### Chincoteague Recognizes First Responders; Resident Requests Demo and Burn Regulation

Five Chincoteague first responders were recognized at the Tuesday, July 5, Chincoteague Town Council meeting for their lifesaving actions during two incidents.

Bryan Rush, Chincoteague director of emergency services, presented citations to Jamie Wheatley, Madison Savage, Seth Jonczak, Patricia Drewer, and Thomas Copenhaver.

Rush said first responders rarely get recognized for their work.

One of the patients, Don Lukens, who suffered a heart attack in May while camping at Jellystone Campground, recovered and attended the council meeting Monday along with family members. Wheatley, Savage, and Jonczak provided advanced life support care to Lukens, who was transported to Tidal-Health for additional treatment.

In a second incident, on June 19, 2021, Drewer and Copenhaver responded at 4:20 a.m. to a childbirth in Atlantic. When they arrived at the scene, the Chincoteague responders met with an Accomack County Department of Public Safety paramedic, who advised the baby had been delivered and was in cardiac arrest.

The crew began lifesaving efforts and transported the baby, who was delivered prematurely at around six months and weighed around 2 pounds,

### Northampton Passes FY 2023 Budget

The Northampton County Board of Supervisors passed its fiscal year 2023 budget June 28, just three days before the new budget cycle was set to begin July 1

Due to the delay in the Virginia General Assembly passing the twoyear state budget, which was signed by Gov. Glenn Youngkin June 21, the Northampton school board had not known how much state funding would be included in its budget, and Northampton supervisors had not known how much local funding would be needed to balance the school budget, causing both the county and school budget to be finalized at the last minute.

Northampton schools Chief Financial Officer Brook Thomas reviewed the changes to the school budget that had been made since the state budget was passed.

Both the Accomack and Northampton school divisions have been seeking the Cost of Competing Adjustment or COCA funding, which is state funding that historically has been given to Virginia school divisions near Washington, D.C., to help those school divisions

to Tidal Health. The baby during transport began to breath on her own and to have a heartbeat. She is now "living a healthy life at home with her family." according to the citation.

Rush noted police and other first responders also deserve recognition, saying, "There are a lot of things that go on behind the scenes."

"Thank you for all you do," Mayor J. Arthur Leonard said to first responders in attendance.

#### Resident Asks Council to Regulate Demolition in Residential Neighborhoods

Chincoteague resident Patricia Farley during the public comment period spoke about issues with demolition and burning in residential neighborhoods, asking the council to consider new ordinances to better regulate those activities.

"We are not in the middle of a field in Accomack County," she said.

Farley said the owner of property next door to her home has been doing demolition work, including burning bulding materials, for several months.

"He refuses to use a Dumpster and instead now has large piles of debris around the property," she said, calling it "not only an eyesore but a real hazard."

Farley said another neighbor had to refund a rental fee to would-be renters because of the conditions.

#### Town Manager's Report

The town took delivery of anew floating dock for Curtis Merritt Harbor. which will be installed this fall, according to Town Manager Mike Tolbert.

Additionally, a new floating kayak launching platform and gangway was delivered to replace the ramp destroyed last year at Memorial Park. The launching facility was installed and work on the gangway will be going on next week.


Tolbert on June 29 spoke with Wallops Flight Facility's Jeremy Eggers and with Phillina Tookes, government and community relations manager from the Office of Legislative and Intergovernmental Affairs at NASA Goddard Space Flight Center. The topic was changes to proposed legislation that would provide up to \$14 million to Chincoteague to relocate the town's wells from Wallops Flight Facility property.

Tolbert asked NASA to change the period for using the funds from five to ten years and to change the language to allow for the possibility of using desalinization as well as ground water for new drinking water sources. Tookes is requesting those changes on the town's behals, Tolbert said.

Resurfacing of tennis courts and a basketball court was completed and a new four-court pickleball also was completed, Tolbert said.

The Building and Zoning Department in June issued 44 building permits, with a total construction value of \$370,806.

Police Chief R.K. Fisher reported the police department was awarded a grant for the second year of a school resource officer at the high school, with no local match required. The department is applying for a grant for an officer at the elementary school.

compete in the labor market by offering higher teacher salaries.

Accomack and Northampton schools have struggled to recruit teachers when competing with nearby counties in Maryland and cities across the Chesapeake Bay, like Virginia Beach.

Last year, Accomack and Northampton received what was essentially one-time COCA funding of \$2 million, of which Northampton's share was approximately \$400,000 based on its smaller number of students.

Permanent COCA funding of about \$3.5 million was proposed for this year, but the General Assembly opted instead for another round of one-time funding, of which Northampton's share is more than \$300,000.

Thomas said the General Assembly stabilized funding for at-risk students over the two-year state budget cycle, meaning Northampton schools will receive about the same amount of at-risk funding in each of the next two years. Even though the updated school budget shows a loss of nearly \$258,000 in

at-risk funding for FY 2023, the school division will still get more at-risk funding than it received previously, she explained.

(At-risk students are those who are more likely to fail academically, typically due to factors such as poverty.)

The General Assembly also reduced the amount of school construction funding it had originally planned to give each school division, which was \$1 million plus additional funding based on average daily membership.

The \$1 million for each school division was left intact, and since Northampton's average daily membership of 1,300 students is already low compared to many school divisions, it did not lose much in the funding cut.

"It's a \$1.2 million gift. ... I'll take it," said Supervisor John Coker.

Thomas confirmed that the \$1.2 million will be applied to the cost of improvements to Northampton's middle and high school.

She later expressed anticipation that the new-and-improved middle and high school will prompt increased enrollment.

Coker noted that, according to the

latest U.S. Census, population decline in Northampton County had appeared to level off.

"Look at all the houses that are being built here in this county," he added. "I'm guessing a lot of them are going to be younger families and a lot of them are going to have kids." He speculated that school enrollment may increase within the next five years.

The state budget also included \$1,000 bonuses for school employees in Standards of Quality or SOQ positions, which are teaching and support staff positions required by the state.

The bonuses will be 100% covered by American Rescue Plan funding, with no local funding match required.

However, the school division plans to give bonuses to all employees, not just those in SOQ positions, which will cost more than \$200,000 in local funding.

In spite of the state budget cuts, all the changes made to the school budget resulted in a total revenue increase for Northampton schools of almost \$17,000.

Moreover, the school division shrank its budget by reducing the number of

new positions it added to benefit atrisk students.

"We're not leaving any money on the table, we're just reducing it from where it was in the original budget down to where the state will fund it," Coker clarified.

Northampton schools saved nearly \$169,000 by reducing the budgeted number of instructional assistants in grades 3 to 8 from one per grade to one for every two grades.

Superintendent Eddie Lawrence explained the new instructional assistants will be placed in the lower grades to help address learning gaps created during the COVID-19 pandemic.

"For ... the previous two years, we've had interrupted learning, so we had kids who did not go to pre-K, who should have been in pre-K. We had kids who didn't go to kindergarten, who should have been in kindergarten.

"So we're putting these aides in those lower grades, where the greatest needs are. ... If we don't look at this strategically, we're going to be 10 years getting past COVID," Lawrence said.

### Reported Seine Net Break Causes Dead Menhaden to Wash Up in Northampton

Residents of Silver Beach are reeling from the stench of thousands of rotting fish carcasses that are washing onto shore and they say Omega Protein's menhaden fishing is to blame.

"Boats were so close to shore which is troublesome as our waters and existing marine life are being adversely affected," wrote Gail Kleintop in a message to the Post. She was visiting Silver Beach over the holiday weekend.

According to Ocean Harvesters, which harvests mendaden on behalf of Omega Protein, the fishing vessel was about a mile offshore from Silver Beach.

Residents say fish began washing up July 2. The Virginia Marine Resources Commission has heard those reports and is looking into them, said Deputy Chief of Fisheries Management Adam Kenyon.

"... No vessels were in operation between July 2 – July 4," said Ben Landry, director of public affairs for Ocean Harvesters, in a written statement. "The company takes no responsibility for any fish washing ashore prior to the reported July 5th spill."

Omega Protein is required to report net breaks to the DEQ and to law enforcement, said Kenyon. The size of the spill was not available, but Kenyon called it "pretty small."

"We estimate that the cleanup will take several days," said Landry. "We take full responsibility for the spill, and we will continue to be as responsive as possible in cleaning up the remaining fish as best we can."

"It happens 2-3 times per year," said Kenyon. Of the 14 net breaks reported from 2018 to 2022, two were in the Chesapeake Bay.

VMRC spokesperson Michele Guilford said law enforcement officers have been on site, and "Omega is now doing the cleanup."

As of the end of the day Wednesday, that clean up had not started, said Debbie Mitchell, who lives in Peaceful Beach Estates. "Omega Protein was going to be sending a crew to clean up the beaches, but none of us has seen them," she said.

Commercial menhaden fishing in the Chesapeake Bay has been hotly debated for years. Steve Atkinson, of the Virginia Saltwater Sportfishing Association, wrote in an email to the Post that the fishery is adversely affecting recreational fishing, especially striped bass. "They (Omega) currently catch 2/3 of their total in the ocean and we are asking that they also get the other third from the ocean," Atkinson wrote. His organization is asking anglers to sign a petition to stop menhaden fishing in the Chesapeake Bay.

Under VMRC regulations, captains are required to report the landed weights of menhaden daily and weekly.

When the cap is reached, the VMRC closes the fishery for the year.

Violation of the regulations constitutes a Class 3 misdemeanor. Class 3 misdemeanors are generally for regulatory and licensing enforcement matters. Under

Virginia law, authorized punishment for conviction of a Class 3 misdemeanor is a fine of not more than \$500.

"We sincerely apologize to anyone impacted by this incident and we hope to remedy this unfortunate situation as soon as possible," said Landry.

the budget, and about \$173,000 was saved by removing additional behavior specialists.

The school division also saved \$80,000 by removing a new student support coordinator and about \$52,000 by budgeting for one student success coach instead of two.

When permanent COCA funding was anticipated, Northampton schools had planned to give teachers a pay increase of 4% plus a step raise and other employees a 6% pay increase and a step raise.

When the school division learned it will not receive permanent CO-CA funding this year, the change was made to give pay increases of 4% plus step raises "across the board," to all employees under contracts and work agreements, Thomas said.

The Northampton school division reduced its planned FY 2023 expenditures by nearly \$822,000, leaving it with a budget deficit of about \$548,000 that it asked the county to cover.

The original school budget for FY 2023 had included a deficit approaching \$1.4 million.

Coker said he was not comfortable

giving the school board more than \$200,000 to apply to employee bonuses because the school board had not yet decided how to calculate the amount of each bonus.

Lawrence agreed to update supervisors when the school board reached a decision on how to allocate the bonuses.

The Northampton County Public Schools operating budget for FY 2023 totals approximately \$24 million, a 2.7% increase from FY 2022.

Northampton County is contributing nearly \$9.6 million in local funding for the school division's operating budget and bus replacements.

Northampton County Finance Director John Chandler reviewed the county's FY 2023 budget, including a discussion on tax rates.

To adjust for rising property values, a proposal had been made to reduce Northampton's real estate tax rate from 83.5 cents to 78.5 cents per \$100 of assessed value, a decrease of five cents per \$100 of assessed value.

Coker suggested reducing the real estate tax rate another three cents since additional school funds were not yet needed. Chandler countered with a suggestion to reduce the real estate tax rate 2.5 cents, to 76 cents per \$100 of assessed value. Coker agreed.

Northampton's personal property tax rate also will be reduced from 3.9 cents to 3.6 cents per \$100 of assessed value

Coker made a motion to adopt the appropriations resolution for Northampton's estimated FY 2023 revenues; Supervisor Dixon Leatherbury seconded the motion and it passed unanimously.

Northampton County's FY 2023 budget includes a general fund of \$45 million, nearly half of which is supported by general property tax revenue of nearly \$22 million.

In addition to the general fund, the budget includes other funds with their approximate totals for FY 2023, such as: social services, \$2.7 million; American Rescue Plan funding, \$1.1 million; harbor improvement, \$160,000; Eastern Shore Regional Jail, \$4.8 million; capital reserves, \$1.8 million; general debt service, \$2.5 million; school debt service, \$2.8 million; public utilities, \$374,000; economic development authority, \$22,000; and tourism capital funding, \$200,000.



### Ed Foundation Grants \$56,000

The Northampton County Education Foundation provided nearly \$56,000 to support the teachers and students of Northampton County Public Schools in the 2021-2022 school year and spent less than \$5,200 on its operations.

Linda Schulz, NCEF president and board chair, presented the nonprofit's annual impact report to the Northampton school board at its June 23 meeting.

NCEF provides the means for community members to donate funding for classroom projects, field trips, and other educational enhancements that are not covered by the Northampton school division's operating budget.

Field trips and other student activities funded through NCEF this year included:

- The robotics team, Shorebots #1908, attended the Chesapeake District Championship and won the Industrial Design Award and Quality Award.
- Occohannock Elementary School

fifth graders participated in activities at the Crown Sports Center.

- Eighth graders went ice skating.
- High school seniors visited Washington, D.C., to learn about their nation's history.
- The band and choir went to Busch Gardens to celebrate 350 hours of practice and 30 performances.
- Marine biology students visited the Virginia Aquarium and Marine Science Center.

School events supported by NCEF included:

- March Math Madness, an event that tested the math skills of students and parents.
- Pre-K Camp at Occohannock and Kiptopeke elementary schools, which gave pre-K students a jump start to their first year of school and taught parents about child development and school readiness.
- Special end-of-year festivities at Occohannock Elementary's field day.

NCEF also demonstrated teacher and school staff appreciation with:

- A welcome lunch and gift cards for new teachers
- Team-building T-shirts for Northampton Middle School staff
- Gift cards for eight "Mountain Movers," NCPS teachers and staff members who made an impact on their schools

Grants, scholarships, and other educational assistance included:

- A professional development grant for one teacher
- Assistance paying for tuition and books at Eastern Shore Community College for dual-enrollment juniors and seniors
- College scholarships for seven seniors, provided by five scholarship groups

NCEF facilitated after-school tutoring for student athletes, and no student was benched due to low grades this school year.

The foundation supported the Kids Closets that are now in all Northampton schools to provide free clothing, personal care products, and other supplies to any student in need for any reason.

NCEF also supported the publication of "Seasons of Reading" and provided individual grants for schools and teacher appreciation.

A record of 25 classrooms were adopted this year. The Adopt-A-Classroom program allows donors to direct their financial gifts to specific classrooms to keep them stocked with school supplies and whatever else is needed.

NCEF board member Kate Latham broke down the total spending of about \$56,000 in three ways:

- About \$28,000 was community pass-through funding (money donated by community members for specific funding programs), more than \$25,000 was for grants, and \$2,100 was for scholarships.
- About \$48,000 directly benefited students and nearly \$8,000 benefited teachers.
- Northampton High School received about \$32,500, Occohannock Elementary got about \$11,000, Kiptopeke Elementary got more than \$7,200, and Northampton Middle School received about \$5,100.

NCEF's total expended funding for the year increased from about \$39,000 in the 2019-2020 school year and nearly \$51,000 in the 2020-2021 school year.

Additionally, the owners of Bay Creek, in Cape Charles, adopted NCEF and raised about \$65,000 for the foundation, Schulz said.

NCEF requested the school board's guidance on spending the donation. "We have a lot of money to figure out what to do with," Schulz said.

Superintendent Eddie Lawrence told the NCEF board members, "I want to thank you from the bottom of my heart for all you've done for the students and the staff of Northampton County."

Schulz said the work NCEF board members do is "our joy and our pleasure."

### Man Pleads Guilty to Five Felonies

Keshaun Lamar Coston, 31, of Painter, initially scheduled for a bench trial last week, entered into a plea agreement with the commonwealth. Coston pleaded guilty to five felonies, which include two counts of eluding, damage to a church cemetery, possession of a firearm by a convicted felon, and possession of methamphetamine. Several other charges were not prosecuted according to the terms of the agreement. He will be sentenced to five years on each with all suspended but three years of active prison time.

On June 2, 2020, a deputy recognized Coston's green Mercury as the one described as being involved in an earlier brandishing of a firearm. The deputy followed the car for a time and soon instituted a traffic stop. Coston did not stop and a chase ensued, reaching speeds of up to 100 mph, said Commonwealth's Attorney Spencer Morgan. He said Coston finally ran up into the cemetery of Zion Baptist church in Painter, damaging several headstones. Coston fled on foot.

Police found a pistol, a credit card,

and a driver's license belonging to Coston in the car. A K-9 search did not locate Coston but found a bag containing white tablets later found to belong to Coston. The tablets were methamphetamine.

"Coston eluded detection for some time," said Morgan.

Nearly a year later, on May 10, 2021, police spotted Coston as the driver of a car in Onley and attempted a traffic stop. He did not stop right away, Morgan told the court. Another officer pulled in front of Coston's car and he stopped but then backed away and fled at a high rate of speed. Morgan said Coston crashed his car and ran across U.S. Route 13 and into the woods by the Bojangles restaurant where he was apprehended and arrested.

Morgan said the defendant wanted four jury trials for the two separate incidents and Morgan believed the plea agreement was an appropriate disposition of the case. Judge W. Revell Lewis III ordered that a presentence investigation report be prepared. He set Coston's sentencing for Aug. 11.



### U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary Safe Boating Tips

This month's topic is VHF radio etiquette.

A boat's VHF radio is one of the most important safety items aboard. Obviously, it allows boaters to call for help or hear Coast Guard broadcasts that provide weather and danger information. It also allows calls to marinas for gas or an overnight berthing, finding out about scheduled bridge openings, or contacting surrounding vessels to coordinate movement in narrow channels.

When using a boat's radio, remember that everyone in the surrounding area (about a 25-mile radius) will be able to hear what is said. So, the first piece to remember is that it is illegal to swear or curse when broadcasting — no exceptions. Don't do it or you will be fined.

Second, before broadcasting, hold the microphone in your hand and listen for other people broadcasting already. If there is activity, especially the Coast


Guard is speaking and your message is not a call for help, wait for at least two minutes of silence, then broadcast. If you push the broadcast button while someone else is speaking your call will mix with theirs and confuse everything. It's called being stepped-on. Next week we'll discuss how to frame radio messages.

Solé's interest in the ponies grew quickly, leading her to move to the Island in 2009. She was the chef and innkeeper of Miss Molly's Bed and Breakfast, where Marguerite Henry wrote "Misty." She is well known and appreciated in the community for her generous work as an active volunteer cooking for the Manna Café: organizing events with the Chincoteague Cultural Alliance, CI Community Cats, and Island Kitties Rescue; and helping at the annual pony auction with her Saltv Pony Crew.

### Broadband Authority Celebrates \$12.3M Grant to Expand Services

Eastern Shore of Virginia Broadband Authority staff and board members were joined by dignitaries Wednesday, June 29, at Sawmill Park in Accomac to celebrate receiving an unprecedented \$12.3 million from the Virginia Department of Housing and Community Development.

The money will help the authority build 269 miles of new fiber and connect more than 11,000 additional homes and businesses to the broadband network, at a total project cost of \$15.6 million.

John Reiter, chairman of the ESV-BA board of directors, said the effort to get broadband on the Shore started some 15 years ago.

"We now cover a little bit more than half the Shore; this will get us up to about 75 to 80%," he said.

"Great strides have been made," said Bryan Horn, VDHCD director.

Virginia since 2017 has invested more than \$797 million, with more than \$1.1 billion in matching funds, in broadband access, resulting in 307,000 connections, he said.

Still, around 210,000 do not have access to broadband, he said.

"We've learned that access to broadband has become a necessity," Horn said.

"The focus of the community as a whole has been to get broadband to everyone," said Del. Rob Bloxom, noting he and Sen. Lynwood Lewis worked to get the state grants made available to the ESVBA.

"One reason it succeeded is that the ESVBA is one of two broadband authorities in the state that is profitable," he said.

"This is what government looks like when it works," said Lewis.

"We haven't seen telecommunications growth like this on the Eastern Shore in decades," said Robert Bridgham, ESVBA executive director. He credited the board of directors and staff for their efforts.

Construction of the new fiber includes 14 areas, seven each in Accomack and Northampton counties. Work will start at the Shore's northern end, going south, and also at the southern end, going north, Bridgham said, noting the ESVBA this month will roll out a new website with a section dedicated to information about the project.

### Perdue Farms Donates \$25,000 for Foodbank School Backpack Program

Officials were on hand last Tuesday at the Foodbank in Tasley for the presentation of a \$25,000 donation made by Perdue Farms to the Foodbank of Southeastern Virginia and the Eastern Shore.

The money is for the foodbank's school backpack program.

The program serves around 3,600 children across 65 schools, including seven on the Eastern Shore.

The backpack program provides 16,524 meals for 152 children attending public elementary schools in the region, according to a press release.

The backpacks each contain six healthy, child-friendly meals and are handed out discreetly to participating children at the schools, according to Christopher Tan, president and chief executive officer of the foodbank.

Along with the check, Perdue delivered 10,000 pounds of chicken to the foodbank.

The grant from the Franklin P. and Arthur W. Perdue Foundation, the company's charitable giving entity, and the chicken donation are part of a Perdue initiative

called Delivering Hope to our Neighbors.

Kim Nechay, executive director of the Perdue Foundation, praised the foodbank for its work, saying, "Backpack food delivery programs are an important cornerstone program of the foodbank's efforts to address childhood hunger. We believe none of our neighbors should go hungry, so helping provide food each weekend to children facing food insecurity through this wonderful program is a meaningful investment."

"For 40 years, the Foodbank of Southeastern Virginia and the Eastern Shore has pursued a mission of leading the effort to eliminate hunger in our community," Tan said, adding, "We're grateful to partners like Perdue Farms who provide the necessary nutrition and financial support to help us feed those in need in our community."

Since the foodbank's incorporation in 1981, it has distributed more than 360 million meals in southeastern Virginia and on the Eastern Shore.

An average of 15 million meals a year has been distributed in the past five years.



### Random Facts About ... Gasoline, Octane, and Ethanol

This gas crisis is affecting everything. When we opened our internet tubes this week, nothing emerged because ... wait for it ... our search engine was out of gas.

When the first wells began producing crude oil in the 1860s, that oil was distilled to produce kerosene. One byproduct of the distillation process was gasoline, which people didn't have a use for and was often discarded. The growth of the auto industry and the switch of fuels from kerosene to gasoline meant that the oil industry concentrated on producing gasoline. Today, about half a barrel of crude oil goes to making gasoline while the other half produces diesel, home heating oil, jet fuel, kerosene, and everything from cosmetics to toothpaste to contact lenses.

An internal combustion engine running on gasoline produces its power when a spark plug ignites the gasoline-air mixture at exactly the right time, causing an explosion that pushes down a piston that turns a crankshaft that makes the wheels go. But if

there's enough pressure in the engine, the gas can ignite from heat before the spark plug fires and this messes up everything. You can hear when this happens because the engine knocks. As car engines became more powerful with higher compression and more heat, the knocking became more of an issue.


To reduce knocking in high-compression performance engines, gasoline is formulated with higher octane, which means that the gas resists igniting from heat and pressure. The higher the octane, the more the gasoline resists igniting prematurely. Octane is increased by adding various ingredients, but the most efficient and cost-effective was tetraethyl lead, creating leaded gasoline. Old-timers might remember some hotshot coming into a gas station with a high-performance car and telling the attendant, "Fill her up with ethyl."

Lead was bad for people who had to deal with it and bad for the environment. Leaded gas was phased out and finally banned in the U.S. in 1996. Refineries used other petroleum products to boost octane.

Ethanol, which is basically highproof grain alcohol, will also boost octane and is cleaner and better for the environment than lead was. Gas with 10% ethanol is generally available everywhere in the U.S. Potential negative effects of ethanol in gasoline is damage to engines that haven't been designed to run on gas-with-ethanol and diversion of a food source (corn) from feeding people (and the animals that feed people) to fuel. But because it's friendlier to the environment, is an income source for farmers, and saves oil companies money (ethanol added to low-quality gasoline can boost octane to acceptable levels), ethanol seems here it stay.

If the manufacturer of your car's engine says it requires a certain octane and you feed the beast lower octane and especially if knocking occurs, you could be causing long-term damage. On the other hand, if you use gasoline with a higher octane than the engine calls for, you're not doing any harm but you're not helping the engine. Technically, higher octane gasoline has less energy than lower octane gas, and using higher-than-necessary octane won't improve your car's performance.

Don't buy high-octane, high-price gas if your car doesn't call for it and maybe you won't have to take out a second mortgage to fill your tank.







Fishing from the Shore By Bill Hall



its. Black sea bass catches have been coming from the offshore wrecks, while deep-droppers have been scoring with catches of tilefish and sea bass. Offshore trollers have been finding a few tuna and marlin.

Angling action was as hot as a firecracker over the recent Independence Day weekend, with catches coming from the beaches to the offshore canyons. Cobia remain the number one target for anglers on the bayside, with flounder fishermen swarming the creeks, inlets, and inshore wrecks on the seaside.

Upper Shore – Alan Ring, at the Sea Hawk Sports Center, reported good flounder action from Chincoteague to Wachapreague "as long as you have clear water." Berkley Gulps fished with silversides or minnows have been productive. Anglers fishing from the beach on the seaside have caught sharks, rays, and kingfish (whiting).

On the Chesapeake Bay side, anglers were catching cobia using cut bunker and live eels fished behind a chum bucket. Spanish mackerel have been hitting trolled Clark Spoons. In the shallows of Tangier and Pocomoke Sounds, anglers have been finding a few rockfish (striped bass) over submerged structure and an occasional puppy drum in the grass beds. Inside the creeks, rockfish have been hitting topwater lures, while black perch catches have come on bloodworm baits fished in the deeper holes.

Chincoteague - Jimmy Vasiliou, at Captain Steve's Bait and Tackle, said some large red drum and sharks have been caught in the surf of Assateague Island. Surf fishermen who scale down their tackle are finding lots of kingfish (whiting) and spot while using surf ball rigs. Vasiliou said a flounder weighing 6 pounds, 8 ounces was caught off the town pier. Offshore deep-droppers returned with catches of black sea bass and tilefish, with a few yellowfin tuna picked up while trolling.

**Wachapreague -** Amanda Manzella, at the Wachapreague Inn, reported several guests recently limited out with flounder on the wrecks.

Captain Lindsay Paul told me the flounder bite has been good in the clear water. Most anglers were using Berkley Gulp/minnow combinations, with several parties catching their lim-

Lower Shore - Jeb Brady, at Bailey's Bait & Tackle, reported cobia action has been "real good" near buoy 36A and on Latimer Shoal. Bottom fishing with fresh cut bait and sight casting live eels have both been effective. A lot of the recent catches have been in the 40-to-45-inch class. Spadefishing around Plantation Light and around the fourth island of the Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel has improved with the warmer water temperatures. Flounder action was described as "decent" in the Ditch and along the bridgetunnel pilings. The area in front of the concrete ships is producing sea mullet (whiting). Anglers fishing on the piers have been catching ribbonfish, small trout, and croakers.

Dez Louie, at Oceans East – Eastern Shore, described the current run of cobia as "excellent," with good numbers of fish being caught while bottom fishing with cut bunker. Recent productive areas have included 9-foot shoal, and buoys 13, 16, and 36A. Sight casters have scored with both cobia and red drum in the shipping channel by the third and fourth islands of the bridge-tunnel. Spadefish catches have come from the bridge-tunnel and Plantation Light.

Louie reported lots of sheepshead weighing up to 15 pounds, as well as small black drum to 20 pounds have been landed along the concrete ships by anglers using bottom sweeper jigs baited with fiddler crabs, sand fleas, and cut blue crab. Anglers trolling with spoons between Cape Charles and the bridge-tunnel are catching Spanish mackerel and ribbonfish. The Kiptopeke Pier has produced catches of small sandbar sharks and lots of ribbonfish.

Bill Hall was the first Eastern Shore resident to achieve Virginia Salt Water Master Angler Status. He has been named Virginia Saltwater Angler of the Year and Virginia Saltwater Release Angler of the Year and is a Virginia Press Association award-winning sports columnist.





"It's therapeutic. Whenever I'm having a bad day, I put on some music and I start to dance. Immediately, I have a complete shift in energy and all the negativity that overwhelmed me disappears."

She also loves the sense of community Zumba dancing provides. "During dance classes, everyone comes together and the things that divide us fall away," she said. "That sense of community is part of what has driven me to start my class. When I had cancer, I danced in Jacksonville and some of my classmates were women who had also fought or were fighting cancer. Being around people that had similar experiences made me feel like I wasn't alone. I hope to spread that sense of comfort and community through Zumba here on the Shore."

Those interested in attending the Zumba class should bring comfortable clothes and water to stay hydrated. Classes will be hosted from 5:30 to 6:30 p.m every Tuesday.





### • Revenue Share Ordinance for Energy Storage Facilities

Under the provisions of this Code section, the County is authorized to impose a rate of up to \$1400.00 per megawatt, which would be assessed in lieu of traditional machinery and tools taxation. Based on the staff's analysis, for energy storage systems, revenue share provides the County with a greater revenue stream over the life of an energy storage facility than that associated with traditional taxation methods. Adoption of the revenue share ordinance is therefore recommended.

### • Scout Storage/Jupiter Energy Siting Agreement

The Code of Virginia § 15.2-2316.8 authorizes host localities to enter into a siting agreement with an applicant seeking to construct and operate an energy storage facility. The draft siting agreement between the County and Scout Storage LLC is being presented for the Board's review and consideration. It is contingent upon approval of the conditional rezoning and conditional use permit associated with the Scout Storage/Jupiter Energy proposed battery storage facility to be located on tax map # 27-A-103A. It is also contingent on the adoption of a revenue share ordinance by the Board (item above). The draft siting agreement is available for public view on the electronic Board Agenda.

#### • Amendments to Accomack County Code Section 70-2 to reflect changes in State Code
