17-Year-Old Dies in Vehicle Crash

On June 13, at approximately 7:24 p.m., Virginia State Police were called to investigate a single-vehicle crash in Accomack County that resulted in a fatality.

The driver and sole occupant of a 2006 Ford Mustang, 17-year-old Joshua Antonio Vasquez, was traveling northbound on Mount Nebo Road,

north of Dingleys Mill Road, in Onancock, at a high rate of speed, failed to negotiate the turn, and ran off the roadway. Vasquez struck a tree and died upon impact.

Vasquez was not wearing his seatbelt at the time of the crash, and it is unknown if alcohol was a contributing factor.

Notifications to family members and next of kin have been made.

Retiring Subrina Parker 'Beat the Odds' to Become Star Teacher and Kiptopeke Principal

Subrina Parker, principal of Kiptopeke Elementary School, may be retiring, but her story isn't over yet.

It started in Townsend, where she was born Subrina Owens and was raised in the same house she lives in now.

She attended Northampton County Public Schools from kindergarten through 12th grade: Cheriton Primary School for grades K to 3 and Capeville Elementary for grades 4 to 6 followed by Northampton Middle School and

Northampton High School, from which she graduated in 1986.

"I beat the odds," said Parker, who had her first child during her senior year of high school, then had a second child in December of her freshman year of college.

Her grandmother, mother, brothers, and sister all pitched in to help care for her children so she could complete her education and get her college degree. "I am so grateful for my strong family," Parker said.

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Northampton Public Schools Appoints New Superintendent

The new superintendent of Northampton County Public Schools will be Jaime Cole, who has served as associate superintendent for the last year.

“I am pleased to be selected and to also work as a team with all the school leaders, the board members, the community, the parents,” Cole said upon signing her contract during a special school board meeting June 9.

Vice Chair Liz Jones had made the motion to hire Cole, which passed in a 3-1 vote, with school board member William Oakley opposed due to his disagreement with the terms of the superintendent’s contract.

Cole’s term will begin July 1, and she will replace Superintendent Eddie Lawrence, who is retiring after eight years in the position and more than 40 years in education.

She has expressed a desire to seek more community involvement in Northampton’s public schools and is prepared to take the necessary steps to allow community members, such as retired teachers and others, to volunteer

in the schools.

Cole also believes in teamwork and identifying employees’ abilities and placing them where they can provide the most benefit.

She described an experience she had as an administrator in which a teacher who had struggled for years with middle school students was transferred to her school. Cole was basically told to force the teacher into retirement.

But instead Cole assigned the teacher a first grade class, and the teacher excelled.

“You have to use people’s strength and place them where they’re going to be successful,” Cole said.

She grew up in a military family who moved all around the country for her father’s work. Before moving to the Eastern Shore, Cole spent 21 years in Arizona, where she received all her previous professional experience in education.

She has been in the roles of teacher, special education teacher, assistant principal, principal, instructional coach, and superintendent, a position she held for five years.

All of Cole’s previous experience as

an educator was in northern Arizona on Native American reservations.

Cole did not apply for her current position of Northampton schools associate superintendent but was recruited by human resources director Melinda Phillips while Cole was working on her dissertation on high school dropout rates for Native American and Hispanic students. Cole will soon receive her doctorate degree.

Her previous experience prepared her to work with diverse student populations as found in Northampton County. According to the U.S. Census Bureau, Northampton’s population was approximately 56% White, 32% Black, and 9% Hispanic as of 2020. A small percentage of residents were multiracial, Asian, or American Indian.

Cole’s year as Northampton schools’ associate superintendent was the school year in which many students returned to the classroom with learning losses due to the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic and virtual learning, which was ineffective for some learners.

To address those learning losses,

Cole has largely spent the last year overhauling the school division’s curriculum map and pacing guides “so everyone’s on the same page.”

“I feel like that’s a huge accomplishment this year,” Cole said.

Next year, as superintendent, she plans to work on parent engagement and “keeping the focus on the kids,” not on politics.

Her aim is to identify the positive aspects of the community and determine how they can benefit students.

“This community has everything. You have so many ... people wanting to help. ... You don’t find that in a lot of communities,” Cole said.

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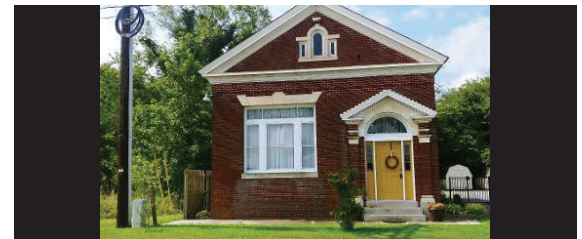

She attended Old Dominion University with the intention of becoming a dental hygienist. She did not become a dental hygienist but completed ODU's dental assistant program. (A dental assistant can provide some dental care under a dentist's supervision, but a dental hygienist can provide preventative care without supervision.)

Parker returned home to the Eastern Shore in 1988 and worked as an instructional assistant in fifth grade at Machipongo Elementary School. "That's what changed my life," she said.

She assisted Josephine Ferebee, who taught in Northampton schools for 30 years. Ferebee died in 2021 at age 84.

Working with Ferebee "was the best experience. It was at that point I knew I wanted to be a teacher," Parker said.

She liked how Ferebee managed her classroom and built relationships with her students. Ferebee was firm but consistent and fair. She and her students respected each other, and no matter what, "the kids knew she loved them," Parker said. The people at Machipongo Elementary made "you feel like family."

Parker resumed her studies at ODU and changed her major to middle education; she graduated in 1992.

In between quitting her job as an instructional assistant and going back to college, she was a substitute teacher, and through that experience Parker learned that she wanted to teach slightly older students.

She started teaching in the 1992-1993 school year, a sixth grade class at Machipongo Elementary School.

Parker was recruited by then-associate superintendent Berkeley Ashby, when Dawn Goldstine was superintendent.

Parker has held several different positions in education, all in Northampton County.

She was one of the first teachers to work at the TECH Center, Northampton's alternative school.

Parker started at Kiptopeke Elementary School in 1995 and taught there until 2004.

Then she became the academic dean of students, a new position created by Superintendent Mary Kay

English. Parker was based at the high school and her role was somewhat similar to a guidance counselor. She held that position for two or three years and later became the division teacher mentor.

When Parker was the division teacher mentor, Karen Foley was the assistant principal of Kiptopeke Elementary, and in 2009, the two women swapped jobs.

Parker was Kiptopeke's assistant principal until 2013, when she became its principal, a position she's held for nearly a decade.

The greatest accolade Parker ever received for her work was the National Milken Award she won in 2002, which is like "the Oscars of teaching," she said.

Parker was presented the "big check" for the \$25,000 award in October 2002, but the actual award ceremony in California was not scheduled until May 2003.

The Milken Family Foundation paid for plane tickets for Parker and one guest to attend the ceremony. Parker's sister had planned to accompany her but was diagnosed with breast cancer and had to have surgery and was unable to take the trip.

On short notice, Gwyn Coghill, who taught Parker in fifth grade and became her all-time favorite teacher, made the trip instead.

Coghill had planned the retirement dinner for Superintendent Goldstine and had to catch her flight as soon as the celebration ended. Parker had arrived in California the day before; it was her first trip to the state and the first time she had flown.

Parker said she's "forever grateful" to Coghill for being there for her on one of the biggest nights of her life.

Parker also recalled her three favorite accomplishments as principal of Kiptopeke Elementary School.

When she became principal, the school had been denied accreditation by the Virginia Department of Education. However, after three years, Kiptopeke was awarded full accreditation.

Parker also got the school involved in the annual February Freeze that benefits Habitat for Humanity. Kiptopeke had never participated in the charitable event before she was principal, but now February Freeze is "part

of the culture” of the school.

She also was grateful for the opportunity to partner with the community to clean up a natural area in front of the school and convert it into an amphitheater called Discovery Park. Parker noted the amphitheater had just been used for the sixth grade recognition ceremony.

Parker said she has faced many challenges that she had to overcome to achieve success in life. She grew up poor, although she didn’t know her family was poor at the time. She was taught to take care of things – if you had a dirt floor, you swept it, Parker said.

She was a single mother of two at age 18, and she faced the loss of a third child who lived only one month.

Commuting to ODU was uncommon when Parker attended the college, but she did it.

Not only did she succeed, but her daughters did, too.

After witnessing the life of a teacher behind the scenes, both daughters vowed not to enter the education field; when they went to college, one studied biology and the other studied chemistry.

Now Parker’s elder daughter, Shantelle Brinkley, is the assistant principal of Gloucester High School, a little more than two hours away, in Gloucester, Va., and Parker’s younger daughter, SuCora Owens, is the principal of Nandua Middle School.

There is more to Parker’s story – enough to fill a book that she plans to write someday. She hopes her story will inspire hard work and determination in others.

“I feel accomplished, but it’s my time to go and think about the next chapter of my life,” she said of her upcoming retirement.

Parker felt the need to take an extended break after working as an elementary school principal through the COVID-19 pandemic that lasted more than two years, but she didn’t want to resign, so she opted for retirement.


She said she will resume her career, but she doesn’t want to be a principal – she wants to be a teacher again.

Parker said teaching is about “more than a textbook, it’s about allowing children to grow, people to grow,” and that’s what she’s about.

Teaching is “the gift that God has given me.”

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Parksley Officials Approve Police Truck, Efforts to Fund Dog Park; Table Library Streetlights

Parksley officials discussed dogs and cats, among other topics, during the June 13 Town Council meeting.

The council voted to move forward with efforts to fund a dog park through a grant.

Parksley area resident Nicole Donaway asked for approval to apply for funding through the PetSafe Bark for Your Park contest, in which four localities will be awarded \$25,000 each to create a dog park.

The winners will be determined by an online vote, she said.

Parksley's dog park, if it happens, will be located in one corner of the existing town park.

Donaway volunteered her time to head up the project.

"I think this would be a big draw for the town," she said.

The council voted to donate \$500 to Northern Accomack Community Cats, a nonprofit that offers trap-neuter-release services for feral, or community, cats.

Councilwoman Jan Welch said the organization has neutered or spayed 57 cats in Parksley, with 65 remaining on its registry waiting to be neutered or spayed.

"So we have a problem," she said, noting the town of Onley recently made a donation to the organization.

Library Lights Request Tabled

The council tabled a request from the Eastern Shore Public Library to add streetlights at the rear of the library building under construction in town.

Mayor Frank Russell said he sent a letter to library officials about the request saying that Parksley is "behind the library 100%."

Still, he said, the issue is that there already is lighting included in the building blueprints.

"When it gets done, we will of course look at the light" and address the issue if more is needed for security, said Councilman Henry Nicholson.

Museum Renovations

Nicholson said renovation work is starting on the museum portion of the

building that also houses the town offices and the DMV Select office.

He hopes to see work completed within 30 days.

Police Vehicle Purchase

The council approved spending up to \$50,000 to purchase and equip a specially designed Ford pickup truck for the police department.

The current police vehicle, a 2012 model, has more than 200,000 miles on it.

Councilman Ricky Taylor proposed using money from the town's federal American Rescue Plan Act allotment for the purchase.

He said Cape Charles police and the Virginia Marine Police use the same model vehicle and said the truck after its use by police potentially could be turned over to the public works department to use.

Sewage System

The council voted to spend \$17,475 of the town's ARPA allotment to clean and coat tanks in the town's sewage system.

Trash Ordinance

The council voted to hold a public hearing Monday, July 11, at 6:30 p.m., about a revised trash ordinance.

Parking Problems

The council agreed to review the existing parking ordinance after residents brought up problems with people parking multiple vehicles in their front yards.

Downtown Revitalization

A final walk through of the state grant-funded downtown revitalization project, with exception of the facade improvement portion, is scheduled for July 1, according to Councilman Dan Matthews.

It is likely enough grant money will be left over from the facade project to purchase and install a bandshell at the stage area, he said.

New Business Coming to Parksley

Russell introduced Kelly and G.W. Hart, the new owners of the restaurant now known as the Club Car Cafe. Their new restaurant will be called Off the Rails and is set to open in August.

"We are tickled to have you in town," Russell said.

Parksley Celebrates Renovated DMV Select, Town Office

Parksley held a double celebration Friday, June 10, and Saturday, June 11, marking five years of having a DMV Select office in town as well as the completion of extensive renovations to the building that houses both the DMV and town office.

The building, the former Fulton Ayres Produce Grading Shed, was built in 1920. Ayres donated it to the town in 1992.

The building, in addition to the town office and the DMV, also houses the gift shop and artifact display area for the Eastern Shore Railway Museum.

Ayres, who died in 2003 at age 86, was a produce dealer and served as clerk of court for Accomack County for 24 years.

The restored building includes a room with displays of old photographs, historic documents, and other artifacts from the town's history, including Ayres' desk and the town's last remaining hitching post.

Parksley was founded as a planned community in 1885.

Mayor Frank Russell at Friday's event welcomed Barry Browning, statewide director for Virginia DMV Selects, among other dignitaries.

Parksley has the only DMV Select office in Accomack County. (Onancock has a DMV Customer Service Center.)

"It has been a blessing to our town. It brings a lot of folks into our town,"

said Russell, adding, "The guys and gals from the DMV have been wonderful to work with."

"This partnership is just amazing," Browning said of the Parksley office, adding that the renovated office "is one of the prettiest DMV Selects that we have."

The Parksley DMV since it opened has processed more than 50,000 transactions and brought thousands of dollars in the revenue to the locality, according to Browning.

"We notice the work that you do," he told the staff and officials.

Russell recognized staff Lauren Lewis, Emily Belote, and Courtney Chapman for their excellent work.

Russell also thanked the volunteers, including among others Councilman Henry Nicholson and former Councilman Mark Layne, who worked long hours and even paid their own work crews out of their pocket to keep down the cost of renovating the building.

"The work, the planning, the design of this office would not have happened without a very modest man named Henry Nicholson," Russell said.

The town held an open house Saturday for members of the public to tour the renovated building, view artifacts, and enjoy refreshments.

Renovations to the museum portion of the building are in the works, with around \$27,000 of the amount allocated to the project remaining.

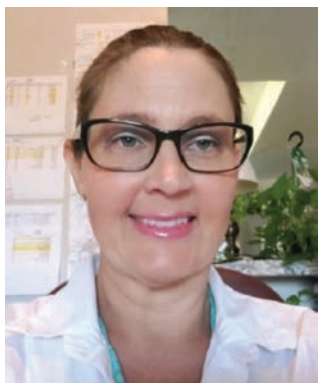

Melfa Man Acquitted of Rape of Minor

Adam Watkins, 36, of Melfa, was acquitted of rape in a jury trial on Tuesday.

Watkins was charged with the 2018 forcible rape of his sister-in-law who was only 14 years old at the time.

The girl, who lives in Maryland, was staying with her sister, Samantha Watkins, and Adam Watkins during the summer of 2018 to help care for the couple's young son while they were working.

Samantha Watkins testified she was using drugs that summer. "I was out of my head with jealousy." She said her drug use caused her to be paranoid. She said she thought her husband was cheating on her with various women including her young sister at that time.

The girl testified Watkins came home from work early one day near the end of August. "He made sexual comments and tried to touch me. I pulled away."

She said Watkins carried her upstairs and raped her. "I asked him

to stop. I said no." She said she was afraid and told no one about it until Thanksgiving of 2020.

Her sister left Watkins and was staying in Salisbury, Md., with her mother and sister. Early in the morning of the day after the holiday, the girl's mother awoke to a fight between her two daughters. She heard Samantha Watkins accuse her sister of having sex with her husband. The girl told her she was raped. When their mother overheard this, she brought her daughter to the Accomack County Sheriff's Office and charges against Watkins were filed.

"This is not a complicated case," said Commonwealth's Attorney Spencer Morgan. "This man forced himself on a 14-year-old child."

"This was a family squabble," said defense attorney Diane Toscano. She compared it to an episode on the Jerry Springer show. A jury of five men and seven women deliberated for a little more than an hour before returning with a verdict of not guilty.

While the 2022 legislative session adjourned in March, we have been in a special session awaiting a negotiated budget deal for months. The Virginia Legislature is constitutionally obligated to produce and approve a balanced budget by the start of the fiscal year on July 1 or risk a government shutdown.

The budget committees released the compromise budget over Memorial Day weekend and the legislature voted to pass it on July 1. Because the amended House and Senate budgets were hundreds of millions in revenue apart from one another, significant work had to be done to align them. With the final budget, both sides gave and the result is one that is advantageous to all Virginians and favorable to the Eastern Shore.

The Senate prioritized increasing teacher salaries, and that priority remained in the final budget. It maintained the 5% raise for each year of the two-year budget for a total raise of 10%, critical to staffing our public schools. While this appropriation will give teachers a much-needed pay raise, the public schools on the Shore are

still competing with Maryland, where salaries are significantly higher.

In this budget, \$1.7 million dollars was appropriated to Northampton and Accomack counties to increase salaries as a means of attracting and retaining teachers while competing with Maryland. This comes on the heels of last year's \$2 million appropriation for the same purpose.

This supplement and ultimate inclusion in Cost of Compete Allowances have been priorities of mine for some time, and this budget does include language directing the Joint Legislative Audit and Review Commission (JLARC) to do a comprehensive study of the commonwealth's COCA that would include looking at the inclusion of Northampton and Accomack counties. As I mentioned in an earlier column, I am hopeful that we will get the first part of that study prior to the 2023 session, and that there will be recommendations that recognize how necessary our inclusion in COCA is to the quality of education here on the Shore.

Additionally, budget allocations to increase support staff and offer one-

time \$1,000 bonuses to public school educators and hundreds of millions of dollars in investment for school construction and modernization all should prove beneficial to the Shore.

The biggest difference in the budgets during this year's session was regarding taxes, and the final budget includes an increase in the standard tax deduction for single filers from \$4,500 to \$9,000 and \$9,000 to \$16,000 for married couples filing jointly. These increases are in place only through 2026 and will be scaled back if the commonwealth fails to meet our revenue targets.

The budget also authorizes rebate checks of up to \$250 per single filer and \$500 per married couple filing jointly. In a compromise, the budget also includes tax relief for retired veterans and a provision that will make the earned-income tax credit partially refundable. Additionally, the 1.5% state tax on groceries was eliminated while the optional 1% put forth by localities remained in place.

The final budget includes \$25 million in new funding for a Resilient Revolving Loan Fund created by my bill, Senate Bill 756. This funding would be available in the form of loans and grants to local governments and individuals for critical resiliency projects. Equally as important for the Shore is the increase in funding to our Waterway Maintenance Fund. The multi-million dollar increase would allow for additional awarding of dollars by the Virginia Port

Authority to several dredging projects on the Shore and in other rural coastal areas of the commonwealth. This is in addition to a one-time allocation of \$5 million for the purchase of two shallow-water dredges for the Eastern Shore and Middle Peninsula.

As it relates directly to the Shore, the final budget allocates more than \$12 million to the towns of Wachapreague, Exmore, Parksley, and Accomack for their sewer expansion in conjunction with the Hampton Roads Sanitation District and includes \$1.5 million to complete the Chincoteague Inlet Study. The budget allocates \$350,000 to the Eastern Shore Public Library and Heritage Center and \$114,000 from my budget amendment in funding to the Eastern Shore Coalition Against Domestic Violence for infrastructure needs at their new facility.

This is just a glimpse into the final biennial budget bill we passed June 1. The final version of the budget as it passed should be available on the state budget website in the coming days. The governor has hinted that he may be sending down amendments, but he must do so within seven days from June 9 when he received the budget.

The legislature is still not adjourned from our special session, as legislators are still working through differences in the final handful of House and Senate bills that need to be brought to a vote. We will likely head to Richmond one more time before the July 1 deadline.

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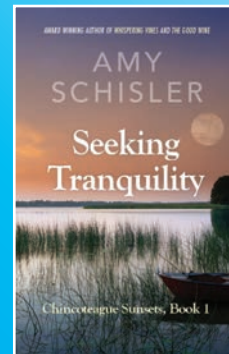

In this week's report I will focus on the appropriations that are for the Eastern Shore. Some of these were included in Gov. Ralph Northam's outgoing budget. If the Senate and the House do not remove an item from the budget or amend the item, it will be included in the final budget. If the Senate or the House changes anything about the appropriation, whether it is the amount, the recipient, or just the timeline of the appropriation through that item, it will become an item of negotiation between the Senate and the House in the conference committee. This group consists of six delegates and eight senators and it negotiates the final wording and amount of any appropriation.

I will begin with what were results of Gov. Northam's proposals that were not amended. I was grateful he showed preference to the Eastern Shore in his outgoing budget. The Eastern Shore Library and Heritage Center received \$350,000. This brings the state support for this project to a total of almost \$2 million. This will hopefully finalize the project with

a projected opening of September 2022. The Chincoteague inlet study had an appropriation of \$1.5 million, which also remained in the budget. I am hoping that there will be a matching amount needed from the Army Corps of Engineers dredge project for the Chincoteague Inlet.

Two appropriations were included in the governor's budget that are a product of the Manufacturing, Employment, Incentive "MEI" Commission. The Rocket Lab project will receive a \$15 million payout if employment numbers and salary projections are met. This is in addition to the \$20 million for Rocket Lab expansions and improvements to the launch capacity on Wallops Island. Both of these items were suggestions of the MEI Commission on which I serve and both were approved without any dissenting votes.

The speaker has called us to reconvene for special session Friday, June 17, to discuss Gov. Glenn Youngkin's amendments. In the next budget update, I will focus on items we had to negotiate that were included in the final budget from this conference committee.

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ACCOMACK BOARD DISCUSSES RESCUE PLAN OPTIONS, POSTPONES DECISION ON JUPITER POWER

The Accomack County Board of Supervisors Wednesday discussed priorities for spending \$3.1 million in federal funds coming to the county in the second and final allotment resulting from the American Rescue Plan Act.

The board by consensus postponed action on allocating the money until the county receives cost information for one of the projects, a regional 911 communications system.

The money must be obligated for specific uses by Dec. 31, 2024.

Accomack County Administrator Mike Mason in April recommended three potential uses for the money: \$892,000 to \$1,563,000 for the remainder of the cost for the 911 communication infrastructure project; \$50,000 for a feasibility study for a sewer system in the northern part of the county; and \$1.5 million for broadband infrastructure to match a state grant.

Additional funding requests were made at a May 5 town hall meeting, including \$250,000 for renovations to the Eastern Shore Coalition Against Domestic Violence facility; \$52,966 to provide broadband access to migrant agricultural workers via Wi-Fi hotspots; \$533,000 to help Eastern Shore Rural Health replace dental units at two schools; and \$2.2 million to help ESRH expand dental services to Onley Community Health Center.

After the town hall, the county received two additional requests: \$50,000 for startup funds for the Onancock Bayside Revitalization organization and \$60,000 for the Mary Nottingham Smith Center to renovate an office and the board room.

Those two requests do not appear to fit approved uses for the federal funds, according to Mason.

The total amount for the projects recommended or requested is \$6.275 million if the higher amount for the 911 project is used, Mason said.

Hearings Held on Wattsville

Battery Energy Storage Facility

The board after holding public hearings postponed action until July on Jupiter Power/Scout Energy's applications for rezoning and a conditional use permit for a \$45 million, 80-megawatt,

battery storage facility on 11.6 acres in Wattsville.

The Accomack County Planning Commission previously voted 6-1, with one absent and one abstaining, to recommend approval of the applications.

Only one speaker, Robert Tittle, who owns property in Wattsville, addressed the board during the hearings.

Tittle spoke against the project, noting 600 area residents had signed a petition opposing it.

"They just don't want it," he said.

Company representatives said they made changes to the project in response to input from the county and previous public comment, including at hearings held by the planning commission.

The company also met with local fire departments.

Benefits of the facility include support for the power grid and revenue for the county, according to Nat Drucker, director of project development for Jupiter Power.

Changes include setting aside a right of way for possible future expansion of Route 175, adding more vegetative buffers, and changing the design of a wall that will surround the facility, among others.

Board members asked questions about safety of the technology, including whether lithium batteries can explode and how they will be disposed of once their life is expended.

The used batteries will be sent to a recycling facility, according to the company.

Supervisor Robert Crockett asked that a condition be added to the conditional use permit specifying the batteries will not be disposed of in Accomack County, to which company representatives agreed.

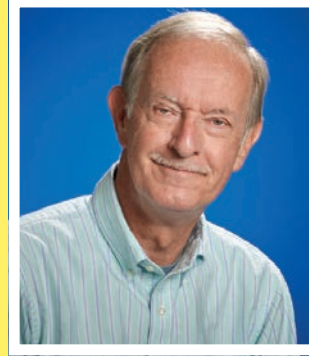
The county could receive at least \$3.6 million in revenue over 25 years from the facility, assuming a revenue share ordinance is enacted, an attorney for the company said at a planning commission meeting in February.

The board of supervisors voted to schedule a public hearing July 20 for a revenue share ordinance that would provide for a different form of taxation for energy storage systems.

Under state law, the county is authorized to impose a rate of up to \$1,400 per megawatt, which would be assessed

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Accomack Circuit Court Indictments

A grand jury meeting in Accomack County Monday, June 6, handed down indictments against 17 people.

Justin Laferriere, also known as Justin Soeum, 27, of Milford, N.H., was indicted on charges of manslaughter and driving under the influence maiming in connection with a Feb. 8 crash in which Angela Kellam, of Bloxom, died and Breonte Shrieves, Terrell Northam, and Treyquan Johnson were injured.

Laferriere was driving southbound when he crossed over into the northbound lane of U.S. Route 13 near Accomack, hitting another car head-on, according to testimony given in Accomack County General District Court in May, when the case was certified to the grand jury.

Testimony was the “black box” in his

rented Toyota Camry recorded his speed at 93 mph when Laferriere struck the white Chrysler driven by 44-year-old Kellam, killing her instantly.

Laferriere’s blood alcohol level was three times the legal limit when he arrived at the hospital, according to testimony from a doctor.

Timothy John VanHart, 25, an inmate in the Accomack County jail, was indicted on charges of malicious wounding by a mob and acts of violence by a mob, in connection with a

•Jaylon Calvin Harmon, 23, of Belle Haven, malicious bodily injury, abuse and neglect of a child, unlawfully shooting in commission of a felony, reckless handling of a firearm causing serious injury, possession of a firearm by a convicted felon, assault and battery of a law enforcement officer, attempting to disarm a law enforcement officer, and attempted first-degree murder, in connection with a Dec. 3, 2021, incident. Harmon allegedly shot the victim 10 times while holding their child, according to a checklist for bail determination. He is being held without bail.

•Lance Carl Jester, 37, of Parksley, abduction, strangulation of another, and rape, in connection with a Nov. 29, 2021, incident.

•Ceonta Kellam, 31, of Temperanceville, possession of a firearm by a convicted felon, in connection with a Jan. 1 incident.

Accomack Circuit Court

Three men involved in a fight in cellblock E in July 2021 at Accomack County jail were sentenced for unlawful wounding. The victim, Derek Robinson, was described as “no angel” by Northampton County Assistant Commonwealth’s Attorney Jack Thornton who prosecuted the cases. The inmates had “a civil order,” he said. “They had a system that worked well for them.” Each person had a time to use the telephone. There was a general order that made life behind bars easier, he told the court.

Then, a stranger moved into cellblock E. Derek Robinson, from New Jersey, was not accepting of the “civil order.” Thornton said Robinson repeatedly threatened the others. He told them he was a gang member and threatened to kill them or have them killed. Finally, they had enough and there was a fight. Before deputies could get there and break it up, Corbin Kenji Drummond, 42, of Atlantic, Traquan Timmons, 22, of Tasley, and Dijon Ryheem Smith, 30, of Fredericksburg, Va., were all involved. Most of the men in the cellblock watched from the sidelines, Thornton said, but these three did not.

Thornton said Robinson “brought much of it upon himself” by infringing on the phone time of others, mouthing off, and generally causing a disturbance. It started when Robinson struck Dijon Smith. Smith got on top of Robinson and Timmons piled on top of them. “After a few minutes of mutual combat, it became a group of three beating up on Robinson,” Thornton said. He said the attack may have been provoked but then went too far.

All three were charged with malicious wounding. Drummond and Timmons pleaded guilty in March to the lesser charge of unlawful wounding in a plea agreement with the commonwealth. Thornton said Robinson did not come to testify against those who beat him badly enough to require hospitalization because, “he was in Philadelphia committing a murder.” The third man, Dijon Smith, was the primary offender

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in the incident, according to Thornton. He pleaded guilty in April to unlawful wounding and assault and battery. Traquan Timmons, described as having “a long and violent criminal history as a juvenile,” was sentenced to five years with all but one year and six months suspended for unlawful wounding. He was ordered to be on supervised probation for one year after his release and 10 years of good behavior. “This sentence is not concurrent with any other,” said Judge W. Revell Lewis III.

Corbin Drummond was sentenced to five years with all time suspended for his conviction of unlawful wounding. He will be on one year of supervised probation and 10 years of required good behavior. Dijon Smooth, who Thornton described as more culpable than the other two, was sentenced to three years and six months, with two years and six months suspended for unlawful wounding and 12 months with six suspended for assault and battery for a total of one year and six months of active jail time. He will be on supervised probation for one year and good behavior for 10 years.

“This was a very violent situation,” said Judge Lewis.

Joshua Michael Green, 25, of Chincoteague, charged with attempting to buy a gun while under a protective order and making a false statement on a firearm purchase application, entered into a plea agreement with the commonwealth. In exchange for his plea of guilty, the charge of making a false statement will not be prosecuted. Adjudication on the felony charge of attempting to buy a firearm will be deferred for two years. He will be on probation during that time. If he is successful, he will be found guilty only of a misdemeanor.

Green attempted to buy a firearm at Circle Arms gun shop on Chincoteague. A Virginia State police investigation of his application showed he was the subject of a protective order in New York. Defense attorney Brandon Matthews said his client has no criminal history and has a government security clearance. “You will be on supervised probation until June 6, 2024,” said Judge Lewis. “If you comply, you will be found guilty of a misdemeanor.”

Tania Zyonna Tyler, 29, of Horntown, charged with embezzlement from the

U.S. Postal Service, entered into a plea agreement with the commonwealth. She was a Postal Service employee who worked in the Assawoman, Saxis, and Withams post offices, said Assistant Commonwealth’s Attorney Michael Baker. Her crime was discovered by a substitute post office employee who noticed the financial reports and receipts did not match. “She logged transactions that had no receipts,” said Baker. She admitted pocketing the cash but could not believe she had taken as much as \$5,936.28, he said.

“The commonwealth has agreed to defer adjudication in the case in exchange for restitution payments of \$200 a month for 30 months. Tyler must report to probation and parole during that time. Baker said the USPS recommended this solution.

“The case will be continued to Dec. 24, 2024,” said Judge Lewis. “You cannot skip a payment. If you could pay a little extra, that would give you some leeway if something came up.” He ordered her to be on supervised probation during that time and to be on good behavior.

A presentence investigation report was ordered for Timothy John Vanhart, 25, of Atlantic. He pleaded guilty to several counts of breaking and entering. Vanhart broke into several homes in the fall of 2021. He is also charged with property destruction and grand larceny in connection with those incidents. He is to be sentenced Sept. 6.

Cadeem Bresean Baines, 27, of New Church, chose to participate in the first offender program. In June 2021, police were called to a Parksley home where Baines was sitting on the hood of a car drinking a Corona beer and causing problems, said Assistant Commonwealth’s Attorney William Fox. Baines was arrested and charged with drunk in public. When he was taken into custody and searched, police found a bag containing cocaine concealed inside his shoe. If he successfully completes the program, which includes a year of probation, remaining drug- and alcohol-free, completing 100 hours of community service, and payment of court costs, the felony cocaine charge will be dismissed. He was fined \$50 for his conviction of public intoxication.

*HPV and MenACWY vaccines are now required for all students. Parents have the right to decide if a child receives the HPV vaccine. A student can attend school and be missing HPV. Parents discuss this with your healthcare provider.

STUDENTS ENTERING 12TH GRADE:

A meningococcal conjugate (MenACWY)* booster is required. Call your center and ask for a nurse appointment if your child does not have a well child annual exam scheduled before 9/6/22, but has had a well child check/physical within the last year.
*The MenACWY booster is now required.

STUDENT ATHLETES

A sports physical and completed VA High School League physical exam form, signed by your child’s medical provider, is required before school team tryouts and participating in conditioning. An updated form must be submitted each school year. Go to the Forms section of the esrh.org home page to download the form.

- If your child has a well child exam scheduled from now through 7/31/22 their sports PE form can be completed at their appointment.
- If your child has already had a well child check performed after 5/1/22 and before 7/31/22 at Rural Health, the child’s medical provider will complete the sports physical form. Parents fill in pages 1, 2 & 4 then drop off the form at the center where your child is a patient.

Kentrel found these skills immediately useful with many of the information technology programs and apps he has encountered in the workplace.

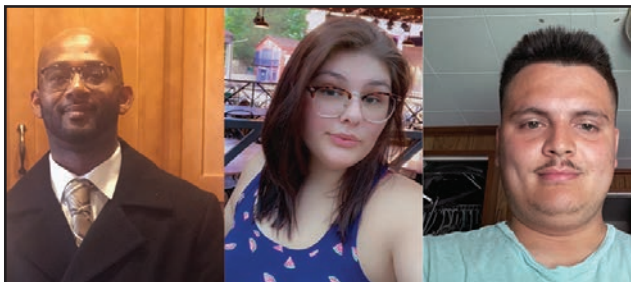
He said, “From working at T-Solutions as a technical librarian clerk processing media, to my current role

instead of the usual machinery and tools tax.

The proposed ordinance stipulates that the rate be increased by 10% on July 1, 2026, and every five years thereafter.

Another hearing, about a siting agreement with the company, also is set for July 20, when the board also could take action on the rezoning and conditional use permit applications.

The siting agreement will set out the amount of revenue share payments to be made to the county by year and the amount of supplemental payments to the county by year, among other provisions.

Wallops Research Park

The board set a public hearing for July 20 about selling more than two acres of county-owned property in the Wallops Research Park.

The county received a signed purchase agreement from Devreco LLC, of Salisbury, Md., to purchase the land, located on the south side of Aerospace Gateway, for \$20,000 per acre.

Devreco wants to purchase the

property to construct office buildings, with plans to lease a portion to Kratos Defense & Security Solutions Inc. or another tenant, according to the agreement.

A hearing is required before selling county-owned property.

Mary Nottingham Smith Center Awarded Grant

According to Mason, the county was informed on June 10 that the Virginia Department of Housing and Community Development has reserved \$5,000 in funding, which will be used to reimburse the county for completion by Sept. 30 of certain activities related to planning for the Mary Nottingham Smith Cultural Center.

Once the activities are completed, a planning grant of up to \$50,000 for the Mary Nottingham Smith Cultural Center will be awarded.

To be reimbursed and receive the grant, the county must submit the most recent audit or financial statement, show completion of an initial public meeting about the project, show completion of an initial and a second management team meeting, and submit a draft request for proposal for engineering services.

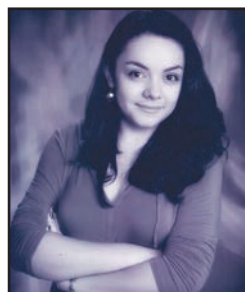

Barrier Islands Geology Is Subject of July Presentation at Island Theater

Dr. Christopher Hein, a coastal geologist and associate professor at Virginia Institute of Marine Science, is scheduled to give a presentation at the Island Theatre in Chincoteague Saturday, July 2. The presentation will focus on the history and future of the barrier islands.

“My research focuses on the formation and changes of the Virginia Barrier Islands,” Hein said. “During the presentation, I will be covering Chincoteague’s 2,000-year history and how Assateague Island formed and why it grew. In the end, I will talk about a big project that’s been funded by the commonwealth. It’s a model of Chincoteague Inlet that we built to simulate tides, storm currents, and sediment movement in order to predict future changes to the area’s geological system.”

Hein, who had always been fascinated by the formation of the land around him, became interested in the barrier islands after driving around

on the Shore. “Coastal islands change daily due to the influence of tides,” he said. “Compared to mountain formation it’s a much faster and interesting process.”

Hein predicts that the geological makeup of the region will change drastically over the next few hundred years. “Sea levels are rising much faster than 20 years ago due to ice cap melting and ocean waters warming,” he said. “Islands are moving 15 feet per year toward the mainland. Toms Cove Isthmus could possibly breach and move in front of Wallops Island, reorienting Chincoteague Inlet and changing the way waves hit the island.”

Transformations of this magnitude could impact the region negatively. “More flooding and frequent higher tides are a possibility,” Hein said. “A long-term result of this would be the retreat and abandonment of towns. Residents would have to move inland.”

There are some efforts that can be taken to delay these geological trans-

formations. “The Netherlands have hardened their shorelines to prevent encroaching land,” Hein said. “That can be done on the Shore, but would require billions of dollars. Serious decisions would have to be made alongside investments in infrastructure.”

Hein is presenting on behalf of a large team, consisting of 15 scientists from the University of Delaware, Randolph-Macon College, and the Water Institute of the Gulf in Baton Rouge, La. The presentation will begin at 7 p.m. Tickets are \$8 online at <https://betterunite.com/MuseumofChincoteagueIsland> and \$10 at the door.

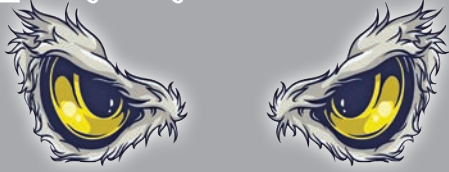

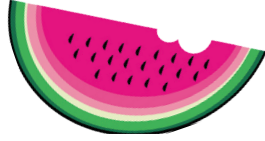

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Random Facts About ... the Possibilities and Realities of Aging

Our internet tubes were getting really old so we replaced them with new ones. Too bad we can't do the same with old body parts ... but wait, science might have an answer to that.

Shinya Yamanaka won the Nobel Prize for discovering, in 2007, how to reprogram a person's skin cells to perform as blank slate stem cells that could be used to develop into any kind of cell in the body. Other researchers used this science in a quest to reverse aging. They seem to have done it with mice. Injecting crafted young-again stem cells into an aging mouse's failing eyes made those eyes young again.

At a Harvard Medical School lab run by David Sinclair, old mice have been reset as young again and Sinclair believes the same process can one day be used on humans. Sinclair is apparently viewing aging as a disease that can be cured.

Once your body, brain, eyes, and organs are reset as young again, you will of course resume the aging process. But no matter. When your renewed body grows old, you can be reset young once more. How often can this happen? Sinclair believes people can live well into their hundreds without disease.

But stem cell research is only one among many efforts, ranging from rig-

orous science to quackery, to increase human lifespans and to ensure that people remain healthy until the end. In Marin County, Calif., the Buck Institute has been studying how to extend human lifespan. Researchers there have already increased by a factor of five the lifespan of ... worms. But, hey, it's a start.

Dozens of other research facilities are studying the aging issue. Obviously, if someone comes up with a "cure" for aging, massive fortunes will be made. But will it be a good idea for people to routinely live well into their 100s? Will the working young become even more overburdened paying for retirements that stretch for 40 or 50 years or more?

Regardless of unintended consequences, many people want to live as long as they can.

CNN Health reported that Sinclair, the Harvard Medical School researcher, exercises regularly and takes vitamins, baby aspirin, supplements, resveratrol, nicotinamide mononucleotide, metformin, and he eats one

meal a day.

Live-long advice is along the lines of exercising, eating more veggies and less meat, getting plenty of sleep, and having a satisfying social life.

But a healthy lifestyle is not the be-all, end-all secret to longevity. A surprisingly large number of centenarians have been lifelong smokers, drinkers, and couch potatoes, just as many thin, exercising vegetarians die young. Obviously, something else is going on — lucky genetics, super powerful immune systems, attitude, the luck of the draw, something.

Whatever that something is, it's increasing our lifespans. According to the Atlantic magazine, "... by the middle of this century, American life expectancy at birth will be 88 years. By the end of the century, it will be 100 years." And lifespans have been increasing for 200 years without being boosted (much) by medical breakthroughs or being slowed down by wars or diseases or even by the wealth or poverty of a nation.

We're living longer — individually and as a species.

feet caught and released, as well as plenty of tasty kingfish (whiting) landed. A few red and black drum could still be caught with high low rigs and fishfinder rigs baited with peeler crabs, sand fleas, or cut spot, but the best of the drum action is over for the

season.

In Chincoteague Bay, the flounder have been hit and miss with water clarity being the key to catching success. With the murky water, darker-colored Gulps and bucktails with live minnows are out-performing the traditional white and chartreuse color variations. Black seabass and large flounder action are occurring over the inshore wrecks. Offshore, dolphin (mahi) and yellowfin tuna catches have started to come in from the offshore canyons.

Wachapreague – Captain Lindsay Paul, at Trident Tackle, said the flounder fishing remains good as long as there is clean water. Limit catches have been made for those anglers willing to put in the effort. Most anglers have been using gulp-minnow combinations. Paul had not heard of any recent drum catches in the inlet or off the beach and thinks the fish may have already migrated out of the area. Black sea bass fishing over the wrecks remains good and boats fishing offshore in the Washington Canyon have had success with tuna.

Amanda Manzella, at the Wachapreague Inn, reported the Teaser released a white marlin and boated several yellowfin tuna on a recent trip.

Lower Shore – Dez Louie, at Oceans East – Eastern Shore, said cobia have been numerous in the lower bay, with fish being found from the Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel north to above Cape Charles. Both sight casting with live eels and bucktails and bottom fishing with cut bunker have been effective cobia-catching techniques. Louie wanted to remind anglers they need a VMRC Recreational Cobia Permit to target or keep cobia and that anglers are required to report their cobia trips and catches.

Schools of big red drum are still popping up in the waters off Fisherman Island and out at the fourth island of the bridge-tunnel. The fourth island is al-

so holding a school of Atlantic spadefish. Louie said steady flounder fishing is occurring in the Ditch and up out of Oyster. The waters around the concrete ships are producing mullet (whiting) and croakers, while recent catches off the Kiptopeke Pier have consisted mostly of ribbonfish.

Jeb Brady, at Baileys Bait & Tackle, told me the cobia fishing continues to improve since the season opened on Wednesday. Brady reported some large fish have been caught while chumming and fishing cut bunker on the bottom in the Latimer Sholas area. Anglers sight casting live eels have seen nice-sized fish along the surface of the deeper waters near the Baltimore Channel. Brady was anticipating some

large fish to be weighed in over the weekend. Other than cobia, red drum catches were still coming from the lower barrier island surf. Flounder catches were coming from along the bridge-tunnel and up in the Ditch. Sand mullet (whiting) catches are coming from the waters around the concrete ships and over the cabbage patch. Pier catches have consisted mostly of small croakers, trout, and a few flounder.

Bill Hall was the first Eastern Shore resident to achieve Virginia Salt Water Master Angler Status. He has been named Virginia Saltwater Angler of the Year and Virginia Saltwater Release Angler of the Year and is a Virginia Press Association award-winning sports columnist.

The much anticipated opening of the Virginia cobia season opened Wednesday, June 15, and if the preseason is any indication for the legal season, this should be another good year for the hard-fighting sport fish. The regulations involving cobia are a bit complicated and confusing, but anglers are allowed one fish per person, but no more than two fish per boat, regardless of how many people are aboard the boat.

The minimum size for a cobia is 40 inches, and only one fish over 50 inches is allowed on a boat. In addition to a recreational fishing license, there is a free Virginia Marine Resources Committee (VMRC) permit that is also required to target and keep a cobia and all of your fishing trips involving cobia fishing (whether successful or not) must be reported to a VMRC website. Once you have mastered all of the legal requirements, you have until Sept. 15, to go out and battle one of these bruisers.

Upper Shore – Alan Ring, at the Sea Hawk Sports Center, told me flounder have started to settle into their summer pattern, with the best fishing starting to occur closer to the inlets. Ring and his crew enjoyed success out of Folly Creek and Wachapreague over the weekend while employing double hook rigs with silversides baited on the top hook with a Berkley Gulp and a live minnow and Gulp on the bottom hook. Ring said the shop just received a supply of fresh bunker (menhaden), bunker chum, and live eels for the Virginia cobia season, which opened on Wednesday. In the Maryland portion of the Chesapeake Bay, anglers have enjoyed success with striped bass and the occasional speckled trout by casting Rap-10s and Mirrolures over submerged structure along the river and creek mouths.

Chincoteague – Jimmy Vasiliou, at Captain Steve's Bait and Tackle, said this week has been "very eventful" in the surf, with sharks over 6

George Phillips: The Eastern Shore's Master of Fishing

Sportfishing on the Eastern Shore is a popular activity. It's one of the many draws to living in the area, appealing to longtime residents, tourists, and emigrating retirees. None have enjoyed this recreation more than Onancock's George Phillips.

"I think I've caught every saltwater species here," the 83-year-old retired baker said. "Except pompano and some offshore stuff. I hooked a couple of tarpon years ago but never landed them. And in freshwater the only thing I haven't caught here is snakehead, which just showed up recently."

A lifetime resident of Onancock, Phillips fished as a teenager in several local ponds. "We had a wooden boat at one pond where we went bullfroggin'," said Phillips. "We sold 'em for 50 cents apiece. At another pond, we built little bridges out of logs to get to the edge so we could cast."

Later, when he returned from military service, those bridges were gone, so he got a little aluminum boat to fish in and was able to launch it by the pond's dam until someone built a house there.

Phillips is the longest tenured and most honored member of the Eastern Shore of Virginia Anglers Club. He joined the group two years after it was formed by a few surf fishermen in 1961, yet he is not a surf fisherman, preferring angling from a boat on both bay-side and seaside for drum, striped bass, speckled trout, and flounder. He has a special affinity, however, for freshwater fishing for bass, crappies, and bluegills.

The Eastern Shore is not known widely for its freshwater fishing, since the scattered manmade irrigation ponds that exist are almost all privately owned and many have no formal access. Nevertheless, Phillips managed to fish most of the ponds in Accomack and many in Northampton over the years.

"Back in the seventies I had 25 or so ponds I could fish," said Phillips. "And some had big bass in them." He had most of the ponds to himself then, as few local anglers bothered with fresh-

water fishing. Today, due to ownership and land-use changes, liability concerns, and trespass issues, few of these ponds are available to him.

Nevertheless, in 59 years of Anglers Club membership, Phillips received the Freshwater Angler of the Year Award most of the years that it was conferred, the overall Angler of the Year Award numerous times, and the annual award for catching the biggest largemouth bass 19 of the first 20 years that he was a club member and overall more than 30 times.

Three times he won the club's biggest largemouth bass award for fish that exceeded 10 pounds, the largest being an 11-pounder in 2008. In 2021 he won it again for a bass that measured 24¼ inches (the club changed from awarding by weight to overall length to encourage conservation). He released that fish, which weighed 9 pounds, 3 ounces as he does all of the bass and most of the other fish he catches.

There have been few years in which Phillips did not win an Anglers Club award, one of them being 1965, the third year of his membership. That year, one of the club's youth awards went to a youngster destined to be Virginia's governor, Ralph Northam, who grew up on the Shore and was once a charter boat mate.

In 2009, Phillips didn't win a single award because he was working 65 hours a week at two jobs and had little time to fish. But in other years he had more time. In 1976 he won eight of the 23 species awards in the adult division. In 1979 he won nine of 25 awards.

Since some of the club's historical records have been lost or undocumented, it's hard to precisely ascertain the full totals of Phillips' achievements, but from the records that do exist, it's known he also received 139 club awards for the largest catch of other species, both freshwater and saltwater. One of those was for an 11-pound, 11-ounce gray trout, stupendous by today's standards. Another was for a black drum weighing 94 pounds, 8-ounces, caught

in 2003, which still stands as an Anglers Club record.

Phillips currently holds five of the club's all-time records. "I had the speckled trout record one year too," he said. "It was an 11-pound, 7-ounce fish and the only thing I caught that day. But Joe Sparrow caught a record 11-pound, 9-ounce speck the next year."

The late Sparrow was a perennial winner in the club's early years and still holds the Virginia false albacore record.

While Phillips often says that he's going to stop entering fish in the club's award program, and gets chided by his wife Judy and kidded by his friends for not doing so, Phillips has no jealousy when someone outdoes him, and he is generous about letting others receive awards he could get.

One year, a friend caught the biggest bass of his life and won the club award. Phillips caught a larger bass later in the year but never submitted it to the club so that his friend could have the honor. "I never told him," he said. "I've done that more than once, when someone who doesn't have awards can get one."

Although Judy doesn't fish much, often getting seasick, she has accompanied her husband from time to time. In 1977 she won the Anglers Club award for the largest croaker, a 4-pound, 1-ounce giant that was third largest in the state that year. "There were only three citation croaker caught that year," Phillips remembered, "and that day we also caught a citation-size spot."

Phillips' award recognitions go well beyond the Eastern Shore of Virginia Anglers Club. He has in the neighborhood of 130 citations from the Virginia Saltwater Fishing Tournament and hasn't entered many of the eligible fish that he's caught over the years. "I don't enter citation fish anymore," he said. "I threw about 30 of the citations in the trash can. You used to be allowed to submit one a year per species, but now you can submit more. I try to take a picture of every big fish I catch, but I don't need citations."

He also received several awards from major outdoor magazines, which had national and state fishing contests in their heyday. Phillips had 19 such awards from Field & Stream and 12 from Sports Afield in the 1960s and '70s. He also received honors from tackle companies Mepps and Garcia, and the International Game Fish Association awarded him line-class world records for black drum,

red drum, and sunfish (they have since been superceded).

The record red drum weighed 38½ pounds and was caught on 6-pound-test line. The record black drum weighed 90 pounds and was a 20-pound line class record. "Judy was with me when I caught the black drum," Phillips recalled. "I thought it was a big skate. It was so big that it wasn't fighting like a typical drum."

Blessed with a terrific memory, Phillips amazes with his ability to recall fish sizes and catch dates, and even what tackle was used. That ability extends to remembering so much about the Eastern Shore of Virginia Anglers Club that he is now the 200-plus-member club's de facto historian.

Phillips has been very devoted to the Anglers Club. He's been a director for 57 continuous years and is its former two-time president. He ran the club's monthly outings for decades until a few years ago and participated in the club's two annual youth day outings on every occasion until this June, when illness caused him to miss his first one.

He also ran the club-sponsored Onancock Bay Challenge fishing tournament for many years. Now in its 30th year, this popular fall event began as an alternative to the then-state-sponsored Virginia Cup multiple-species fishing contest. It has raised funds for the club, and for charitable and conservation causes, and has been broadly supported by Eastern Shore businesses.

As the event chairman, he didn't fish in the Bay Challenge for many years, but after turning management reins over to friend Don McGavock in 2014, the following fall he participated and won two awards, one being a major award for the largest club-member-caught fish.

Phillips worked in food service, cooking and baking, while in the Army from 1957 to 1960. He was stationed in Germany for two years and spent his last eight months in Texas, where he met Judy, whom he married in 1961. They had five children together, and now have three grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

After the service, Phillips returned to baking in Onancock, opening The Pastry Shop for several years, then closed it because he was in competition with his uncle's bakery. He worked a variety of jobs in the area, including cooking and baking for the Navy at Wallops, eventually becoming the head baker at Walmart

in Pocomoke City, Md., when it opened in 1997, where he was the third person hired for the new store. When the Onley Walmart opened in 2012, he transferred there as head baker for several years before retiring.

For 12 years, Phillips did part-time contract work for NOAA Fisheries, conducting in-person weekly angler surveys at docks and launch ramps. He interviewed anglers, measured their catch, and reported on angling efforts. Some people were friendly and cooperative, some were nasty, many lied.

When anglers declared catching nothing he would report that but eventually quit because he didn't see eye to eye with the government's approach or requirements.

"I told them some of these people saying that no fish were being caught were lying," he recalled. "It was affecting survey results. A supervisor told me 'if no fish are being caught, go write in some fish.' I wouldn't do it. It makes you look good, like you're doing a good job. Other surveyors were showing more fish than I did, but it was a flawed system, and I think it's as bad or worse today."

Honesty is one of George Phillips' admirable traits. Some may find it hard to believe that he accomplished as much as he did as a recreational angler, but if Phillips says he did it, or saw it, you can take it to the bank. He was able to put in a lot of time fishing thanks to a supportive family and working early hours for decades. He'd go home after work, rest a little, then go fishing in the afternoon and evening. Retirement opened up more opportunity, and an early-rising habit sees him freshwater fishing now near the crack of dawn.

With all of his accomplishments, you might think that Phillips is only centered on awards or on catching big fish, but he still gets as excited as he ever did when fishing, whether for large or small fish. You can hear him yell, "gall dang it!" when he misses a strike or see him get in a fever pitch when the action is fast. And if the fishing's poor, he doesn't get overly disappointed but remains level-minded, figuring that things will be better on the next trip.

Phillips is disappointed, however, by the state of saltwater fish populations today, since he's experienced it near its best in the past. He remembers when you couldn't hardly catch a striped bass in the bay in the late '80s and then the population rebounded marvelously. He remembers when hordes of 16-pound bluefish marauded Chesapeake Bay (they average a few pounds now), when gray trout averaged 7 to 8 pounds (they're now less than a pound), and when Onancock called itself the "Columbia Capital of the World" because of the short-lived period when they were especially abundant in that area.

"Striped bass are declining again," notes Phillips. "Fishing in the bay has not been up to par the last few years, especially in the fall. Things overall have changed a lot, and I hope they turn around. They've been up and down before."

Phillips has been up and down a bit too. He was sidelined briefly a decade ago with heart bypass surgery, and a current health issue has temporarily halted his astounding level of fishing success. But to those who know George Phillips, he's unquestionably the fishing master of the Eastern Shore.

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Wife's Christmas Gift Led to Technology Room for Boys & Girls Club

What began as a Christmas present to her husband who had all the “toys” he needed has become a technology room at the Eastern Shore Boys & Girls Club that will open up a whole new world to the club members.

“I wanted to do something meaningful, not just give another present that would soon be forgotten,” said Kesha Pettit recently, talking about the gift she gave her husband Ashley last Christmas. “We came up with the idea of providing computers to the members of the Boys & Girls Club, and the concept took off to where now we have a technology and resource room at the club. And this is only the beginning. We want to provide instruction and add to the room.”

The room is named for Ashley’s parents, Elaine Hall and Chester Pettit Jr., both educators who taught on the Eastern Shore. A dedication ceremony and banquet at the Mary N. Smith Cultural Enrichment Center, home of the club, in early May was attended by family members and supporters of the project and honored the late Elaine and Chester Pettit Jr.

Among the speakers that night were the Rev. Clarence Pettit, the only surviving sibling of Chester Pettit Jr., and Dr. Larissa Pettit, a niece of Chester Pettit Jr.

The Rev. Pettit talked of how his brother attended Maryland State College (now University of Maryland, Eastern Shore) despite the family’s limited income, taking food packed by their mother when he made his trips to college. “It was a strug-

gle, but my parents raised and educated five children working 10 acres of land.”

Chester Pettit Jr., who taught at T.C. Walker and Worcester Technical Institute, died at the age of 52 when Ashley was only 10. Elaine Pettit taught 22 years at T.C. Walker and Accomac Primary School and died in 2020.

“Obviously, I didn’t know Ashley’s father, but I knew Mrs. Pettit, and she was an amazing woman who valued education highly,” said Kesha.

Ashley Pettit is president of Triangle Enterprises Inc., the rental real estate/development company that was started by his parents in 1972. Triangle Enterprises sponsored the banquet and oversaw the renovation of the classroom, converting it into a technology and resource lab. Triangle Enterprises also presented \$1,000 in loving memory of Chester and Elaine Hall Pettit. Ashley recalls his mother often saying, “Everything you do and make can not be for yourself.”

Friends Step Up to Support the Project

Before there was even a thought about purchasing a computer, the classroom at the club had to be rewired to accommodate the equipment. “I think there were two electrical outlets in that room,” said Ashley. “It was a major renovation that included significant rewiring.”

The Mary N. Smith facility was built in 1953 as the primary high school for African-Americans until 1970, then later served as a middle school after integration and was closed in 2004. The building was rapidly deteriorating before being taken over by a group of MNS alumni in 2011.

Ashley attended middle school at MNS, but Kesha, a native of Mississippi, who is a retention specialist at Perdue Foods, said not being from the Shore didn’t hold her back when the couple sought funds for the project after making a substantial donation themselves.

“Ashley texted a lot of friends and business acquaintances and got an immediate response,” she said. “I went out and talked to people. I am not into telling people what we don’t have. I am interested in furnishing the needs and creating a space for learning. My approach is to make a connection, show a commitment and then maintain communication.”

An old classroom was transformed to

a sparkling technology and computer lab with the help of area construction, electrical, and IT companies coordinated by Ashley and finished just prior to the dedication ceremony with a strong push at the end.

Kesha, a member of the Boys & Girls Club Advisory Board whose passion for the project shines through when she talks about it, explained, “We didn’t want people to come to the banquet and hear us talk about this vision after they had made donations. We wanted them to see a space ready to be used by our club members.”

Colby West, another member of the Boys & Girls Club Advisory Board and also an active member of the Mary N. Smith Alumni Association, was visibly emotional after walking into the room for the first time. “I’ve dreamed of something like this for a long time, but now seeing this brings tears to my eyes,” said West.

Hoping Others Will Follow

The Pettits hope this is the first of several spaces that can be renovated to better serve the club and the community at Mary N. Smith. “This is about the legacy of the Pettit family that values education,” said Ashley. “We hope it inspires other families to honor their loved ones in some way and also build a better future for our kids.”

The Pettits’ next focus is on phase two. Individuals who want to help can contribute funds to purchase Chrome Books, costing about \$250 each, which will be used to supplement the computer and work stations now in the new technology room.

Ashley and Kesha’s 15-year-old daughter, Layla, is a volunteer at the club, where club members attend an after-school program that provides a hot meal, academic tutoring, fine arts, and supervised athletic activities. The new technology room will be an additional asset where chess will also be taught online in addition to having the Smart Girl program and other academic and well-being programs offered to club members.

Javon Smith, a Boys & Girls Club Advisory Board member who maintains a visible presence at the club, says, “We hope that the Pettits’ contributions will influence more families to want to fix up other classrooms to help fit the kids needs with a long-term goal of all of the

classrooms being named after families who have chosen to support the Boys & Girls Club. Because of the C&E Technology Room we will be able to expand our programs and increase membership beginning with the summer program which starts this June.”

The mission of the Boys & Girls Club is important to our society today: “To enable all young people, especially those who need us most, to reach their full potential as productive, caring, responsible citizens.”

Beginning in 2005, when the club first met in a rented building in Exmore, the Boys & Girls Club has been changing lives by teaching youth to make decisions that lead to academic success, a healthy lifestyle, and good life choices.

Destiny Carrington, a club member for seven years, recently won Youth of the Year in competition with other club members in the Southeastern Region and then finished runner-up in the state, earning scholarship funds toward her attending Longwood University in hopes of becoming either a nurse practitioner or physician assistant.

Carrington received additional college funds through the Love and Legacy Scholarships presented by the Pettit family at the dedication of the Technology and Resource Lab. The scholarships, made in memory of Darnell Robert Charles Thompson, the late son of Dr. Larissa Pettit, and Katherine Hall Claude, the late mother of Rachael Hall, will be available each year to Boys & Girls Club members as well as other qualifying students.

“We want to reward positive behavior and accomplishments,” said Kesha in announcing the scholarships. “Destiny is a shining example of the difference the Boys & Girls Club can make in a life.”

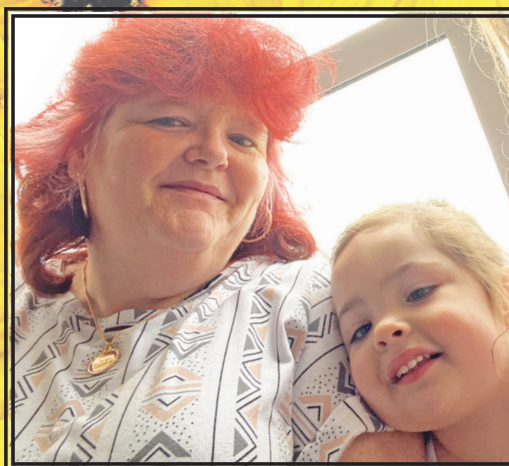

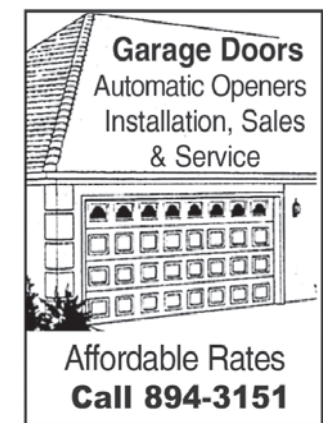

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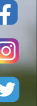

In the end, you will decide what to believe. All I ask that you listen and keep an open mind. If we do face a threat to our democracy, we had better face that threat together versus divided.

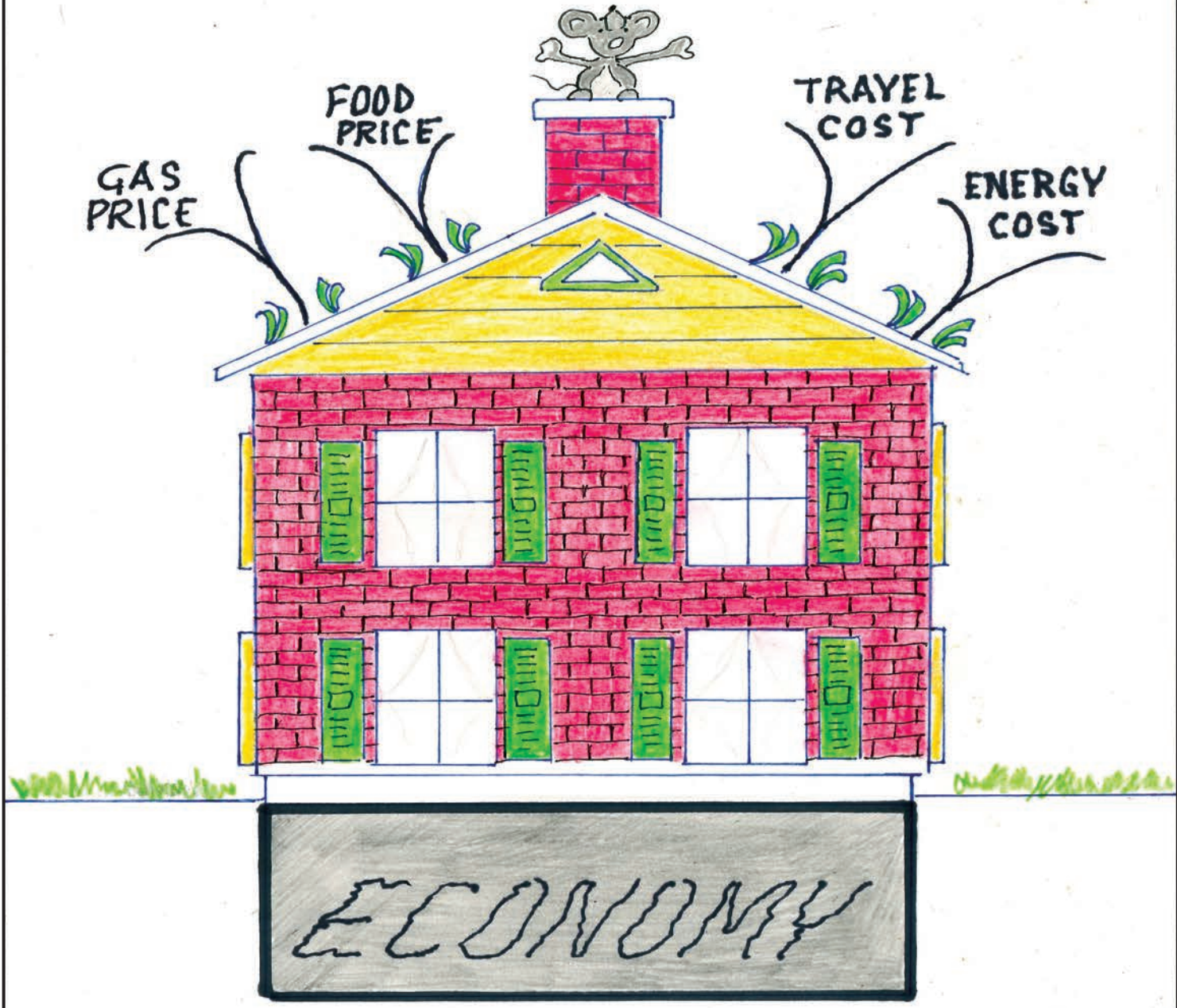
