Sin tax spells cash for county

New tariff on cigarettes yields \$190K after only one fiscal quarter

Accomack County's new cigarette tax already has earned the county more than \$190,000.

The amount came in during the first quarter of the fiscal year, after the 10-cent per pack tax took effect July 1.

The estimated revenue for the year is \$422,000, according to a presentation Accomack County Finance Director Margaret Lindsey gave the Accomack County Board of Supervisors Wednesday.

"Overall, the first quarter is very favorable," Lindsey said.

The county's major revenues overall are up \$600,573, or 10.6% for the first quarter of fiscal year 2023, compared to the same period last year, Lindsey said.

ACCOMACK

A 34-year-old Exmore man will spend 69 years in prison for the murder of his mother and a family friend, and for trying to shoot his sister while she ran from the scene.

Fredrick Marvin Barnes Jr. pleaded guilty earlier this year to killing his mother, 75-year-old Brenda Barnes, and family friend, Dean Reid, 53.

He also pleaded guilty to the attempted murder of his sister, Christina Green.

"This is about as bad as it gets," said Circuit Judge W. Revell Lewis III.

"It is hard to imagine someone killing their mother, for you to shoot her in the

On July 3, 2021, Green was hosting a birthday party for a family member at her Deep Creek home.

Barnes arrived with his mother, with whom he lived.

As the afternoon wore on, Barnes began to show signs of being intoxicated.

A fight started after a disagreement and Reid intervened.

Barnes shot Reid, then told his mother, "I am tired of taking care of your ass," and shot her twice in the head.

Barnes then began firing at Green.

"The bullets were whizzing by me," she said. "You don't expect your brother to do that."

Commonwealth's Attorney Spencer Morgan said Barnes told a probation officer he used cocaine while at the party and drank a fifth of liquor and shots of Fireball that day.

Morgan said Barnes' mother was a generous woman who cared for her son and gave him a home.

He said Reid "wanted to be everyone's hero" and was doing just that when he was murdered.

"He just wanted to get a bad situation under control," said Morgan.

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

Shore looks skyward for space station launch

Many Eastern Shore residents woke up early Monday, Nov. 7, to view a Northrop Grumman Antares rocket launched at 5:32 a.m. from the Mid-Atlantic Regional Spaceport at NASA Wallops Flight Facility.

It was the second launch attempt. The launch was scrubbed Sunday morning due to a fire alarm going off at Northrop Grumman's Cygnus spacecraft control center in Dulles, Va.

The rocket was carrying the S.S. Sally Ride Cygnus spacecraft, loaded with more than 8,200 pounds of cargo including science experiments and supplies, bound for the International Space Station.

This is Northrop Grumman's 18th resupply mission to the space station under a NASA contract.

Only one of two solar arrays on the spacecraft successfully deployed, NA-SA reported.

Still, Northrop Grumman reported Cygnus had enough power to rendezvous with the International Space Station Wednesday, Nov. 9, to complete its primary mission.

The spacecraft arrived at the ISS Wednesday, when NASA astronaut Nicole Mann captured the spacecraft using a robotic arm, at 5:20 a.m.

Cygnus will remain at the space station until late January before it departs for a destructive reentry into Earth's atmosphere, according to NASA.

Work on Shields Bridge to begin in spring '24

Construction of a replacement for Shields Bridge, over Occohannock Creek, should get underway as early as spring 2024 and be completed in late spring or early summer 2025, according to a highway department spokesperson.

Heavy machinery has been moved to an area near the bridge, prompting discussion of when construction would begin.

The bridge connects Belle Haven and Craddockville.

Timothy Kelley, senior communications specialist for the Virginia Department of Transportation's Hampton Roads District, said the project currently is in the right of way phase, with

right of way negotiations complete and utility relocations in progress.

The utility work is projected to be completed as early as next summer.

The project includes replacement of the structurally deficient 99-foot bridge, which was built in 1933, and the guardrail.

It is being paid for with State of Good Repair funds, at an estimated cost of \$8.1 million, Kelley said.

The new, three-span bridge will include a 109-foot, structural steel plate girder superstructure and will utilize corrosion-resistant steel girders.

The total vertical clearance from bottom of the beam to mean high tide will be 4.29 feet, which is a 9-inch increase, as requested by the local recreational boating community at a previous public meeting.

Four rescued from boat near bay bridge-tunnel

The Coast Guard rescued four people from a disabled sailing vessel Monday, Nov. 14, approximately two miles east of Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel.

Watchstanders with Coast Guard Sector Virginia received notification at 2 a.m. from a good Samaritan that the 48-foot sailing vessel Irish Tango was sailing erratically and impeding oncoming traffic in Thimble Shoal Channel.

The sailing vessell then proceeded to cross back-and-forth across the bow of a container ship. The sailboat's crew did not respond to communication attempts made by the Coast Guard, other vessel pilots, or the container ship.

A Coast Guard Station Little Creek

45-foot vessel responded and towed the Irish Tango to Little Creek. The vessel had been on the sea for the last 48 hours with an inoperable autopilot system and was set off track due to weather.

"This crew was lucky," said Petty Officer 1st Class Michael Anderson, Station Little Creek coxswain on duty. "Fatigue can be just as dangerous as any storm or hazard to navigation. On the water, things don't often go like you planned, so always have a back-up plan."

The Irish Tango and its crew were taken to Cobbs Marina, where the crew was examined by first responders. No injuries were reported.

Captains Cove residents file updated lawsuit

A group of Captains Cove residents has filed a new lawsuit against CCG Note LLC, and Captain's Cove Golf & Yacht Club Inc., alleging the developers are, according to the lawsuit, "breaching their fiduciary duties and conducting self-dealing activities."

The new lawsuit was filed Nov. 7 to include more items "that were detrimental to the funds of the members" of the Captains Cove property owners association, said Teresa Birckhead, president of Concerned Citizens of Captains Cove, in an email to the Post.

Background

Seven plaintiffs, representing Concerned Citizens of Captains Cove, had filed a civil lawsuit June 21 in Accomack County Circuit Court against the company that proposes to build a 140-unit townhouse development adjacent to the Captains Cove subdivision near Greenbackville and against the property owners association.

The lawsuit alleged that past and proposed actions by the development company, CCG Note LLC, by virtue of having a controlling majority of its own representatives on the Captains Cove's property owners association board of directors, "represent self-dealing in breach of its fiduciary duty owed" to

The issue

The plaintiffs in October filed a nonsuit, meaning they withdrew the lawsuit but could file it again within a certain time period.

The plaintiffs asked the court to declare their property rights, as established in documents related to the subdivision; to find that CCG Note controls the property owners association; to award damages against CCG Note, in an unspecified amount; and to enjoin the developer and the property owners association "from taking any actions that interfere with or damage" residents' property rights as established.

CCGYC in a court document responding to the original lawsuit said the residents "have failed to allege a justiciable controversy" and asked the court to dismiss the lawsuit. CCG Note

LLC filed a similar document.

The residents group established a fund to pay their legal expanses.

The nonsuit filing under Virginia law allowed the plaintiffs to refile the lawsuit within the statute of limitations.

'Voicing their concerns'

While the lawsuit names as plaintiffs seven residents, "the legal action is for the hundreds of members in the Concerned Citizens of Captains Cove group," according to Birckhead. The seven named are directors of the CCCC board, she said.

"The residents have been voicing their concerns for years as captured in meeting minutes, but their concerns are minimized by our POA (property owners association) president and developer affiliated board members," Birckhead said.

"There is no other action left to fix this financial mess in the Cove other than to vote to remove the members of the board. That is an option that many are adamant about and currently discussing. Folks have had enough," she said.

Among several new allegations in the lawsuit filed in November is that CCG Note in a settlement related to two pending lawsuits in 2012 contractually agreed to pay the property owners' association \$50,000 per year for 20 years for debt service on loans to build roads in Captain's Cove and for road maintenance and development after the debt was retired.

The lawsuit alleges the POA's board of directors for a number of years since 2012 allowed CCG Note to pay less than that amount, and that the POA's annual budget "was prepared and presented to its members, the Captains Cove lot owners, in a manner which concealed the actual amounts paid each year by CCG Note on its annual \$50,000 obligation."

In 2022, the amount paid was just \$9,000, according to the lawsuit.

Additionally, the lawsuit claims the POA "has refused, and continues to refuse" to charge assessments on 30 lots owned by Stonewall Capital Inc., in violation of the community's declaration, and that the POA gives preferential treatment to CCG Note related to requirements for lots CCG Note owns—for example, by not requiring CCG Note to install and maintain bulkheads on two waterfront lots it owns, while other waterfront lot owners are required to do so.

Rebuttal

The Captain's Cove Golf & Yacht Club board of directors, in a statement issued after the nonsuit filing and printed in the November 2022 edition of the Captain's Cove Currents newspaper, said CCGYC "has spent considerable funds, and resources, including time from staff, and the Board of Directors" to counter the lawsuit's claims.

"It is ironic that one of the claims was a 'breach of fiduciary duty' and because of this, thousands of dollars of Members' Dues were expended on attorney fees to counter the claims on CCGYC's behalf," the statement said, in part.

The statement went on to say CCGYC "may file for sanctions against these Members for having filed a frivolous lawsuit," adding that option would be discussed at a future board of directors meeting.

Our D.C. revolving door circles around again

The Eastern Shore's voice in the U.S. House of Representatives has changed many times since Herbert Bateman died 22 years ago.

You need a scorecard to keep up with them all.

Last week, the revolving door circled again, as voters chose Jen Kiggans, a Republican state senator, to succeed two-term U.S. Rep. Elaine Luria.

Luria, a Democrat, supplanted Scott Taylor in 2018. Taylor, a Republican, was elected in 2016 to the U.S. House after fellow Republican Scott Rigell decided not to run.

Rigell, astute readers will remember, defeated Democrat Glenn Nye in 2010. Remember Nye?

He was a one-term congressman, elected in 2008 while riding on President-elect Barack Obama's coattails.

Nye defeated Republican Thelma Drake — it is hard to believe it has been 14 years since Drake was defeated.

Drake was elected in 2004 after the incumbent Republican, Ed Schrock, dropped out of the race.

But Schrock didn't replace Bateman. Jo Ann Davis, who died in 2007, did — the Eastern Shore helped her become the first Republican woman elected to Congress from Virginia.

So Kiggans is the Eastern Shore's ninth member of the U.S. House of Representatives in 22 years — and this is the fourth time voters switched parties.

Our representatives have failed to establish themselves quite the way Bateman did during his 18-year House career. We will see if Kiggans becomes a constant or another name relegated to history.

ESCC president on a successful 'refresh'

Early in my tenure as president of Eastern Shore Community College, I had a chance meeting with a community member who asked if I was the "new guy."

I responded, "If you mean, 'Am I the new president?', then yes, I'm the new guy."

This community member looked me in the eye and said, "You cannot let the college die."

Why was she so worried about the college?

I knew what she meant. We were in for a ride that had serious consequences for all of us who live in and love our community.

to the system average, and an increase in the number of high demand, noncredit credentials earned.

In 2018, our community college failed to meet established

thresholds for all four sustainability factors, triggering a detailed assessment.

Following that assessment, in January 2019, the State Board for Community Colleges approved a three-year reboot plan to establish ESCC as a strong, sustainable college that would more effectively and efficiently serve the educational and training needs of the Eastern Shore of Virginia.

It included the condition that, "At the conclusion of the reboot period in July 2022, the college will be reassessed using the established thresholds in VCCS Policy 2.15. The results will either signal the viability of the college, or the state board will seek an additional detailed assessment to determine whether the college should be consolidated with another Virginia community college."

Thus began a three-year sojourn in which the faculty and staff of the college took on the reboot challenge to demonstrate the strength and sustainability of the college.

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Gram Parsons, Avis Parsons, and a horrible Folly Creek night

Everyone died young in the family of musician Gram Parsons, who often is called the founder of country rock.

His father killed himself two days before Christ-

mas when Parsons and his younger sister, Avis, were children.

His mother, an alcoholic, died on the day of Parsons' high-school graduation.

Parsons, a band member of the Byrds and then the Flying Burrito Brothers, died of an overdose in 1973 at the age of 26.

And Avis died one September evening in 1993 near Accomac when she was involved in a boat collision on Folly Creek. She was 42.

Gram Parsons isn't exactly a rock 'n' roll household name. But he is remembered as a musical visionary, fusing a blend of rock, country, and blues that was perfected by groups like the Eagles.

And while Avis Parson Johnson's fatal injury is a creepy happenstance in a family full of early deaths, it is more a cautionary tale of boating at night without lights.

That rock star Gram Parsons' sister died on the Eastern Shore isn't one of our really big brushes with fame. Instances of having the ultra-famous in our midst are well-known.

Elizabeth Taylor visited in 1978 while campaigning with her then-husband. Walter Cronkite ran his boat aground off Onancock in 1969.

The Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. addressed the congregation of First Baptist Church in Capeville while he was a seminarian.

In 1981, the Rev. Jesse Jackson spoke at Eastern Shore Community College. In 1982, Michael Jordan—then a college student—helped at a basketball clinic at Arcadia High School.

Diana Ross once dined at the former Whispering Pines near Tasley. Barbara Streisand once walked around Onancock, looking at the architecture. Joe DiMaggio was in Onancock in 1961 as a guest of regional sweet-potato growers.

George H.W. Bush, later the 41st U.S. president, was stationed at the Chincoteague Naval Air Station during World War II. And John McCain, later a presidential candidate, crashed a Navy jet in southern Northampton County in 1965.

Our peninsula is set apart from the world. But the world finds its way to us in a variety of circumstances.

Avis Parson Johnson's death wasn't notable because her sibling was a musical icon. It was notable for its abject tragedy.

Also fatally injured in the boating accident were Johnson's teenage daughter and a 10-year-old boy.

All lived in Virginia Beach and were headed for a stay at a former Cedar Island Coast Guard station with friends. But they left the boat ramp after sunset.

Their boat collided with another vessel whose occupant had been fishing. The Johnsons were pronounced dead at the scene.

"A 50-cent flashlight would have prevented three deaths," said Sgt. Mike Caison, of the Department of Game and Inland Fisheries, in a published report.

Avis Parsons Johnson was not identified as Gram Parsons' sister in news accounts.

The two apparently shared a good relationship strengthened by their difficult childhood.

Gram Parsons was so happy with his 1973 solo album "Grievous Angel" that he called his sister to express his pride in it. He died weeks later.

Avis Parsons Johnson graduated from Virginia Wesleyan University and was active in the United Methodist Church she attended in Virginia Beach. She taught rug hooking and was an active gardener, according to her obituary.

It was a quiet life that seemed disconnected from the almost Gothic horror that hung over her family and her famous brother, whose legend and influence has grown since his death almost a half-century ago.

Then one calm weekday evening in Accomack County, she unwittingly became a chapter in the family's harrowing story.

What happened is a great example of resiliency and dedication.

First, we embraced the idea that this was a new day, and with a new day you assess what needs to be changed and strengthened to be successful. We reframed the "reboot" as a "refresh."

Second, we established a new culture of "YES!" — Your Eastern Shore. It is a culture of hospitality, transparency, accountability, and inclusion.

With "YES!" embraced, we shared the ownership of the college; it is your Eastern Shore Community College.

Third, we had the courage to recognize we needed to change; it could not be business as usual. Every faculty and staff member embraced new roles including student recruitment and retention, program development, and being

an advocate for the college.

As if the challenge of the refresh wasn't enough, we faced a pandemic that turned everything upside down. We were suddenly an online college with online student services. Undaunted, the faculty and staff rose to the occasion. During the pandemic, students attended classes, received services, and best of all, students completed programs and graduated.

With the support of the community, our Foundation Board and Advisory Board, and through all kinds of hard work and sacrifice, we increased workforce and academic enrollments. We changed our business model and stabilized our finances, bringing in more revenue and lowering our expenses.

Here we are, three years later.

On Sept. 12, I received a letter from Sharon Morrissey, the interim chancellor of the state's community college sysem, informing me that "the results of sustainability analysis presented to the State Board for Community Colleges at the May 2022 meeting showed evidence of progress in addressing the challenges identified. Since the May 2022 board meeting, data have validated that the college is currently meeting one of the four thresholds. As such, I am lifting the re-boot status of the college."

ESCC has accomplished the goal of the lifting of the reboot. As president, I cannot minimize the hard work, dedication, and love the faculty and staff shared these last three years.

In fact, ESCC's Licensed Practical Nursing program was recently ranked No. 1 in the state by www.NursingProcess.org, and our RN program, operated in partnership with Tidewater Community College, is ranked No. 2 in the state. We added programs that help fill the needs of local employers and expanded opportunities for paid internships and jobs at NASA Wallops.

If you were to ask me three years ago what is the strategic plan for ES-CC, I would have responded that it is the refresh plan. We've recently completed our next five-year strategic plan that begins to position ESCC for the next 50 years to reach our vision of "to be the national model of a community college serving a rural community through diverse programming that leads to better lives and a better Shore."

So, to that community member who approached me a little over three years ago, I am proud to note that we did not let the college die. In fact, it is thriving and continually growing to meet the changing needs of the Shore. Here's to the next 50 years of Your Eastern Shore Community College and working together so all can reach our potential and contribute to our rich communities.

The fascinating world of bezoars

What do horses, persimmons, and the British crown jewels have in common? The answer is an object that

develops in the stomachs of some animals, including humans, and can harden into a stone said to have curative powers.

Bezoars begin as something ingested that proves to be undigestible a small stone, plant fiber, cer-

tain foods and medicines, or human hair. Calcium and magnesium phosphate secreted by the stomach form in layers around the foreign body like a pearl being created in an oyster. Peristalsis, the rhythmic contractions of the stomach, shape the object into a hard, round stone that can be pleasing in shape and color. But bezoars can also be hairy, stinky lumps.

Back in the days of animal sacrifices, when a stone-like bezoar was found in the stomach of a goat or sheep being sacrificed, the bezoar was treasured as having magical powers to cure diseases and provide protection against poisons. "Bezoar" comes from the Persian word for antidote.

By the 1500s, bezoars were all the rage among the rich and royal of Europe. You're attending an Elizabethan dinner party and suspect that your husband's daughter by his first marriage wants to get rid of you so she could inherit daddy's money? Drop a bezoar into your wine glass and drink like there's no tomorrow—because for you, if stepdaughter

poisons your wine, there will be no tomorrow. When it comes to curative powers, bezoars don't do squat.

Persimmons are notorious for causing bezoars in horses. The persimmon fiber (especially from unripe fruit) can create blockages in the horses' intestines that can lead to colic, weight loss, and even death. The bezoar often must be removed from the horse. In one well-publicized case, the bezoar in a pony was treated by flooding the blockage with Coca-Cola.

Elizabeth I is said to have had at least two bezoars. Not in her stomach but among her crown jewels with quick access should she be poisoned.

But, even in the 16th century, people had their doubts about bezoars being antidotes. One such naysayer, Ambroise Pare, a French surgeon who was physician to King Charles IX and also doubled as a barber, conducted a fiendish experiment. A man caught stealing spoons was to be executed. Pare said to the condemned: Do I have a deal for you. Ingest mercuric chloride, a deadly poison, but then swallow a bezoar. If the bezoar works,

you walk free.

It didn't work. Mercuric chloride causes an excruciating death, and the spoon thief, bleeding from every hole that can bleed, used his last breath to wish he had taken the gallows instead of the bezoar... and then died in agony.


Speaking of agony, the Rapunzel syndrome trichobezoar occurs when the bezoar is formed by hair that is ingested — in 90% of the cases, by young women who have developed a hair-pulling habit. This hair bezoar continues to expand as more hair is ingested until it can fill the stomach, move into the intestines, and even reach up into the esophagus.

These Rapunzel hairballs contain putrefying bits of food and are a pain to remove. No one, no matter how fearful of being poisoned, would drop one in a wine glass as an antidote to anything except ever drinking wine again.

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Committee addresses weaknesses, deficiency uncovered in county audit

A committee appointed by the Accomack County Board of Supervisors to provide independent review and oversight of the county's and the school board's financial reporting has met twice and has discussed corrective actions meant to address deficiencies identified by auditors in 2021.

Steven M. Belote chairs the committee, which also includes school board chairman Ronnie Holden and Supervisor C. Reneta Major.

The audit committee reviewed a monitoring worksheet created by a corrective action committee established after the 2021 audit showed weaknesses and deficiencies in the county's financial reporting practices.

The corrective action committee developed

a corrective action plan for each area defined as needing improvement or correction.

Most of those plans have been implemented, according to the audit committee's report to the board of supervisors at Wednesday's meeting.

The county's auditors, Brown Edwards, gave the committee an update on the fiscal year 2022 audit, saying it is on target to be completed by the deadline set by state law.

The audit committee was established in July, after the accounting firm reported five material weaknesses and three significant deficiencies relating to the audit of the county's fiscal year 2021 financial statements and two material weaknesses and one significant deficiency related to the audit of federal awards that year.

Last year was the first year Brown Edwards conducted the audit for Accomack.

Barnes was treated and released at Riverside Shore Memorial Hospital.


He is charged with felony drug possession, eluding, and driving without a license. He is incarcerated in Accomack County Jail with bail denied.

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Private space launch is Rocket Lab's first here

Launch window opens Dec. 7

Rocket Lab announced its inaugural launch from Wallops Island is set for early December — another landmark moment in the Eastern Shore's courtship of privately owned space enterprise and the resulting economic spinoff.

The space systems and launch company is targeting liftoff of its Electron rocket during a launch window that opens the afternoon of Dec. 7.

The exact time will be announced closer to launch day, but is expected to be in the afternoon or evening, according to an email from the company.

Backup launch opportunities will be available in the days following Dec. 7 should it be necessary to delay the launch.

It will be the first time Rocket Lab has launched a rocket from the United States.

"We are honored and excited to bring a new launch capability to Virginia's Eastern Shore," said Rocket Lab founder and CEO Peter Beck.

The launch will be visible from the usual viewing locations on Chincote-ague, including Robert Reed Park and Beach Road, as well as from other seaside viewing locations on the Eastern Shore.

Additionally, the NASA Visitor Center at Wallops will be open for the launch.

A live webcast of the launch will be available starting around 40 minutes before liftoff at at www.rocketlabusa.com/live-stream

"Electron is well-established as the leader in small launch," Beck said.

"With our inaugural mission from Launch Complex 2, we are immensely proud to expand on this strong launch

heritage by enabling a new capability for the nation from Virginian soil. We look forward to making history this December with our dedicated mission partners HawkEye 360, NASA, and Virginia Space."

The company has launched 31 Electron rockets on missions deploying 151 satellites from its first launch complex in New Zealand, making the Electron the most frequently launched small orbital rocket in the world, according to the company.

The company has dubbed the mission "Virginia is For Launch Lovers."

The mission is to deploy satellites for HawkEye 360, a Virginia-based radio frequency geospatial analytics provider.

"For our fifth cluster of next-generation satellites, we needed optimal orbital flexibility — and Rocket Lab's new Electron launch pad in Wallops, Virginia, provides the perfect domestic capability," said John Serafini, chief executive officer of HawkEye 360.

"Rocket Lab's inaugural launch facilitates our first mid-latitude satellite cluster, which will strengthen the diversity of our geospatial insights for our government and commercial customers across the globe," Serafini said.

The mission is the first of three Electron launches for HawkEye 360 under a contract that will see 15 satellites delivered to low-Earth orbit between

Rocket Lab the day before the launch plans to host a tour for media of the launch pad at the Mid-Atlantic Regional Spaceport on Wallops Island, as well as of the company's integration and control facility, which includes its mission control area.

With the addition of its second launch complex, Rocket Lab will be able to support more than 130 launches annually, according to a press release.

The Electron rocket is 59 feet tall, nearly 4 feet in diameter, and can carry a paylod of around 660 pounds to low-Earth orbit.

In addition to the Electron, the company is establishing a production complex and a dedicated launch pad for its larger, reuseable Neutron rocket at Wallops.

The Neutron will be 131 feet tall and able to carry payloads of more than 14 tons into low-Earth orbit, acstellation deployment, deep space missions, and human spaceflight.

Construction is underway on the 250,000 square-foot production complex, which is on a 28-acre parcel along the road leading to Wallops Island.

Plans for the Neutron production facility include automated fiber placement robotic production systems capable to laying up meters of a specially formulated carbon composite structure for the rocket in minutes.

Town announces proposed sewer rates

Exmore is ready to seek bidders for its wastewater project and has proposed new sewer rates intended to be fair to homeowners.

The rates, however, must ensure the sewer system is financially self-sustaining as required by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, which is partially funding the \$17 million project.

For every home connected to Exmore's sewer system, the owner will pay a \$40 monthly operation and maintenance fee, which will be applied to the town's sewer-related debt, and \$8 for every 1,000 gallons of wastewater treated, according to the proposed ordinance.

Customers will pay for wastewater treatment based on their water usage - if a household uses 3,000 gallons of water in one month, it will pay to treat 3,000 gallons of wastewater.

During a Nov. 14 public hearing, Director of Utilities Taylor Dukes noted this method of calculating sewer bills is used because it's difficult to accurately measure how much wastewater a household produces.

Town Manager Robert Duer said the town may implement lower rates

in the summer, when residents use more water to wash their cars and water their gardens.

The proposed sewer rate is higher than the current rate of \$44.50 for unlimited use, but it's sustainable, according to USDA's calculations.

Duer said if Exmore's current sewer system was self-sustaining, it would cost each household nearly \$100 a month.

He noted the proposed rate was based on the assumption that Exmore will borrow about \$5 million to pay for the portion of the construction costs not covered by grant funds.

If the town borrows less, the proposed sewer rates could decrease. If Exmore borrows more money, the rates

would increase.

Exmore citizen Joe Andrews asked why water rates are much lower than sewer rates.

The water rate is a minimum of \$18.50 for the first 1,000 gallons, then \$2.75 for every 1,000 gallons up to 10,000 gallons, and \$5.50 for every additional 1,000 gallons.

Dukes explained that treating wastewater costs two to three times as much as treating fresh water.

Brandi Drummond pointed out that her primary residence and guesthouse share a water bill, but there will be separate charges for sewer service.

Duer affirmed a family must pay the base amount of \$40 a month for each home connected to the sewer system, even an unoccupied residence.

"There's so many empty houses, I don't think it's fair to put \$15,000 or \$20,000 into somebody's house, and then everybody else pays ... the debt service on it," Duer said.

He explained why the town chose not to build a new sewer plant but instead is partnering with the Hampton Roads Sanitation District, which is building a force main to transport wastewater from Exmore and other towns to Onancock's treatment facility.

Exmore's sewer project includes only construction of a new, townwide collection system. Building a new sewer plant would cost an additional \$10 million, Duer estimated, and the town couldn't afford to borrow nearly that much.

Land for new drain fields would have cost another \$3 million or \$4 million and wasn't available for purchase, he added.

Once the new sewer system is ready to go, the only thing that will restrict Exmore's growth is the water withdrawal limit placed on it by the Virginia Department of Health.

Duer said the town will be able to grow by about 50%. Exmore's current population is around 1,400, and with the new sewer system the town could support about 2,100 residents.

He said the developments Exmore is seeking to attract include one or two more restaurants on the highway and workforce housing.

Exmore expects to be ready to receive bids on the sewer project in early December, and construction should be completed in about 15 months.

Additionally, local sales tax and revenue from building permits continue to outperform the same quarter last year.

The county collected more than \$1.6 million in sales taxes this quarter, compared to around \$1.4 million last year during the same period.

Building permit fees brought in arond \$104,000, compared to around \$89,000 in the first quarter last year.

The meals tax, which is in its first full fiscal year and for which budgeted revenue this year is \$500,000, brought in \$210,293 in the first quarter.







Cold temps will jump-start rockfish migration

This week's cold temperatures should help jump-start the migration of larger striped bass (rockfish) in-



Bill Hall to state waters. As of last weekend, the bulk of the trophy striper schools was still located in the ocean waters off New Jersey. I spoke with knowledgeable New Jersev source over the weekend said there was still a large population of bait

(menhaden) off the Jersey coast and he did not anticipate any southernly movement of the stripers as long as they had a reliable source of food. Early in the week, the local water temperatures had fallen into the upper 50s in the upper Chesapeake Bay and the lower 60s near the mouth of the bay.

Chincoteague

Captain Steve's Bait and Tackle will hold its annual Surf Fishing Tournament Nov. 18 to Nov. 20. Eligible species for the top three awards will include striped bass, red drum bluefish, and trout.

Neither Captain Lindsay Paul, of Trident Tackle, nor Amanda Manzella, of the Wachapreague Inn, had any reports of fishing action out of Wachapreague this week.

Lower Shore

Dez Louie, at Oceans East – Eastern Shore, said the unseasonal warm weather that the area experienced last weekend extended the end of the autumn fishing season a couple of days, allowing anglers a late season opportunity to land speckled trout, puppy drum, flounder, and schoolie-sized stripers.

The cold front, which approached the area late Sunday, probably triggered the final push of the warmer weather species out of the Chesapeake Bay en route to warmer waters.

These fish will be gorging themselves with as much food as they can consume to provide energy for their seasonal journey and anglers intercepting these fish can experience excellent action.

Soft plastic baits, especially scented ones like Berkley Gulp, can make a huge difference in production. Another option is to apply scents such as Pro-Cure Gel to nonscented baits like Z-Mans and Saltwater Assassins. Live minnows, fished under a float, are also very productive and less work than casting.





Melfa man sentenced after murder plea

A Melfa man will spend will spend a total of 26 years in prison for the May 2019 first-degree murder and attempted robbery of a man from whom he and two others bought marijuana.

Bronta Jamar Ames, 26, of Melfa, was sentenced in Accomack Circuit Court.

Alvin Lee "Derek" Rogers Jr. was called to a Boggs Road address to make a marijuana sale, said Accomack County Commonwealth's Attorney Spencer Morgan. He was backing out of the driveway when the shooting occurred.

Ames was in front of the vehicle shooting. Bullet holes were found in the windshield of the van. An autopsy showed Rogers was shot in the shoulder and the stomach and died at the scene.

In an agreement with the commonwealth, Ames pleaded guiling to shooting Rogers. In exchange for Ames' pleas of guilt to murder and attempted robbery, Morgan agreed not to prosecute charges of credit card fraud and credit card larceny.

Nyxavior Snead, of Belle Haven, who was 17 years old at the time, is also charged with Rogers' murder. He will be tried as an adult. The trial is set for April.


