Town's cat population 'to explode'

Frisky, fecund, feral felines 'floating around,' says resident

Onancock has a feral cat problem that is on the precipice of an eruption.

That's according to a resident who spoke during the public comment period at Monday's Town Council meeting.

A representative of a nonprofit organization also spoke at the meeting, saying the town should consider addressing the issue.

Resident Priscilla Hart asked council "how we can control the cat population."

She said "a very sick cat" recently showed up on her property.

"There are plenty of cats floating around. Not all of them are feral or homeless, but there are plenty that are and the kitten population is just going to explode," she said.

Margie Spangler of Northern Accomack Community Cats said the organization has facilitated the trapping, neutering or spaying, and release of 85 outdoor cats in Onancock and has more than 75 additional Onancock cats on its list to be neutered or spayed.

Additionally, the organization has had five complaints about feral cats in Onancock, including getting calls from both vacationers and property owners who rent out homes in town.

Spangler said the town of Parksley approved spending money to bring the Neuter

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MISSING WOMAN'S BODY MIGHT BE IN N.C. LANDFILL

N.C. authorities search for woman at dump site

A missing Accomack County woman may have died in a poultry-truck crash in North Carolina and her body mistakenly scooped up with crash debris and dumped in a landfill.

The family of Alyssa Nicole Taylor, 25, of Oak Hall, a mother of two, has traveled to Orange County, N.C., to try to find Taylor or her remains.

Family members are setting their sights on a landfill where debris from the accident was taken. They planned to visit the landfill Tuesday.

There has been no sign of Taylor since the crash, which happened in the early morning hours of Sept. 14.

The fiery crash killed the driver, Danny McNeal, 51, of Exmore. Taylor's family says she was traveling with McNeal at the time of the crash.

North Carolina authorities ini-

tially refused to search the landfill, said Shelly Payton, Taylor's aunt, because they say the missing woman wasn't in the truck.

Taylor's relatives were told Tues-

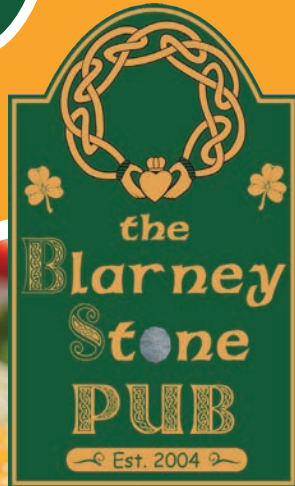
day "that they won't send somebody to the landfill because they don't have the money, they don't have the

Town may use sewer department reserve to fund new attorney

The town of Onancock, which has a \$4,500 legal budget this fiscal year, has hired a \$2,000-per-month Richmond law firm to represent it.

The town could use reserve money from the sewer department to help fund the new attorney.

Onancock officials approved hiring as town attorney a Richmond law firm called Hefty Wiley & Gore.

Eric Gregory of the firm spoke with the Town Council Monday via Zoom.

The firm charges a flat monthly fee of \$2,000 to advise and represent the town in legal matters.

That is significantly more than the \$4,500 budgeted for legal fees this year.

The additional cost could be met this year through a surplus in the water department budget or reserve funds in the sewer department, according to Town Manager Matt Spuck.

Spuck noted the town has a significant backlog of ordinance and policy reviews and other matters that need

legal oversight.

The law firm has represented municipalities and other regional governmental entities in Virginia for well over 25 years, Gregory said.

He has been with the firm since 2016.

The firm has no other towns on the Eastern Shore as clients.

Gregory will be the town's primary contact, but the firm has six attorneys and others in the firm could assist in matters where they have particular expertise, he said.

The town contacted the law firm after receiving no responses in its search to hire a town attorney, according to Spuck.

Mayor Fletcher Fosque said when he came on Town Council, the town was spending \$10,000 to \$15,000 a year on the town attorney, who attended meetings.

"We need professional help that knows municipal law," he said.

Fosque called for a roll call vote, which was unanimous in approving the arrangement.

Scouter, a mobile spay/neuter unit operated by the Virginia Beach SPCA, to Parksley to help control that town's outdoor cat population.

Only Parksley cats will be spayed or neutered during the mobile unit's visit Oct. 4.

"That takes care of 28 to 30 cats," she said, urging Onancock officials to consider following Parksley's lead.

It costs \$2,600 to bring the mobile

Neuter Scooter to a locality, she said.

"Ignoring it is not going to make it go away. It's going to get worse out there," Spangler said of the feral cat population.

"So I'm asking you to please raise the money, find the money somewhere, for us to have the Neuter Scooter to come up here," she said, noting the organization is asking towns around the county for similar help.

"It sounds like we have a cat problem," Fosque said.

The council took no action Monday on the request.

Onancock, Onley, Saxis, Parksley support saving Accomac school

The Onancock Town Council Monday voted unanimously to send a letter to Accomack County and school board officials supporting renovating the former Accomac High School.

The school board is in the process of deciding whether to renovate the 1932 building or to demolish it and replace it with a new structure to serve as school board offices.

Accomac Councilman Tommy Hines last month asked the Onancock council to support the town of Accomac in its effort to save the old school building, but Onancock officials declined to vote on the matter then.

Hines was at Monday's meeting to ask again for the town's support.

Onancock Councilwoman Sarah Nock noted the towns of Onley and Saxis have sent letters of support, similar to what Hines was asking for.

Parksley officials also voted earlier this month to support the effort to save the building.

Asked about the cost difference between renovation and demolition/new construction, Hines said, "It was \$4,300 difference," out of a total project cost of around \$5 million.

"The school board wants to tear it down," he said, noting many Accomack County residents graduated from the old school.

"If you tear down history, it doesn't come back," Hines said.

resources to do that," she said.

Payton in a live video posted Wednesday said Taylor's relatives had spoken with someone at the landfill where the debris was taken and said authorities had agreed to search the landfill.

She credited "everybody pushing," media coverage, and evidence the Accomack County Sheriff's Office found indicating Taylor was in the truck with the decision of North Carolina authorities to search the landfill.

"The are out there searching with cadaver dogs as we speak," Payton said, asking for prayers that searchers find "something out there today, that we can get closure, that we can go home."

Missing person

The Accomack County Sheriff's Office Friday posted a missing person report on its Facebook page, seeking information about Taylor's whereabouts.

Taylor is described as 5 feet, 5 inches tall, White, with green eyes and brown hair.

The last known contact Taylor made

was Sept. 13. She said she was leaving the area in a tractor-trailer for a few days, according to the sheriff's office.

According to a report in the News & Observer, of Raleigh, N.C., Taylor texted her mother at 1:15 p.m. Sept. 13 to say she was "riding with Danny in tractor trailer for two days."

Sabrina Taylor, another aunt, this week started an online fundraiser at www.gofundme.com to raise money to help the family with funeral expenses and efforts to find the missing woman.

The crash caused the truck to catch on fire, Sabrina Taylor wrote, adding, "With little to no cab left, we have thus far just found her blanket and one flip flop among the wreckage. We are in North Carolina trying to find answers and closure and our baby girl so we can bring her home."

Payton posted a live video Saturday, Sept. 24, of relatives looking at what remains of the truck after the crash.

"We're looking. We're being told there's no evidence found," she said near the beginning of the video.

A police officer is seen in the video accompanying Taylor's relatives.

Taylor's relatives during the video found a flip-flop they say belonged to Taylor, as well as a pink blanket that

somehow survived the fire.

"This is the blanket that she traveled everywhere with," Payton said.

Payton said the last location notification from Taylor's cellphone came from a location "not even an hour from this crash site."

Additionally, Payton in the video said relatives saw Taylor in the truck and heard what they identified as Taylor's voice on police body camera video from Exmore, taken when McNeal was pulled over there.

She said a North Carolina official said there was nothing more to search from the wreckage, that the truck exploded, and the temperature reached 3,000 degrees.

But, she added, "I will do whatever it takes to figure out what exactly happened to Alyssa."

Search continues

Payton in a telephone interview with the Eastern Shore Post said family members plan to remain in North Carolina for now and will continue to press authorities for answers about Taylor's fate. They have been there since Friday.

She, Taylor's mother, and Sabrina Taylor met Tuesday morning with the North Carolina Highway Patrol.

Payton said an investigation by the Accomack County Sheriff's Office that included cellular phone data shows Taylor was in the truck at the time of the crash.

"Accomack has done a wonderful job. I just keep praising them. Even since we've been down here, they keep saying the same thing — that they need to search the landfill," Payton said.

Of North Carolina authorities, she said, "I feel like they are covering it up down here that somebody messed up."

Taylor's relatives planned to try to speak with first responders who were at the scene and also planned to go to the landfill where debris from the crash was taken later Tuesday.

McNeal died after the 2022 Mack tractor-trailer he was driving ran off the road in Hillsborough, N.C., around 2:15 a.m., then crashed into the abutment of the N.C. Route 86 bridge over I-85 and overturned, according to a N.C. Highway Patrol spokesperson.

ABC 11 television reported McNeal was hauling a load of frozen chickens at the time.

McNeal's dog, Blu, also died in the crash, according to an online fundraiser.

New teachers hail from foreign countries

Teacher shortages across America mean that school divisions must continually broaden their searches for qualified educators, with some like Accomack County looking beyond the nation's borders.

Nearly a dozen new teachers who were hired in 2021 and this year are from Jamaica, Colombia, and the Philippines, bringing with them a wide range of specialties, including elementary education, math, Spanish, English as a second language, and special education.

"I can honestly say that their work ethic is superb. They are prepared, they're engaging, and they're enthusiastic in the classroom," said Julie Evans, Accomack's division teacher mentor.

To recruit these teachers, Accomack employed the services of two companies, Participate Learning and Educational Partners Inc.

These companies recruit teachers by offering them the opportunity to travel, experience new types of recreation, food, music, and culture, and be both a teacher and cultural ambassador to their students.

Examples of teacher requirements set by one or both recruiting companies include possession of a valid driver's license, a minimum of two years of teaching experience, successful completion of an English writing sample or an advanced English assessment, multiple interviews, and background checks.

All candidates are eligible for Virginia teaching licensure, and selected candidates obtain visas that allow them to work in the U.S. for up to five years.

Participate Learning's and EPI's services don't stop once teacher candidates are offered jobs in the U.S. The companies also help teachers transition to their new communities.

Orientations are held for the teachers in North Carolina after they arrive in the U.S.

Additional services may include the provision of housing options, as-

sistance with temporary transportation, maps of the local area, help locating places such as banks and grocery stores, and assistance acquiring a Social Security card and Virginia driver's license.

EPI pairs every new hire with a veteran mentor teacher, and teachers recruited through Participate Learning work with a local advisor like Teresa Ibarra, an Accomack ESL teacher.

Ibarra thanked Accomack County Public Schools staff for welcoming the new teachers, whether by inviting them to dinner or taking them to the beach or on a boat ride.

Evans said the new teachers' "passion for building relationships with students and families is apparent. ... I look forward to working with them as we continue through the school year and supporting them ... as we go forward."

The Accomack County Department of Public Works is pleased to announce the countywide *"Fall Clean-Up"* to be held on **Saturday October 8, 2022**. In an effort to encourage citizens of Accomack to remove unsightly refuse from their yards, homes, and communities, **the Accomack County Board of Supervisors will waive tipping fees at the North Landfill and South Transfer Station for residential waste and recyclable materials brought in on this day.** The waiver will also be open to non-residents possessing an Accomack County Solid Waste Decal. Commercial for hire waste haulers will be required to pay standard tipping fees.

Landfills will be open on Saturday, October 8, 2022 from 8:30 am to 4:00 pm to accept residential garbage, yard waste, and construction/demolition debris. The landfill will also accept the following recyclable materials:

- Tires (car and small truck only "LIMIT" 12 per person/day)
- Used Motor Oil, Scrap Metal, and car and truck batteries.

Recycling materials, such as plastic bottles, milk jugs, detergent bottles, any #1 or #2 plastics, newspapers, magazines, catalogs, junk mail, telephone books, cereal boxes, metal and aluminum cans, may be recycled at any of the County's 7 Convenience/Recycling Centers "FREE" year round.

Landfills and Convenience Centers will not accept materials deemed to be hazardous, such as: Paint, Pesticides, Biological hazards, asbestos, and heavy metals. Please check with the attendants at these sites as to where and how to dispose of hazardous materials.

The Department of Solid Waste looks forward to working with the citizens of Accomack County on this program and encourages everyone to mark their calendars for the Spring Clean Up - the second Saturday of May every year! Makemie Park homes will get septic fix

Boggs Water and Sewage Inc. was awarded a contract to install individual septic systems for 21 properties on Saxis Road, in Makemie Park. The cost ranges from \$21,494 to \$38,500 for each property.

Construction started Sept. 20, with completion expected by Dec. 25.

The contract is related to a Virginia Community Development Block Grant awarded to pay for septic services to remedy the failure of a community septic system in Makemie Park.

Boggs was the only bid received, after Accomack County issued an invitation for bids in July.

"There is an education portion of this project," so homeowners will be informed about how to maintain the septic systems, Mason told the Accomack County Board of Supervisors last Wednesday.

Fourth quarter financial report

Accomack County's major revenues were up nearly \$1.3 million, or 5.9%, for the fourth quarter of fiscal year

2022 as compared to the previous year's fourth quarter, according to a presentation given to the board of supervisors by Finance Director Margaret Lindsey.

Sales tax revenue for fiscal year 2022 exceeded both the budget, by 9.3%, and actual collections the prior year, by 8.7%.

Electrical inspection fees updated

The Accomack County Board of Supervisors voted to update the fee schedule for electrical permits, after a public hearing last Wednesday at which no one spoke.

Residential and commercial electrical inspections in the county are done by third-party contractors and the new fee schedule will allow the county to recover the costs the contractors charge.

The minimum permit fee for residential inspections under the new schedule is \$75 and the reinspection fee also is \$75.

The new minimum fee for commercial inspections is \$95 and the reinspection fee also is \$95.

Owners of dams must comply

Hurricane season is ongoing — and with fall rains and winter storms just around the corner, Virginia's dam safety officials are reminding dam owners of their responsibilities. Dam failures can result in catastrophic flooding, putting people and property at risk.

Most dams in Virginia are privately owned. Dam owners may be liable for

damages to other people's property, injuries or deaths resulting from the failure or malfunction of their dam.

DCR advises dam owners what they must do to be in compliance with the Virginia Dam Safety Act, including registering their dams with a Certificate of Operation and Maintenance through DCR.

Teacher exit survey results: high gas, low pay

High gas prices may have contributed to the reasons some Accomack teachers left the school division last year, a recent teacher exit survey suggests.

Of nearly 60 Accomack teachers who left the school division last year, about 40% took the anonymous survey, said Director of Human Resources Clara Chandler.

The respondents were given anonymity to encourage frankness. "If they're not honest, we're not going to improve," Chandler said.

When the teachers were asked how long they were employed in Accomack schools, the most common answer, supplied by 36% of respondents, was two to four years.

Some of the teachers who left either changed careers or retired, but others remained in education.

The No. 1 reason teachers accepted positions in different school divisions was higher pay, which was unsurprising, Chandler said.

Both Accomack and Northampton have made efforts to increase teacher pay, and both offer a first-year teacher a starting salary of about \$45,000.

Increased teacher pay has been made possible in part through one-time state funding similar to the Cost of Competing Adjustment or COCA, which is permanent funding historically given to Virginia school divisions near Washington, D.C., to help them offer competitive salaries.

The second-highest ranking reason for accepting a teaching job in another school division was a shorter com-

mute, which was a somewhat unusual answer, Chandler said.

Record-high gas prices may have driven some educators to look for teaching jobs with shorter commutes.

No one said that the primary reason for leaving the school division was dissatisfaction with coworkers, and only 8% were dissatisfied with their supervisors or a lack of opportunity for advancement.

The No. 1 primary reason for leaving, given by 28% of respondents, was personal or family obligations, which is "out of our control," Chandler noted.

But one thing Accomack can do to encourage teachers to stay is to give them more professional support.

Superintendent Chris Holland said he is "quite proud" of the supports Accomack offers its teachers, which include:

- The New Teacher Academy held every August
- Three tiers of teacher mentors: division-wide mentors, school-wide mentors, and individual teacher mentors
- A program in which retired teachers can coach, model, and

co-teach with new teachers

- Opportunities for new teachers to observe other teachers, both in the new teachers' home schools and other Accomack schools
- Team planning by department at the middle and high schools and by grade level at the elementary schools
- Professional development both in and out of the school division

New teachers also meet with Chandler to discuss teaching licensure requirements, and both new and veteran teachers alike are welcome to bring any issue related to human resources to her attention.

"My door is always open," Chandler said.

She also complimented Accomack's community members, from its churches to its fire companies, for welcoming the new teachers who move to the county.

She said "relationship building" is one of the most important things that can be done to encourage teachers to stay.

New Church man found not guilty in crime against child

A New Church man was found not guilty by an Accomack County jury of the 2020 aggravated sexual battery of his girlfriend's daughter, who was 8 years old at the time.

Charles Anthony Gaskins Jr., 44, shared a home with the child, her mother, his two children, and a child the couple shared.

Before she testified, the alleged victim, now 10 years old, was questioned by Judge W. Revell Lewis III to assess her competence to testify in the case. The names of the child and mother are being withheld because of the nature of the crime.

Lewis spoke to her generally about school and her teachers before asking her about telling the truth and its importance. After questioning, Lewis

found her competent to testify about her experience with the man who had been part of her family since she was a toddler.

The girl described the night of the alleged incident.

She said she was with her stepsiblings in the living room of their mobile home in New Church. She said the others were asleep and her mother was in another room. She said she was on a sofa in the living room with Gaskins when he began touching her inappropriately.

"I was trying to sleep," she said. "He was on the sofa with me and he started touching me and rubbing me. I was uncomfortable and it really hurt me a lot. I tried to move but I couldn't. I didn't know what to do."

She said she tried to tell him to stop but could not. The girl wept softly and wiped away tears as she talked about

the incident and how it affected her. She said Gaskins had never done anything like this before.

She said she told her mother the next morning. "She wanted me to lie about it," she said of her mother.

She said her stepcousin called the police, "because she had my back." She was taken to Children's Hospital of the Kings Daughters in Norfolk for a forensic interview that was audio and video recorded and given to police.

A former sheriff's department investigator testified he arrested Gaskins. "After hearing the (forensic) interview, I felt I had more than enough probable cause to obtain a warrant for Gaskins," he told the court.

Defense attorney Carl Bundick called the child's mother to the witness stand. She said her daughter's story about the incident changed several times. She said the child did not

tell her what happened when she had an opportunity to do so the morning after the alleged incident. She denied telling her daughter to lie about what happened.

Commonwealth's Attorney Spencer Morgan said the girl never wavered in her description of the incident. "He was touching her intimate parts," Morgan said. "She tried to say stop but could not find the words. She told the truth." He asked the jury of seven women and five men to find Gaskins guilty.

Defense attorney Carl Bundick said his client had never been convicted of any offense and denied the child's accusations. He said there was no scientific evidence. He said the commonwealth failed to prove beyond a reasonable doubt that the incident described by the child ever occurred.

"It just doesn't make sense," Bundick told the jurors.



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Officials look for blame, solutions in \$85M school morass

After Northampton received what it deemed an unaffordable low bid of nearly \$85 million for its middle- and high-school project, county supervisors and school board members are searching for a way forward, including the possible firing of the project's architect.

Among their choices are seeking new bids in spring 2023, when economic conditions may be improved and more contractors may be available, modifying or redesigning the project to cut costs, or a combination of both.

Supervisor John Coker said, "Otherwise, six months from now, we could be in the same place. ... It might come down 10 million bucks, and we're going to be sitting here, saying, 'Gee, we can't afford 75 (million dollars) either.'"

The \$85 million price tag was more than double the initial estimate of \$38 million provided by Virginia Beach architecture firm Waller, Todd & Sadler, now a Woolpert company, in October 2020.

By the time the middle- and high-school design phase had reached 100% completion and the county made a request for bids, Northampton officials

had expected to spend a maximum of \$65 million on the project.

Laying the blame

Supervisors and school board members differed in their opinions of where to lay the blame for their predicament.

Northampton Board of Supervisors Chair Betsy Mapp suggested the former Northampton Middle School in Machipongo should have been renovated instead of closed, and the middle school shouldn't have been housed within Northampton High School.

But school board member Jo Ann Molera and others pointed out that the old middle school had intensive structural issues as well as mold and asbestos.

Furthermore, combining the middle and high school had saved money by reducing building maintenance costs and the number of school staff needed, they said.

Coker said Northampton officials were "led down the garden path" by Waller, Todd & Sadler, who convinced the county that the best option was to keep the middle and high school on the same campus but build a new wing for

the middle school and a separate gym.

Coker said the architect "should be fired. I think they did a horrible job."

Few references were made to the COVID-19 pandemic that lasted nearly three years and drastically impacted the cost and availability of materials and labor.

However, Northampton schools Director of Operations Chris Truckner noted that the school division received only two bids for the project; normally it would have received six to 10 competitive bids, but few contractors can bid on projects right now because they can't find subcontractors.

He responded to Mapp's allegation that the high school improvement committee, which includes both school and county officials, may not have kept Northampton's financial best interests in mind.

Truckner said "we were very conservative" when designing the project and selecting materials, which did not include "golden doorknobs ... or crystal."

Other suggestions

Mapp proposed saving money by building the new middle school wing

not in front of the existing school building but within the same footprint as the current cafeteria and auditorium, which were built in 1954, are in poor condition, and will be demolished.

School board members seemed reluctant to consider the proposal, partly because redesigning the project will cost more money.

Woolpert will complete a study around Dec. 1 to determine how project costs could be reduced, such as eliminating plans for a storm shelter, choosing a heating and cooling system that's not geothermal, and eliminating or delaying plans for a middle school gym, locker rooms, and weight room.

School board Chair Charlena Jones said the school board attended Tuesday night's meeting for informational purposes only, and it will discuss the matter and make a recommendation to county supervisors at a later date.

A deserved tax break for our volunteers

Volunteerism is the glue that holds the Eastern Shore together. It is hard to imagine life in Accomack and Northampton counties without it.

So it is great to see the Accomack County Board of Supervisors give an incentive to our volunteer firefighters and emergency medical providers who give freely of their time and talents to keep residents safe.

Supervisors voted to allow volunteer fire and rescue personnel to have a lower tax rate on one motor vehicle apiece — one cent per \$100 in valuation. The new rate begins at the start of next year.

A benefit like this helps current volunteer first responders and will work as a recruiting tool for new volunteers.

It should be said that no volunteer first responders trade their time for compensation.

Accomack County's volunteer fire and rescue organizations have a rich history of community service without a thought of remuneration or reimbursement.

The new incentive will cost the county almost \$124,000 annually. That's a small price to pay — it is hard to imagine the tax implications of not having volunteer first responders.

We hope the new benefit helps boost the number of volunteers who make such an important contribution.

Dear Mom,

I hope things are going well in the hereafter. I hope that the Parkinson's disease you hated is long gone. I hope there is plenty of stuff there you always

liked — puppy dogs and ice-cream sandwiches and kindly, mannerly folks.

I hope everyone picks up after themselves and knocks the mud from their boots before they enter, just like you always wanted us to do.

It has been a year since you died and I always feel a little mopey on the approach of the hallmark days — your birthday and mine, Christmas, and the like — when it is strangest not having you around, telling me I'm eating

too much.

I'm writing you from my new desk, at my new job. Everybody reads this paper and it literally gets delivered everywhere — probably even to the hereafter, where you are.

Let's catch up a bit. The grandkids are doing fine and we are, too. I think you'd be impressed with the gravestone Dad picked out for you. I miss our long chats.

There was one chat we missed, however. That's why I'm writing.

Before your Parkinson's got too bad, we should have discussed what to do with your stuff after you passed away.

Yes, you gave some of it to me before you died — a few items I asked for that had sentimental value to me. You were happy to let me have them. I look at one of them every day and think of you — and us.

And no, you weren't a pack rat. You didn't keep everything. But I had no idea what to do with some of what you left behind.

It leaves me with philosophical questions we should have chewed on:

When people reach a certain age, should they pare down their belongings before they die to make it easier on those left behind?

Or have those people earned the right to barrel into old age surrounded by their accumulations, and leave all of it for everyone else to fret over?

Is it callous and insensitive of me to think it prudent for a lifetime of gathering possessions to also include the thoughtful dissemination of them?

Or is it callous and insensitive for someone to just leave the miscellany of a life behind to become someone else's trouble?

Would it be better for people, while they still can, to divvy or donate all that extra furniture in the attic?

Or do people in the autumn of life have better things to do than sort out stuff last used during the Cold War?

I think we should have taken the time while you

were still here to sell your sewing and quilting machines, which you hadn't used for years, because you were unable to.

We hocked the machines and all of the associated furniture, probably for much less than they were worth. But we were all happy to have them gone.

I'm sorry some of the magazines and instruction manuals you so meticulously kept went in the trash. Extra dishes and furniture went to the thrift store.

We made instant decisions — keep it or pitch it — with stuff that had been around forever. It was heart-breaking and necessary both.

In truth, I had no idea what to do with many of the remnants of your life. I didn't have room for some of it — but it seemed disrespectful to throw it out.

It would have helped if we made these decisions long before your funeral — and not afterward.

Maybe the real issue is that we all have accumulated too much, when we don't need many things in life. Most of us don't need the possessions we have.

I treasure my memories of you and of our good times together. Now that we have almost finished processing your stuff, my thoughts can turn fully to the person you were and not the difficult disposition of what you collected along the way.

I miss you, Mom. Enjoy the puppy dogs and ice-cream sandwiches in the hereafter. And thanks for the conversation.

Of rats, PETA, snap traps, and corn gluten

Fall is the season of apples on the ground, bird feeders overflowing, and brisk weather. But as granny used to say, "It's all fun and games until someone

can't get in but, considering that mice can enter a dime-size hole and rats can get through a gap the size of a quarter, good

puts an eye out." Fall is fun and games until the rats show up.

They've been living in your yard or nearby wooded areas and now they want shelter, such as your house or apartment.

The usual advice is to seal your premises so the rats and mice

luck with that.

Rats can bring diseases and gnaw into your wiring, water pipes, walls, and furniture, so you have to get rid of them. And hurry. Female rats go into heat once a week, can get pregnant two days after giving birth, and by having about 10 pups in each litter can produce a thousand rats in a year.

You could try discouraging rats from entering your house by using mothballs, peppermint oil, or ammonia-soaked cotton balls. But these measures have limited effectiveness in keeping rats away and won't evict an established rat population.

One source suggests using strobe lights and rock music to scare away rats, but do you really want to be responsible for creating a strain of disco rats?

Kill them.

Traps or poison. The Victor snap trap is effective but messy. Classic rat poisons use anticoagulants to cause internal

bleeding, leading to the rats' death.

Unfortunately, these poisons also kill unintended victims that either ingest the poison directly or eat poisoned rats and succumb to secondary poisoning. The EPA requires these poisons to be used in bait boxes with rats-only access, but that doesn't prevent the secondary poisoning.

Within the last decade, a rat poison became available that kills rats without poisoning other creatures. This new poison is a mixture of corn gluten and salt. It works because of the odd way that rats, mice, and other rodents sense thirst.

Rodents have thirst sensors in their stomachs. When they eat gluten, it swells up in rodents' stomachs and prevents two key processes: moisture from being absorbed into the rats' bodies and the thirst sensors from being activated.

Without ever feeling thirsty, the rat stops drinking and slowly dehydrates, goes into a coma, and dies of heart fail-

ure. Corn gluten doesn't need a bait box. Although no rats have been consulted, it is said that the death by corn gluten is painless.

Which still might not comfort People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals, the animal rights organization that would prefer you to live-catch rats from your house and release them within 100 yards. Releasing them farther away will lead to the rats being in unfamiliar territory and getting traumatized or killed.

PETA is also the source that suggested strobes and rock music to discourage rats. According to the PETA website suggesting how we can live in harmony with rodents, rats "naturally have a pleasant perfume-like scent" and "love to be tickled."

PETA has done an enormous amount of good in the world, but some people draw the line at tickling rats, regardless of whether the rodents smell like perfume or smell like, well, rats.

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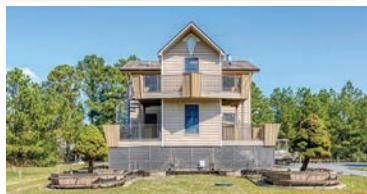
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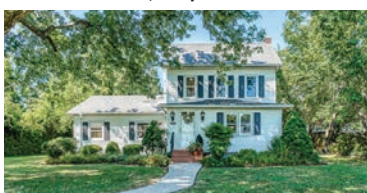
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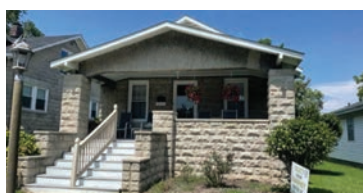

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Exmore closes park's public restrooms marred by vandalism

When Exmore Police Chief Angelo DiMartino explained how kids have been continually damaging the town park's public restrooms despite correction, the Town Council took immediate action to permanently close the restroom facility.

"We're doing all we can, but these kids are doing this in broad daylight ... in the afternoons, with people out there," and they are not deterred by the presence of security cameras, DiMartino said.

He described how one juvenile tore a board from a picnic bench, then destroyed a security camera while looking into it.

"It's a shame. They've got a place to come and hang out" but they abuse it, DiMartino said.

The offending youths were between 12 and 14 years old and had not previously been in trouble, so when they were caught on camera vandalizing the park they were placed in a juvenile justice system diversion program, DiMartino said.

If the child's parents pay restitution for the damage done, and the child performs community service, the charges are dropped, he said.

However, some of the juveniles are

not completing their community service, DiMartino added.

Councilman G.W. Adkins recalled that past offenders have been banned from the town park, and it might need to happen again.

Director of Zoning and Utilities Taylor Dukes commented, "Those bathrooms ... as much good as they've been, they've been one of the worst things we've ever done."

Public works employees clean the bathrooms on a Monday morning, and within two hours, there's sand in the sinks, the toilet has been used and not flushed, and "sometimes they don't even use the toilet, that's how bad it gets out there," Dukes said.

A suggestion was made to hire a park attendant, but Town Manager Robert Duer said the position would cost around \$45,000 – a typical annual salary for a full-time town employee – and Exmore needs another public works employee more than a park attendant.

Councilman Bryon Heaster made a motion to permanently close the town park's restrooms, except during special events. The motion was seconded by Councilman Thomas Lewis and passed unanimously.

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Onancock police release quarterly report

Onancock Police Chief Eric Williams in his quarterly report to the Town Council said the police department is now fully staffed with five officers.

"We are actually the only department on the Shore that is fully staffed now," he said.

Williams said grant awards are helping to pay for overtime hours, resulting in 24-hour coverage by town officers three to four days per week.

The remaining days typically are covered by Onancock officers 20 to 22 hours

per day, with the Accomack County Sheriff's Office responding otherwise.

From June to the end of August, Onancock police reported 9,200 events — meaning any event to which police responded, including accompanying ambulance crews on calls in town, crimes, citizen complaints, and other events.

Of the total, 3,100 were special patrols, when police were asked to ride by or check on a property.

Other events included 63 citizen complaints, four mental health events, five welfare checks, 12 business complaints, and 87 residence checks, among others.

The department issued 100 summonses during the quarter, including 52 for speeding, 14 for seatbelt or child safety seat violations, and seven for using a cellphone while driving, according to Williams.

Fifty-three incident reports during the quarter included seven breaking and entering incidents, five assaults, 13 trespassing incidents, and five domestic

violence incidents, among others.

Town Manager Matt Spuck updated council on a security camera system being installed in town, saying the equipment has been ordered, the electrician is ready for installation, and the town is waiting for Accomack-Northampton Electric Cooperative's confirmation as to the pole numbers for all utility poles involved in the project.

Built by Lloyd Henry Giddens with building materials from the recently torn-down home, the former juke joint is now operated by Giddens' daughter, Jane Cabarrus.

Crudup — a field laborer and blues artist whose songs were covered by Elvis Presley, Elton John, and Rod Stewart — played at the Do Drop every weekend at one time, in addition to acts like the Malibus and Burley Strand and the All-Stars.

It is one of the oldest continually owned and operated African-American businesses on Virginia's Eastern Shore and was once open seven days a week — offering soul food, a jukebox, penny candy, and a firm handshake for members of the Shore's African-American community who were excluded from many venues at the time.

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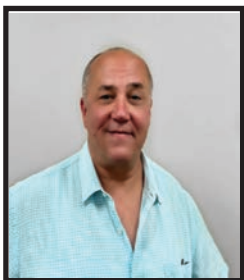

Accomack approves use of dredge spoils along Tangier shore

Accomack County officials approved sending a letter of support to the Virginia Marine Resources Commission for the Army Corps application for a permit to place dredge spoils along the shores of Tangier.

The application is for a permit to use 65,000 cubic meters of dredge coming from federal channel maintenance dredging and being placed along the western shore of Tangier, along the northwest shoreline of Uppards, and near the shore of northwest Uppards.

In the letter, included in agenda items for the Wednesday, Sept. 21, Board of Supervisors meeting, Accomack County Administrator Mike Mason wrote, "The remoteness of Tangier Island has for centuries preserved a culture, a dialect, and an island way of doing things. The population is a closely knit community

of watermen, consisting of a handful of families which have endured through the generations, and they live and work much as their ancestors did."

Tangier is listed on the National Register of Historic Places, a list of the nation's historic places worthy of preservation, according to the letter.

The letter notes Tangier is one of only two inhabited islands remaining in the Chesapeake Bay and says Tangier would "significantly benefit from similar dredge material beneficial use programs as those proven to be successful on Poplar and Hart-Miller Islands," both uninhabited Bay islands.

Tangier in the mid-1800s was around three times larger than it is today.

Between 2001 and 2022, around 176,000 cubic yards of dredge spoils have been removed from the Tangier channels, typically being transported and disposed of at a permitted open

water disposal site in the Bay.

"(T)hus, this valuable dredge material has not been used beneficially for restoration of island habitat or mitigation of coastal erosion and flooding," the letter says, adding that the VMRC's approval of the permit would allow that use.

The beneficial use of spoils to build up

Tangier would help promote public safety, protect and restore aquatic ecosystem habitats, stabilize shorelines, reduce storm damage to property and infrastructure, promote recreation, support risk management adaptation strategies, and reduce the cost of dredging and spoils disposal, the letter says.

Ernest James Powell Sr.

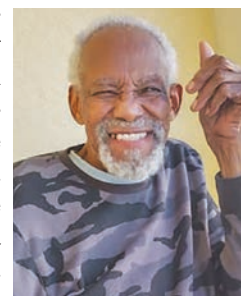

The facts about wave heights

To complete our topic of waves, I will be discussing a considerable contribution to wave height and high water — storm surge. It is an appropriate topic as tropical storm Ian is making its way to our southern coast.

We have previously discussed how wind and accompanying fetch contribute to increased wave height. The most frequent cause of these coastal wind patterns is the difference in temperature of water and adjacent land.

Storms, however, add another factor in wave and water height: atmospheric or barometric pressure drop.

Storms are generated from the vertical flow of atmosphere when cold air encounters hotter dry air.

We can determine the magnitude of the storm in the change in atmospheric pressure — as the barometer drops, the strength of the storm increases.

Slight depressions in the barometer may just mean rain; however, large reductions can mean a storm and a resulting surge in water height.

For example, a drop in pressure of 1.5 pounds in pressure can result in a 3-foot rise in water height (or surge).

Clearly, the strong winds should keep us off the water but storm surge should make us assess the safety of our berthed vessel.

Boating safety reminders like this are a public service of Flotilla 12-02 of the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary.

In 2021, Lizania Uscanga Morales finished in second place for district, 11th place at regionals, and 43rd place in the state.

Bethel, raised in Hampton, fell in love with cross-country running at the age of 13.

It is a unique sport that involves teams running a race on natural terrain.

"I love to run," he said. "I could run

for hours. I also love watching the open space and surrounding sites when I'm running."

He competed at Bethel High School — he shares his last name with the name of his high school.

There, he made the all-city, all-district, and all-region teams.

He also ran cross-country at the collegiate level for Virginia State University. At VSU, he won the Most Valuable Player Award twice, was named a member of the All-CIAA team, and twice was a member of the All-Atlantic Region team.

His personal record for finishing a meet during high school is 16:55. At VSU, his record is 15:03.

Bethel began his cross-country coaching career at Northampton in 2018. He was an assistant coach under Richard Wilfong.

"I love competing so it was hard for me to coach at first," he said. "But the more I see the runners practice and get better, the happier I become."

Bethel officially became head coach in 2021. His coaching style consists of passing on knowledge his former coaches taught him. He also devotes his time to reading up on new ways of building

endurance.

The most challenging aspect of coaching cross-country is finding students willing to compete.

Northampton is a small school with only around 400 students.

"The numbers, especially after COVID-19, are low," he said. "Before this season, we were averaging like three or four runners on the boys and girls teams."

Another challenge is that each course is different.

"For example, Northampton's and Nandua's courses are both 3.1 miles long, but it takes runners longer to finish Northampton's," said Bethel. "This is because our course has a lot of twists and turns."

Bethel's favorite aspect of cross-country is that anyone can compete.

"It doesn't matter if you're 5 or 100 years old," he said. "You're never too old to start running. You're never too slow to start as well."

"As long as you have a pair of running sneakers you can run any course in the world."

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Barring storm's effects, angling options to consider

Barring any lingering effects from the remnants of Hurricane Ian, local anglers have a few angling options to consider.

The fall red drum run has started in the northern barrier island surf; flounder are still available once the water clears on the seaside, both inside the inlet and on the wrecks; and sheepshead, speckled trout, and puppy drum are available in the lower Chesapeake Bay.

We are still a couple of weeks away from the opening of the fall striped bass season.

Upper Shore

Striped bass (rockfish) have started hitting peeler crab baits in the shallows from Saxis to Muddy Creek.

Large perch and an occasional speckled trout, puppy drum, and bluefish are prowling the same waters.

A few large red drum remain, making an occasional appearance around some of the marsh islands in Tangier and the upper Pocomoke Sound.

Red drum have made their autumn debut in the surf of Assateague and Wallops islands, with several fish measuring from 30 to over 47 inches having been caught and released.

Lots of rays and sharks have been mixed in along the drum hookups.

Flounder, speckled trout, kingfish (whiting), bluefish, and ribbonfish have been landed inside Chincoteague Bay and along Chincoteague Channel.

The Robert Reed Park Pier has recently produced catches of flounder, ribbonfish, and an occasional gray trout. It's time for the autumn fun of flounder inside the Curtis Reed Memorial Harbor.

Wachapreague

Captain Lindsay Paul, at Trident Tackle, said flounder catches were still being made early in the week, but there's not been a whole lot of fishing going on due to the deteriorating weather conditions.

Paul added that there have been a few speckled trout caught. The blue water fleet has been held in port due to the proliferation of storms offshore.

Lower Shore

Dez Louie, at Oceans East – Eastern Shore, said last week's high winds and scattered storms made it difficult for anglers to get out of port, but those that managed to find a protected area close to the shorelines found some schools of puppy drum, with fish ranging from 12 inches to some in the mid-30-inch range.

The drum schools were found traveling down the seaside beaches and venturing in and out of the mouths of some of the lower bayside creeks.

Most of the drum were caught on cut and live baits, such as hard and peeler crab, mullet, and spot fished on or near the bottom.

Anglers casting paddletails on jig heads also enjoyed some success with the drum schools. Speckled trout fishing slowed during the week, primarily as a result of the dirty water, with most of the action occurring in the creeks north of Cape Charles.

Live baits such as pigfish, spot, and finger mullet produced the bulk of the keeper-sized fish. Flounder action was better than expected for the recent conditions, with the waters around the little bridge between Fisherman Island and Wise Point producing keepers for anglers fishing live minnows or jigging Berkley Gulp baits.

Large sheepshead are still being pulled from the Cherrystone Reef and along the concrete ships. Large croakers have finally showed up, with some fish exceeding 2 pounds. Spanish mackerel, bluefish, and ribbonfish are still feasting on surface schools of silversides, bay anchovies, and peanut bunker.

Recent catches from the Kiptopeke State Park Pier have included pinfish, croakers, and ribbonfish.

Jeb Brady, at Bailey's Bait & Tackle, said that the trophy sheepshead fishery remained "solid" over the week, with anglers bringing in multiple fish exceeding 10 pounds.

He mentioned the Cherrystone Reef and the Cabbage Patch as recently productive areas for anglers soaking crab baits.

Customers fishing soft plastic baits under popping corks have had success fishing the schools of puppy drum that have been found along the bayside beaches from Cape Charles to Machipongo.

The recent string of cool nighttime temperatures should jump-start the autumn speckled trout run. Trout catches have been reported from Hungars Creek to Plantation Creek, with many fish under the legal size limit.

On the seaside, anglers casting Mirrolures and soft plastic baits have enjoyed success of speckled trout out of Oyster.
