Residents ponder rails-to-trails lawsuit

Can landowners be compensated if they believe their property rights have been violated by the proposed hiking and bicycling trail?

An Exmore-area couple is asking an attorney that question, the answer to which could have widely ranging impacts.

There are hundreds of Eastern Shore property owners who own land by the Shore's former railroad, which is being converted to a public trail, and could file a lawsuit against the federal government for just compensation.

Among them are Wardtown residents Ken and Mary Dufty, who are considering suing the U.S. government because they say they can't access their own land.

The U.S. Surface Transportation Board, which regulates railroads, decided in late 2019 to allow the Eastern Shore's railroad to be abandoned. The railroad's operation had ceased in 2018.

Through legal agreements called

Schools still need 20 more teachers

The Eastern Shore's two public school systems combined have almost 20 teaching vacancies to fill with fewer than two weeks before students arrive Sept. 6.

The local issue mirrors a national trend as schools struggle to attract and retain teachers. Local officials, however, said schools will be ready.

"When we open our doors, our students will get the education that they deserve," said Clara Chandler, Accomack schools' director of human resources.

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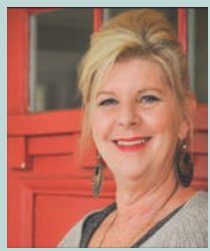
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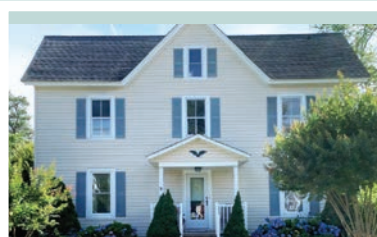

In Northampton and Accomack counties, higher salaries for starting teachers and international searches have helped recruiting efforts.

New Northampton Superintendent Jaime Cole hoped the two school systems would work together in the future to recruit teachers.

"It's not north versus south," she said. "It's all of our kids."

Accomack

At press time Thursday, Accomack schools had 12 teaching positions left to fill, Chandler said. The county of 33,000 residents has 13 public schools with 427 teaching positions.

Accomack's starting salary for teachers is around \$45,000, and the school division is always applying for grants to recruit and retain teachers and help those teachers continue their education and obtain licensure, said Chandler.

The school division gives salary advances to help teachers relocate to the Shore.

The school division also uses the Eastern Shore's attractive location between the beaches of the Chesapeake Bay and the Atlantic Ocean as a selling point, Chandler added.

The teacher shortage in Accomack has been concentrated in the areas of English learners, special education, and math, and the school division has had much success recently filling those positions by recruiting internationally, from countries such as Colombia and the Philippines.

A dozen international teachers have been hired over the last two years; they are all experienced and eligible for licensure, Chandler said.

The teachers are interviewed virtually and, when hired, they obtain visas that allow them to work in the U.S. for up to five years.

Accomack schools are recruiting retired teachers through a Virginia Retirement System program. Some retirees are eligible to be full-time regular teachers, and others become long-term substitutes.

The school division also is taking a "grow your own" approach to recruitment through the Virginia Teachers for Tomorrow dual-enrollment course.

Accomack school representatives have attended 18 job fairs this year, both in-person and virtual and in and out of state, Chandler said.

She also has reached out on social media and ran an ad on the radio to attract career switchers — people who have a college education and want to take the additional steps required to become licensed teachers.

Northampton

Northampton County has a population of more than 12,000 and a total of four public schools with 131 teaching positions.

Northampton schools had only seven K-12 teaching positions left to fill for the upcoming school year, Cole said.

The Northampton school division has done its research on which nearby states typically pay teachers less and is advertising its job openings in the local newspapers of its target areas.

Northampton pays a new teacher up to \$50,000 in the first year: a \$45,000 starting salary, a \$2,500 bonus for remaining in the position through December, and another \$2,500 bonus in the spring for signing a contract for the following school year.

Northampton also received a \$100,000 grant from the Virginia Department of Education to help teachers with bachelor's degrees earn their master's degrees, giving them another boost up the salary scale.

About \$36,000 of the grant has been spent, and Northampton is on track to use the remaining funds by the September 2024 deadline.

Northampton also provides year-round professional development opportunities tailored to each teacher's individual needs and has scheduled half school days for those professional development sessions.

Cole also has reached out to the non-profit Teach for America as well as the Peace Corps for assistance recruiting teachers.

easements, the railroad had the “right of way” to run tracks on nearly 50 miles of the Shore across other people’s property.

Earlier this month, Ken Dufty wrote to the Flint Cooper Law Firm in Illinois, which specializes in rails-to-trails lawsuits.

Dufty’s action was prompted by the local rails-to-trails committee denying him access to his property near the railroad right of way – because he would have to cross the right of way to access it.

The committee announced, “anyone that is caught crossing or using the old rail line will be prosecuted to the full-

est extent of the law until the (rails to trails) project is complete,” according to Dufty’s Aug. 7 letter.

Regarding Dufty’s ability to access his property, the law firm noted that if he decides to sue the federal government, he can seek “cost to cure” damages, including the cost to restore access to his property.

The issue has been mentioned before.

According to a March 2021 article in the Eastern Shore Post, Accomack’s then-county attorney, Cela Burge, noted that a notice of interim trail use “sets a time clock ticking for any folks ... that have property along the rail line – and it puts in place a statute of limitations for any of them

that would wish to make a claim in federal court.”

The statute of limitations is six years from the time the notice of interim trail use or NITU is issued.

In January 2020, the Surface Transportation Board issued a NITU to the Dahlgren Railroad Heritage Trail Association, of northern Virginia.

The notice allowed a period of 180 days for the railroad association to negotiate an agreement with Canonie Atlantic, the company that manages the railroad, to create a public trail where the railroad once ran.

Because the notice was issued by a federal government agency in accordance with the U.S. National Trails Act, it could be argued that the feder-

al government’s power of eminent domain was used to take the property in the railroad right of way for public use – in this case, a public trail.

The U.S. Constitution specifies the government can take any property for public use but not without paying for it.

The negotiation period between Canonie Atlantic and the Dahlgren Railroad Heritage Trail Association was set to expire last month, but in March, a letter was filed with the Surface Transportation Board to replace Dahlgren with the local Eastern Shore Rail Trail Foundation as trail sponsor.

If the request is approved, a new NITU will be issued, and negotiations will resume.

Onancock moves to obtain quotes to extend, pave Marshall Street

Onancock officials approved the first step toward making an extension of Marshall Street a thoroughfare that one day will meet highway department standards.

The town council voted Monday to pursue getting quotes from contractors to add a crushed concrete base to the street, with a plan to tar and chip it next year.

The street connects Kerr Street to Waples Street.

Of three parcels on the street, one has building plans completed and the other two have been surveyed and houses are being designed for them, according to Town Manager Matt Spuck.

If the town builds the street, it will get income from taxes and water bills for the three new homes. Paving the street also would facilitate adding more homes on a large parcel behind Waples Street, he said.

“This small road would add value to who we are,” Spuck said.

“I’m encouraged that there’s somebody wanting to build houses in town,” said Mayor Fletcher Fosque.

Council members Joy Marino and Cynthia Holdren voiced concerns about the town being able to maintain the street in the future.

Still, council member Maphis Oswald said building the street to highway department standards now means a greater chance of the state highway department taking it over in the future.

The first phase of the project will cost an estimated \$15,000, with around the same amount next year needed to tar and chip the street,

according to Spuck.

The town has \$26,000 remaining in its budget for street repair this year.



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Accomack gives money to ESCADV

The Accomack County Board of Supervisors will give the Eastern Shore Coalition Against Domestic Violence money from the American Rescue Plan Act.

Peaches Dodge, the coalition's past president, spoke about progress on renovations to the coalition's campus, three buildings at the former G.F. Horne Assisted Living Facility in Onancock.

ESCADV asked for \$250,000 from the county's second tranche of ARPA funds, which totals around \$3.1 million.

Dodge said the coalition had applied for ARPA money from various sources, totaling between \$350,000 and \$450,000.

"To date we have received \$63,000 of that," she said.

The coalition also received corporate sponsor funding of \$70,000 and state and federal grants of around \$174,000.

"But that money is not available to us

yet," and won't be until 2023, Dodge said.

Foundations also awarded \$140,000, but \$100,000 is not available until 2023.

Individual donations totaled around \$150,000.

Additionally, the coalition raised money by selling its former emergency shelter and office.

In the next two weeks, the new shelter will be ready to occupy.

"What we would like to do is to keep going as fast as we can so that we can, perhaps in the next six to nine months, be able to move our staff into the second (building), which will be the counseling and administrative building.

"We really need the money now. We've got to keep this thing (moving) along," Dodge said.

The board unanimously approved a motion by Supervisor Jackie Phillips to give \$250,000 to help renovate the campus.

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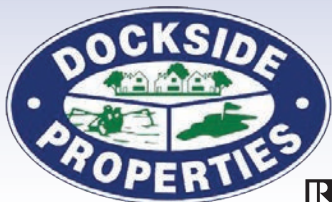

Owner of Ocean City Seacrets Plans Chincoteague Location

The owner of a well-known Ocean City, Md., restaurant and bar plans to open a business on Chincoteague.

Seacrets Restaurant and Bar owner Leighton Moore announced land where the business will be located, on the southwest end of Chincoteague, was acquired in late July.

The plan is to open Seacrets on Chincoteague in spring 2024, according to a press release.

"Rebecca and I along with the Seacrets family look forward to being a part of and serving the Chincoteague community," Moore said. Rebecca Moore is his wife.

Seacrets Chincoteague "will be restaurant-focused and a low-key, simple and fun place for visitors to enjoy seasonally," according to the release.

The Chincoteague establishment will include the "palm tree jungle" for which the Ocean City Seacrets is known. It will be modeled on the original Seacrets opened in Ocean City in

the late 1980s, including a small tiki bar, a rock bar, a raw bar, a restaurant, and a boutique.

Moore, who grew up in the hospitality industry in Ocean City, was inspired by his many trips to Jamaica to open Seacrets, "Jamaica USA," in 1988 on 49th Street in Ocean City.

The company since then has expanded to include a radio station, Atlantic Beverage Center, and Seacrets Distillery.

The Chincoteague property is near two other properties purchased recently by Maryland developers.

Blue Water, the Ocean City development company co-founded by Jack and Todd Burbage, purchased the former Capt. Bob's Marina earlier this year.

The company also owns Sun Outdoors Chincoteague Bay, scheduled to open in 2023. The property formerly was Inlet View Campground.

The town has not yet received any permit applications for the Seacrets property, Chincoteague Town Manager Mike Tolbert said this week.

County will help with beach parking grant application

Accomack officials voted to repurpose \$250,000 the county had set aside as a match for a federal study of Chincoteague Inlet, after the General Assembly this year approved state funding for the match.

The Accomack Board of Supervisors voted to use the money to pay for

third-party assistance to prepare federal grant applications for a project to move beach parking on Assateague Island National Seashore to a more stable area.

"We're talking about a \$40 million parking lot now," said Chairman Billy Joe Tarr, who made the motion to repurpose the \$250,000.

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Accomack grant aims to provide universal broadband

The Accomack County Board of Supervisors voted to partner with the Eastern Shore of Virginia Broadband Authority to apply for a Virginia Telecommunication Initiative grant for fiscal year 2023.

The proposal is to build nearly 256 miles of broadband network to reach 5,750 additional homes, at an estimated cost of around \$9 million, which would result in universal coverage in Accomack.

The vote included committing funds for a match, to be paid for out of money the county received through the American Rescue Plan Act.

The required match is \$1.8 million, or 20% of the project cost.

Northampton County also is involved.

"This is an important year because I don't think there are many more years left of more funding than we are used

to coming from our federal partners to be able to make money available to the Commonwealth of Virginia and other states ... to get broadband delivered and deployed to everybody," said Rob-

ert Bridgham, ESVBA executive director, in a presentation to the board.

A 2022 VATI grant will bring the Eastern Shore's broadband coverage to around 80% to 85%, according to

Bridgham.

"We don't want to stop there," he said, adding of the 2023 application, "This is the last step to completing Accomack County."

Accomack County hires instructor for school EMS program

Accomack Emergency Services Captain Shawn Malone will be the instructor for the Accomack schools EMS program, Director of Secondary Education Karen Taylor announced at the Aug. 16 school board meeting.

The program will prepare seniors to become certified EMS providers and start careers in emergency services right after graduation.

Taylor said the basic courses that participating seniors need for graduation will be "front loaded" into the fall semester so the students will be available to take the EMS class in the spring. The class will be held every weekday, from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., through March.

Participating students will complete their senior-year coursework in March unless they opt also to attend the fire

academy that will follow the EMS class.

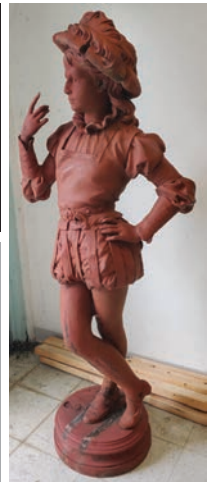
EMS instructors are normally paid by Accomack County, but the EMS instructors who teach the seniors also will receive compensation from Eastern Shore Community College, which is seeking a full-time EMS instructor.

The program will allow students to prepare for EMS careers during school hours instead of having to attend the required classes at night.

Accomack pay study a good first step

The Accomack Board of Supervisors last week decided to conduct a salary study for all county positions. It's a good first step. Taxpayers should be interested in its findings and resulting action.

It was revealed at a public meeting that some county pay rates were soberingly low — dozens of Accomack's workers are compensated below the poverty level. Other county employees will need a pay hike before year's end so they don't earn less than the new minimum wage.

A story in last week's edition showed the stark realities. Essentially, more than 50 of the county's lowest-paid employees could quit tomorrow and make more money at practically any other job.

Studies like the one sought by the county are easy to criticize — they take a bit of time and effort, and if the findings are expensive or inconvenient, the studies are simply ignored by those making decisions.

But a comparison of pay rates from other similarly sized counties around the region seems especially prudent.

And if Accomack's lowest earners are as unfairly compensated as it seems, county leaders should take action to pay them in a manner consistent with similar municipalities.

How would the county afford this? Usually it comes from one of two places: a tax increase or other cuts to municipal spending.

County officials on the Eastern Shore make it a point of pride to use tax increases only as a last resort. It's usually not an option. Cuts to county departments and programming likely will be required to help bolster salaries.

Accomack taxpayers — and employees — will be watching to see how this initiative unfolds.

My friend's birthday was approaching so I stopped for pork fried rice and conversation — and to congratulate her on another year.

Anna Zheng smiled broadly. I was the first customer of the day at the China Wok, the venerable restaurant at Shore Plaza in Exmore.

"Happy birthday," I said. "Not yet," she said. "September 3."

We both laughed. We always do.

Zheng and her husband have operated the restaurant since 2014. She and I have introduced ourselves in short stints over a long period of time.

Essentially, we chat when I have a hankering for sesame chicken, or I have an emergency hunger for egg rolls, which happens sometimes.

I'm always fascinated by how people end up on the Eastern Shore. Her trek was longer than most.

She was born and raised in China, the youngest of seven children. Her parents both died when Zheng was 13 years old. She began work a year later.

"What about school?" I asked.

"There was no money for school," she said, in her own matter-of-fact way.

These are the interactions we miss with online restaurant ordering and food delivery. DoorDash and pizza delivery might be convenient, but they are not conversational.

Technology, while alluring, is too good at separating us from others.

Face-to-face interaction builds bridges and understanding but is so easy to skip. Sometimes, I wonder why.

Behind the kitchen door I heard a spatula rattling around a wok. Outside, the strip mall parking lot was quiet.

There are three vacant storefronts to the south of China Wok and five vacant storefronts to the north. There once were more stores nearby. Even the liquor store has moved across the street.

The Zheng family moved to the United States in 2007. The family opened a Chinese restaurant in Michigan. Seven years later, the Zhengs essentially put their finger on a map and moved to the town they found randomly: Exmore.

"I like it here," said Anna Zheng after retrieving my order of pork fried rice from the kitchen.

She thanked me for my order. I again wished her a happy birthday. I told her I was glad she moved to my community.

She smiled again.

What will new wastewater system mean for Shore's aquifer?

One of the common refrains from first-timers to the Eastern Shore of Virginia is "Virginia Beach used to look just like this."

Years ago Virginia Beach and Northampton County shared many similarities like size and population. The principal land use in both areas was agriculture and both relied on underground aquifers for their potable and irrigation use.

The ESVA was not highly developed mainly because of its remote location. Virginia Beach and Hampton Roads, more centrally located, could not develop because raw sewage was running into waterways.

Similarities in the areas diverged in the 1940s when residents voted to form the Hampton Roads Sanitation District and large sewage treatment plants started coming on line beginning in 1947.

Another distinction limiting development here is the fact that the Eastern Shore draws its drinking water from one of the most unique, small, and threatened aquifers in the world.

Unlike our incredibly finite situation, Virginia Beach sits atop the Potomac Aquifer, a drinking water source that stretches from Georgia to New Jersey that used to host hundreds of trillions of gallons of fresh and pristine drinking and irrigation water.

Once the sanitation district began building out its sewage treatment infrastructure, Virginia Beach's rural quality vanished.

Virginia Beach and its neighbors drained one of the largest aquifers on the East Coast and began to run out of water. Development slowed until in 1995 a 5-foot pipe from Lake Gaston — 75 miles away — began to bring 60 million gallons of water every day to the region.

Virginia Beach over-pumped its

aquifer and its land started to sink, salt water started to encroach, and recurrent flooding plagues the region.

Today the sanitation district has the capacity to pump 250 million gallons a day of treated Hampton Roads waste into the York, James, Elizabeth rivers and other receiving waters. The same result is being considered at the Onancock plant. Will it pump our aquifer dry?

The U.S. Geologic Survey estimated that our aquifer is only "recharged" by rainwater and from the overlying surface aquifer.

The reality is, that out of an average of 43 inches of rainwater we get every year on the ESVA, only five one-hundreds of an inch gets through the Columbia into the Upper Yorktown, from which about 90% of us get our drinking water.

Once operational, Exmore alone is expected to divert 190,000 gallons of waste every day into the wastewater plant in Onancock, now owned by the

sanitation district.

But today, Exmore's waste is treated in a mass drainfield, and, according to the EPA, sewage released to the ground in private and municipal septic systems is highly purified and stays in the local water cycle, recharging the aquifer.

There is a high likelihood that once the sanitation district sewer main is completed, development on the Eastern Shore will explode just like it did in Virginia Beach.

Ask elected officials and the Department of Environmental Quality to increase monitoring and oversight of our limited drinking water resource in real time. If not, we could be saying, "I remember when the Eastern Shore of Virginia" looks like it does now.

How cooking meat helped develop the human species

The next time your Uncle Fred throws a steak on the backyard grill (or, considering the price of meat, when he throws some hot dogs on the grill), congratulate Fred: He

is engaging in an activity that helped small-brained, apelike creatures evolve into homo erectus, the first true humans.

The story of how cooking made us humans is told in the book, "Catching Fire," by Richard Wrangham. Cooked food allowed a species to develop a smaller, more efficient digestive system that provided the increased energy larger brains required while reducing the time and effort devoted to eating and digesting low-energy foods such as uncooked meat and raw

vegetables.

Two elements (meat eating AND cooking food) are needed to explain the development of the human species.

In "Catching Fire," Wrangham writes, "Meat eating

accounts smoothly for the first transition, jump-starting evolution toward humans" According to Scientific American, "A brain is a very nutritionally demanding organ, and if you want to grow a big one, eating at least some meat will provide you far more calories with far less effort than a meatless menu will."

But for the next step in evolution, cooking that meat was necessary, because, again according to Wrangham, "... cooking increases the amount of energy our bodies obtain from our food. The extra energy gave the first cooks biological advantages. They survived and reproduced better than before."

People have been cooking meat over fire for two million years. The American backyard grilling didn't really take off until the 1950s when George Stephen Sr., working in sales at Weber Brothers Metal Works, which was making metal buoys for the Coast Guard, took home the two halves of a buoy, put on a hinge so the top half could open, placed a metal grate at the bottom to hold charcoal, a grate on top to hold food, and voila, the Weber grill. Because of its shape, the early Weber grill was referred to as Sputnik. (The ancients among you can explain to millennials and younger what Sputnik was.)

Across the globe, three billion people cook all their meals over an open fire while, in the U.S., it's the backyard grill that gets a workout for fun and socializing.

Various methods have been employed by charcoal grillers hoping to speed up the moment when those briquettes are covered in white ash and ready to put on the food. Blow on the charcoal, use a hair dryer, use a leaf blower, pour on the lighter fluid — but no method is more outlandish than the one used by George Goble who worked in the Purdue University engineering department.

He doused charcoal with liquid oxygen. The three pounds of liquid oxygen ignited into a 10,000-degree inferno that melted the grill. When the experiment was tried with a more substantial grill and 60 pounds of charcoal, the exploding liquid oxygen disintegrated 40 pounds of charcoal but left the remaining 20 pounds barbecue-ready in three seconds.

As Uncle Fred might say, mission accomplished.

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Tangier gets money for opioid treatment program

Accomack is slated to receive at least \$126,361 this month

Thousands of dollars Accomack is receiving from settlements in cases involving opioid manufacturers and distributors likely will go to improve drug treatment access for Tangier Island residents.

Accomack is slated to receive between \$126,361 and \$157,180 this

month as part of a nationwide settlement.

The money must be used for opioid treatment, according to Accomack County Administrator Mike Mason.

Mason said the county asked the Eastern Shore Community Services Board about use of the money.

The ESCSB noted the need to enhance services to Tangier due to its remote location.

ESCSB staff prepared a narrative describing a program the agency could create and administer.

“What we are proposing is we have a

pilot who flies to Tangier, picks up the individuals, and flies them back to the airport,” said Mimi Sedjat, ESCSB executive director.

Services either could be provided at a mobile unit at the Melfa airport or ground transportation could be provided to a ESCSB clinic.

The ESCSB currently provides services to six Tangier residents, Sedjat said.

From 2010 to 2019, there were 51 fatal overdoses on the Eastern Shore — 39 in Accomack and 12 in Northampton, according to the presentation.

The COVID-19 pandemic appears to have had an adverse effect.

Preliminary figures show five fatal overdoses on the Shore in 2020 — four in Accomack and one in Northampton.

The board authorized staff to prepare a draft agreement with the ESCSB to establish a one-year pilot program for Tangier.

The board will consider approving the agreement next month.

If successful, the program could continue using additional settlement money Accomack receives in future years.

Navy Junior ROTC to come to Accomack schools

The Navy Junior Reserve Officers Training Corps program could come to Accomack County Public Schools by fall 2023, bringing with it opportunities for students to learn, earn community service hours, and participate in a variety of extracurricular activities.

Retired Navy Capt. Jim Daniels briefed the school board on the NJROTC program and its counter-

part, the Navy National Defense Cadet Corps.

He said programs are not for recruitment but to help students become responsible citizens with a sense of accomplishment, self-discipline, respect for authority, community service experience, and leadership skills.

Students can participate in academic, athletic, STEM (science, technology, engineering, mathematics), and Color

Guard events.

Students also can compete in drills, athletics, and academics at the Navy Nationals.

Starting an NJROTC requires participation of at least 10% of a school's population or 100 students, but an NNDCC requires only 50 students.

Director of Secondary Education Karen Taylor said Accomack would start an NNDCC as a regional program, and it likely would be based at Arcadia High School.

The NNDCC includes its own curriculum and would be part of the Accomack schools career and technical education program as a four-part course called naval science, which participating students would take every year of high school.

Students would be provided bus transportation to the host school as they would be for other CTE (career and technical education) classes.

The NNDCC program is a class and an extracurricular activity in one and gives students college scholarship op-

portunities without committing to enlisting in the military.

Of all students who participate in the Navy Junior ROTC program, more than 50% enter military service after graduation and nearly 60% pursue continuing education.

More than 40% of participants are female, 30% are Hispanic, and nearly 25% are Black, bringing diversity to the group.

The suspension rate for NJROTC cadets is about 6%, compared to more than 13% of all students at the host schools. The cadets' dropout rate is 0.64%, compared to nearly 2% of their peers.

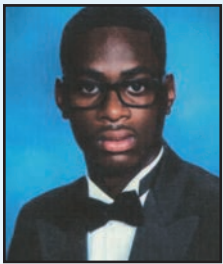
Cadets also have better attendance records and higher GPAs than other students.

Taylor said the program startup costs, such as the cost of uniforms, would be covered by CTE and at-risk funding (for students at risk of failure due to factors such as poverty). The school division would be responsible to pay the instructor of the naval science course.

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\$84M bid jeopardizes new Northampton school plan

A low bid of \$84 million – nearly \$20 million over budget – is putting the Northampton middle and high school improvement project in jeopardy.

“The Northampton County Board of Supervisors were very disappointed that the bids for the middle/high school project were so much over the estimated cost,” Northampton County Administrator Charlie Kolakowski said Wednesday.

Northampton’s middle and high school has long been in desperate need of renovation and new construction, but now the project will be further delayed as consultants figure out why the contractor bids were so much higher than expected.

The bids were going to be discussed on Tuesday at a Northampton supervisors meeting that was canceled due to a lack of a quorum. Chair Betsy Mapp was the only county supervisor present.

Regardless, there was no discussion to be had on the middle and high school project when both bids received far exceeded \$65 million, the maximum the county was willing to spend.

The high bid was around \$85 million, only about \$1 million more than the low bid.

Aside from abandoning the project, which is unlikely, the only option Northampton has is to go back to the drawing board and figure out how to scale down the project and cut costs.

Northampton High School, which also houses the county’s middle school, was built in Eastville in 1954, and an addition was built in 1978.

The push to renovate or build a new high school has been going on for years, at least as early as 2007, when a structural study called “Another Brick in the Wall” was published.

In the document, a structural engineering firm reported that the 1954 building was in poor condition and the 1978 addition was still in good condition but in need of attention “in the near future.” That was 15 years ago.

Since then, repairs have been done as needed to ensure the school building is safe for students, but it took many years and tense exchanges between county and school officials before they agreed to work together toward a long-term solution to the structural issues.

A turning point was reached in 2018 when a high school revitalization committee was formed with representatives of both the local government and school division, including administrators, county supervisors, school board members, and finance directors.

Around that time, the project cost was estimated at \$24 million, but it continually increased as the design process wore on. The COVID-19 pandemic also drove up the cost of materials and labor.

The final design on which contractors bid includes a brand-new middle school wing, cafeteria, auditorium, and a separate gym for the middle school, among other improvements. The project consultants who will investigate why the contractor bids were so high are Woolpert Architecture, of Chesapeake, and Skanska Construction, which built the original structure of the Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel.

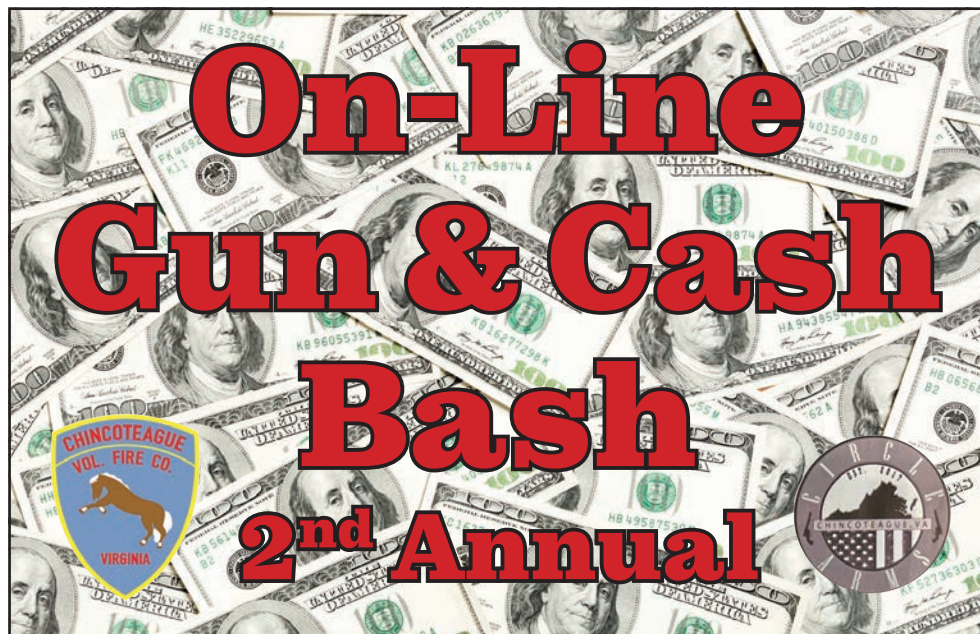

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8,500 Accomack County acres for conservation, wildlife

More than 8,500 acres on the Eastern Shore are being acquired by the Virginia Department of Wildlife Resources for conservation and wildlife management.

All but two small parcels near Jamesville are in Accomack County, with large amounts of acreage located in the northern third of the county.

DWR staff heard comments about the acquisition from nearly three dozen speakers in a standing-room-only meeting Wednesday at Eastern Shore Community College.

Adjoining property owners spoke about concerns over existing rights of way and potential trespassing by visitors to the public lands.

Hunters asked questions about regulations, access, and safety.

Some speakers thanked the department for conserving the land and asked about volunteer opportunities.

Others were concerned about loss of tax revenue to the counties.

The second phase of the acquisition, totaling around 6,875 acres, is set to happen this month.

DWR in an earlier phase acquired 1,043 acres in the Doe Creek area, near Onancock, in January.

A smaller, third phase, including around 625 acres in Northampton where parcels need additional research, is expected to close early next year.

The properties formerly were owned by Chesapeake Corporation, a paperboard container manufacturing company.

The land was purchased in 1999 by The Conservation Fund, an environmental nonprofit organization, according to Rebecca Gwynn, DWR deputy director.

The land was appraised at \$9.1 million and The Conservation Fund donated 10% of that amount as part of the purchase by DWR and its partners, Gwynn said. The project's total cost is around \$13 million, which includes surveying and other expenses.

"We still need to look at each of these parcels, specifically the people who live around it, and make sure we

understand what it can accommodate from the perspective of number of users at any one time and what types of uses and activities will be appropriate," Gwynn said in answer to questions about what public uses will be allowed.

Information about allowed activities for specific properties will be available on the DWR website, she said.

Asked about DWR's long-term plans for additional land acquisition, Gwynn said it was an opportunity of a lifetime "to improve habitat for migratory birds" and contribute "in a positive way to help our recreation on the Eastern Shore."

"I don't have a specific plan in mind right now (for additional acquisitions). We'll look, on maybe some of these parcels, to expand out if the opportunity presents itself, if there is another willing landowner — but I don't have a secret plan back at the office that says we're going to triple this."

A state law that requires DWR to return 25% of timber proceeds to the locality will help offset the loss of real estate tax revenue to the county, Gwynn said.

The plan is to harvest industrial pine from the properties and replace it with vegetation that is better wildlife habitat, she said.

Additionally, "We think there is great opportunity to work with the Eastern Shore tourism alliance and the chambers of both counties to also talk about how we can collaborate in expanding promotion of the Eastern Shore as an outdoor recreation destination, with these parcels kind of serving as a foundation," she said.

The Eastern Shore properties will add to Virginia's wildlife management areas, which at present include 48 WMAs totaling more than 230,000 acres.

The land will be managed for native wildlife and habitat, including increasing habitat for migratory songbirds, according to Matt Kline, DWR Region 1 lands and access manager.

The acquisitions will help Virginia

meet its Wildlife Action Plan goals for species on the Shore.

Of Virginia's 883 species with greatest conservation need, 79 are thought to be on the Eastern Shore, according to Kline.

Of the 79, 67 are dependent on habitats provided in the DWR's planning region and are considered a priority for conservation. Those include the black rail, the Ameridan woodcock, and the black-throated blue warbler.

Conserving and managing the land for wildlife also will help the region prepare for climate change and sea-level rise by keeping the land free from buildings and able to be adapted more easily as the sea level rises, according to David Norris, DWR Regional 1 regional wildlife manager.

"These are 60-some parcels that are not going to have a house on them," he said.

The land also will provide recreational opportunities, including hunting and other uses.

"We want to get these properties

open as soon as possible," Kline said, but he noted some of the property needs to be timbered first and access, parking, and other infrastructure has to be installed.

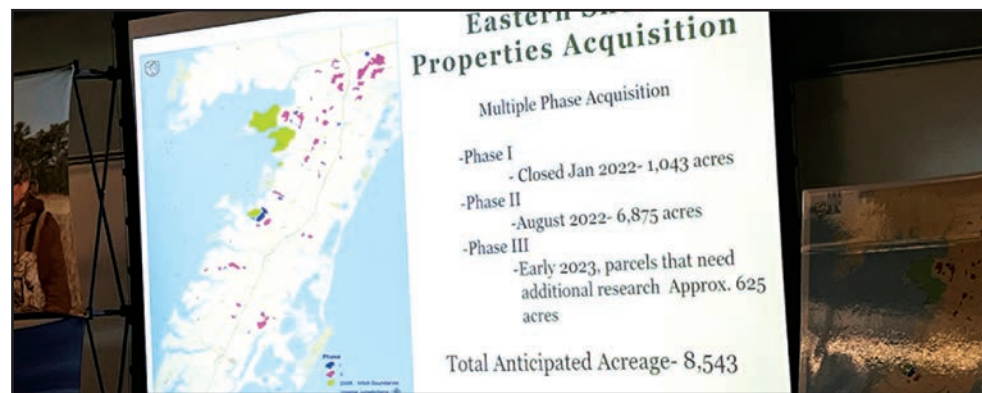
Some areas could be open to the public as soon as this spring, in time for turkey gobbler hunting season, according to Kline.

Kline said the department is working to be consistent in its regulations for use of WMAs on the Shore, noting a lack of consistency is the number one complaint DWR hears from the public.

Kline said DWR manages the number of visitors to a wildlife management area in part by limiting the number of parking spaces at access points. Only foot and bicycle or E-bike traffic are allowed within WMAs, he said.

Gwynn said DWR law enforcement officers "stand ready" to address trespassing onto adjoining privately owned land.

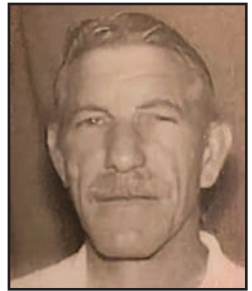

SAFETY ON THE WATER

A checklist for boating at night

When you are going boating at night, there are a lot of things that you need to do.

First, as you leave the dock in daylight and move through the local channel, take it slow (like 5 knots) and note a couple of things.

Note the time it takes you to run from one channel marker to the next and the course to reach each one.

On your return trip, you will need to know those times to make your way in.

After you have the course from leav-

ing your home port, you will need to subtract 180 degrees from each leg to determine an approximate return course.

As darkness falls, have everyone put on a lifejacket and check their marker lights, then be sure to turn on your boat's navigation lights.

Power boats must show red (port) and green (starboard) lights each visible on an arc of 112.5 degrees from the bow and white light visible 360 degrees.

Sailboats under sail do not turn on the white lights unless they start their engine.

As you leave your home port, take

note of which aids are lighted and which are not.

In daylight hours, most lighted aids are off so boaters don't notice them. As you pass them, check your chart to be certain you know the flashing pattern each light will use and note this on the course pattern you are laying out.

If lights are present they will guide you back but only if you know the flashing patterns.

school football until he landed the varsity head coach position five years ago.

Spencer has coached a lot of unique and outstanding players over the years, including local basketball legend Ace Custis.

"I coached Ace in parks and rec," he said. "He was the best basketball player I ever coached. He played both ends of the floor. When the varsity basketball team went to the state final four in 2014, Ace opened up the gym and let us in. That really meant something."

When asked what he likes most about coaching, Spencer responded that he loves sports and the young people with whom he works.

"It's such a joy working with all these young athletes," he said. "I'm going to coach until I die or they run me out of here."

Lower Chesapeake Bay fishing action stays hot

The lower Chesapeake Bay continues to provide the top angling action for the peninsula, with sheepshead action drawing most of the attention.

The area is still seeing some cobia catches, but they are on the decline and are quickly being replaced by late afternoon catch-and-release trophy red drum action.

Flounder fishing on the seaside has remained steady for the last several weeks.

Locating clear water and carrying enough minnows and/or silversides to outlast the pesky small croakers and whiting have been the key to boating limits of the flatfish.

Chincoteague

Jimmy Vasiliou, at Captain Steve's Bait and Tackle, reported action in the Assateague surf was "steady," with a mixed bag of spot, kingfish (whiting), big rays, and a few sharks.

Productive baits have included Fish Bites, squid, and lugworms.

The inshore ocean wrecks are producing large flounder, spadefish, and gray triggerfish. Black sea bass and triggerfish are coming from the deeper offshore wrecks.

In Chincoteague Bay, the flounder bite was described as "good when you can get past the pickers." A 24-inch sheepshead and a few tautog have been caught by anglers fishing from the Main Street Pier.

Wachapreague

Captain Lindsay Paul, at Trident Tackle, reported the flounder bite out of Wachapreague was still very productive when the water conditions were clear.

Small croakers and sand mullet (whiting) were also showing up in the catches. Black sea bass and small dolphin (mahi) catches have come from the offshore wrecks.

Marlin and tuna fishing in the canyons was described as "slow."

Amanda Manzella, at the Wachapreague Inn, said the recent flounder bite has been "hot."

She added that sea bass and flounder catches have come from the inshore ocean structures.

Manzella said tuna fishing was slow offshore, but good mahi action was experienced by trollers while

deep droppers fared well with tilefish.

Lower Shore

Dez Louie, at Oceans East-Eastern Shore, said the cobia bite has started to pick up again as the fish are heading down out of the Chesapeake Bay. The best action has occurred during bottom fish-

ing in the area of 9-Foot Shoals as well as sight casting to fish staging around the pilings of the Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel.

Trophy-sized red drum have been caught and released in the late afternoon/evenings near buoy 36 off Cape Charles, as well as around the third and fourth islands of the bridge-tunnel.

Sheepshead fishing was described as "excellent" by Louie, with keeper-sized fish coming from Plantation Light and the concrete ships, with larger fish being pulled from around the bridge-tunnel pilings.

He added that there are still schools of bluefish and Spanish mackerel feeding on the migrating schools of bay anchovies and silversides.

Flounder fishing has been good for anglers willing to put in their time catching limits of fish over 20 inches. Berkley Gulp grubs in the 6-inch size or Gulp Swimming Mullet fished on heavy bucktails along the high rise section has produced some of the larger fish.

Speckled trout and some puppy drum have been hitting peeler crab baits suspended under popping corks as well as soft plastic artificials cast along the edges of the marsh grass.

Catches from the Kiptopeke Pier have included ribbonfish, small croakers, spot, and small black sea bass.

Jeb Brady, at Bailey's Bait & Tackle, reported sheepshead fishing dominated the week. Anglers reported "great action" from the bridge-tunnel up to the Cell, while fishing crab on weighted head jigs around pilings and over structure.

Brady described the cobia fishing as "slow" with sight fishermen reporting "OK days" when the sun is out. Bottom fishing action for cobia resulted in lots of unwanted shark and ray action.

Big red drum action has been good in the evenings between buoy 40A and buoy 36A. Sight fishermen who encountered schools of surface cruising red drum have had some success casting artificials to the fish.

Spanish mackerel catches have come from the area between the mouth of Cape Charles Harbor down to the Cabbage Patch. Speckled trout action is picking up with some larger fish recently caught in Hungars Creek. Look for action to improve as the water temperatures begin to cool. Action off the Cape Charles Pier has consisted mostly of ribbonfish and small spot.

Sen. Lewis discusses menhaden spills

State Sen. Lynwood Lewis recently called for and hosted a meeting in his office in Accomac with Virginia Marine Resources Commissioner Jamie Green, Delegate Rob Bloxom, acting Secretary of Natural Resources Travis Voyles, Northampton County Administrator Charles Kolakowski, and Northampton County Board of Supervisors Chairwoman Betsy Mapp.

The meeting was held in response to the multiple menhaden spills that occurred just off the coast of Northampton County during the month of July, resulting in thousands of dead bait fish — and in one spill, red drum bycatch — washing up on beaches.

Lewis pushed VMRC to take decisive action in response to these spills, asking for consideration of several preventative measures, including a buffer of at least one mile for menhaden fishing opera-

tions to move them farther offshore, and greater than one mile in highly utilized recreational areas, and strict requirements and timelines surrounding clean-up when and if spills do occur.

Lewis plans to introduce legislation directing state agencies to conduct a study on localized depletion of the menhaden fishery, as well as a budget amendment funding this study.

“I am hopeful that we will see VMRC action to hold Omega Protein accountable for these recent spills as well as the adoption of regulatory measures to ensure the prevention of future spills.

“However, I must be clear here: these spills were and will continue to be unacceptable. If this administration's VMRC Board does not take sufficient action, I am absolutely open to legislative action to address these spills, and I will not hesitate to move forward accordingly.”

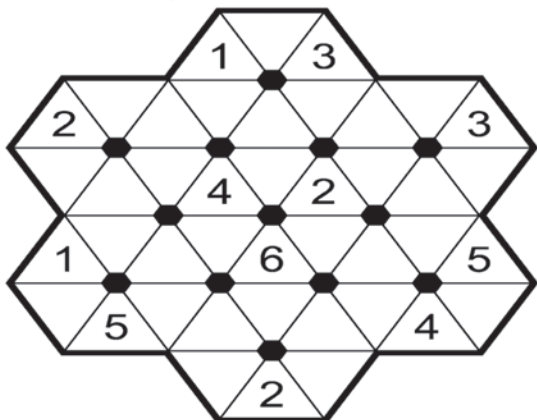


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SNOWFLAKES
