As election nears, Shore votes early

Thousands already vote in races for U.S. House and town seats

Early voting is underway for the Nov. 8 election, with thousands on the Eastern Shore already having cast their early ballots at a rate much higher than the state average.

Voters in Accomack and Northampton counties will elect a congresswoman to represent Virginia's 2nd District in the U.S. House of Representatives.

Incumbent Rep. Elaine Luria, a Democrat, faces Republican candidate Jennifer Kiggans.

Town residents in both counties also will elect town council members and, in most towns, the mayor. In some cases, town results will be determined by write-in votes.

The General Assembly in 2021 passed a law changing all Virginia town elections from May to November.

Registrars' offices in both counties are open for in-person early voting through Nov. 5, including two Saturdays, Oct. 29 and Nov. 5.

If not registered, the last day to register to vote a nonprovisional ballot in this election

Rocket Lab's Electron rocket set to launch in December

Rocket Lab's Electron rocket arrived at Wallops Island Wednesday, Oct. 12, in preparation for the company's first launch from the Mid-Atlantic Regional Spaceport, scheduled for December.

The launch also will be the company's first from the United States. Rocket Lab's original launch complex is in New Zealand.

The mission will deploy satellites for radio frequency geospatial analysis provider HawkEye 360.

"We are looking forward to seeing Electron take to Virginia skies for the first time very soon," said Peter Beck, Rocket Lab founder and chief executive officer.

"Rocket Lab has been providing reliable and responsive access to orbit for more than four and a half years with Electron and we're excited to build on that strong heritage by unlocking a new path to orbit from right here on Virginia's Eastern Shore. We are delighted to be working with the dedicated teams at NASA, Virginia Space, Accomack County, and HawkEye 360 to

launch this historic mission and begin a new era of space access," Beck said.

The December mission is the first of three scheduled for HawkEye 360, in a contract under which Rocket Lab will deliver 15 satellites to low Earth orbit between late 2022 and 2024.

Rocket Lab's Launch Complex 2, at Wallops, was developed to support missions from U.S. soil for government and commercial customers, according to a press release.

The company scheduled the mission for December, "encouraged by NASA's recent progress in certifying its Autonomous Flight Termination Unit software, which is required to enable Electron launches from Virginia," according to the release.

Preparations for the launch include a standard launch dress rehearsal and payload integration, which will be done at Rocket Lab's integration and control facility near the launch site.

Rocket Lab has launched 31 Electron missions from its New Zealand site. Combined with the Wallops launch site, more than 130 launches a year can be supported, according to the company.

was Oct. 17.

However, in a new law that became effective Oct. 1, any person qualified to register to vote is entitled to register in person “up to and including the day of the election at the office of the general registrar” in their locality or at their polling place on Election Day.

From now until Election Day, those people will be able to do same-day voter registration and then will be able to vote with a provisional ballot at their polling place on Election Day, according to the Virginia Department of Elections.

Election officials will verify the voter’s paperwork and ensure the vote is valid before a provisional ballot is counted.

The General Assembly passed the same-day voter registration law in 2020 as part of a voting reform legislation package.

Polls will be open Election Day from 6 a.m. to 7 p.m.

As of Monday, 1,627 voters in Accomack County and 774 voters in Northampton had cast ballots early, either in person or by mail.

Accomack’s early voting rate per 1,000 registered voters, 65 as of Monday, was significantly higher than Virginia’s overall rate, 43.1.

Northampton’s rate is even higher, at 79.7 per 1,000 registered voters.

Voters may apply online to receive an absentee ballot by mail at www.elections.virginia.gov or call the voter registration office in their county. The last day to request a mailed absentee ballot is Oct. 28.

Accomack offers an official ballot drop box in the parking lot of the Voter Registration Office, 24387 Joynes Neck Road, Accomac, for returning completed mail-in or absentee ballots.

Voters do not have to have a reason or fill out an application to vote early in person, but they do need to provide their name and address and show an acceptable form of identification.

Onancock issue

Onancock voters should be aware of issues with the ballot for that town.

Incumbent Mayor Fletcher Fosque, whose name does not appear on the ballot, is running a write-in campaign for mayor. No names are on the ballot for the mayoral race.

Additionally, the voter registrar was not notified of a town council seat for which there should have been a special election this November because of an appointment made for an incomplete term, according to the town charter.

The ballot instructs voters to vote for up to three council members, but a fourth seat should have been in the election, according to Town Manager Matt Spuck.

Spuck said the Town Council is seeking legal guidance on how to proceed.

Accomack County Voter Registrar Angel Shrieves said Onancock voters should vote for three council members. If a voter votes for four, the person will be informed of an overvote when the ballot is scanned, and he or she will be given the option to proceed.

“We have not had any of those yet” in early voting, Shrieves said.

Only three votes for town council per ballot will be recorded.

If a person who votes for more than three council members also votes for a candidate for U.S. House of Representatives, that vote will be counted, according to Shrieves.

A special election will be held next year for the fourth Onancock council seat, according to Shrieves.

Four names appear on the Onancock ballot as town council candidates: Brandon J. Brockmeier, Sarah B. Nock, Cynthia W. Holdren, and Joy S. Marino. All except Brockmeier are incumbents.

Onancock gets downtown revitalization funding

The Onancock Main Street project has secured \$37,500 in funding to improve the town's downtown district.

OMS was awarded \$25,000 in Downtown Investment Grants. The Town of Onancock is matching the grant with \$12,500.

The investment grants are available only to Advancing Virginia Main

Street communities and can be used to fund complete projects, provide seed funding for new projects, or provide gap financing that allows a project to become fully funded.

All of the funding will be directed to programs including creating murals on buildings in the downtown area, initiating a gift card program to encourage shopping in downtown

Onancock, assisting small businesses and recruiting prospective businesses, and creating banners and window clings.

"The Town is grateful for the tireless efforts of OMS," said Onancock Town Manager Matt Spuck. "Innovative grants like this one will continue to differentiate Onancock, which will attract even more businesses to town

and support those that already call Onancock home." Gov. Glenn Youngkin last week announced Virginia Main Street grants for 16 communities totaling more than \$257,000. The funded projects will revitalize historic commercial districts, expand small businesses, and bolster local economies through new technology and improved marketing.

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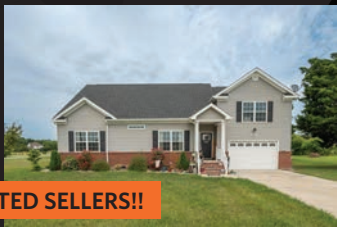
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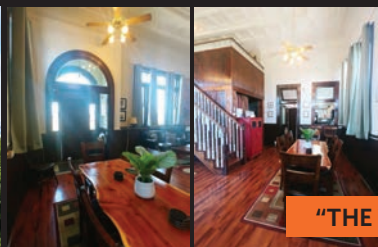

Incumbent, challenger discuss qualifications and town priorities

Wachapreague is among four Accomack County towns with a contested mayoral election. The election is Nov. 8. Incumbent Fred Janci faces a challenge from Charles Elliott.

Each candidate answered questions posed by the Eastern Shore Post.

Their responses are below.

■ **Tell us a little bit about yourself, including your qualifications to be mayor.**

Elliott: I'm originally from Michigan. I moved to the Eastern Shore six years ago. I discovered this beautiful place while doing military and government contracts. I have a bachelor's in archaeology, and have studied forensics. I love history and music. I have run and operated a few small businesses, and also having some law enforcement experience, I'm able to keep the peace and manage a system that follows law and order.

Janci: "I recycle air conditioners on a large scale."

Janci, 72, is in his 10th year as mayor. He owns a business, East Coast Air Conditioner Recycling, in Tasley.

"I've worked for myself all my life."

He bought a house in Wachapreague in 2008 and moved to town in 2010.

"I ran for office because the previous mayor quit."

He first was asked to run for town council, then 10 days later was asked to run for mayor.

His qualifications include "the experience that I've had for the last 10 years. I had no experience with town council at all or any public office, so this whole thing was new and you learn as you go. I'd like to think that I've done

quite well for the town in the 10 years that I've been there."

■ **Why do you want to be mayor?**

Elliott: I want to be mayor because a mayor is a voice for the people, and I believe that the people should be heard.

Janci: We have a major project — and that's the sewer. I'd really like to see the sewer come to fruition. I was actually not going to run, but I got a sense at the time that my opponent — I'm not going to say he was against the sewer, but I'm going to say he was not as enthusiastic on the sewer as I was. I would at least like to run this one more term. If it's going to happen, I would like to be here when it does happen, because I've worked with this since the very first meeting at the college. So I'd like to see that.

■ **What do you think are the top (one to three) priorities on which your town's officials should be focusing right now?**

Elliott: To secure and maintain a working waterfront.

To establish and maintain the small town atmosphere.

To help and maintain our current businesses, creating minor growth and development.

Janci: The short-term rentals is an issue. ... We're about 60-40, 60% opposed, 40% in favor. The sewer is just the opposite, 60% in favor and 40% opposed. That's something we're going to have to address. There are requests for short-term rentals and right now we don't allow them, so we need to come up with some kind of a plan.

■ **What is your town's greatest asset?**

The Accomack County Sheriff's Office is investigating a fatal shooting that happened early Saturday near Painter.

found Tabora Jermaine Bailey, 38, of Painter, unresponsive and suffering from apparent gunshot wounds, according to Sheriff W. Todd Wessells.

Bailey was pronounced dead at the scene.

His body was transported to the

Elliott: The people

Janci: I think we have two. One is our waterfront and our marina and the other is just the nature of our town — small, quiet, calm, friendly. It's kind of a throwback to the 1950s. It's really nice. It's kind of unique. Part of what makes it good for us is that we're not a place you just drive through — you have to go to Wachapreague. That, I

think, makes it nice. ...

It's a good place to raise kids — and we have more families in our town right now than we've had in the entire time I've been here.

■ **What is the greatest challenge facing your town?**

Elliott: The sewer system

Janci: Sea level. That will be a challenge for the survival of the whole town at some point. It might be beyond my time, but it's coming. We're seeing more and more water on Atlantic (Av-

enue) more days. It doesn't take a big, giant storm any more. I think we're all going to be faced with that.

■ **Why should people vote for you in this contested mayoral race?**

Elliott: I believe change is good, and not originally being from the Eastern Shore I'm able to view things from another perspective. I have also been here long enough to view things from a local perspective. This makes for a good balance, and a neutral perspective.

Janci: I've got experience. ... I have a good knowledge of what's going on in town, what the issues are in town. You listen to the people, you know who's who, you know how they feel about different things. I'm not saying that I can tell you what everybody's thinking, but quite a lot of people. Through the whole time I've been there, I've done what's good for the town. ... I'm doing this for the residents of Wachapreague and for the life of the town.

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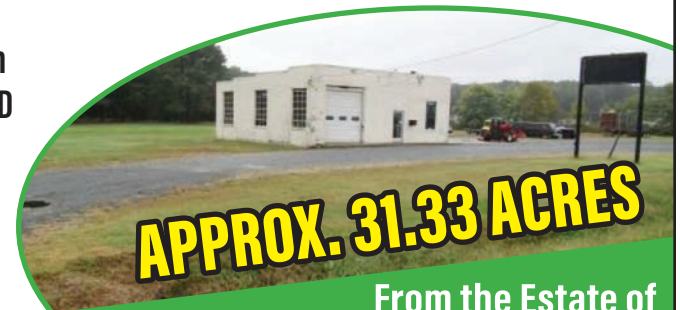

Gov. Youngkin updates transgender student policy

Under new administration, VDOE has rewritten a policy to help prevent abuses

When the Accomack school board attempted to propose and adopt a policy on the treatment of transgender students about a year ago, parents and community members objected at every opportunity, and the plan was quietly shelved.

The Virginia Department of Education model policy issued under former Gov. Ralph Northam intended to protect the rights of transgender students and allow them to use the restrooms that correspond to their gender identities.

But the policy was not well-received by parents and others who may have had a troubling incident from May 2021 on their minds: a female student at Stone Bridge High School in Loudoun County, Va., had been sexually assaulted in a school restroom by a male student who was wearing a skirt and may have identified as transgender or gender fluid.

Virginia parents and community members were concerned that the VDOE model policy was inadequate to ensure the safety of students and could be abused by students who weren't transgender but wanted access to spaces normally separated according to biological sex, such as locker rooms and restrooms.

"Do not compromise and kowtow before Richmond. Find a way to do this thing if you must, but do it without compromising the integrity and innocence of our children," Accomack citizen JoLynn Hart had told the local school board in October 2021.

Now, at the direction of new Gov. Glenn Youngkin, VDOE has written a

replacement model policy that aims to prevent such abuses.

The previous policy stated that "when a student asserts that they have a name and/or pronouns affirming their gender identity, school staff should abide by the student's wishes," with no suggestion that the parents should be involved in the decision.

The new, proposed policy suggests that a student identifying as transgender must "have a persistent and sincere belief that his or her gender differs from his or her sex" to receive gender-affirming accommodations, and the accommodations must be requested by the child's parents.

To justify this change, the policy cites Virginia Code 1-240.1, which affirms that a "parent has a fundamental right to make decisions concerning the upbringing, education, and care of the parent's child."

According to the policy, a school division should maintain an official record for each student, which includes the student's legal name and sex.

Each student is to be referred to by the pronouns that correspond to the student's sex.

However, the student's name and/or sex may be changed on the official school record at the parent's request if the parent shows documentation that the student's name and/or sex has been changed legally.

Examples of acceptable documentation include a birth certificate, state- or federal-issued ID, passport, or court order.

A student may be called by alternate pronouns or another name designated by the parent in writing.

An "eligible student," meaning one who is age 18 or has been emancipated, also may submit the written request.

The new VDOE policy attempts to protect the rights of both students and parents, but not everyone is satisfied

with it.

According to an ABC News report Sept. 27, student activists across Virginia staged school walkouts in protest of the recommendations that “would have a devastating effect on transgender kids who don’t have support at home.”

Their opinions echoed those of Jeanie Bale, an Accomack County business owner who is transgender and runs the Gender Expression Movement Eastern Shore support group.

She spoke to the Accomack County school board in November 2021 about counseling transgender children who told her that their parents would throw them out of their homes or they would wind up “buried in a ditch” if they came out.

Some protections for vulnerable children are already built into state law. For example, Virginia Code 22.1-272.1 states that if any employee of a local school board has reason to believe a student is at imminent risk of suicide, the employee must contact the student’s parents to ask about their awareness of the child’s mental state and whether counseling for the child is desired.

If the student has indicated the risk of suicide is due to parental abuse or neglect, the school employee must instead contact the state or local department of social services.

The new VDOE model policy acknowledges that “all children in Vir-

ginia have a right to learn, free from unlawful discrimination and harassment,” and school boards are expected to prohibit bullying in the student code of conduct and establish a bullying prevention program as required by Virginia Code.

The policy also preserves First Amendment rights by not compelling others, such as teachers, to use preferred pronouns if it would “affirm ideas that may be contrary to their personal religious beliefs.”

The VDOE policy states students must use the bathrooms and locker rooms that correspond to their sex, “except to the extent that federal law otherwise requires.”

The document references the case of Grimm v. Gloucester County School Board, in which transgender male high school student Gavin Grimm sued the school board for not allowing him to use the restroom that corresponded to his gender identity.

Grimm’s mother had received permission from school administrators for her transgender son to use the boys restroom, but the school board reversed the policy that enabled the decision after receiving complaints about it.

A federal judge ruled in favor of Grimm in 2019 and awarded him \$1 in damages and ordered the school division to pay his court costs.

VDOE’s model policy on privacy, dignity, and respect for all Virginia public school students and parents is expected to take effect after the 30-day public comment period ends Oct. 26.

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Clinical Breast Exam

An expectation of open government

Open-government issues can draw yawns and shrugs from the public. Instead, other matters rise to the fore. Some are salient: The prices of fuel and food are up. Others are comparatively trifling: Pumpkin-spice lattes are back for autumn.

But transparency from our governments is of paramount importance. From the biggest federal office to the smallest town council, there is an expectation they follow the letter of the law with regard to open government.

That brings us to Parksley, where two town council members have filed lawsuits against the mayor and other council members for allegedly violating state open-government laws. It is up to a judge to view the facts and hand down rulings.

But in a way, the town already has lost — because when it comes to matters of openness and integrity, we want our governments' actions to be beyond reproach. Even governments that conduct business properly must ensure perceptions reflect reality. We want governments that are stalwart proponents of openness and accountability.

We understand many in our local governments do not have professional or specialized knowledge of the state's freedom of information laws. So getting it right requires an earnest willingness, a thoughtful approach, occasional research, and plenty of collaboration. We certainly hope that's the case in Parksley.

It is also disturbing that the parties bringing the lawsuits have been criticized. In our country, there is a proud tradition of questioning government and holding it accountable. The plaintiffs should be lauded for caring so much about the town that they seek the critique of a judge.

The defendants should welcome a judge's review if they are confident in their procedures. If their actions have been legal and prudent, there's no cause for frustration, hand-wringing, or name-calling.

Parksley has an exciting future ahead. A new library soon will open. An anticipated new restaurant already has opened. The town square is being refurbished. It has fantastic businesses. The active fire company has a rich history.

It will soon learn in court whether its municipal practices are as well-regarded as the rest of the town.

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‘Lights on Gladding’ is a labor of love in Mears Station

It is difficult to completely describe the intricate show of Halloween lights and music playing nightly outside Joshua and Patricia Voss’ Accomack County home.

But if you’re lucky, you’ll witness the flamethrowers in action. They’re sometimes part of the weekend show.

The whole production is something you’ll want to see for yourself. Head to 26518 Gladding Road, Mears Station. People park on the side of the road in front of the house to see the spectacle.

For those not cultured enough to know the location of Mears Station, it is north of Bloxom, but south of the Turkey Run Road intersection. If that doesn’t help, you don’t get out enough.

But it is where the magic happens. I tried to get a photo of it — the flashing, the size, all of the components beaming through all of the darkness — but there was no way to do it justice.

Every half hour from 7 to 10 p.m., a lighting show begins with a musical accompaniment. In all, there are 8,000 pixel lights — on the roof, in the windows, in the yard — that throb and move to all types of Halloween-themed music.

There are two versions: Friday through Sunday is a regular show, while the Monday through Thursday show is more of a kids’ show.

So that everyone can enjoy the music, Joshua Voss bought an FM transmitter. A sign in the yard requests viewers to tune to 88.7 FM. There’s a screen in the front yard that also plays the music videos to the songs.

On any given night, there are 10 vehicles there watching a cross between the drive-in theaters of yore and contemporary technological savvy.

Folks who want more information can follow the “Lights on Gladding” page on Facebook.

This is Voss’ first Halloween show. He has created special Christmas lights-and-music shows for years.

During the Christmas shows, it’s not uncommon to see more than two dozen cars in front.

“It’s been fun to do,” said Voss. “There’s a lot that goes into it. It makes my head hurt sometimes.”

It is Voss’ hobby and pastime. He began collecting songs and creating light patterns to the music early this year, usually after everyone else has gone to bed.

“I started on this Halloween show in January and literally finished the last song for the weekend show the day before it started,” he said.

For Voss, the hard pull of festive illumination began early. A Saxis native, he fondly recalls helping his mother, Lorie Thomas, string Christmas lights in their yard.

His idol was the late Jimmy Dennis, whose affini-

ty for Christmas and Saxis holiday light displays was legendary.

“He was the main light guru on Saxis,” said Voss.

Voss is the next generation of illuminators. His system, which he built, includes a number of computers. There is wiring everywhere.

This year’s Halloween shows run through Oct. 31. Then on Thanksgiving night, the Christmas shows begin.

It is a quick conversion — out with the spooky tombstones, in with the festive Christmas trees. Each have the same number of lights.

At Christmas there is also a box for letters to Santa Claus, all of which are answered as long as an address is provided.

The Voss’ daughter, Alanna Woods, and son, Asher, get into the spirit of their father’s hobby. So do his nieces, Kylie and Bristol Johnson.

During the Christmas season, Asher and his father can sometimes be found passing out candy canes to those watching the light show. And Asher can sometimes be found pocketing some of the candy canes, his father said.

Some people even ask to donate money toward Voss’ effort. He said he’s not doing it for a profit.

He’s just enjoying adding some festival seasonal light shows to what can be a dark world.

“I certainly enjoy doing it,” he said. “It’s a labor of love.”

How did we go from thin to fat?

If you look at pictures of Americans out in public from the early 20th century to the 1980s, you'll notice at least two

things in contrast to how we look today. First, Americans used to dress modestly, most men wearing sports jackets or suits and most women wearing simple dresses. Second, most Americans back then were thin.

Go to an airport or department store today and you'll find elderly men have traded the dignity of old age for shorts (oh, those 70-year-old's bare legs!) and gaudy T-shirts

declaring grandpa status. Women of all ages will wear pajama bottoms to the airport.

And we're obese. According to the National Library of Medicine, "Today, about 65% of adults and 15% of children and adolescents in the US are overweight or obese."

Body mass index is considered better than pounds at gauging the health effect of weight. A BMI of 18.5 to 24.9 is considered healthy while 30 and above indicates obesity. American men at age 18 had a BMI under 22.5 up through the 1950s.

By the 1980s, the BMI of 18-year-old males had topped 24, heading for the overweight level. And it's become worse since the 1980s with today's BMI for an adult American being at 26.5, above the level that's considered healthy.

We might have become sloppy dressers out of a self-indulgent desire to be

comfortable, but have we gained weight simply because we've become gluttons?

Maybe not. There's considerable evidence that powerful industries are benefiting by shoveling calories to Americans at a rate unparalleled in our history.

With government support encouraging food producers to create ever cheaper food supplies, companies that prepare foods for consumers find it easy to ramp up portion sizes. Between 1977 and 2007, sugary drinks alone accounted for 20% of American weight gain as portion size ballooned.

In the 1950s, a Coke bottle contained 6.5 ounces and the only size of Coke you could get at McDonald's was 7 ounces or about 85 calories. Today, the typical bottle of soda is 20 ounces and 250 calories. Today, a large Coke at McDonald's is 30 ounces and 42 ounces at Burger King, or seven times what was once available. A Team Gulp at 7-Eleven is 128 ounces.

In the last 40 years, portion sizes at fast-food restaurants have doubled. A typical bagel has gone from 3 inches to 6.

While the food industry is making money by loading us up with calories

and creating obesity, the medical and pharmaceutical industries are raking it in by treating that obesity (\$170 billion annually) and related diseases (diabetes is a \$28.84 billion industry).

To make matters worse, a report in Atlantic magazine revealed evidence that a person in 2006 taking in the same number of calories and doing the same amount of exercise as a person in 1988 would still be 10% fatter.

Apparently factors other than calorie intake and exercise are causing weight gains. The article speculated those other causes might be an increase in prescription medicines, intake of chemicals in our environment that cause hormonal changes, and changes in our gut microbes due to food additives.

We can wear different clothes to avoid looking foolish at Walmart but battling the bulge won't be so easy.

NHPS lecture Sunday at Arlington House

The Northampton Historical Preservation Society Lecture on the Lawn will be Sunday, Oct. 23, at 2 p.m., at the site of Arlington House and the Custis Tombs.

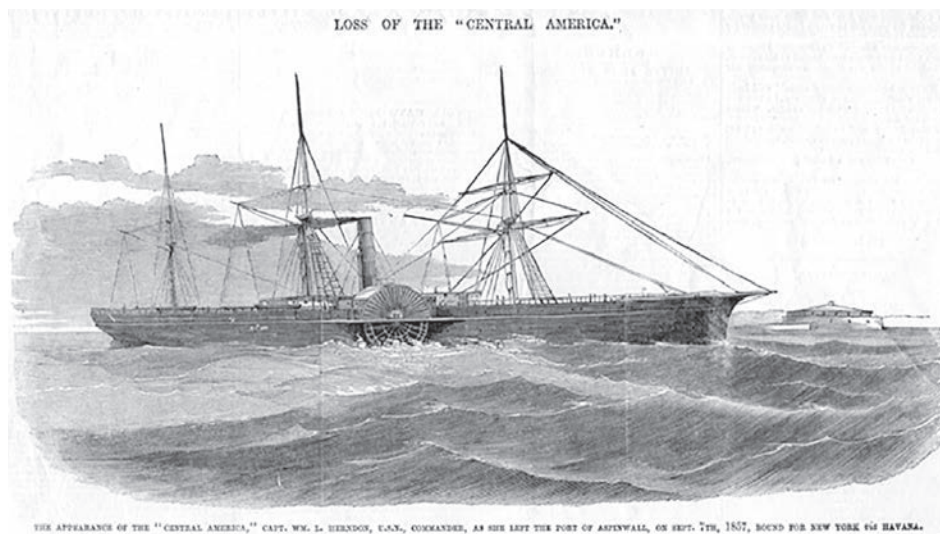
Arlington House was a late 17th century brick mansion built by John Custis II in 1670. In 1696, the property was inherited by his grandson, John Custis IV, who lived there until sometime after his marriage to Frances Parke. He then moved to Williamsburg, Va., but, when he died, he wished to be buried at Arlington House in Northampton.

John and Frances Custis' son, Daniel Parke Custis, married Martha Dandridge who, following Daniel's death, married George Washington. All that remains of the house today is the brick foundation and the tombs of John Custis II and John Custis IV. This outdoor lecture at the site will be lead by Dr. David Scott, who will cover the history of the Arlington mansion, the Custis tombs, and the Custis family – including the turbulent marriage of John and Frances Custis.

The site was saved from development by the Arlington Foundation and is now owned by the Archaeological Conservancy. NHPS is partnered with the conservancy for the interpretation and promotion of the site.

Attendees need to bring lawn chairs. Refer to the NHPS website for more information at <https://northamptonhistoricalpreservationsociety.com/> Advance tickets are not required, but a donation (\$10 per person) to support the restoration of the 1907 jail and other preservation efforts would be appreciated.

The lecture site is west of Route 13 about three miles south of the Cape Charles light. Follow the "Custis Tomb" sign off the highway onto Arlington Road (Rt. 644). Continue straight onto Custis Tomb Road (still Rt. 644) where Arlington Road makes a left turn. The site is about two miles on the right. NHPS "red arrow" signs will be in place.

BOATING

Some tips on safely anchoring

Chantelle and Jeanna wondered about anchoring. Being able to anchor a boat safely is very important and can be lifesaving.

The first thing to consider is to check the current and the wind. Generally, anchor into the wind but if you have a fast-moving current you may need to point the boat's bow up-current.

Next, measure the depth of the water and add the height of your boat's bow to that number. Then measure out five times that amount of line.

This is a 5:1 scope — if you are in a storm measure out seven times the line.

As a base measure, begin where the line ties to the anchor chain and stretch the line from one hand to the next across your chest.

That will just about equal your height so you can get an estimate.

Lay the line on the deck but away from your legs. When you get to the proper length immediately tie the excess line off to your bow cleat.

Now lower the anchor hand-over-hand until it lays on the bottom. Allow the boat to slowly drift back while you pay out the line hand-over-hand. As you reach the end drop the line and let the boat pull the slack.

Now place your hand on the top of the line and feel for vibration. If you don't feel any you are anchored. When you are at the helm and find two landmarks about 900 apart and note their relative position on the boat. Check them every 30 minutes to be sure the anchor is holding.

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EASTERN SHORE FISHING REPORT

Speckled trout continue to be the local anglers' top quarry, with most of the catches coming from the shallow waters of Occohannock Creek south to

schools of bay anchovies and bunker.

Upper Shore

One tackle shop owner described the recent action in the upper portion of Virginia's Chesapeake Bay as "lackluster" and I think that may be an appropriate adjective. Speckled trout and red drum action has been far below what is expected for this part of the season. There is still time for the season to turn around, but the upper bay season has been a bust so far. Rockfish (striped bass) numbers are slowly improving, with the top shallow water action coming early in the morning or right around sundown. If you can match one of these times with an incoming tide, your odds of landing a striper will improve.

On the seaside, red drum catches are still coming from the northern barrier island surf, while a few flounder and speckled trout catches are coming from inside the inlet. Offshore wreck action has been productive with black sea bass limit catches coming from the deep water wrecks and tautog action occurring over the more shallow sunken structures, with a few togs caught off the town dock. Jimmy Vasiliou, of Captain Steve's Bait and Tackle, added deep droppers have scored with some catches of large tilefish.

Wachapreague

Captain Lindsay Paul, at Trident

Tackle, said catches of flounder and speckled trout continue to be made. In addition he heard of a few puppy drum catches, but he added that there has not been a lot of fishing activity going on out of the port town.

Amanda Manzella, at the Wachapreague Inn, reported a group of the inn's guests recently enjoyed a productive trip offshore in the Washington Canyon, returning with 30 dolphin (mahi) and a swordfish. The fish were caught aboard the Final Verdict.

Lower Shore

Dez Louie, at Oceans East – Eastern Shore, reported the recent species target for most of the lower Shore anglers have been speckled trout. Most of the recent catches have been on the small side, with some even being short of the minimum legal length. Patient anglers have been able to land their limits of legal fish if they were willing to "weed" though the small ones. Soft plastic artificials, such as Berkley Gulp, Saltwater Assassins, and Z-Mans in pink and electric chicken color combinations have been the most productive baits of choice.

The larger fish, however, have primarily been caught on hard plastic lures such as Mirrolures in the Mardi Gras, electric chicken, and 808 color combinations. On the Chesapeake Bay side, the fish have been scattered along the beaches, while on the seaside the trout have been along the edges of the marsh grass where they are feasting on shrimp and finger mullet. Puppy drum continue to be mixed in with the drum and have been a bycatch of the artificial lure fishery. Anglers specifically targeting the drum are enjoying better success by employing cut mullet or peeler crab baits either fished directly on the bottom or suspended under popping corks. Other bycatch species of the trout fishery have been small flounder and under-sized striped bass.

Large sheepshead continue to be landed from the Cherrystone Reef and around the pilings of the Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel. The striped porgies are eagerly biting any type of fresh crustacean offered.

Hundreds of people made their way through the campsite and thanked Steelman for a community get-together that won't soon be forgotten.



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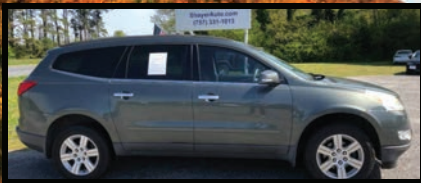
