

Omicron Variants Drive Rise in Eastern Shore COVID-19 Cases

The Eastern Shore over the past month has seen a steady rise in COVID-19 cases, according to Jon Richardson, chief operating officer, Eastern Shore Health District.

The average has risen from three cases per day to around 11 cases per day over the past month, Richardson said.

"The trajectory has been more gradual than what we've experienced with previous variants and, overall, we are still a good bit lower case-wise than we were in Fall 2021 with the Delta variant and significantly lower than January 2022 with the initial Omicron variant," he wrote in an email to an Eastern Shore Post reporter.

Most cases on the Shore now are the result of various omicron variants or subvariants.

"I anticipate cases will continue to climb in the coming weeks though it's impossible to predict how long exactly," Richardson said.

As of Wednesday, the Virginia Department of Health reported a seven-day average of 10.3 daily new cases on the Eastern Shore.

The region has reported 9,346 total cases and 171 total deaths as result of the pandemic.

Six new cases were reported Wednesday.

The seven-day PCR test positivity rate on the Shore was 13% as of May 24, according to the VDH.

In the past 13 weeks, there have been 230 cases and four deaths resulting from COVID-19 reported in Accomack County and 99 cases and three

deaths reported in Northampton County, according to the VDH.

Two deaths as result of confirmed COVID-19 were reported on the Shore for the week ending April 30 and one death reported as probable from COVID-19 was recorded for the week ending April 23, according to the VDH.

They were the first deaths from COVID-19 reported on the Shore since two deaths reported for the week ending March 19. One probable case resulting in death also was reported for the week ending March 12 and one confirmed case resulting in death was reported for the week ending Feb. 26.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, for the week ending May 20, cases and hospitalizations continued to rise in the United States as a whole, as the nation marked one million deaths from COVID-19. "While about 54% of the U.S. population is experiencing low COVID-19 community levels, many areas have moved into medium and high levels," according to a COVID-19 data tracker weekly review on the CDC website, https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/covid-data/covidview/index html

People who are up to date on getting

the recommended COVID-19 vaccines have a much lower risk of serious illness and death from COVID-19 compared with unvaccinated people.

The CDC's data tracker showed that in March, unvaccinated adults age 18 and older were about five times more likely to be hospitalized with COVID-19 than those up to date on vaccination. Unvaccinated people age 12 years and older were 17 times more likely to die of COVID-19 than those who were up to date on vaccination.

The currently spreading omicron variants have been producing less se-

'One of a Kind': Shore Mourns Charles Baines III

The Eastern Shore community is mourning the death of Accomack County sheriff's deputy Corporal Charles Linwood Baines III.

Baines, 50, died Saturday at his home in Painter, according to Accomack County Sheriff Todd Wessells.

"We are heartbroken at the sudden loss of Corporal Charles Baines, who was an incredible co-worker and made many lasting contributions to the Accomack County Sheriff's Office. You were always met with a smile and an upbeat attitude. He will be missed and will be remembered by his hard work ethics and his dedication to the citizens of Accomack County. He was one of kind," a post on the Accomack County Sheriff's Office Facebook page read.

Baines, who had worked for the sheriff's office since 2009, was as-

signed to the corrections division. He worked at the jail and doing crisis intervention at Riverside Shore Memorial Hospital.

Baines was a champion kickboxer who had made a comeback after suffering multiple strokes in January 2021, after testing positive for COVID-19. He was hospitalized for a week as result of the strokes.

Remarkably, Baines, a member of the World Association of Kickboxing Organizations' Team USA, was back in competition in October 2021, competing at the WAKO World Senior Kickboxing Championship in Italy.

The competition included teams from 65 countries.


"After the (medical) clearance, I had about five weeks to get ready," Baines said in a December 2021 interview with the Eastern Shore Post.

He had to undergo a series of medi-

cal tests to determine it was safe for him to participate.

While he did not win his bout in tatami kickboxing, as he had hoped to, he had a respectable showing.

"It was really, really close," he said,

adding, "It was just great to be back in the ring."

He was the oldest member of the team.

Baines said then he was working with a Virginia Beach trainer to prepare for upcoming events. He also

vere disease on the Shore, with hospitalization and death rates remaining low, according to Richardson, who added, "Data clearly reflects vaccination remains effective against hospitalization and death from (COVID-19), with boosters providing the most protection."

The Eastern Shore continues to have one of the highest vaccination rates in Virginia and the health district has seen similarly successful results with administration of boosters.

Still, Richardson said, "There are still many who are eligible for boosters who have not received one and there are many opportunities (primary care, pharmacies, health departments) available in the community for those who choose to get a booster to enhance their protection against (COVID-19)."

Elderly and immunocompromised people are at greatest risk of severe disease and should take precautions ensuring they are up to date on vaccinations.

The health district, beginning in June, will pilot a program to make house calls to give COVID-19 vaccines and boosters, according to Richardson.

"Since the beginning of the vaccination campaign, it has been our mission to educate our community and remove any barriers to them being able to receive the (COVID-19) vaccine. We have been vaccinating homebound members of our community at their homes since the vaccine became available," he said, adding the initiative will expand that opportunity to other members of the community.

Appointments for the house call vaccination program are limited and those wishing to schedule an appointment should contact Laurie Laird at 757-710-0277.

Boosters for Children Urged

The Virginia Department of Health has given the green light to Virginia health care providers to begin administering a booster dose of the Pfizer vacine to children ages 5 to 11, according to Virginia State Vaccination Coordinator Christy Gray.

After the CDC gave the go-ahead to

administer the Pfizer vaccine to children in that age group, 316,571 children in Virginia had received at least one dose as of May 17. That represents nearly 44% of Virginia children in the age group.

More than 144,606 children fully vaccinated as of Dec. 17 are now eligible for a booster.

In a May 19 statement, Gray urged parents to talk to their child's pediatrician or other health care provider about getting a booster shot.

"Vaccination helps to keep children from getting very sick (and) developing short- and long-term health problems and reduce(s) spread to loved ones and communities. COVID-19 cases are rising in Virginia and this is a step parents can take to continue their child's protection. The best way for parents to protect their children is through vaccination, which we urge parents to consider for their children's safety and well-being," she said.

Gray also encouraged those eligible for a second booster to talk to their doctor, after the CDC strengthened its recommendation that people 12 years and older who are immunocompromised and those 50 years and older should get a second booster if it has been four months since their first booster.


"As COVID-19 cases are rising in Virginia, VDH urges those eligible for a second booster vaccine to talk to their healthcare provider to ensure continued protection against severe illness," she said.

On the same day the VDH released Gray's statement, the department announced certain COVID-19 dashboards are being retired and will no longer be updated.

Those include data about cases by vaccination status; federal vaccine doses; vaccines received; and cases and deaths by date reported.

The VDH also announced it is removing landing pages for data about levels of community transmission and locality. Those dashboards were no longer published as of March 10.

Additionally, as of March 10 the data set giving the cumulative number of COVID-19 cases by ZIP code is being updated weekly, rather than daily on weekdays.

worked out regularly in a gym in the basement of Historic Onancock School and at his home gym.

He gave credit to a team of supporters who helped him, including Accomack County Sheriff's Office's Sgt. Donnie Williams, who was a regular workout partner; sparring partner Ed Robinson; Andre Tyler, who operates the Onancock gym; and Crystal Roughton, his stretching coach, confidante, and contact person for Team Baines.

"Charles Baines' legacy will remain etched in our minds and hearts for as long as we continue to share his 'awesome stories' of inspiration, motivation, and grind mixed with all that laughter," Roughton said this week.

Craig Smith, Baines' coach, trainer, and lifelong friend, said about his friend in a written statement, "Charles Baines was the most 'Humble' and 'Kindest' World Kickboxing Champion that I ever met. Baines and I started training together on a Virginia State Fighting Team called 'The Playmakers' and from that point on we stayed training together, help-

er be forgotten and your Kindness and Christian Heart will live forever. See you in the 'Kingdom of Heaven,' my good, humble friend."

WAKO Team USA Kickboxing and its president, Rob Zbilski, eulogized Baines in a Facebook post Sunday, saying, "One of our WAKO USA warriors passed away yesterday. Charles was a Joe Lewis Black Belt who was trained by Craig Smith and Phil Maldonado, and a bronze medalist at the 2019 WAKO World Championships in Bosnia.

"Charles was a man's man, a quiet but hardcore dude. He was a guy that said what he was going to do, and did what he said. His motivation gave me motivation to push harder on WAKO USA. ... The last thing Charles would want is pity, so let's give him a hell ya for all his great accomplishments!"

Baines was one of four Team USA members to win a medal at the 2019 world championships.

Baines started practicing martial arts at age 3 and was named American kickboxing champion in three dif-

ferent weight classes, according to a June 2021 interview with the Post.

In the interview in December, Baines spoke about his awareness that young people were always watching what he did and of the need to serve as a role model, in particular to his son.

"Part of being a father is to prepare your kid for when you are not here. ... I want to have him have stuff that can carry him when he gets in a crisis. ... I'm going to tell him a lot of stuff, but at the end of the day, he'll remember, when my dad was in this situation, what he did was, he got up," Baines said then.

Baines also spoke about how the drive to succeed in kickboxing carried over into other areas of his life.

"It keeps you focused," he said.

Baines, a man of faith, saw working hard as part of his testimony to others, especially to younger people.

"I keep pushing. I keep pushing so the kids will push. ... You've got an audience right now who is watching you — how you act and how you react. So then, when you go talk to those kids, it's like, 'Okay, I hear what you say.' Your biggest ministry is not what you say; it's what you do," he said in December.

Baines said people often asked him how having the strokes had changed him.

His response was, "I don't hold back. I don't hold back, because you don't know when your time is coming and that's going to be it. ... This is what I want and I'm going all out. ... Every day, I'm going to push forward. Every day you get up, there is some type of fight ... so why not get up saying, 'Okay, I'm going to take it on."

A public funeral service will be held Saturday, May 28, at 3 p.m., at Annointed Word of Deliverance Ministries, 32170 Seaside Road, Keller, with Brother Charles L. Baines IV officiating.

Interment will be held immediately following the service at New Mt. Zion Baptist Church cemetery, 17450 Coal Kiln Road, Painter.

Onancock Purchases Building for Public Restrooms, Welcome Center

The town of Onancock has purchased the building at 38 Market St. (the single story building between the Lilliston Building and the Corner Bakery) and plans to put new public restrooms and a welcome center there.

The town used reserve funds to purchase the building, so there is no debt associated with the purchase, according to Town Manager Matt Spuck.

Spuck said in an email to the Post that the building's central location is ideal for the purpose and the purchase will give the town a chance to renovate the police department (in the building where public restrooms are now) "to make it more usable and customer friendly."

According to a deed recorded in the Accomack County Clerk of Circuit Court office in April, the town purchased the property from CGM LLC for \$175,000.

Onancock Awarded \$30,000 for Tourism

The town, in partnership with Onancock Main Street, received \$20,000, and OMS was awarded another \$10,000, in local and regional tourism marketing funds from the Virginia Tourism Commission.

The awards are to be used to leverage local marketing dollars with matching state funds on initiatives to increase visitor numbers and spending.

Onancock will use the money to market the town's assets to visitors throughout the year, according to a press release from OMS.

The town and OMS will partner with businesses and nonprofit organizations to strengthen marketing campaigns.

Additionally, OMS will use funds to continue developing the website, <u>www.</u> ExperienceOnancock.com

"These grants will continue to strengthen the Eastern Shore of Virginia, and I am very grateful to the Virginia Tourism Commission," said Robert Sabbatini, president of the Eastern Shore of Virginia Tourism Commission. "The Eastern Shore of Virginia's culture, outdoors, and most importantly, people, will continue to attract visitors from all over, and these grants will help make that possible," he said.

Town Council Actions

The Onancock Town Council at its May 23 meeting approved a special use permit for a homestay business at 60 Kerr St.

No one spoke at a public hearing about the permit application.

The council approved the fiscal year 2023 town budget and capital improvement plan in a 4-3 vote, with Mayor Fletcher Fosque casting the deciding vote.

The council was split 3-3 on whether to reduce the real estate tax rate to 27 cents per \$100 value or keep it at the advertised rate, 28 cents.

The final vote keeps the rate at 28 cents.

Among council members advocating for the 27-cent rate was Councilwoman Maphis Oswald, who said the move "would be an across-the-board help to all our citizens," citing the effects of inflation among other economic factors affecting residents.

Still, Councilwoman Cynthia Holdren said it is "better to have small increases over time," citing potential expenses related to creating a master plan for the town.

ARPA Projects Prioritized

Spuck presented a list of proposed priorities for using \$1.25 million in federal funds coming to the town as result of the American Rescue Plan Act.

Residents, the Town Council, and staff all had a voice in deciding how to allocate the funds. Public hearings and council discussions resulted in a list of 23 projects, details of which have been submitted to the federal government to comply with mandated reporting requirements.

Certain projects depend on another project being completed first and some also use other funds to complete.

In the first phase, which includes projects on which to begin work immediately — including design work, seeking bids, and other steps — is using global positioning systems to map the town's water system; police department

and public bathroom renovations, the park in the northeast section of town; a dog park; touchless fixtures and a walking path at the Little League facility; grants for business façade improvements; and electric improvements and a security system at the water tower.

In a second phase are projects with a seasonally driven start date, including dredging under the floating docks at the wharf (fall 2022), followed by a new bulkhead, funded by the other sources, and creating a "Sunset Park" at the wharf; and the second, final payment to the Eastern Shore Coalition Against Domestic Violence in January 2023.

Ongoing projects on the list include stormwater management, which may coincide with a state highway department project on King Street, and digging and cleaning drainage ditches.

Projects on the list that have been completed include a hypo tank for storage of sodium hypochlorite used in water and wastewater treatment: removing the derelict former wood shop at the Historic Onancock School; and painting the water tower.

Town Manager's Report Jackson Street will be getting new sidewalks, curbs, and paving starting in mid-June, with completion before July 4, according to Spuck.

The town manager said he is working with the state highway department at the state and local level to determine the best solutions to ensure safety and "preserving the integrity of our downtown district," related to Chaney Enterprises' gravel operation at the wharf.

Spuck had a 45-minute conversation recently with the Virginia deputy secretary of transportation about potential state and federal funding options for improving the King Street area near the wharf, which needs stormwater improvements and currently lacks sidewalks.

The planning commission has reviewed and made proposed changes to the zoning ordinance for two business districts, including the waterfront business district. Questions from the commission have been sent to the town attorney to answer.

An evaluation of security camera systems for the town has been completed and staff is working to have a vendor design the system to get the scope and cost of the system for the council to consider.

A fifth police officer has been hired and will start work July 25.

Spuck asked for and received council members' consensus to potentially consider selling a 100 by 100-foot parcel at the back of Hartman Avenue to the Hampton Roads Sanitation District.

The HRSD needs land for a pump station as part of its sewer line project on the Shore. HRSD also is looking at property owned by ESCADV in the same area, but wants to survey the town parcel to expedite the project in case the ESCADV property is not able to be purchased.

The sale of town property would require a public hearing and a council vote.

National Infant Formula Shortage Has Shore Families Scrambling

When Abbott Nutrition, the largest U.S. supplier of powdered baby formula, temporarily closed one of its plants in Michigan and issued a recall in February, it led to a shortage that made a nationwide impact. Three months later, the plant is still closed and the baby formula shortage has worsened.

Leslie Shifflett, of Eastville, told the Eastern Shore Post that since her son was born this past December, it has continually become more difficult to find the hypoallergenic formula he needs.

Options on the rural Eastern Shore for buying baby formula are limited even without a nationwide shortage. "If you happen to go to the store the same week that ... three other moms need your formula, then you're up the creek," she said.

Abbott Nutrition issued a press release on Feb. 17 announcing its voluntary recall of select powdered formulas sold under the brand names Similac, Alimentum, and EleCare, after the company received four consumer complaints related to infants who had consumed formula from the facility and later contracted bacterial infections. Two of the infants died.

The complaints were connected to two types of bacteria, Cronobacter sakazakii and Salmonella newport, according to the release.

Cronobacter sakazakii is a foodborne pathogen that thrives in very dry places, such as in powdered baby formula. An infection of Cronobacter sakazakii can develop into a bloodborne infection called septicemia, which can lead to sepsis – inflammation that spreads throughout the body, potentially causing death.

Cronobacter sakazakii also can cause meningitis, inflammation of the membranes that protect the brain and spine, which also can be fatal.

Salmonella newport is a strain of salmonella that causes foodborne illness. Symptoms can include stomach cramps, diarrhea, and fever. A case of salmonella usually can be resolved without antibiotics but is sometimes fatal.

Infants are susceptible to these types of infections because their immune systems are not yet well-developed.

Testing at the Abbott facility in Sturgis, Mich., revealed evidence of Cronobacter sakazakii in some areas of the plant where there was no product contact. Neither Cronobacter sakazakii nor Salmonella newport was detected in any product, but Abbott proceeded with the recall out of an abundance of caution, the press release indicated.

Abbott regularly tests for these and other pathogens and all products must test negative before they are released.

The press release further noted Cronobacter sakazakii is commonly present in homes and emphasized the importance of proper storage, handling, and preparation of powder formulas.

Shifflett was concerned about the prolonged closure of the Abbott plant because "the bacteria that ... made the babies sick was not even found in that factory, and they continued to hold that factory closed while we need ... they need that ability to distribute."

Her husband works in Accomack County and has had to search every store on his way home for formula, Shifflett said.

She discovered that Facebook was a good resource for finding formula. She's had friends from other states, like Colorado, who have found her baby's formula in their local stores and bought and mailed it to her.

Shifflett said, "We are fortunate we have the (financial) ability to do that, but there are so many moms on the Shore that cannot," because they depend on the supplemental nutrition program Women, Infants, and Children or WIC, which provides vouchers that are used to buy formula from local retailers.

"It's sad that these moms are ... scrambling to feed their baby, and they don't have the money themselves to go stock up on extra in case they get in a bind," she said.

Her supply of formula for this month – more than a dozen cans – came from out-of-state, Shifflett said.

She added that breastfeeding isn't an option for every mother. For example, the child may be adopted, like her son. Some mothers have to return to work and are unable to pump, and others are physically unable to breastfeed, she said.

After Abbott issued its recall, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) followed up in February with a press release providing instructions to identify recalled powder formula and noting the recall does not apply to liquid formula.

A container of recalled formula can be identified by looking at the sevento nine-digit code on the bottom of the package — all three of the following must be present: the first two digits are a number from 22 to 37, the code contains K8, SH, or Z2, and the expiration date is April 1, 2022, or later.

The FDA advised caregivers not to dilute formula or feed babies homemade formula due to reports of infants who had consumed homemade formula and were hospitalized with low calcium levels.

The FDA stated that parents who get formula through WIC should not discard recalled formula but return it to the store for refund and exchange or call 1-800-986-8540 for help.

Families who currently do not participate in WIC but may qualify can find more information about the program by visiting www.signupwic.com

The release referred caregivers to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention or CDC website for more information on cronobacter and infant formula.

The FDA updated its press release May 16 to announce that it had issued guidance to infant formula manufacturers and temporarily will apply discretion, on a case-by-case basis, when enforcing its regulations for infant formula.

"This action is designed to increase infant formula supplies in the United States while protecting the health of infants, for whom infant formula is often the sole source of nutrition during a critical period of growth and development," the FDA said.

The following day, May 17, Sen. Tim Kaine stated he was one of 30 senators who had sent a letter to baby formula manufacturers the previous week, urging them to increase production.

"The last thing we want is to have tainted infant formula on the market, but that's putting a short-term challenge in place that's really affecting a lot of families," he wrote.

Since the letter was sent, Kaine reported three developments: Abbott agreed to resolve its safety issues and reopen its plant in a couple of weeks, the administration of President Joe Biden announced it will allow the import of baby formula to address the short-term supply challenge, and the administration will ease rules and regulations to address supply-chain issues.

Gov. Glenn Youngkin also weighed in May 17: "My administration remains engaged with industry leaders on their production capabilities, and the Virginia Department of Health is working to ensure that there are adequate supplies of baby formula statewide. Additionally, my administration has asked the FDA to utilize all resources to get the U.S. plant back into production as quickly as possible. Simply put, acquiring baby formula shouldn't be a challenge in the United States," he said.

Jon Richardson, chief operating officer of the Eastern Shore Health District, shared a list of do's and don'ts for mothers seeking help on social media during the formula shortage:

- Do contact your baby's doctor with any questions, especially if your child has diet restrictions or medical conditions. (The doctor also may have free samples of formula available, Shifflett said.)
- Do call ahead to stores to find out if the formula your baby needs is in stock.
- Do look for formula in smaller markets and drug stores.
- Do consider purchasing formula online from well-known, reputable distributors.

•Cape Charles Main Street was awarded \$5.000 to promote Festive Fridays, special events held every Friday during the winter holiday season to attract visitors to Cape Charles' shops, restaurants, entertainment venues, and other businesses.

The nonprofit was established in 2018 and is a member of the Virginia Main Street program that revitalizes downtown commercial districts while preserving the history and heritage of communities.

- Do check social media support groups for help finding stores with formula in stock.
- Do purchase a different type or brand of formula if your baby has no diet restrictions or major health issues.
- Don't purchase more than 10 to 14 days' worth of formula at once to avoid hoarding and exacerbating supply issues.
- Don't buy formula online from private sellers or auctions, as there are no quality or pricing guarantees.
- Don't buy formula from overseas, as it is not approved by the FDA and may contain contaminants.

 Don't feed your baby homemade formula, watered down formula, or plant-based milks, as these lack adequate nutrition.

If a household supply of formula has run out, a baby who is 6 to 12 months old and has no diet restrictions or health problems may drink cow's milk for a short period until more formula is obtained, Richardson said.

He also recommended pregnant women near their delivery dates to consider breastfeeding, as they likely will avoid the formula shortage.

U.S. Sen. Mark Warner said via Twitter May 19 that the Senate had passed a bill allowing WIC to ease restrictions on the types of formula that can be purchased with WIC vouchers, because "all families deserve equal opportunities to feed their children."





Chincoteague Town Council Adopts \$9.8M FY 2023 Budget

The Chincoteague Town Council at its May 19 meeting voted to adopt a \$9.8 million town budget for fiscal year 2023.

No one spoke about the budget at a May 2 public hearing.

Highlights of the 2023 budget include the town taking on the Chincoteague Civic Center fund.

Additionally, the Virginia Retirement System employer contribution increased by 2.81%.

The budget also includes a 5% increase for employee health insurance and two new positions in the Chincoteague Police Department.

Capital improvement highlights in the budget include rebuilding the boat ramp at Memorial Park; replacing a backhoe; purchasing a patrol car for the police department; replacing the Cropper Street water and storm sewer lines, as well as pavement and sidewalks; and replacing the final wooden pier at Curtis Merritt Harbor.

The council at a previous meeting approved lowering the real estate tax rate from 7 cents to 5.9 cents per hundred dollars of value, after the 2022 Accomack County assessment showed increased property values.

2022 Surplus Allocated

Vice Mayor Chris Bott reported there is a forecasted surplus of \$798,343 for fiscal year 2022, mainly due to increases in revenue, including federal American Rescue Plan Act funds the town received, along with increased revenue from meals and occupancy taxes.

Town Manager Mike Tolbert had, at Bott's request, recommended specific accounts to receive transfers from the surplus to replenish accounts that have been spent down in the past several years, Bott said.

The council unanimously approved making the following year-end allocations from the surplus:

- Transfer \$146,444 to Beach, Recreation, and Tourism.
- Transfer \$100,000 to Boat Ramp Reserve.
- Transfer \$100,000 to Property Acquisition Reserve.
- Transfer \$200,000 to Park Equipment Reserve.

The action leaves \$251,899 in unallocated surplus funds.

The council approved amending the 2022 budget to account for additional revenue, including the second allotment of federal ARPA funds, nearly \$1.5 million, received by the town.

No one spoke at a public hearing to receive comment about the amendment.

Student Government Day

The Town Council heard a report about the annual Student Government Day, a longstanding Chincoteague tradition.

"Our school is so fortunate to have the town's support," said, Katie Farrell, Chincoteague Combined Schools principal.

She thanked the Town Council for sponsoring the annual Student Government Day, during which high school seniors took on the roles of town officials, including holding a special student-led Town Council meeting Wednesday, May 18.

"They enjoyed learning how the town works and the ins and outs of every day," she said.

Chincoteague High School Senior Lindsey O'Shea reported to the council on Student Government Day.

"As we arrived yesterday, we were greeted by the heads of each department," O'Shea said, adding the department heads gave students a summary of the day's plans, along with a tour of their respective buildings.

The seniors then split into groups and began gathering information for their council meeting to be held later that day.

Some students met with Chincoteague National Wildlife Refuge officials to discuss plans for the beach and damages from the latest storm.

Others went out "to identify things in the community that could be introduced or improved," O'Shea said.

Items the students discussed included causeway safety, how to introduce more teen-related activities in town, and how to restore town parks.

Among recommendations made by the student government was to create a mural at Brianna's Kindness Park and to expand existing annual events such as the Decoy and Art Festival and the Blueberry Festival to include more locations in town.

Additionally, there was a suggestion to form a Maddox Boulevard merchants group, similar to the Main Street group, according to the minutes of the student-led meeting.





Regional Housing Study, Part 2: Costs Excessive for Some Income Levels

The recently released Eastern Shore Housing Study reveals a need for additional housing at multiple price levels and makes recommendations for how to address that need.

It is the first regional housing study done on the Shore since 2002.

The study shows low-income rental households are experiencing excessive costs for housing and it suggests multifamily housing may be the most cost-effective way to meet demand for affordable housing.

The study found the housing gap—the number of additional housing units needed for the housing inventory to match the number of households in the corresponding affordability and income level—among renters in Accomack is greatest in both the highest and the lowest income brackets.

The trends are similar for Accomack homeowners.

In contrast, Northampton has an overall shortage of affordable, available housing for both renters and homeowners in all income categories.

The housing gap is greatest for the highest income renters in Northampton. Of 795 households in that category, only 144 live in units affordable for their income.

Another 135 households with lower income occupy the remaining inventory, resulting in cost burden to those renters.

The county lacks 516 rental units to fully meet the demand for rental housing in the highest income tier.

For the lowest income renters in Northampton, there is a housing gap of 145 units, worsened by the fact that 283 homes that would be affordable to them are occupied by households with incomes higher than 30% area median income or AMI.

For housing to be affordable, the lowest income renters in Accomack should pay no more than \$576 per month for all housing costs; middle income renters should pay \$576 to \$921 per month; and the highest income renters should pay more than \$921 per month.

In Northampton, the lowest income renters should pay no more than \$354 per month; lower middle income households should pay between \$354 and \$590 per month; higher middle income households should pay between \$591

and \$945; and the highest income renters should pay more than \$945.

For Northampton homeowners, there is a housing gap of 321 units for the lowest income tier; 196 units for those at 51% to 80% of AMI; 226 units for the 81% to 100% AMI group; and 1,041 units for the highest income group, with an AMI of 101% or more.

Additionally, the study estimates between 93 and 107 Shore vulnerable residents — including those with substance use disorder, serious mental illness, experiencing homelessness, or with other conditions — need supportive housing, which combines affordability with intensive support services.

In a count on one night in January 2021, 51 Shore residents were found to be homeless.

Vacant housing units are far more common on the Shore than in Virginia as a whole, largely due to vacation homes, the study found.

Of vacant homes, 56% are reserved for seasonal or other occasional use.

Only 5% of the 10,083 vacant units on the Shore are available for rent or sale, compared to Virginia's rate of 25%.

Additionally, nearly 60% of vacant homes in Northampton and 32% in Accomack are categorized as "other vacant," meaning they either are uninhabitable, being used for storage, owned by financial institutions, or tied up in inheritance or other legal situations, among other reasons.

Barriers

The study found local zoning codes are among barriers to affordable housing.

In Accomack, zoning ordinance requirements for minimum lot size in the agricultural district; a lack of provision for accessory dwelling units as a by-right use; and inconsistency with state laws regarding mobile homes, making the county code "overly restrictive" all are barriers to meeting affordable housing needs.

Northampton also limits the use of accessory dwelling units, is unclear about mobile home regulations, and "limits housing types and provides few options for multi-family development," according to the study.

In addition to zoning, other barriers cited include rising construction costs, an inadequate supply of contractors, demographic changes, landlord issues, federal housing rent standards, poor infrastructure, limited English proficiency, underfunded programs and services, and public perception of affordable housing.

Goals and Recommendations

Implementing recommendations to improve the affordable housing situation on the Shore "will require a well-coordinated strategy within each county, and regionally in some cases, to set the stage for encouraging and facilitating new housing development," according to the study.

The strategy "is more complex than building a few additional units every few years," it said.

"In the face of woefully inadequate funding, an aging stock occupied by households without the financial capacity to maintain and repair their units, poor infrastructure and restrictive zoning that discourages even small rental developments, and local employers who cannot ramp up to their full employment capacity, the Eastern Shore's housing problem is an economic problem, too," the study's authors said.

Among goals the study cites is to harness time and talent from a diverse cross section of community leaders to guide implementation of the study's findings, including appointing a leadership team in each county and requiring an annual report from those teams.

An additional goal is to conduct a public awareness campaign to change how people perceive affordable housing.

Additionally, the region needs to expand its housing inventory by taking measures including updating comprehensive plans and zoning codes; constructing new affordable housing; requesting and supporting increased investment in educational programs in the construction trades; identifying and marketing sites for infill housing development; completing the remaining proposed phases of the Hampton Roads Sanitation District sewer project; and supporting new housing development.

Another goal is to preserve the existing housing stock by continuing community revitalization efforts and continuing to identify communities for Community Development Block Grant projects.

A final goal is to ensure safe housing for people experiencing homelessness, including through management of housing choice vouchers and evaluating the idea of using hotels as emergency shelters.

Random Facts About ... the History, Uses, and Language of Salt

When we opened our internet tubes this week, lots of things about salt came out. Although only a small amount of salt (500 mg or about a quarter of a teaspoon) is needed for life, that salt is critically necessary for muscles (including your heart) to work, for nerve impulses to be transmitted, and for fluid levels to be regulated. Medical guidelines suggest that your salt intake be kept to around 1,500 mg or about three-quarters of a teaspoon daily. American adults, however, are consuming about 3,400 mg daily (about one-and-a-half teaspoons), most of it from prepared food.

Primitive humans were hunters who ate meat and meat is a rich source of salt. But when agriculture became widespread, human civilizations developed an enormous demand for salt, which was hard to come by in ancient times. Deposits of salt deep underground, where we get most of our salt today, were beyond the mining capabilities of early human societies. People had to rely on using crude methods to evaporate seawater or on collecting salt from deposits found on or near the surface of the Earth — and those deposits were rare and jealously guarded.

In addition to salt being necessary for life and delightful for flavoring food, ancient people used salt to preserve meats and treat wounds. With demand vast and supplies restricted, salt became one of the most valuable commodities humans traded. In the 6th century, the Moors would exchange an ounce of salt for an ounce of gold. In other areas cakes or blocks of salt were used as currency. Wars were fought and global trade routes were established over salt.

Our languages are peppered (salted?) with words and phrases based on salt. "Salary" comes from the Latin "salarium," which was the payment to Roman soldiers so they could buy salt or sometimes the payment was the salt itself. Not being worth your salt means you're not measuring up.

Taking something with a grain of salt (in some societies it's with a pinch of salt) means to be skeptical and might have come from Pliny the Elder in 77 A.D. recommending that antidotes to


poison be taken with a grain of salt to make them more effective.

People began visiting salt mines as therapy. Today, you can take halotherapy, which is using salt-infused air to treat lung ailments. Salt particles in the air are anti-inflammatory and anti-bacterial.



Driver Charged With Manslaughter

A general district judge certified the vehicular manslaughter case of Justin Lafierrier, 27, of Milford, N.H., to a grand jury. Lafierriere, also known as Justin Soeum, is charged with the February crash that killed a Bloxom woman. He was driving southbound when he crossed over into the northbound lane of U.S. Route 13 near Accomac, hitting another car head-on. Testimony was the "black box" in the rented Toyota Camry recorded his speed at 93 mph when he struck the white Chrysler driven by 44-year-old Angela Marie Kellam, killing her instantly.

Two motorcyclists, both seriously injured, testified to seeing the horrific crash unfold. Each testified they were stopped in the same lane at the red light near the Parksley Royal Farms. The red Camry was directly in front of them. A little later the motorcyclists said they passed the red car. "I looked in my rear-view mirror and saw him riding on the opposite side of the road," said Treyquan Johnson. "He passed us. He was speeding. I saw him hit head-on with another car." He said the white Chrysler ended up in the southbound lane. "I saw the crash," said Terrell Northam. "We were in the passing lane still. I went down on the ground, I tried to get up. I felt pain. I couldn't get up. The red car burst into flames. They pulled him out of the car." Johnson said he laid his motorcycle down. "I got thrown off," he told the court. "The accident caused the white car to hit my bike. I was off." He used a walker and said he is still recovering from the crash that required surgery to put two metal plates and ten screws in his pelvis. Johnson said his ankle was broken.

According to testimony, the Camry was rented for the defendant by a friend. A Virginia State police officer testified that Lafierrier's driver's license restricted him, as a result of

a DUI, to driving a car with an ignition interlock device. The defendant's blood alcohol level was three times the legal limit when he arrived at the hospital, according to testimony from a doctor there.

Lafierrier is charged with involuntary manslaughter, two counts of DUI maiming, DUI second offense, and reckless driving. After hearing from eight witnesses presented by the commonwealth and questioned by defense attorney Carl Bundick, Judge Patrick Robbins found probable cause to certify the case to a grand jury.

Accomack County Circuit Court

Christopher Northcraft, 35, of Brooklyn Park, Md., pleaded guilty to misdemeanor eluding, reckless driving, and driving without a license in a plea agreement with the commonwealth. All these charges stemmed from a high-speed chase through Accomack County Oct. 19, 2021. The chase began in Maryland and ended on the Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel with a crash that left both Northcraft and passenger Brandy Bowman, 35, with major but not life-threatening injuries. According to a report by the Virginia State Police, Northcraft exited the crashed Toyota Camry and tried to get Bowman out before fleeing the scene. He went over a guardrail and fell to the ground approximately 30 feet below.

The chase, which reached speeds of 120 mph, began in Maryland where Northcraft and Bowman had warrants on file for their arrest. The chase continued to the bridge-tunnel. As the vehicle approached the North Channel high rise, the car struck a curb, spun out of control, flipped, and landed on its roof. Northcraft was combative with rescue personnel while being flown to Norfolk General Hospital. On Oct. 22, 2021, the morning he was to be discharged, he barricaded himself in his hospital room and unsuccessful-

ly attempted to open or break a window to escape. He faces multiple felony charges in Northampton County, including attempted murder, abduction, eluding drug charges, and more. Judge W. Revell Lewis III sentenced him to 12 months for eluding, 12 months for reckless driving, and six months for driving without a license. He fined him \$500 on each of those charges.

A secured bond of \$50,000 was set for Domnique Rashad Wescott, 27, of Painter. He is charged with malicious shooting, shooting at an occupied building, and use of a firearm. He was involved in what Commonwealth's Attorney Spencer Morgan described as "a shootout involving multiple people." He said bullet casings from different types of firearms were found at the trailer park in the northern part of the county where the April gunfight occurred. Quanta Mapp was shot and identified Wescott as the man who shot him. "He is a threat to the community," Morgan said. Wescott was arrested when his car ran out of gas on the Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel. He was carrying a firearm when he was arrested and charged with carrying a concealed weapon in Northampton County. "He ran out of gas on the CBBT and was walking for gas when arrested," said defense attorney Andre Wiggins. "The weapon was not concealed in his vehicle." He said his client had the gun with him because he didn't want to leave it in the car. "We have only the testimony of the victim," said Judge W. Revell Lewis III. He set bond at \$50,000, ordered We cott to be supervised by pre-trial services if released and to wear a GPS monitoring device.

Vashod Rykish Reid, 32, of Parksley, charged with felony eluding, was released on a \$4,000 bond March 30. He was arrested after a high-speed police chase resulting from an attempt to pull him over for a missing license plate on the front of his vehicle. He fled, reaching a speed of 100 mph on U.S. Route 13 near Parksley at 7:00 in the evening. A condition of his bond was that he be supervised by pre-trial services. He re-

peatedly missed appointments there as well as those with the community services board. He told the court he could not drive and relied on friends and family members to take him there. He said he worked two iobs and had little time to attend the meetings. He was taken into custody again and his bond revoked. "I don't understand," said Judge Lewis. "You have two jobs and six kids. You were operating a motor vehicle with a suspended license and no front tag. You were released on bond. Driving over 100 mph is a danger." He told Reid he would restore his bond but expected him to comply with the conditions. "You need to understand this is a serious matter. Any more of this, and you will be back."

Preston Vanness Townsend, 42, of Horntown, has been released on bond since March 30 following arrest on charges of possession of cocaine and eluding. His bond was revoked earlier this month because he has repeatedly tested positive for illegal drugs. He was tested and found positive for drug use when he appeared for his preliminary hearing. Defense attorney Carl Bundick appealed the decision and asked that Townsend's bond be reinstated. On the witness stand. Townsend said he had four children. ages 1, 2, 3, and 8, for whom he provided daily child care. He said also he was on disability because of mental issues. The mother of the children testified she would lose her job and her house if Townsend could not care for the children. Jolynn Perry, of Community Corrections, testified that Townsend attempted to cheat with a urine screen by filling the container with tap water. She described a thermometer on the vial that tells when the liquid inside is not body temperature. "There are allegations of domestic assault and battery," said Judge Lewis. "You were granted bond under certain terms and conditions. You attempted to conceal the use of cocaine [and] mental health appointments were missed. There is no doubt you will continue using cocaine while taking care of the kids. It is a severe hardship, but I would think she would not want someone taking care of her kids who is high

on cocaine." Townsend's bond was not reinstated.

Cesar Tecum-Ajanel, 28, of Melfa, pleaded guilty to possession of cocaine, driving without a license, misdemeanor hit-and-run, and DUI. He requested admission into the first offender program. He was leaving the parking lot of Stuckey's on U.S. Route 13 in January when he struck the rear passenger side of a Ford F-150. He turned southbound and ran off the road and went into a ditch a mile south of the accident, said Commonwealth's Attorney Morgan. He said the police officer said the defendant smelled of alcohol and performed poorly on a field sobriety test. He was arrested. A search found a small plastic bag of cocaine in his wallet. "He is performing well at pre-trial services," Morgan told the court. Judge Lewis told Tecum-Ajanel he must follow all the requirements of the program. He will continue to be supervised by Community Services. If Tecum-Ajanel is successful, the felony charge will be dismissed. For the misdemeanor hit-and-run, Judge Lewis sentenced him to six months, with all but time served suspended. For driving without a license, he fined him \$100. He sentenced him to 60 days for the DUI with all but time served suspended and fined him \$1,000. He told Tecum-Ajanel that \$500 of that fine will be suspended if he successfully completes the Virginia Alcohol Safety Program. He is to be of good behavior for two years. He is set to return to court on May 18, 2023.

A plea agreement was reached between the commonwealth and Michael John Szymanski, 53, of Horntown. He agreed to plead guilty to two counts of assault and battery and one count of assault and battery of a police officer. In exchange, a charge of resisting arrest was not prosecuted. Police were called to Trails End for a report of domestic assault. When the deputy arrived he found the defendant had assaulted two women. a member of his household and her friend. When the deputy attempted to

arrest him, Szymanski struck him in the back four or five times, said Assistant Commonwealth's Attorney William Fox. Defense attorney Isabel Kaldenbach said Szymanski was both caretaker and boyfriend of the woman with whom he lives. The woman, who has multiple sclerosis, obtained a protective order against him which is in effect until February 2023. "She cares for him and wants him to get help," said Kaldenbach. "He has a serious alcohol problem. He was extremely inebriated that night," she told the court.

Hannah Boyd, 25, of Accomac, entered into a plea agreement with the commonwealth. A larceny charge was dismissed in exchange for her plea of guilty to credit card fraud and to embezzlement. While employed at H.W. Drummond, Boyd used the credit card number of a customer to shop online. "She was abandoned by the father of her child and was struggling," said defense attorney Kelly Vasta. Judge Lew-

is sentenced Boyd to 90 days on each of the two charges, to run concurrently, and suspended all but 10 days on each, for a total of 10 days He told her she could serve the time on weekends.

Benito Thomas Flores, 36, of Exmore, will spend one year and six months of

active jail time. He pleaded guilty to unauthorized use of a motor vehicle, possession of cocaine, and larceny of property with a value of less than \$1,000. In May 2021, police responded to a call from an Onancock woman who said she loaned her truck to Flores and he failed to return it, said Assistant Commonwealth's Attorney Fox. He said Flores made numerous excuses when the woman contacted him. He was arrest-

ed after police spotted the truck in the T's Corner area. Judge Lewis sentenced Flores to five years with four years suspended for unauthorized use, two years with all but three months suspended for possession of cocaine, and 12 months with all but three months suspended for petty larceny, a total of 30 months. This jail time is to run concurrently with a sentence for crimes committed in Northampton County.

Murder Charges Filed Against Accomplice Following Investigation Into December Fire in New Church

The Virginia State Police Bureau of Criminal Investigation, Chesapeake Field Office, responded Dec. 4, 2021, to a request by the New Church Fire Department to investigate a suspicious fire with a deceased victim located in the residence.

"When agents arrived at the residence, it was noted that the victim had a gunshot wound to the face and a deep laceration to the neck," said

Virginia State Police Sgt. Michelle Anaya in a May 23 press release.

Gary J. Fleig Sr. was charged Dec. 9, 2021, for his role in the homicide.

On May 16, in consultation with the Accomack County Commonwealth's Attorney J. Spencer Morgan, warrants were obtained for an accomplice based on the results of the continuing investigation.

Wendy Dawn Taylor, 46, of New Church, and spouse of Gary Fleig

Sr., has been charged with murder in the first degree, murder in the second degree, arson of an occupied dwelling, breaking and entering with intent to commit a violent felony, and robbery.

Taylor is currently incarcerated in Worcester County, Md., for her involvement in another criminal activity within their jurisdiction.

The criminal investigation is ongoing.





Seniors Celebrate Older Americans Month, Making It Through 'Challenging Times'

The theme was "Seniors Aging Our Way" as members of the Hare Valley and Central Accomack senior centers celebrated Older Americans Month on May 18 with a combined live and virtual event sponsored by the Eastern Shore Area Agency on Aging/Community Action Agency.

Wayne Burton, manager of the Accomack County Parks and Recreation Department, was the master of ceremonies, and Donna Smith, chief executive officer of ESAAA/CAA, made opening remarks, reminding everyone that the first Older Americans Month, honoring Americans age 65 and older, was celebrated in May 1963.

Special guests included Betsy Mapp, chair of the Northampton County Board of Supervisors, and Billy Joe Tarr, chair of the Accomack County Board of Supervisors.

Speakers, including Northampton County Sheriff David Doughty, thanked senior citizens for all the knowledge and experience they have shared over the years, remaining steadfast throughout the COVID-19 pandemic, and continuing to serve as mentors to the younger generations.

Doughty continued, "We all should be mindful and promote awareness of the abuse and neglect that some of our older adults face today."

"We're seeing a staggering amount of fraud committed against our adults. In hopes for little resistance, criminals tend to target our vulnerable, elderly community," he said. "That's why it's so important for each of us to recommit ourselves, providing our support, our gratitude to them."

The Accomack County Sheriff's Office also was represented at the event and shared information on two of its programs that can help senior citizens maintain their independence and stay safe.

Senior Call-In Program participants provide contact information to the sheriff's office and agree to call the office every morning by a specified time. If the senior citizen doesn't call on time, a deputy is sent to the senior's home to do a wellness check.

Sometimes when seniors don't call, they usually have overslept or simply forgotten, but once the deputy knows the senior citizen is OK, all involved can resume their daily activities. On the rare occasion that a medical emergency has arisen that no one would have known about otherwise, the senior can get help quickly.

Project Lifesaver is for adults with conditions such as autism or elderly adults who suffer from Alzheimer's disease and could become lost and unable to tell someone where they live to help them get back home.

Each program participant wears a wristband that contains a tracking device that allows the sheriff's deputies to locate the missing person quickly using equipment installed in their police vehicles.

Accomack County has used Project Lifesaver to complete four rescues to date, each in less than one hour.





Vikings Girls Track Team Wins VISAA State Championship





Chayce Wayman Earns VHSL William Andrew Mullins Courageous Achievement Award

The Virginia High School League hosted its 33rd Annual Achievement Award Luncheon Monday, May 23, in Charlottesville, Va. During the luncheon, Nandua senior Chayce Wayman was honored as the 22nd recipient of the William Andrew Mullins Courageous Achievement Award.

This award was created in remembrance of Andrew Mullins, an active member in VHSL functions who was diagnosed with cancer in 1995 and lost his battle in 2000. Mullins remained involved in VHSL activities despite his inability to compete after his diagnosis. The VHSL continues to honor Mullins as an outstanding young man and inspiration with the Courageous Achievement Award.

Wayman was selected as the 2022 recipient after displaying a high level of resiliency in the classroom, on the playing field, and in the community. Wayman had the opportunity to speak about his experience during the award luncheon on Monday. At age one, he was diagnosed with profound hearing loss as an infant and received a cochlear hearing implant.

In his speech, Wayman reminisced about his childhood, explaining that there was never a time he was without a football. "By middle school I could remember football statistics better than anyone else," he said. "But the challenges began as I started high school."

The audiologist and doctors discouraged his participation in contact sports as it was too dangerous with his implant. At first, Wayman complied as he watched his peers compete during freshman year. He dabbled in golf, wrestling, and baseball as a freshman, where he experienced one of his first memorable high school moments.

Wayman stated that he had to wrestle with no sound, meaning the coaches were unable to speak to him during the match and he was unable to hear the referees' whistles. It became important for him to watch

film after matches and hear everyone cheer for him. "The support was amazing," Wayman said. "But I never had the opportunity to experience that on the mat."

In Wayman's sophomore year, after asking multiple doctors and getting approval from his parents, he suited up for his first football game. He was not just any player on the field in his first year. He became the starting quarterback for Nandua's junior varsity team. His junior year was canceled due to COVID-19, but he took the field again in the fall of 2021 for his senior season. During his senior season, he was selected as First Team All-District Quarterback and represented Nandua High School in the Eastern Shore Senior All-Star Bowl.

Wayman reminisced again about the memories of that season, highlighting a critical touchdown against Arcadia. "I remember seeing a defender coming at me, so I threw the ball to my teammate Brandon Smith just as I was being hit," he said. "I felt joy as I hit the ground because I could hear everyone cheering. That was a good thing."

Wayman concluded his speech by thanking his teachers, individual education plan team, friends, family, and coaches for the support throughout his career. He mentioned the importance of having people who encouraged him and helped him by doing things like creating hand signals for the offense in football and cheering him on in wrestling even when he couldn't hear them.

These were just a few of the moments where Wayman has shown extreme resilience during his high school career. His achievement did not stop on the playing field. Wayman participated in multiple church activities throughout high school and volunteered his time at local Little

Leagues both coaching and umpiring.

His deaf specialist teacher, Dana Wright, said, "Due to his hearing impairment, he has had to overcome incredible odds in school and sports. Chayce is an incredible student who has worked hard to overcome many obstacles. He has made significant contributions both in the classroom and on the playing field."

The state of Virginia is the home of 96,000 seniors in the class of 2022. Only one student athlete has the honor to be selected for the Courageous Achievement Award. The Eastern Shore has only received one other achievement award from the VHSL, 26 years ago. Nandua High School has never had a student honored through the VHSL. Wayman defied all odds by competing in four sports during his high school career while simultaneously maintaining honor roll and volunteering in the community, showing everyone he has a courageous spirit.

Chincoteague and Wallops Island National Wildlife Refuges Release Draft Hunting Plan for Public Review

Hunting and fishing are traditional uses of the National Wildlife Refuge System. At Chincoteague and Wallops Island National Wildlife Refuges (NWR), people of all backgrounds and abilities are welcomed to participate in recreational hunting and fishing.

Chincoteague and Wallops Island NWRs are seeking public reviews and comments on its proposed hunting opening plan. The public is invited to review the draft documents for our proposed hunts, including the Draft Hunting Plan, Compatibility Determinations, and Environmental Assessment. These documents will be available for a 60-day comment period.

Chincoteague NWR is proposing to continue to allow deer and migratory game bird hunting and open new opportunities for raccoon, opossum, fox, and coyote hunting during the state deer season only; adding additional migratory game bird species including woodcock, dove, snipe, gallinule, and crow to the existing waterfowl hunt; and opening a quota turkey hunt.

Other changes include no longer allowing the use of shotguns in the former Tom's Cove Hook zone (now merged and part of archeryonly zone), requiring nonlead ammunition for upland game, migratory game birds, and turkey immediately, while instituting a fouryear phase out of lead ammunition for deer (nontoxic ammunition will be required by 2026).

Wallops Island NWR is proposing to continue to allow deer hunting and open new opportunities for raccoon, opossum, fox, coyote, rabbit, and squirrel; opening to all migratory game birds (waterfowl, goose, coot, rail, snipe, wood-

cock, dove, gallinule, and crow); and opening a quota turkey hunt. Wallops Island NWR will also be requiring the use of nonlead ammunition for upland game, migratory game birds, and turkey immediately, while instituting a four-year phase out of lead ammunition for deer (nontoxic ammunition will be required by 2026).

A signed brochure, available at no cost, will be required to hunt on Chincoteague and Wallops Island NWRs. All required state permits must be in possession of the hunter while hunting on the refuge. Daily sign-in and signout procedures will be required for big game hunters at Chincoteague NWR.


The comment period will stay open through the end of the 2022–2023 Station-Specific Hunting and Sport Fishing Regulations comment period to be announced in the Federal Register. Public comments are accepted through June. The webpages will be updated with the final date soon.

Fishing from the Shore By Bill Hall



While the recent air temperatures may have felt more like August than May, the recent fishing action has been equally as hot. Black drum fishing has been very good, with anglers starting to recognize the importance of releasing some of these slow-growing giants after snapping a few pictures. Pinhead croakers have made their summer time appearance on the seaside, much to the chagrin of drum fishermen trying to keep bait on their hooks. Look for an early appearance of cobia, though the state's cobia season does not open until June 15. The first tuna of the season have been caught out of Ocean City, Md.

Upper Shore - Captain Matt Abell, at the Sea Hawk Sports Center, said the recent seaside flounder action has been "real good." Abell commented that silversides have recently been the best bait by far. Pink has been the most productive teaser color, followed by chartreuse, then white. Best action has still been occurring on a falling tide in shallow water. On a recent charter, John and Star Krieger landed a limit of flounder to 24 inches in less than three hours. Abell said the Assateague surf has produced large rockfish, with most exceeding the 36-inch maximum size limit.

Local anglers Jenna and Garett Daisey landed large black drum in Machipongo Inlet. Abell said the recent Smith Island Fishing Tourney benefiting the town's Cultural Center was a huge success with anglers landing lots of red drum, speckled trout, and rockfish. Anglers reported several slam catches. Finally, Abell commented the bullfish (cownosed ray) population appears to be at an all-time high.

Jimmy Vasiliou, at Captain Steve's Bait and Tackle, confirmed the striper action in the surf, showing me pictures of fish measuring up to 44 inches that had been released. Most of the fish had been caught on peeler crab baits fished on a Captain Steve's Hi-Low rig. A few sheepshead have also been landed in the surf.

Wachapreague Captain Lindsay Paul, at Trident Tackle, said

the flounder fishing was improving with the clean water, although it still could not be considered "hot." Berkley Gulp with live minnows continue to be the most popular flounder bait. Paul added there were still black drum available in the inlet area. Black sea bass catches were coming from the offshore wrecks, but Paul had not heard of any blue water action.

Amanda Manzella, at the Wachapreague Inn, reported guest Henry Forrester caught nine keeper-sized flounder and a trout while fishing aboard the Foxy Lady. Captain Tom Hart led a group of guests who caught 18 flounder over a two-day period, keeping 10 fish. Manzella said black sea bass were caught by some of the Inn's guest near buoy R-10.

Lower Shore - Jeb Brady, at Bailey's Bait & Tackle, said black drum fishing on both sides of the lower Shore "has been on fire!" Top black drum locations have been out of Oyster on the seaside and in the area around buoy 13 on the bayside. Sheepshead fishing has rebounded along sections of the bridge-tunnel. The surf behind Smith Island and Fisherman Island is still producing big red drum. Flounder catches have been coming from inside the Ditch and along the Fisherman Inlet Bridge. Whiting catches are coming from the concrete ships and along the bridge-tunnel.

Dez Louie, at Oceans East - Eastern Shore, confirmed the recent run of excellent black drum fishing, specifically mentioning Nautilus Shoal, buoy 13, and the inlets accessible from Oyster. Louie said that numerous large sheepshead have been taken by anglers targeting black drum. Schools of red drum are patrolling the waters off Fisherman Island with fish in excess of 50 inches caught by anglers casting

crabs and bucktails to the edges of the schools.
