14 this year, with Chincoteague's total cases at that point being 481.

2023 Budget Public Hearing

No one spoke at the 2023 budget public hearing.

Highlights of Chincoteague's fiscal year 2023, \$9.8 million, budget include the town taking on the Chincoteague Civic Center fund.

Additionally, the Virginia Retirement System employer contribution increased by 2.81%.

The budget also includes a 5% increase for employee health insurance and two new positions in the Chincoteague Police Department.

Capital improvement highlights in the budget include rebuilding the boat ramp at Memorial Park; replacing a backhoe; purchasing a patrol car for the police department; replacing the Cropper Street water and storm sewer lines, as well as pavement and sidewalks; and replacement of the final wooden pier at Curtis Merritt Harbor.

The general fund budget is nearly \$7 million.

The harbor fund budget is \$1.135 million, about half of which is for capital improvements.

The trolley fund budget totals \$262,652, including replacing a trolley.

The water fund budget totals \$1.144 million.

The civic center fund budget totals \$438,194, which includes proposed capital improvements.

The council at its last meeting approved lowering the real estate tax rate from 7 cents to 5.9 cents per hundred dollars of value, after the 2022 Accomack County assessment showed increased values.

The council will consider approving the budget at its work session May 19.

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Northampton Chronic Absenteeism Rates 'Basically Double Pre-COVID'

More Northampton students are chronically absent from school now compared to the period before the COVID-19 pandemic, Northampton School Superintendent Eddie Lawrence reported at the April 28 Northampton school board meeting.

As of April 14, the rates of chronic truancy at each of Northampton's public schools are: 44% at Northampton High School, 35% at Northampton Middle School, 29% at Occohannock Elementary, and 25% at Kiptopeke Elementary.

Those rates are "basically double pre-COVID," Lawrence said. There are "a lot of things that we're going to spend a lot of time correcting following this pandemic, but getting attendance back to where it should be is going to be an ongoing goal of this division for quite a while," he said.

EMT Instructional Program

Northampton High School Assistant Principal Heather Marsh updated the school board on the development of a program that would permit rising juniors and seniors to take EMT classes during regular school hours, get certified, and start a career right out of high school.

Emergency medical technicians are in demand, and there are students who are interested in becoming EMTs, but many find it difficult to attend the classes, which are typically held at night and on weekends.

Marsh is working with Terry Christman, an employee of the Northampton County Department of Emergency Medical Services and a CPR and first-aid instructor, to find someone who could teach the course during regular school hours.

The EMT course is approved by the Virginia Department of Education as an elective and is divided into three parts. Students who take the course also can get dual-enrollment credit, Marsh said.

She noted the three-part course would fit well into a 90-minute block schedule, which the high school will begin following this fall. The entire EMT course can be completed in one school year.

Of 44 Northampton students who completed a survey on the potential new EMT program, 22 submitted positive responses and 15 showed serious interest in becoming certified EMTs.

To teach the course to a class of 14 to 16 students would cost the school division around \$14,000, Marsh estimated, including the cost for each student to take the final exam.

The course textbooks are expensive, about \$300 each, so the school could purchase a set to be checked out by students, she said.

The class would be taught at an EMT training site in Machipongo, and the school division could provide transportation from the high school and back.

A student who completes the EMT course, passes the exam, and is certified is "hirable immediately," Marsh said.

School board member William Oakley said the program sounded "exciting ... especially if you can start a career at a good-paying job – it pays as much as a starting teacher, or more."



Lawrence announced a summer educational opportunity for qualifying students.

The Virginia Space Flight Academy, a 501(c)(3) nonprofit, is offering five full scholarships to Northampton students for its summer program, which includes STEM (science, technology, engineering, and math) activities such as robotics and coding.

A Northampton schools committee will select the students to participate, who must include at least two females.

The participating students will stay six days and five nights at the Wallops Flight Facility, Lawrence said.

The school division's budget includes summer camp funding that hasn't been used since before the COVID-19 pandemic, which can be used to pay for student transportation to and from the facility if necessary, he said.

School Calendar

Lawrence presented his draft of the calendar for the 2022-2023 school year.

He noted that creating the school calendar was challenging, as state law requires the school year to include 180 days or 990 hours, and the first day of school can't be before Labor Day.

The calendar includes a shorter Thanksgiving break but allows two full weeks around Christmas and the whole week after Easter.

Holidays include three school days for Thanksgiving, two weeks for winter break (Monday, Dec. 19, through Friday, Dec. 30), Martin Luther King Jr. Day, Presidents Day, one week for spring break (Monday, April 10, through Friday, April 14), and Memorial Day.

Teacher work days, on which students do not attend school, also are included in the calendar.

Next year's high school graduation is tentatively scheduled for Saturday, June 10, 2023, and the last day of school is June 15.

New Year's Day falls on a Sunday next year, so federal and state employees will get a paid holiday on Monday, Jan. 2, the same day Northampton students are scheduled to return to school.

Lawrence refrained from adding that day to winter vacation so the break would not exceed two weeks. However, he welcomed the school board to consider adding the extra day to the winter break.





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School Board to Study Accomac Primary

Accomac Primary School's fate will not be decided until additional structural and hazardous materials studies are completed, the Accomack school board and board of supervisors agreed when they met April 25.

Tuesday night's school board meeting included this announcement, immediately followed by a unanimous vote by the school board to hire a firm to conduct the studies. It is expected that the school board and the board of superisors each will pay 50% of the cost of the study.

The Accomac Primary School site has been targeted as the possible new location of a school administration building, but the school board has yet to make an informed decision on the historic school and whether it should be renovated or demolished and replaced with new construction.

Every person who spoke on the matter during an April 19 public hearing supported the preservation of the historic school that first opened as Accomac High School in 1932.

Health Update

Coordinator of Student Health Services Tonya Martin reported that as of May 3, Accomack County had a seven-day average of three new cases of

COVID-19 per day, and the COVID-19 community level remained low, according to the Virginia Department of Health.

As of May 3, Accomack schools had two teachers who were positive for CO-VID-19, one at Accawmacke Elementary and one at Chincoteague Elementary. Fifteen students were positive for COVID-19: two at Arcadia Middle, three at Chincoteague Combined, seven at Chincoteague Elementary, and three at Kegotank Elementary.

Superintendent Chris Holland recommended addressing a shortage of registered nurses in Accomack County Public Schools by increasing the school nurse salary range.

He reviewed the three previous salary ranges for school nurses. The oldest started below \$30,000 and reached nearly \$36,000. The next salary range was about \$32,000 to \$38,000. The most recent salary range was \$36,000 to approximately \$43,000.

Holland recommended increasing the salary range for school nurses to \$42,000 to \$50,400.

The school board passed the recommendation, with school board member Janet Turner abstaining, as the item was not included on the meeting agenda for discussion or action.

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Exmore Strengthens Vehicle, Nuisance, and Trash Ordinances

The Exmore Town Council unanimously passed several ordinances and other measures Monday night to advance the town's business interests and promote public health, safety, and welfare.

Exmore police officer Chip Little, who is in charge of ensuring town residents keep their properties free of trash, debris, and other public nuisances, presented changes he made to two existing ordinances, which were approved by the Town Council.

Inoperative Vehicles

Ordinance 212 originally was implemented to prohibit inoperative motor vehicles, trailers, or semi-trailers from being kept on property in town unless they are in a fully enclosed structure

A vehicle is subject to the ordinance if it meets one of three conditions: it is inoperable; it has been partially or completely disassembled, with tires, wheels, engine, or other essential parts removed for 60 days or longer; it displays neither valid license plates nor a valid inspection sticker.

The ordinance as written was unenforceable, Little said, since it did not include any criminal or civil penalties for violators.

Little added language to the ordinance making a violation a misdemeanor punishable by up to 90 days in jail and/or a fine of up to \$1,000.

The additional language also allows the town to impose a civil penalty for each offense. Every 24-hour period in which the problem is not corrected is considered a separate offense. That is, if the civil penalty is a fine of \$100, the town may charge the offender \$100 for every day the inoperative vehicle remains on the property.

A person in violation of the ordinance will receive a notice by certified or registered mail giving the property owner 30 days to correct the issue and avoid penalties. Little added language to the ordinance permitting the notice to be delivered in person.

If the property owner does not remove the inoperative vehicle within

30 days, the town may remove and dispose the vehicle. The property owner may redeem the vehicle before disposal by paying the town's costs to move and store the vehicle.

The town may place a lien against the property until the charges are paid. Little added language to the ordinance permitting the Northampton County General District Court to order abatement and reimbursement to the town.

The new ordinance will be assigned a new number and supersede ordinance 212.

Public Nuisances

Little also contributed to ordinance 217, which will supersede ordinance 168 on public nuisances. The ordinance now includes a civil penalty of \$100 for each offense of failing to remove a public nuisance, including publicly visible dirt and filth, garbage, junk, trash, rubbish, and waste, all of which are defined within the ordinance.

Trash Pickup

Ordinance 219, establishing water and sewer rates and trash fees, was updated with new trash pickup rates which have increased \$1 per trash can. Customers will now pay \$16 for limb and brush service and trash pickup from one trash can of at least 95-gallon capacity. The cost of trash removal for each additional trash can is \$10.

Sewer Connections

Only one citizen spoke during the public hearing on ordinance 147, which will be updated to add a requirement for homes to connect to Exmore's new sewer system if the pipes run past the homes.

Town Manager Robert Duer noted that Exmore can opt out of running sewer lines to certain homes if it would be cost-prohibitive.

"So ... if it's going to cost us \$100,000 or \$200,000 or \$300,000 to get a pipe to John Doe's house, we have the option not to run it there. But if we do run it there, John Doe's got to hook up to it," he said.

Director of Utilities Taylor Dukes explained the addition to ordinance 147 is a requirement of the U.S. Department of Agriculture and the Virginia Department of Housing and Community Development (DHCD), which are contributing funding to the sewer project.

He and Duer noted the requirement also applies to a homeowner who has a functioning septic system or is considering installing a new above-ground septic system.

The Town Council is expected to vote on the changes to ordinance 147 at its next meeting.

Dukes added that Exmore is pursuing additional federal funding for the sewer project, \$3 million through the office of U.S. Sen. Mark Warner and \$3 million through the office of Congresswoman Elaine Luria.

The town currently is about a month ahead of schedule with the sewer project, which may be ready to go to bid by late June instead of sometime in July or August, Dukes said.

Duer remarked, "We need to know what the cost is going to be before we pull the plug or fill the tub up."

Employment Project Area

Dukes explained DHCD also is requiring Exmore to establish a Section 3 Business and Employment Project Area to receive the \$1 million Community Development Block Grant (CD-BG) the town was awarded.

The project area name is a reference to Section 3 of the U.S. Housing and Urban Development Act, which concerns providing jobs to low- and very-low income people in areas with ongoing HUD-funded construction projects.

HUD funds the Community Development Block Grant program that is administered by DHCD.

The Town Council passed a motion to establish the business and employment project area.

Budget

Exmore's fiscal year 2023 budget of more than \$2.1 million was passed and the budget is balanced. The majority of the town's revenues are generated through water, sewer, and trash pickup service, and the majority of expenditures are the maintenance of those services, public works, public safety, and general government.

Sale of Town Property

The new owners of a home on Car-

olyn Avenue offered to buy the land next-door, which is the property of Exmore. The Town Council voted unanimously in favor of accepting closed bids for the sale of the land, which is comprised of two lots. Duer noted the town previously had tried to sell the property, but the prospective buyer did not follow through.

Police Report

Police Chief Angelo DiMartino said speeding in Exmore is a worsening problem, with 93 summonses issued in April, of which 30 were reckless driving violations, as the driver was traveling 20 mph or more over the speed limit.

DiMartino noted many drivers are being stopped for traveling more than 70 or 80 mph in the 45 mph zone.

For example, Sgt. Jonathan Gonzalez stopped a Pennsylvania man who was driving 89 mph in the 45 mph zone. Duer said the driver, a police lieutenant, asked Gonzalez not to issue a summons but give him a "professional courtesy." DiMartino said the driver called him to complain after Gonzalez refused the driver's request and told him he was going "too fast ... I'm sorry."

Duer said Exmore possibly could acquire traffic-light cameras that automatically photograph a vehicle's license plate when a driver runs a red light, enabling a town employee to bill the driver for the civil penalty through the mail.

"If people know cameras are up, they might slow down a little bit," he said.


Six kids who caused about \$600 worth of damage to lights in the town park were caught on camera and will be disciplined through the juvenile justice system, DiMartino said.

Duer said kids have been "running ramshod" through the park; for example, five minutes after the restroom has been cleaned, it's been trashed again.

He was concerned that if the situation continues to worsen, the town may need at least a part-time attendant at the park.

"I'd love to have a place for children to play, but we don't need a place for children to tear up," Duer said.

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The Accomack County Department of Public Works is pleased to announce the countywide "Spring Clean-Up" to be held on Saturday May 14, 2022. In an effort to encourage citizens of Accomack to remove unsightly refuse from their yards, homes, and communities, the Accomack County Board of Supervisors will waive tipping fees at the North Landfill and South Transfer Station for residential waste and recyclable materials brought in on this day. The waiver will also be open to non-residents possessing an Accomack County Solid Waste Decal. Commercial for hire waste haulers will be required to pay standard tipping fees.

Landfills will be open on Saturday May 14, 2022 from 8:30 am to 4:00 pm to accept residential garbage, yard waste, and construction/demolition debris. The landfill will also accept the following recyclable materials:

- Tires (car and small truck only "LIMIT" 12 per person/day)
- Used Motor Oil, Scrap Metal, and car and truck batteries.

Recycling materials, such as plastic bottles, milk jugs, detergent bottles, any #1 or #2 plastics, newspapers, magazines, catalogs, junk mail, telephone books, cereal boxes, metal and aluminum cans, may be recycled at any of the County's 7 Convenience/Recycling Centers "FREE" year round.

Landfills and Convenience Centers will not accept materials deemed to be hazardous, such as: Paint, Pesticides, Biological hazards, asbestos, and heavy metals. Please check with the attendants at these sites as to where and how to dispose of hazardous materials.

The Department of Solid Waste looks forward to working with the citizens of Accomack County on this program and encourages everyone to mark their calendars for the second Saturday of May every year! A "FALL CLEAN-UP" will also, be held on the second Saturday in October. This year's event will be October 8, 2022. 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Luria Gives Congressional Update in Eastern Shore Town Hall

Rep. Elaine Luria answered constituents' questions and gave an update on her recent work in Congress at a town hall-style meeting Wednesday at Eastern Shore Community College.

ESCC President Jim Shaeffer moderated the event, which drew a full house in the Great Hall of the Workforce Development Center.

Luria, a Democrat, represents Virginia's 2nd Congressional District. She serves on the House Armed Services Committee, where she is vice chair; the House Committee on Veterans' Affairs, where she serves as chair of the Disability Assistance and Memorial Affairs Subcommittee; and on the House Committee on Homeland Security, as well as on the Select Committee to Investigate the January 6th Attack on the United States Capitol.

Luria spoke about the \$11.2 million in community project funding, formerly called earmarks, brought to the Eastern Shore this year, including \$8.2 million for a regional public safety communications system — the largest single award in the country — along with \$2.5 million for the first leg of the Rails to Trails project and \$500,000 to build additional homes in the New Road community in Exmore.

"The majority of the projects I've put in this year are again on the Shore," Luria said, noting rural communities like the Shore have fewer resources available to them than large urban centers.

Of more than 60 requests, 15 were able to be submitted for possible federal funding, including sewer lines for Wachapreague and Exmore and funding for the Eastern Shore Coalition Against Domestic Violence campus expansion, among others.

Luria urged constituents with needs related to federal agencies — including issues with the IRS, immigration, passports, Social Security, or veterans' claims, among others — to contact her office, which this year has recovered more than \$1 million for constituents on the Shore and \$4 million for constituents in the entire district.

On the national level, Luria spoke

about the Armed Services Committee's work on national security issues, including Russia's invasion of Ukraine and the threat of China invading Taiwan within the next five years.

"We really need a strong defense, a strong military, a strong Navy to be able to defend our nation," she said, adding this year's budget had included decommissioning 24 ships and only building eight.

"To me the math doesn't add up. That's going in the wrong direction," she said.

Luria said she helped get \$24 billion added to the Department of Defense budget, noting the military accounts for 42% of Hampton Roads' economy.

In her work on the Committee on Veterans' Affairs, Luria said she helped get healthcare benefits extended to Bluewater Navy veterans exposed to Agent Orange during the Vietnam War, as well as adding coverage for additional presumptive conditions from Agent Orange exposure.

Additionally, legislation to get help for more recent veterans frequently exposed to burn pits "is one of the top priorities in this administration," she said.

The January 6th committee investigation "is a large task and a very important task," Luria said, adding, "I take that work very seriously."

Hearings will start June 9.

"That will be an opportunity for the committee to present to the American public the information that we have learned," Luria said.

Luria spoke about the infrastructure package Congress passed, noting it includes significant funding to make the Port of Virginia the deepest East Cost port.

One in nine jobs in Virginia are related, directly or indirectly, to the Port of Virginia, according to Luria.

Luria also spoke about the district's "unique geographical advantage in the fact that we are an unobstructed port" for offshore wind projects, which could bring jobs as well as filling the need for renewable energy.

"We are poised to become the launch-

ing point not only for the Mid-Atlantic but the whole East Coast for offshore wind development," she said, noting she started an offshore wind caucus in the House.

Luria also spoke about funding for restoration of the Chesapeake Bay.

"I was able last Congress to work with Congressman Rob Wittman from the 1st District to pass the Chespeake Bay reauthorization funding — that hadn't been done since 2013," she said.

The town hall included an update on broadband expansion given by Maria Stevens, accounts manager for the Eastern Shore of Virginia Broadband Authority.

Since the broadband fiber backbone on the Shore was completed in 2010, the ESVBA has progressed to adding fiber-to-the-home starting in 2016 and taking out a \$5 million loan in 2018 to expand from 350 miles to over 600 miles of fiber, increasing the number of homes passed to 12,000.

In fall 2021, the ESVBA was awarded federal funding of more than \$12 million through the Virginia Telecommunications Initiative grant program.

That will pay for about 250 more miles of network, passing by another 11,000 homes.

Additionally, the grant includes \$2 million to assist with connection and installation costs, including for more remote homes.

Stevens thanked Luria "for her support in getting broadband to all of the residents on the Eastern Shore."

It will take efforts from "every level of government — federal, state, and local — to get broadband to every person on the Shore and I will continue to fight for those resources on the federal

level," Luria said.

Luria answered questions about the decommissioning of Navy cruisers; the rail trail project; the climate crisis; housing needs on the Shore; the need for mental health services; Chincoteague's need for centralized sewer; agriculture and aquaculture priorities; the national power grid; the proposed Tangier seawall; and the status of moving the beach on Assateague Island, among others.

Answering a question about the climate crisis and the nation's dependence on fossil fuels, Luria, in addition to mentioning offshore wind development, spoke about her support for increased investment in advanced nuclear energy, eliciting applause.

She noted Dominion Energy, which serves a large part of Virginia, "is already 40% nuclear."

"It's not only an issue about greener, cleaner energy by investing in nuclear, but it's also a national security issue because we're really not leading the world in developing new nuclear," Luria said, noting Russia and China are exporting nuclear power technology to other nations.

"They are leading us in all of this," she said.

Luria introduced the Nuclear Energy Leadership Act in the House, counterpart to Sen. Lisa Murkowski's bill in the Senate. Interest in the legislation is increasing in Congress, including approval of appropriations to build two nuclear reactor demonstration projects using new technologies.

Luria will return to the Shore Monday for a housing tour, with participants including developers, officials, and community leaders, to discuss challenges related to affordable housing.

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
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
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U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary Safe Boating Tips

This month's tips focus on a particular concern for boaters in the Chesapeake Bay and Eastern Shore coastal areas: the potential for running aground. The telltale signs of potential grounding locations, grounding mitigation measures, and the actions you should take if you unfortunately run aground will be discussed in this and future articles.

One of the greatest contributors to potential grounding conditions is shoaling. Shoaling is the result of movement of the soft bottom of coastal areas from strong winds, water surge, and severe tidal changes. Shoaling also results from erosion of the coastal area from rainwater runoff. In several areas, shoaling has encroached upon channel passages and is severely affecting the Intracoastal Waterway and has rendered some of the aids to navigation, such as day boards and other channel markers, obsolete.

Boaters can reasonably expect sufficient water below their keel by observing the chart and channel depth markings. However, boaters should always be on the alert for shoaling.

Shoaling is best observed during low tides and indicated by changes in water color (lightened or browning) and/ or water breaking in unexpected areas. Special attention should be made around bends in the waterway and at the points of land.

Next week we will discuss measures to avoid grounding and minimize the impact of the grounding that is almost inevitable for Chesapeake boaters.

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Book Retraces Early Days of Cape Charles

"Cape Charles: A Railroad Town" is one of the most comprehensive historical accounts of Cape Charles ever written. Jim Lewis took on the daunting task of tracing the history of this boomtown from its early beginnings in the 19th century Last published in 2004, all the printed copies of the book were bought not long after.

In recent years, Cape Charles has undergone another economic boom reinventing itself as a small beach tourist-friendly town and home for many retirees. Continued interest in the book and town history led to the republication of a new edition of the book, made possible through the granting of publishing rights by Lewis' sons, the Cape Charles Historical Society, and Xenophon Press.

The original text and photos of the book remain, starting with the 1884 efforts of William L. Scott and Alexander Cassatt who envisioned the railroad running down the spine of

the Eastern Shore and the crossing of the 32-mile mouth of the Chesapeake Bay by ships and ferries to shorten the north-south transportation route.

The text and photos describe the early days of Cape Charles built on marshland, and its emergence from the early "rough and tumble" days to its peak in the 1920s as a thriving commercial center.

Cape Charles experienced the evolution of rail, ship, and ferry technology over its life, and the specific history of these changes, along with the names of ferries, tugs, and steamers are well documented in the book.

"Cape Charles: A Railroad Town," by Lewis, is available for sale through the Cape Charles Historical Society website and will be available at the Cape Charles Museum which opens May 6. Copies are also available at Peach Street Books. The book is available in both softcover and hardcover.

Court Postings

Accomack County Circuit Court

Bail was denied for Jaheem Snead, 19, of Onancock. He is charged with shooting from a vehicle into an occupied vehicle while driving on U.S. Route 13 near Parksley in April 2021.

He failed to keep required appointments with pretrial services and failed screenings for alcohol use, said his pretrial probation officer.

"This was a violent offense," said Substitute Judge Glen A. Tyler. "Bail is denied."

Teresa L. Haynie, 63, of Bloxom, was found guilty of misdemeanor contempt of court and fined \$100. Haynie failed to appear in court when summoned for jury duty and then failed to appear in court when served with a show-cause order. A capias (warrant) for her arrest was issued.

Haynie came to court to say she had

numerous medical issues and appointments as does her mother, for whom she said she provides care. According to testimony, she contacted the clerk of court with that information and was told to provide an excuse from her doctor. She never did that.

"This is a simple process," said Judge Tyler. "You get a summons for a particular day. You contact the clerk's office if you have a problem. The clerk can decide. You did not do these simple things. You failed to appear two times. A doctor never sent an excuse as the clerk told her to do. She failed to appear for a show cause. A capias or arrest warrant was sent. She is in contempt of court."

Antalf Nottingham, 43, of Nassawadox, will spend two years in jail for felony eluding and possession of cocaine. According to the terms of a January plea agreement, he pleaded guilty to the eluding charge. A charge of possession with intent to distribute was

amended to simple possession.

On December 16, 2020, an agent of the Eastern Shore Drug Task Force was talking to a man in the parking lot of a Belle Haven business. The man was to be a confidential informant working for the task force. Nottingham pulled into the parking lot, then sped away. Police and the task force agent pursued his vehicle. They saw something thrown from the car.

Nottingham crossed U.S. Route 13 without stopping. His car went airborne when crossing the railroad track, said Assistant Commonwealth's Attorney William Fox. A search of his car found a number of \$20 bills and marijuana. The item thrown from his car was located and found to contain 3.32 grams of cocaine, Fox told the court.

At Nottingham's sentencing hearing Fox said Nottingham had a criminal history that was "quite concerning" including robbery, burglary, and concealed weapons charges. Judge Tyler sentenced him to 30 days for possession of cocaine and five years, with all but two years suspended, for felony eluding. He ordered him to be on good behavior for five years.

Vassean Maurice Armstrong, 39, of Oak Hall, pleaded guilty to misdemeanor assault and battery in a plea agreement with the commonwealth. A charge of abduction was not prosecuted according to the terms of the

agreement.

In August 2021, deputies responded to a call from a woman at a family reunion on Nock's Landing Road saying she was assaulted. "The victim did not wish to pursue these charges," said defense attorney Tucker Watson. "He [Armstrong] did not want her to be forced to testify."

"You refused to allow her to go," said Judge Tyler referring to the nolle prossed (dismissed) charge of abduction. "That is a serious felony. Count to 10 next time you get angry," he told Armstrong. He sentenced Armstrong to 12 months in jail and suspended six of those months.

Benito Thomas Flores, 36, of Exmore, pleaded guilty to unauthorized use of a motor vehicle, possession of a controlled substance, and larceny of property with a value less than \$1,000. Police responded to a call May 27, 2021, from an Onancock woman who said she loaned her truck to Flores and he failed to return it, said Assistant Commonwealth's Attorney Fox. He said Flores gave numerous excuses when she repeatedly called him, he finally blocked her telephone number.

The blue Ford truck was seen by police in the T's Corner area and Flores was arrested. When he was searched, officers found a small bag of crack cocaine. A presentence investigation report was ordered and the case was continued to May 19.



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Random Facts About ... People Who Die in Movies — Die for Real

When we opened our internet tubes this week, there was still a lot of talk about the Oct. 23, 2021, death on the set of "Rust," a western starring Alec Baldwin, who was also a producer on the movie. Somehow, a gun was loaded with real ammunition so when Baldwin pulled the trigger on a revolver supposedly empty or loaded with blanks, he for-real shot Halyna Hutchins, the cinematographer, and

the director, Joel Souza, Hutchins died.

The online movie website, The Wrap, explained that Hutchins' death was not a total outlier, with 43 people having died on U.S. movie sets from 1990 to 2016. And this doesn't count more than 150 "life-changing" injuries on movie sets in that period. Hutchins' death, which occurred last year, isn't included in the total either.

Unlike the "Rust" case, sometimes even a gun loaded with blanks can be lethal. On the set of "Cover Up" in 1984, actor Jon-Erik Hexum, bored with delays in filming, held a gun filled with blanks to his head and, as a joke, pulled the trigger. The blank had enough power to kill Hexum. On the set of the 1993 "The Crow," Brandon Lee, son of the martial arts icon Bruce Lee, was shot with a blank that propelled a metal fragment stuck in the barrel. The fragment hit Brandon Lee in the abdomen and, after six hours of emergency surgery, he died.

In another online article, The Wrap said there is, unfortunately, inconsistency regarding how firearms on movie sets are referred to. A "prop gun" can be a nonfunctional, theatrical prop that is unable to fire projectiles of any kind, real bullets or blanks. But real guns firing blanks are also referred to as prop guns. Adding to the potentially deadly confusion, "live" rounds have been applied to both real bullets and to blanks.


Here's how that confusion can play

out in real life: According to the New York Times, the gun on the "Rust" set was referred to as a "prop" that was also declared a "cold gun," supposedly meaning the weapon did not have any "live" rounds in it. What's a "prop" and what's a "live" round? Exactly.

But it's not just guns that kill people on movie sets. A locomotive killed Sarah Jones, who was working as a camera assistant on "Midnight Rider" in 2014. And a crashing helicopter killed three actors on the set of "Twilight Zone: the Movie" in 1982. A pyrotechnic explosion caused the helicopter to crash, killing actor-director Vic Morrow and two child actors, 7-year-old Myca Dinh Le and 6-year-old Renee Shin-Ye Chen. In the scene, the Morrow character was running while carrying both children.

Old-timers tell those who are newcomers to firearms, "Never point a gun at anything you don't intend to kill." That advice obviously cannot apply to shoot-'em-up-bang movie sets — but it still makes sense.

Captain Lindsay Paul, at Trident Tackle, said that anglers drifting Berkley Gulp-live minnow combinations in Bullshead and Drawing Channels are catching flounder, with action temporarily slowing down during periods of cooler weather.

The Foxy Lady charters had flounder catches weighing up to 5 pounds, 4 ounces on Friday and 4 pounds, 6 ounces on Saturday. Black drum and striped bass were landed from the inlet and surf.

Amanda Manzella, at the Wachapreague Inn, said that the Inn was booked to capacity with flounder anglers, many returning from fishing with limits of 18-inch and larger fish. One of the guests finished in fourth place in the flounder tournament.

Lower Shore - Dez Louie, at Oceans East — Eastern Shore, said the drum fishing is "excellent!" He said there are schools of trophy red drum being spotted on the oceanside of the bridge-tunnel as well as off Fisherman Island. Anglers are having success by both bottom fishing with hard crab and peeler baits, as well as sight casting bucktails or live crabs just in front of the roving schools. Black drum are biting, especially during the flood tide out of Oyster and on Nautilus Shoal, off the high-rise section of the bridgetunnel. Sea clam and clam/crab "sandwiches" are both producing catches. Black drum fishermen near the bridgetunnel were also rewarded with trophy sheepshead bycatches, as the shop weighed in eight citation sheepshead over the weekend. Flounder fishing continues to improve inside the Ditch. Schools of small bluefish and stripers have started appearing in the waters of the lower bay. The Kitopeke Park Pier has produced small flounder and

Brady said that sheepshead have been pretty abundant with anglers catching fish up to 10 pounds while drum fishing, as well as targeting sheepshead around the bridge-tunnel pilings with clam





Ace Custis Inducted into Northampton High School Athletic Hall of Fame

Local basketball legend Ace Custis was inducted into the Northampton High School Athletic Hall of Fame Saturday, April 30.

"I was excited when I found out I was being inducted," said Custis. "It's an honor anytime a player can be recognized for their hard work on the court."

Custis fell in love with basketball at an early age. "It has always been a dream of mine to play basketball to the best of my abilities and leave it all on the court," he said. "Growing up, I used to play basketball against my older brother each morning and I really liked the competitive aspects of the game so I dedicated myself to the sport."

Custis began playing for Northampton High School during his freshman year and participated in basketball camps and tournaments to increase his chances of being spotted by college scouts. During the summer of his junior year, he played on the Boo Williams AAU basketball team in Hampton, Va., alongside future NBA legend Allen Iverson.

After graduating from Northampton, Custis continued his basketball career at Virginia Tech. In 1995, he helped lead the Hokies to victory in the NIT (National Invitation Tournament) against Marquette University.

"Winning that tournament in Madison Square Garden was an awesome feeling," he said. "Our team felt like we had been overlooked for the NCAA tournament and we wanted to prove that we should have been included. We felt like we had something to prove."

Custis concluded his college career with over 1,000 points and 1,000 rebounds. His jersey was retired in 1997 and in 2007 he was inducted into Virginia Tech's Hall of Fame. Following his collegiate career, Custis aspired to take his talent to the NBA.

"I remember sitting through the entire 1997 NBA draft waiting for my name to be called," he said. "When it was over, my name still hadn't been called. I went into my room and cried. Later that night, I got a phone call from the Los Angeles Lakers expressing their interest in me."

Custis joined the NBA Summer League and played for the Los Angeles Lakers alongside future basketball icon Kobe Bryant. The Dallas Mavericks soon signed him to a nonguaranteed contract, but his NBA career was cut short when he tore his ACL during a preseason game.

After recovering from his injury, Custis played semipro basketball stateside in the Continental Basketball Association and American Basketball Association and then played professionally overseas in Lebanon, Venezuela, and several other countries before retiring in Japan in 2012. He played overseas for a total of 12 seasons.

"After I stopped playing overseas, I took a year off to spend time with my kids," Custis said. "Then I started coaching. My first job was at Virginia State University in 2013."

Following his season at VSU, Custis joined the coaching staff as an assistant at the University of Maryland Eastern Shore. He coached at UMES for five years and then returned to Virginia Tech as the coordinator of bas-

ketball relations. In 2020, he became a special assistant to the Hokies' head coach Mike Young.

"All of my success has come from hard work," Custis said. "I was never the most athletic or had the best jump shot, but I could always outwork my opponent. My work ethic and my competitive drive were my best assets."

Custis plans to continue using his best assets to his advantage in the foreseeable future. "My journey is not over," he said. "I have a lot more dreams and things I want to accomplish and hopefully I can continue to enjoy the ride."




and sometimes she gets to help patients and their families through difficult times.



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

Little Farm Rescue and Sanctuary Provides Compassionate Care

Dear Editor:

Some of your readers may have heard of the Little Farm Rescue and Sanctuary in Machipongo, but they may not know of the wonderful things that happen there.

It was just a year ago that the founders of the rescue, Katie and Les Cook, moved their family along with 100 animals from Ojai, Calif., to Machipongo to escape the wildfires and poor air quality, and to be closer to family. They sold their home in California and purchased a 115-acre farm in Machipongo. That was just the beginning of the story that is now a year old.

Their journey has been exciting, rewarding, and sometimes frustrating, and they have forged new friendships along the way. Farmland has been replaced with outbuildings and shelters for animals along with several pastures. Rain, snow, and even more rain hindered daily routines as everyone battled the mud, but they persevered. Animals can be seen in their spaces happy, well-fed, loved, and healthy, yet all of them are recovering from the atrocities of previous owners.

The animals' stories bring tears to the eyes of volunteers and founders who take care of them daily. Starved, beaten, worked into the ground, wounds that were not addressed, abandoned, and forgotten are just some of what these animals once experienced before coming to the Little Farm Rescue. The work of rescue organizations can be both rewarding and heartbreaking. Some animals are able to survive

and flourish while others suffer cruelties that prevent their full recovery.

The Little Farm Rescue is a non-profit depending solely on donations to support the animals. This includes maintenance health checks and hoof trimmings, special diet feed and medicines, hay, and emergency vet care, just to name a few. It costs approximately \$6,000 to feed all the animals for just one month.

The founders of the Little Farm Rescue DO NOT receive any salary or compensation for the work they do daily. Their own investment is in the farm they purchased and it is their true dedication, compassion, and love of animals that they complete the work they do. When monthly donations don't meet the expenses, it is the founders who make up the difference using their own funds.

This past year has brought many challenges, but they are very grateful for the family, friends, and volunteers who have helped them along the way. I am proud to say that I am a TEAM LITTLE FARM member. Thank you Katie and Les for your commitment to animals! Readers may follow their work on Facebook under the Little Farm Rescue.
